EXCELLENT NOMINATIONS.  
The republican nominees for county commissioners are all well-known business men, and county affairs will be ably managed in their hands. E. A. Miera is a merchant and stock grower at Corrales, and Jesus Romero has a store in old Albuquerque. Mr. Romero is the present chairman of the board of county commissioners, and one of the most popular men in the county. He has made a faithful and competent public officer. The people can rest assured that county affairs will be carefully and honestly conducted by these well-known business men.

COUNTY CLERK.  
James A. Summers is the republican nominee for county clerk. For the past eleven years he has faithfully performed the duties of chief clerk in the office, and is known and respected by all the people. He is one of the best accountants in the county, and is thoroughly familiar with all the details of the county business. Nothing can go wrong in county affairs while Mr. Summers is kept in the county clerk's office. He is obliging and closely attentive to his duties, and the people will make no mistake in electing him to the office.

REPUBLICAN TICKET.  
The republican convention yesterday was a well attended and representative body of earnest men, anxious to select the best men for the various legislative and county offices. The utmost harmony prevailed and no ill-feeling was engendered in the selection of candidates. The nominees are all well known citizens and true and tried republicans.

M. Sandoval, one of the best men in the county and one of the most deserving republicans in the party. He has served the county as one of the board of commissioners and is well qualified to discharge the duties of county assessor. SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT.

The legislature two years ago consolidated the offices of county treasurer and tax collector, effecting a saving to the people of \$1,500 a year. The republican nominee for the office is Jose L. Perea, who is now the deputy collector of the county. Mr. Perea is well known to nearly everybody in this city and county, and one of the most capable men in the territory. He has served the people of the county four years as sheriff, and gave universal satisfaction in the office. Mr. Perea is a resident of this city and a popular citizen. He will probably lead the republican ticket in the size of his majority, which will be anywhere from fifteen hundred to two thousand.

THE REPUBLICANS yesterday nominated J. W. Ball as one of the river commissioners. Mr. Ball is a colored gentleman of this city and is considered a first-class business man in every respect. He will prove a capital river commissioner, with E. Marino, Apolinario Gutierrez, Trinidad Gabilan and Nazario Perea as his assistants.

THE El Paso Herald has been enlarged and greatly improved, and is now one of the very best papers in the great southwest. Bro. Smith has worked hard to build up a good paper in El Paso and he deserves abundant success.

LEGISLATIVE DELEGATION.  
The republican legislative nominees are well known to the people of the city and county. The nominees for the council are Thomas Hughes and T. A. Finiel. The first named has twice had the honor of serving the county in the territorial council, and T. A. Finiel served during the last session of that body with credit to himself and his constituents. If elected they will try to do their duty to the people. Two years ago they voted for every bill cutting down city, county and territorial expenses, and stand pledged to try to still further reduce expenses. Their two years ago helped to reduce the expenses of this county at least \$10,000 a year, and placed county warrants at par.

The three nominees for the house of representatives are well qualified to serve the people at the territorial capital. Marcelino Baca is a business man at Pena Blanca, and a man of force and ability. Pablo Crespin is one of the oldest residents of San Antonio, east of this city. He is the patriarch of his people in the Sandia mountains, and is beloved by all who know him. Rufilano L. Gutierrez is a resident of Candelario precinct, just north of this city, and is a well educated young man. He will make a good record in the legislature. THE CITIZEN is authorized to state that these gentlemen, if elected, will work and vote for the best interests of this city and county.

COUNTY OF SUMMIT.  
If the republicans of Gallup consult their best interests they will give their vote to the republican ticket. Arrangements are now being made to give Gallup a new county. If the new county is made it will be the work of the republicans of the legislature. Two years ago and four years ago the Gallup county bill was defeated by the democratic members of the legislature. Four years ago in the council Pedro Perea devoted all his energies to securing the new county. He was defeated by the democratic members, who had stolen a majority of the legislature. The republicans of this county have always stood ready to state that the county of Summit, and this next winter there should be no reason why the bill should not become a law.

Four years ago the democrats claimed that tin plate could not be made in the United States.

To get a few hundred voters in Santa Fe county two years ago, H. B. Ferguson deliberately sold out the people of Albuquerque on the location of the capital.

The people of this city do not forget that it was M. B. Otero who located the court house in old town, to the great and lasting injury of this city.
