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FOREIGN POLITICS.

Russia Will Support France in
Fashoda Question.Quarantine Restrictions on Traffic
in Louisiana Removed.Five People Killed in Railroad Wreck
in Texas.

McKINLEY IN WASHINGTON.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 22.—Commenting upon the recent speech of the British ambassador to the emperor, Sir Michael Hicks Beach, Novorossyia charges the ambassador with making a violent attack upon the French government and says he failed to bear in mind that France was in Russia an ally resolved to support her in the Fashoda question.

THE HOUSE AGITATED.
Paris, Oct. 22.—The house today was agitated, during the early portion, but subsequent the unanimity experienced regarding the outcome of the Fashoda dispute subsided. This was due to a growing belief that the matter would be amicably arranged.

To Examine Surgeons.
Washington, Oct. 22.—An order has been issued by the war department directing the surgeon-general to convene a board of medical officers to examine the acting assistant surgeons now in the service and candidates for appointment. At the outset of the war and up to the present time appointments have been made by the surgeon-general on professional and such other endorsements as candidates have been able to present because of the urgent necessity for service.

Railroad Sold at Auction.
Arkansas City, Kan., Oct. 22.—The St. Louis, Kansas & Southwestern railroad was sold at auction today under a decree of the United States circuit court to satisfy the claim of the Morse Loan and Trust company of New York. The line is sixty miles long, from Arkansas City to Anthony. The property was purchased for \$100,000 by Samuel Baker, of Hamilton, Oct. 18, representative of the creditors, who held \$800,000 of the company's bonds.

PRINCETON'S CELEBRATION.

Its 150th Anniversary Celebrated With
Appropriate Ceremonies.
Princeton, N. J., Oct. 22.—Princeton university celebrated its 150th anniversary today with appropriate ceremonies. The imposing academy procession, in which appeared ex-president Grover Cleveland, and other men of national reputation, passed from the library to Alexander hall, where the exercises were held. President Putnam introduced as the guest of honor President Sherman, of John Hopkins university, who addressed the assembly on "Books and Politics." Honorary degrees in doctor of laws were conferred upon Abraham Kuyper, D. D., of Holland; Albert V. Dicey, B. C. L., of England.

British Navy.

London, Oct. 22.—The British admiralty has ordered every sea-going warship to have its crew made up to the full complement as ordered in the case of mobilization. Six torpedo boat destroyers, about to be fitted with new water tube boilers and had the orders countermanded, have been instructed to redraw their stores. Officers on leave of absence or unemployed have been notified to hold themselves in readiness to commission reserve squadron.

Bad Railroad Wreck.

Fort Worth, Texas, Oct. 22.—A freight train on the Rock Island road broke in two at the top of a steep grade near here today. The rear portion crashed into the front section, wrecking several box cars. In one were ten men sitting a ride. Five were instantly killed, three dying later. The names could not be learned.

Troops for Cuba.

Washington, Oct. 22.—According to the last advice from Gen. Wads, president of the American commission, it will probably be December 1 before American troops will be required in Cuba. In the meantime the board, now in Cuba selecting camp sites, will be enabled to have comfortable quarters ready when the troops arrive.

Bank Statement.

New York, Oct. 22.—Weekly bank statement: Surplus reserve, increased, \$3,750,775; loans increased, \$1,000,000; specie increased, \$8,105,700; legal tenders increased, \$8,877,800; deposits increased, \$18,088,900; circulation increased, \$19,160,000; banks hold \$23,312,325 in excess of requirements.

British Cabinet.

London, Oct. 22.—The British cabinet has been summoned to meet early next week for the purpose of discussing the Fashoda question. It is understood that the government proposes that steps be necessary to insist upon early and definite statement on the subject from France.

Embassies for All.

Denver, Oct. 22.—The supreme court today decided that each ticket filed by petition is entitled to an embus on the official ballot. Under this ruling the Teller effort to prevent the appearance of the petitioners on the ballot and the words, "to 1 by Uncle Sam alone."

Native Indignant.

Manila, Oct. 22.—Admiral Dewey's seizure of Aguinaldo's steamer has made the natives indignant and their attitude is threatening.

SOREHEADS MEET.

Otero and Spencer Hold Their
Little Side Show.They are Going to Reform Every-
thing in Sight.Ticket Selected that Will Meet with De-
feat in November.

THE MEETING SLIGHTLY ATTENDED.

This morning M. S. Otero and a few of his faithful followers assembled at the orchestra hall, old town, and went through the form of holding an alleged county convention.

Some one suggested M. S. Otero for temporary chairman, and he also talked for reform and was in favor of organizing a party of his own for political purposes. K. W. Spencer was made temporary secretary.

Committees were appointed on credentials and resolutions, but what they wanted was a committee on credentials. The little crowd represented only themselves and was a mixture of sorehead republicans and disgruntled democrats.

At 3 o'clock the convention reassembled, and the committee on credentials reported, and the report was adopted. Judge Denham made a motion for a committee on emblem.

Pauline Muntz, chairman, and E. W. Spencer, secretary.

After a long harangue by Senator Salazar, the meeting got down to business, and a long string of resolutions were read endorsing McKinley and the gold standard and protection to American industries; congratulating the country upon the results of the late war; denouncing the republican administration; and demands that the outlaws be put in the republican convention; whopped up the bones and had a bug at the courts.

The platform as a whole is the usual dysentery of words used by sorehead conventionists. Judge Denham reported the emblem, two flags crossed, which was adopted. Nominations being in order the ticket was read, and the following followed: For the Council—Alex. Bows and E. W. Spencer.

For county commissioners—M. S. Otero, Benjamin Johnson and E. P. Jones.

NAVAJO INDIANS CONVICTED.

Hosh Ke and Na Si Hi Guilty of Murder in First and Second Degrees.

The jury in the case of the territory vs. Na Si Hi and Hosh Ke Yih Na Hih, the two Navajo Indians charged with the murder of Hosh Nese, another Navajo, brought in a verdict last night finding the former defendant guilty of murder in the second degree, and the latter guilty of murder in the first degree.

Attorney S. R. Gillett, who represented the Indians for action for a suit upon the judgment on the ground that his clients had not been arraigned.

Hosh Ke Yih Na Hih Da yesterday appeared on the witness stand and admitted that he fired the shot that killed Hosh Nese, but said that he did so to save his uncle, Na Si Hi, who was getting the worst of Hosh Nese.

Na Si Hi knew nothing of the shooting for the reason that he had been knocked unconscious just before it occurred. He testified that he was taking some whiskey to Hosh Nese's camp when he became mixed up in the fight with the husband, who objected to the attentions which Na Si Hi was paying his wife.

When the jury brought in the verdict against the Indians last night Judge Pumphrey adjourned court until tomorrow, when Martinéz will be tried for the murder of Maldonado.

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SANTA FE LINES.

The Big Road Will Absolve All
Branch Lines.New Route to Alaska Discovered at
Mouth of River Yukon.Heavy Frosts Reported in the Southern
States Last Night.

Topeka, Kansas, Oct. 22.—All branch lines now included in the Santa Fe system are to lose their identity as separate corporations and will be incorporated under title of the Atchafalaya, Topeka & Santa Fe railway. Many times will be formally sold to the parent corporation, but those in such shape that formal purchase cannot be made will be conveyed to the company by lease. This scheme will be officially ratified by the board of directors at their annual meeting on December 8. The branch lines to thus be consolidated number about twenty.

Heavy Frosts Reported in the Southern States Last Night.

SICK SOLDIERS FROM MANILA.

Yellow Fever District Visited by White Front.

Washington, Oct. 22.—The weather bureau bulletin on frosts in the yellow fever district says: "This morning's reports show frosts generally throughout the infected district. In Alabama and eastern and northern Mississippi and northern Louisiana the frosts were killing in southern and western Mississippi and southern Louisiana light frosts are reported. At Mobile the minimum temperature was forty degrees; at New Orleans, 45."

San Francisco, Oct. 22.—The United States transport steamer Rio de Janeiro arrived today from Manila with 150 sick soldiers. Right close at sea. The vessel was sent to the quarantine station at Angel Island, and the particulars of the voyage are unobtainable.

ALASKAN BOUNDARY.

Another Mouth of the Great Yukon River Discovered.

Washington, Oct. 22.—The discovery of 200 miles additional territory of the United States on the Alaska coast and a new channel for the Yukon, which will minimize the distance in time and danger, is officially reported by Superintendent Priesthood, of the coast and geology, by John F. Braden, Mississippi, in charge of the expedition working in those waters. The new channel will effect a saving of four or five hundred miles in reaching the Yukon. Ships of moderate draught can proceed directly into the Yukon from the south, instead of going to St. Michaels and continue up the river for four or five hundred miles, to a safe landing before transshipping to smaller boats.

AN AMERICAN CITIZEN.

He is an honest and able man, a courageous man, true to his convictions, loyal to his flag and country. Why should he be called a Mexican? His father became an American citizen by absolute choice. In 1818, the republican nominee for congress was born years after his father assumed American citizenship. If he is not a native born American citizen in the truest sense of the word, there are none such in this great country.

A recent report of the mineral products of the United States for ten years ended with 1897, shows some interesting statistics, which are condensed in a recent issue of the New York Commercial Advertiser. While the total value of domestic pig iron produced in 1897 was \$95,122,249, as compared with \$131,161,039 in 1892, the total quantity produced one year ago was 495,983 tons larger, thus pointing to the extraordinary decline in prices during the intervening five years. Pig iron heads the list in point of value of domestic metals produced, followed by silver, of which \$69,037,172 worth was produced last year. Gold ranked third, the aggregate value of domestic production amounting to \$17,365,000 as compared with \$33,600,000 worth in 1892. The increase in the production and value of copper last year, as compared with 1892, was extraordinary, the former showing a gain of 40 per cent, and the latter a gain of nearly 82 per cent.

In the list of non-metallic products, bituminous coal stands first with an output during 1897 valued at nearly \$120,000,000, or about \$5,000,000 less than 1892, notwithstanding an increased production last year over 1892, amounting to 51,000,000 tons, which figures furnish another instance of the reduction in values sustained during the period following the panic of 1893.

The grand total value of the combined output of non-metallic, metallic and unspecified mineral products of the country in 1897 reached the enormous sum of \$632,312,347.

Petroleum ranks third, with a total output of 5,568,000 barrels, an increase of 20 per cent compared with 1892. In value the total last year was \$40,929,000, a gain of nearly 64 per cent.

MAJOR HENRY has returned to Santa Fe, and will probably resume his old position in the weather bureau office.

Most encouraging reports reach us from every county in the territory of republican success. Socorro county will give a good majority to every candidate on the republican ticket. Perera's majority will exceed that of Mr. Catron in 1894.
