## REPUBLICAN TICKET.



For Delegate to Congress,  
**PEDRO PERA,**  
OF BERNALILLO COUNTY.

REPUBLICAN clubs will be formed in every precinct in this county.

This city should cultivate the friendship of the people of the county.

Geo. Chase, one of the best newspaper men in the territory, is now connected with the Las Vegas Optic.

The Crescent, published at La Balle, will be removed to Taos, and will be known in the future as the Taos Crescent.

The democratic papers are trying to start the fall campaign on the race issue, which may result in great injury to the territory.

The opposition have already tapped a large campaign fund, and are trying to corrupt the voters of several small precincts near this city.

The republicans desire to elect a republican delegate to congress so that he can secure beneficial legislation from a republican president and congress.

No one can accuse Pedro Pera of seeking the nomination for congressional delegate. He received the solid endorsement of the republicans of this county unhesitatingly.

There was no ill feeling in the territorial republican convention. Hon. Pedro Pera had the solid support of several counties, and in the end was nominated unanimously.

One of the falsehoods already started by the democrats is that Pedro Pera opposed the building of the Santa Fe railroad. The statement is so ridiculous that it needs no refutation.

No one can truthfully say a word against the character of Pedro Pera. His honesty has never been questioned, and his executive ability has made him the republican leader of this county.

Six years ago, in the territorial council, Pedro Pera led the fight in favor of the public schools in the cities, and but for his able work this city would not enjoy to day its excellent public school system.

The republican party is the true friend of silver. The republican party has caused the American silver dollar to circulate in Cuba, Porto Rico, Philippine islands and elsewhere in the world at par with the gold of all other countries.

This city is vitally interested in the success of a republican delegate to congress. There are several measures pending—one of which is the establishment of a military post here—which will be defeated if Mr. Ferguson is again sent to congress.

With lamb-selling at \$2 a head, the sheep men of New Mexico are making money. Two years ago lamb were hardly worth gathering from the ranges for shipment. The republican policy of protection to American industries brought this prosperity about.

The Boston Globe says that by the terms of his grandfather's will Chicago man who has a penchant for liquor has inherited the right to get drunk, and \$600 a year is provided for him for that purpose. And yet there are men who say there is no such thing as luck.

The Las Vegas Optic should be more careful of its political predictions. It says Grant county is safe for 600 majority for Ferguson. That county gave the gentlemen D.D. majority last year. At this rate of loss Mr. Ferguson will be badly beaten in the territory next month.

The opposition is making assertions that the republican nominee for congress will not carry any votes in this city. The same opposition has made these statements the past twelve years, but when the votes were counted it was found that the republican party of the city and county had a healthy majority.

It is certainly to the interest of Albuquerque republicans to give the congressional nominee and the county ticket their united support. This city has a university and other institutions to maintain, and if we antagonize the rest of the territorial republicans, it will be hard for our delegation in the next legislature to secure recognition.

GROWTH OF THE POSTAL SERVICE.  
The report of the auditor of the post office department of the United States government for the year ending June 30, 1908, shows the revenues of the department were \$6,847,000 greater than for

the preceding year. The expenses increased \$1,252,000, so that there was a net profit of over two millions in the new business gained during the year. The total revenues for the year were eighty-nine million dollars and the expenses ninety-eight and one-fourth millions. The service cost a little over nine million dollars more than the amount paid by the public for postage. The deficit last year was two million no less than in the preceding year, a little more than two years ago and a little less than three years ago.

MINNESOTA'S INDIAN TROUBLES.  
Indian uprisings are getting few and far between, and the latest one, like the affair of Wounded Knee several years ago is not likely to last long. Its origin, as explained by an Indian agent, was in the arrest by a United States deputy marshal of a Chippewa brave, whose comrades forcibly rescued him. When the marshal found himself unable to execute his process he called for troops, and these responding, landed on the island where the Indians lived, were attacked and compelled to fight for their lives against superior numbers.

It had been anticipated that the removal of the major part of the army from west would tempt the Indians to riot and bloodshed, but the danger was looked for in the southwest rather than in Minnesota. The handling of the Arizona tribes under such circumstances as pertain at Leech Lake might have been a serious matter, but the Chippewas are not numerous enough and too closely hemmed in by civilization to cause much trouble.

FAIR PLATFORM.  
Sierra county democrats make the remarkable statement in their platform that the county has lost three million dollars in valuation since McKinley's election. The man who wrote that platform ought to have a permanent job on a county paper. Certainly the gold mines of Bernalillo and the sheep and cattle industries of Sierra county have not lost in value since McKinley's election; and the other day the writer of this paragraph helped make a careful inspection of the tax rolls of Sierra county on file in the office of the territorial auditor, and found no such reduction. There was only one appeal for a reduction this year from that county, and that was from the democratic manager of a big cattle company owned by eastern capitalists. Sierra county is one of the most prosperous in the territory, and the attempt of the democrats of that county to injure its fair reputation should be promptly rebuffed.

THE SAME OLD PARTY.  
Every once in a while we run across something which proves that the democratic party is one and eternal, changing not from age to age, and here we find a democratic proclamation that is worth more than passing remark.

"Resolved, That the administration, by its corruption and imbecility, has shown itself incapable of a successful prosecution of the war, and from its inactivity, tergiversations, and its bad faith, is manifestly incapable of negotiating an honorable peace."

This is not, as you might think, a denunciation of McKinley's administration by some democratic convention of 1908; the answer was aimed at Abraham Lincoln; the resolution was passed by the democrats of Maine in the campaign of 1864, and was meant to be in line with that famous declaration issued by the national democratic convention at Chicago in that year denouncing the war as a failure.

When it comes to passing judgment on the conduct of a war, who can pretend to rival the democrats?

In the Philippine islands, under Spanish rule, all males over 21 years of age must pay a poll tax that equals about \$20 of our money, and the women must pay \$15. A man must pay a license to sell coconuts from his own trees or indulge of his own raising. Every article of furniture that costs half a sovereign is taxed. The curtain never goes up at a theater unless \$10 is paid to the government, and for every act of slaughtering his own animals, clipping his own sheep or felling his own trees, the Philippine farmer must pay a fee to the government. There is exacted government tribute for getting married and for getting buried, and for every step and turn of his life the tax collector holds out his hand to him, and it is not a demand that can be refused. And yet some people in the United States favor a continuation of that sort of thing.

THE Socorro Chieftain, under the editorship of Clement Hightower, is one of the very best weekly journals in the territory.

Investigation of the War Department. About fifty voters of that section turned out to greet the candidates and give assurance of aid in redeeming Arizona and Yavapai county from misrule and incompetency. With the exception of A. H. Wycoff the speakers were county candidates, and so much enthusiasm was aroused that at the close of the meeting three cheers were given for the ticket as never before heard on Lynx creek. Democrats who feign to believe the republicans are not confident and have no hope for success, would have changed their tune had they been present at this rally. The candidates go to Williamson valley to-night—Prescott Pick and Brill.
