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## GOOD HAUL BY ROBBERS

Enter Iowa Post Office and  
Secure \$2,500—Posse Gives  
Chase and After Running  
Fight.

## TWO ARE CAPTURED

Over Half of the Sum Stolen is Re-  
covered—Third Bandit Gets  
Away.

Reinbeck, Iowa, Dec. 12.—Robbers entered the postoffice in this town during the night and got away with \$2,500. Exchange of shots took place between a posse of citizens and the robbers, who made good their escape.

The posse pursued the robbers on a handcar. Six miles away, after exchanging shots with them, one man, who gave the name of James Roach, and said he was a railroad man, was captured. From him \$1,300 were recovered.

Further on the town marshal of Bee-man captured another of the robbers, but the third escaped.

## CARNEGIE MUST GO TO CLEVELAND

Steel King Subpoenaed to Testify Before  
Grand Jury—Does Not Fancy  
the Idea.

New York, Dec. 12.—A subpoena was served on Andrew Carnegie at his home in this city today, calling upon him to go to Cleveland, Ohio, on Wednesday and testify in the case of Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick. Carnegie is requested to appear before the federal grand jury in the United States district court at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Carnegie was much annoyed when he discovered that the summons required him to make the trip to Cleveland. He will be paid 5 cents a mile for his trip to Cleveland and \$1.50 a day for his time when actually before the grand jury.

## KILLED BY INSANE MAN

Mrs. Walters Murdered by Luis Ramirez at  
Tularosa Wednesday—Shoots Himself.

Alamogordo, Dec. 12.—Word has just been received here of a double tragedy in Tularosa Canon, which has greatly shocked the people of this city. Luis Ramirez shot and killed Mrs. Albina Walters, widow of William Walters a pioneer of Tularosa, while she was pleading for her life and later killed himself. It is supposed that he was seized with a sudden mania. It occurred Wednesday. Mrs. Walters' two sons live in this city.

## OLD RESIDENT PASSES AWAY

William Crane, a Pioneer of McKinley County  
Died Last Night of Old Age.

Gallup, Dec. 12.—William Crane, one of the oldest settlers of McKinley County and well known in Santa Fe, died at his home at Bacon Springs last night of the infirmities of old age. The deceased came to what is now McKinley County, thirty years ago, and settled at Coolidge Station, now Guam. He retired from business several years ago. He was a good business man and well liked by all of his neighbors and those who did business with him.

## JOINT STATE- HOOD FIGHT

Governor Otero and Chairman Bursum  
Have Wired Strong Protests Fav-  
oring Consideration—Women  
Suffragists Oppose It in  
Present Form.

Governor Otero and Chairman Bursum, of the Republican Territorial Central Committee, spent some time Saturday last in formulating dispatches containing vigorous protests against the passage of the Hamilton joint Statehood Bill which is now pending in the United States senate and giving strong reasons for this course, as well as making powerful objections to the provisions of the bill.

These dispatches were sent to Senator Beveridge, chairman of the Senate Committee on Territories, to Senator Foraker of Ohio, to Senator Gallinger, of New Hampshire, as well as to several other senators who are not exactly in love with the pending measure and who would be glad to have it defeated. These dispatches were followed up by letters containing strong protests, giving the result of the recent election and informing these senators that the people of this Territory by at least 90 per cent were strongly and unequivocally opposed to the passage of the bill and that it would be a waste of time, energy, labor and money to have the bill become a law and to hold a constitutional convention under it.

Governor Otero expects to start for Washington tomorrow to appear before the Senate committee on territories to argue against the passage of the bill and also to work on the same lines with individual senators of whom quite a number are warm personal friends of the governor.

**Women Suffragists at Work.**  
The woman suffragists are taking a prominent part in the proposed passage of the Hamilton joint statehood bill and a recent Washington special says in the matter: "Women suffragists of this city have decided to oppose the passage of the statehood bill which proposes to admit to statehood four territories under the names of Oklahoma and Arizona, unless the bill is amended to provide for adoption of the franchise for women in the proposed new states."

"Mrs. Belva Lockwood presided at a meeting of women suffragists last evening, at which it was decided to ask the senate committee on territories to grant the suffragists a hearing on the amendment desired by them."

"Protests signed by women of New York, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Washington, Wyoming and the District of Columbia, against admission of new states with provisions discriminating against women in enabling acts have been presented to congress and a vigorous crusade will be carried on by the women to secure equal suffrage in the new states, should they be admitted."

"It is believed that the bill now before the senate, which has passed the house, providing for the admission of four territories as two states, will be passed by the senate without opposition of Democrats, who realize that statehood in this form is the only measure that will be allowed by Republican leaders to go through."

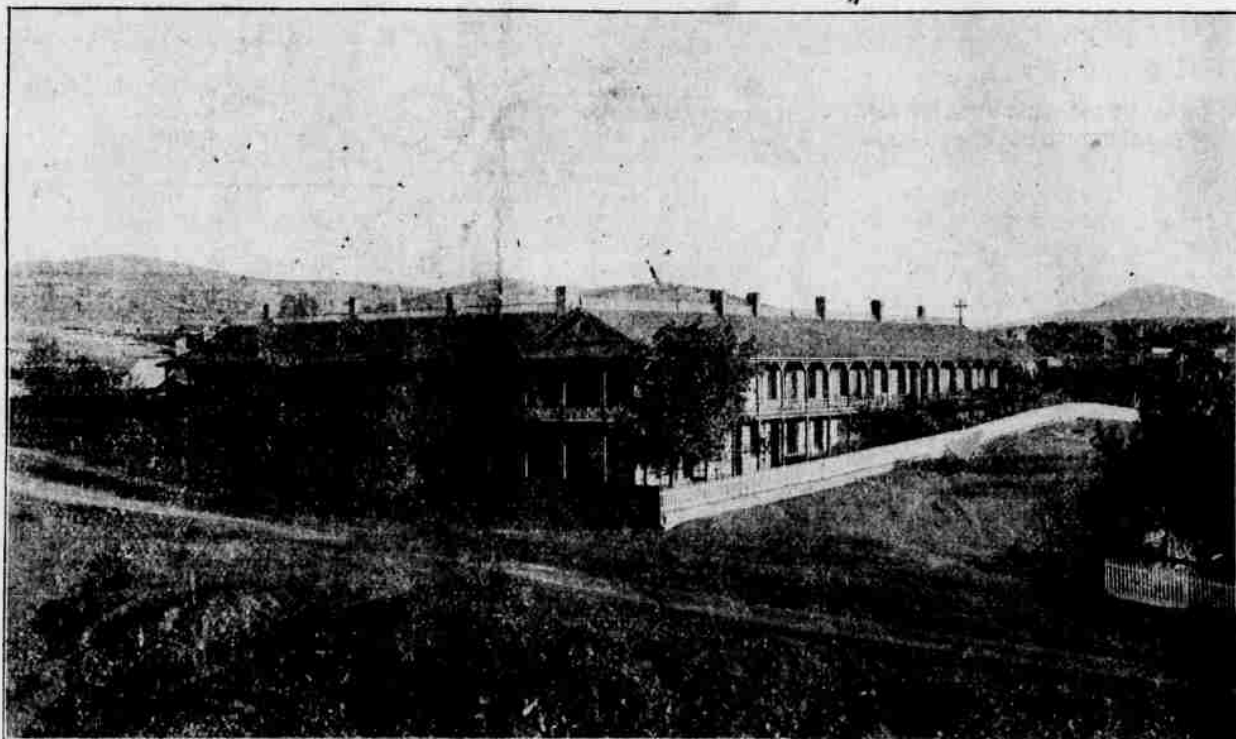
**For Taos County.**

## PORT ARTHUR IS BURNING

Terrific Bombardment of Japan-  
ese is Fast Reducing  
the Fortress.

## MORE TROUBLE FOR THE CZAR

Exciting Scenes Attend Hearing of  
Minister Von Peleve's Assassin—  
Many Are Arrested.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 12.—The Japanese legation today received the following from Tokio: "Port Arthur army headquarters reports that the bombardment has inflicted considerable damage upon Golden Hill, and also set Port Arthur on fire."

**Shelling Port Arthur.**  
Tokio, Dec. 12.—The commander of the naval land batteries in front of Port Arthur reports as follows: "Four Russian battleships, two cruisers, one gunboat and one torpedo storer are lying in Port Arthur harbor completely disabled. There is no further necessity of bombarding the Russian squadron. We are now engaged in shelling the town of Port Arthur, which is being heavily damaged."

**Russian Ships in Port.**  
Sundab, Dec. 12.—The Russian warships Oleg and Dnieper and the torpedo-boat destroyer Grozny arrived here during the night.  
Cape Town, Dec. 12.—The Russian hospital ship Orel arrived here today to take on supplies. Two large Russian warships passed Cape Point this morning.

**Attacks Unsuccessful.**  
Mukden, Dec. 12.—On Friday night the Japanese several times attacked the trenches of the Russians' right, and in each case they were repulsed.

**More Internal Troubles.**  
St. Petersburg, Dec. 12.—St. Petersburg resumed its wonted quiet today after the excitement of the demonstration of yesterday. The papers without comment print only a brief official account of the rioting. Nevertheless they are full of articles demanding reforms, the Russ espec-

## AGAIN POUND DOWN STOCKS

More Frenzied Finance on the  
New York Stock Exchange and  
Bulls Get the Worst of it.

## BIG FIGHT ON COPPER

Tape Got Lost in Morning's Business—  
Cause of Decline is a Mystery—  
Buying at Close.

New York, Dec. 12.—There was another opening smash in stocks today, Amalgamated Copper again being the center of trouble. Heavy unloading at the opening carried it down 4 1/2 points. The market fluctuated unevenly and then lowered. The extreme weakness of the market came as a surprise.

**Bulls Paralyzed.**  
It became evident during the afternoon that the buyer demand was practically paralyzed beyond an occasional covering by the bear element.

**Early Bears Buy.**  
The sentiment changed later to the extent that brokers advised their clients to buy standard stocks and early sellers became late buyers. Business during such tremendous proportions attained the first hour that the tape was at times 10 minutes behind the market. At 1 o'clock heavy selling again began. With the approach of the last hour the market showed some improvement but all trading was done with caution. There is no tangible news to account for the decline.

**Articles of Incorporation Filed.**  
The following articles of incorporation have been filed in the office of the Territorial Secretary, J. W. Reynolds:  
The Chaco Coal and Iron Company. Capital stock, \$250,000, divided into 25,000 shares of the value of \$10 each. The principal place of business will be Santa Fe, and the term of existence 50 years. The incorporators and directors for the first three months are Amado Chaves, Glenville A. Collins and Irene L. Chaves, all residents of Santa Fe. The object of the company is to carry on a general business in the mining and selling of coal and its by-products.

**TO STOP TRESPASSING.**  
Washington, D. C., Dec. 12.—The Secretary of the Interior, in a letter to the speaker of the House, recommends the passage of an amendment to the Indian appropriation bill covering the trespass of livestock on Indian reservation lands. The section at present provides a fine of \$1. The proposed amendment authorizes the United States Indian agent or other officer to seize and hold trespassing stock, in order that they may be sold, or such number thereof as shall be necessary to pay the charges incurred and penalty prescribed.

## DELEGATE RODEY SHOULD TAKE A HEADER.

The Las Vegas Optim in a recent issue reads Delegate B. S. Rodey a well-deserved lesson. It takes him to task for statements made by him recently in Washington to the effect that up to twenty-four hours before the nomination of the candidate for delegate by the Republican convention in September, he was sure of the nomination, that Governor Otero and Delegate-Elect Andrews entered into a horrid conspiracy to deprive him of it and that between \$30,000 and \$40,000 in actual cash were spent in order to attain Mr. Andrews' nomination. He gave vent to a lot more rot and hot air, but the above are the principal points in the half column interview which he induced Washington correspondents to send broadcast over the country. The fact is that Mr. Rodey was defeated for re-nomination not by a conspiracy, by the use of money nor by the patronage of the administration; but by the will and desires of the Republican voters of the Territory, who had done too much for him, which gave him the "swell head." The rank and file of the Republican party in the Territory wanted a man as delegate to Congress who would fight the joint statehood plan, who would advocate single statehood for New Mexico within present Territorial limits and under its present name; it wanted a man who would cut loose from the political machine which was the worst that ever cursed the Republican or any other party in New Mexico. The voters were victorious and the Hubbell machine was beaten horse, foot and dragons. Mr. Rodey was told a week before the day of the nominating convention in Santa Fe that if he did not agree to drop his joint statehood humbug and work for single statehood for New Mexico and cut loose from the Frank Hubbell machine in Albuquerque, his defeat was certain. He did not believe it and would not believe it, because the Hubbell machine had assured him that there was no power in the Territory that could hurt or defeat him as long as the machine supported him. The result is known. Delegate Rodey should take a header and behave himself during the remainder of his term of office.

## AN ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION NECESSARY.

During the past 14 years, the work in the office of the Territorial superintendent of public instruction has grown steadily and the duties of that office have increased to a large extent in many directions. In fact there is too much work there for one man and an increase in the office force should be made. While this paper favors economy and rigid economy at that, in the Territorial administration, still it believes in providing a sufficient number of officials and enough funds for the proper conduct of affairs of each public office now in existence and necessary for the proper and efficient carrying out of the intent and letter of the laws bearing upon the same. In this connection, this paper suggests that the office of assistant superintendent of public instruction be created by the coming Legislative Assembly and that the superintendent and assistant superintendent be given a fair salary consistent with the important duties of their positions. The laws now in force concerning the office of superintendent of public instruction and defining its duties should also be amended in certain directions and more power should be given that official in the supervision of the public schools. A proviso should also be made to compel city boards of education and boards of regents of the Territorial educational institutions to comply promptly with the demands of the superintendent in furnishing information concerning the conditions of their institutions and to make regular and necessary annual reports to that official for use in his annual report to the governor of the Territory. There cannot be too much publicity in school matters and the more

they are placed in the lime light of public opinion, the better will it be for all concerned. It should also be made a duty of the superintendent and assistant superintendent to make semi-annual inspections of the city school systems and of the higher educational institutions and make regular reports thereon to the executive for his information and guidance and for the information of the tax payers and people interested in educational matters. The New Mexican hopes that these suggestions will be taken in a kindly spirit by the members of the Thirty-sixth Legislative Assembly, as they are made for what are believed to be the best interests of the commonwealth and of its educational system.

## THE STAY-AT-HOME VOTE IN THE RECENT ELECTION.

It is a remarkable fact that the total vote cast on November 8, this year, for Presidential electors was less than the vote cast four years ago. Out of about nineteen million registered voters, less than fourteen millions availed themselves of their privilege as American citizens. In the South the stay-at-home vote was especially large, in Texas alone 200,000 less votes having been cast than four years previous. In New Mexico there was a stay-at-home vote that reached 15,000 for out of almost 60,000 registered vote only 44,000 were cast. As long as the stay-at-home vote reaches that proportion, the political prophet is necessarily more or less at sea in making forecasts for the future, although it is certain, that the stay-at-home vote of the Democrats this year was much larger than that of the Republicans. While Parker had a quarter of a million votes less than did Bryan four years ago, Roosevelt had only half a million more votes than did President McKinley the last time he was elected.

Medical authorities assert that the increase of certain throat diseases in cold weather is not due so much to the rigor of the climate as to the fact that the dust is not as fully absorbed as in warm weather. There are diseases for which the dust is quite as responsible as temperature. For a city that makes a claim to being a health resort, the sprinkling of the streets, is therefore an important matter, a fact of which the Santa Fe City authorities should not lose sight.

W. A. Leonard, who for years was one of the publishers of the Silver City Enterprise, but who of late has been publishing a paper in Arizona, is mentioned as a probable successor to Governor Brodie, should the latter retire from the executive office. Mr. Leonard has had sufficient and varied experience in the managing of newspapers and there is therefore no good reason why he should not make a good governor. He is on the right side in politics.

According to Secretary Taft's recent annual report, the American soldier is the best fed on this mundane sphere. If there is any trouble with rations provided for the navy, the New Mexican suggests to Secretary Paul Morton that the establishment of the Harvey eating house system on American war ships might be an improvement over the present methods. The Secretary knows all about this and his experience might come in in good play.

The jury system which has been in vogue in this Territory for several years past has not given satisfaction to the people. It should be changed. Jurors should be chosen by lot in the presence of disinterested jury commissioners from the qualified voters of each county. The wheel box method should be used. The Thirty-sixth Legislative Assembly will do well to look into this matter and give it careful consideration.

The construction of the Scenic Route Road between Santa Fe and Las Vegas across the beautiful and picturesque Pecos range will be pushed to completion during the coming year, provided the Thirty-sixth Legislative Assembly will help this very laudable and timely project with a small appropriation. It looks as if this would be done and it will certainly be very satisfactory.

Nebraska statesmen and financiers are getting an enviable reputation for thoroughness in business and politics. At a bank that had recently failed in that state, two cents in actual cash were found in the vaults, when the receiver appeared and took charge. The rest of the funds and property had disappeared.

The members of the Thirty-sixth Legislative Assembly of New Mexico are ahead of those of the Fifty-eighth Congress in one respect. None of them have written testimonials for patent medicines. Several members of the present Congress have done so and have received quite handsome sums therefor.

It is reported from Washington that there will be no river and harbor improvement legislation in this session of Congress. New Mexico can look up on this matter with equanimity. Its navigable rivers and harbors are not worth talking about.

In the matter of higher educational institutions the new joint state of Arizona would be a little top heavy. A rather serious question, this, should joint statehood become a fact.

A prominent New York club woman asserts that all women cannot marry handsome men. That may be the case in New York, but not so in New Mexico.

The removal of Judge Baker of the Second judicial district court is another proof that President Roosevelt requires federal officials to walk in the straight and narrow path of duty.

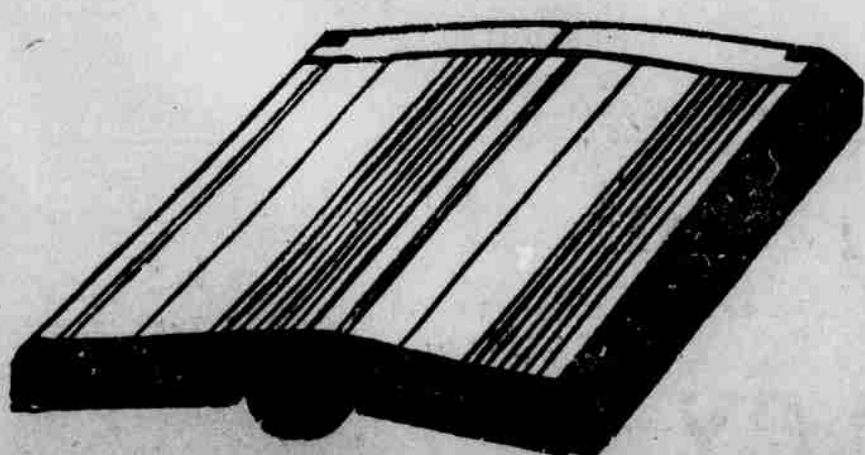

## CASE UNDER SHERMAN ACT

Tried in U. S. Court, Sixth District—  
Resolutions to Memory of Late  
Solicitor General E. L.  
Bartlett.

Special Correspondence.

Alamogordo, Dec. 10.—An interesting case has just been concluded in the United States court for the Sixth district of New Mexico, wherein the defendants, Albert Roland, J. W. Miller, George Riggins and John McFerguson were tried on an indictment under the Sherman Act. On the 3d of last September John Crenshaw and Charles Tilley, two non-union workmen in the employ of the El Paso & Northeastern Railway Company, were sent to Torrance to patch some water tanks for the company, which said tanks were used to supply water for the engines drawing the trains of this railroad. The defendants were union men and had previously been in the employ of the company, but had walked out a short time before on a strike. They took charge of Crenshaw and Tilley and gave them a rather sound beating, thus interfering with their work of repairing the tanks, and, as alleged in the indictment, with the commerce of the road. W. B. Childers, the United States attorney, and E. L. Medler, his assistant, fought the case stubbornly for the prosecution, while Judge Byron Sherry, of this place, worked equally hard for the defendants. The case occupied the attention of the court for two days, and the feeling among many who heard the testimony was that the prosecution had the best of it; but the jury returned its verdict of "not guilty," last Monday morning. As the indictment was drawn, the defendants were held upon two separate offenses, one under the Sherman Act and one under the Ku-Klux Act. A motion for the prosecution to elect under which statute it intended to convict being sustained by the court, the Sherman Act was selected. Thereupon another indictment was returned against these same defendants under the Ku-Klux Act, upon which they are still held and upon which they will have a hearing at the May, 1905, term of this court.

In the case of the United States versus George Jenkins, Edward J. McGuire, and John McGuire, three hoboes who entered a car at Santa Rosa last November and took therefrom 45 bottles of whiskey and endeavored to sell the same to a saloon man in Santa Rosa, where they were arrested and bound over by Justice Morse, a jury returned a verdict of guilty. On Tuesday they were sentenced by Judge Mann, Jenkins being the older, getting three years in the penitentiary, the McGuire boys each receiving one year, Edward's sentence being without labor on account of his health.

William K. Leaf, a Chinaman without the necessary papers, has been waiting for this term of court for several weeks, under the instructions of Edwin Blaine, the Chinese inspector at this place. Leaf was well known throughout this part of the Territory and was discharged and given his papers, thus doing away with any further trouble from Chinese inspectors.

The case of Wah Sing, for being unlawfully in this country, was continued for ten days, giving the defense opportunity to send his certificate to the department at Washington to compare with the original.

### Resolutions of Respect.

The following resolutions were presented by Judge Byron Sherry, as chairman of the committee:

To the Hon. Edward A. Mann, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the Territory of New Mexico and Judge of the Sixth Judicial District: We, the undersigned members of the committee to draft resolutions on the death of the late Solicitor-General Edward L. Bartlett, would respectfully report as follows:

Whereas, The members of the Otero County, New Mexico, bar have learned with profound sorrow of the death of the Hon. Edward L. Bartlett, therefore be it

Resolved, That the members of the Otero County, New Mexico, bar recognize the sorrowful fact that, in the death of the Hon. Edward L. Bartlett, the bar of the Territory of New Mexico has lost an able, brilliant and accomplished lawyer, and that the people of the Territory have lost an able and faithful public servant.

Resolved, That we tender to the family of the deceased our sincere condolence.

The resolutions were, by Judge Mann, ordered spread upon the records of the Sixth Judicial District.

The expenses of the first term of the Federal court for the Sixth district were as follows: Grand jurors, \$797.15; petit jurors, \$908.25; witnesses, \$414.75; bailiffs and criers, \$56; interpreters, \$55; meals and lodging for jurors, \$31.15; a total of \$2,264.30.

Most of the officials and attendants upon the court were enabled to get out of town Tuesday, with the exception of Deputy Marshal W. R. Forbes, who left Wednesday morning with his three prisoners for Santa Fe. He was accompanied by Will Buck of this place, who accompanied him as a guard. The first term of the U. S. court for

this district was a very interesting one, and in all respects a very successful one.

To obtain by purchase, lease, bond, hire, discovery or otherwise, and hold within the United States, and Mexico, lands, water courses, and springs and conserving the waters therefrom and from other sources in dams, ponds and reservoirs for irrigation and other purposes; to build irrigating ditches and water course ways for distributing said waters upon said lands; to acquire by purchase or otherwise, horses, cattle, sheep, goats, hogs and all kinds of domestic animals for propagation, sale and slaughter; to build and equip slaughter houses for the purpose of preparing animal meats and their by-products for the markets, and to do everything necessary for furthering a general live stock business; to develop and mine any and all kinds of minerals that may be found in or upon the lands of the company wherever located, and prepare the same for market, and to do whatever may be necessary in this connection; to sell, improve, manage, develop, exchange, lease, mortgage, dispose of, turn to account or otherwise deal with the undertaking of the whole or any part of the property and rights of the company; to borrow money, execute notes, bonds, mortgages or deeds of trust to secure the same and as a corporation to exercise in respect for all such bonds, mortgages, notes, shares of capital stock held by it to the same extent that a natural person might or could do, and in general to do all things necessary, appertaining or conducive to the attainment of the foregoing objects, and to the proper conducting of the business of this corporation in the Territory of New Mexico and elsewhere, not inconsistent with the laws of the United States, Territory of New Mexico, or those in any country in which the corporation may be carrying on its business.

4. The authorized amount of the capital stock of this corporation, shall be two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, divided into twenty-five thousand shares of the par value of ten dollars each. At such time as the Board of Directors may by resolution direct, said capital stock shall be paid into the treasury of this corporation, either in cash or by the sale and transfer to it of either real or personal property for the uses and purposes of said corporation, in payment for which, shares of the capital stock of said corporation may be issued, and the capital stock so issued shall thereupon and thereby become fully paid up and non-assessable.

5. The term of the existence of this corporation shall be Fifty years commencing from the date of filing these articles of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of the Territory of New Mexico.

6. The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted for the first year of this company's existence by a Board of six directors, but this number may be increased thereafter as may be provided for in the by-laws of the corporation. The Board of Directors who shall serve for the first year and until their successors shall be elected and qualified are C. E. B. Lamson, H. E. King, H. C. Adams, John G. Meilink, Allen C. Thomas, and R. B. Thomas. Afterwards the board of directors shall be elected by the stockholders as the by-laws of the corporation shall provide.

7. The principal place of business of said corporation shall be in the city of Santa Fe, County of Santa Fe, Territory of New Mexico, but other offices may be established outside of said Territory, where meetings of the corporation may be held and the general and special business of the company may be fully transacted.

7. The Board of Directors of said company shall have power, from time to time, to make such prudential by-laws as they may deem proper for the management of the affairs of said corporation, not inconsistent with the Constitution and laws of the United States, the Territory of New Mexico, or any other state of country where said corporation may be carrying on its business.

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## TERRITORIAL TOPICS.

The El Paso & Northeastern and the Rock Island have contracted the routing of 3,000 cars of oranges over these lines from California to the eastern markets. The shipping of the fruit has already begun. Negotiations are now under way for these roads to carry 3,000 more cars a little later in the season.

It will consist of a gasoline engine, dynamo and two motors, which will furnish all of the power necessary on the grounds and the lights.

The Silver City Independent will publish a splendid Christmas edition on the 13th instant, which will consist of eight pages of holiday reading matter enclosed in an illuminated cover.

Clyde Mattuz, the outlaw, who became notorious throughout the west several years ago and who is now doing time in the Kansas penitentiary for murder, has sent four oil paintings to Roswell to be raffled off for the benefit of his aged mother. He is known to many Roswell people.

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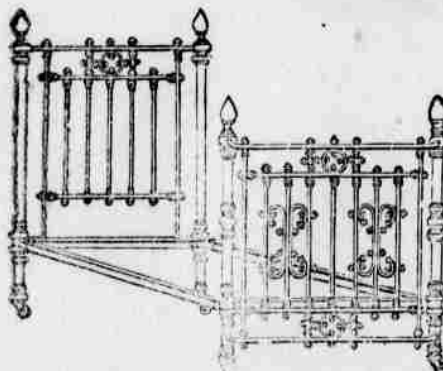

**NATIONAL LIVE  
STOCK ASSOCIATION**

Official Call for Convention.

To the Members and All Persons Engaged in the Live Stock Industry:

The Eighth Annual Convention of the National Live Stock Association is hereby called to meet in Denver, Colorado, January 10-14, 1905. In the opinion of a large number of the members of this association, a condition exists which makes it necessary to consider a revision of the constitution and by-laws of this organization, so as to provide for a more liberal representation of the various branches of the live stock industry upon a business basis that will permit of active co-operation, without necessary interference with the affairs of any interest. By order of the board of control, therefore, representatives of all interests involved in the breeding, growing, feeding, transportation, marketing and manufacture of live stock are hereby invited to attend this convention and participate in a general conference, looking towards such revision and amendment to the constitution and by-laws of this association as will produce a more active and harmonious co-operation between the various branches of the live stock industry.

It has been suggested that the constitution and by-laws of the association be revised at this meeting, so as to recognize, as the basis of organization, the various branches and interests of the live stock industry, allowing each branch a representation in the association upon such plan as will permit of the fullest co-operation without interference. Owing to the nature of this industry, each branch has affairs peculiar to itself, and in which no other branch is directly interested. It is possible, and does sometimes happen, that the method by which one branch of the industry conducts its affairs causes loss and inconvenience to another branch. Such methods may cause misunderstanding. It is proposed by the new plan of organization to provide a method by which such matters may be considered and argued by representatives of the various branches directly interested, and it is believed that, by such method, misunderstandings may be avoided, injustice remedied, and wrongs righted. By such a method of organization, also, where the interests of all are mutual, concerted and united action can be secured with certain results.

As this convention must be organized according to the present constitution and by-laws, representation will be as provided by the constitution, but upon the organization of the convention, the Executive Committee will propose to the convention a resolution as follows:

"Resolved, That for the purpose of considering a revision of the constitution and by-laws, that a committee be appointed, consisting of three representatives from each of the following interests: Cattle growers, sheep growers, stock feeders, swine growers, railroads, packinghouses, stock yards, commission men, and pure bred record associations. Said representatives may be suggested by those in the convention representing the various interests named, or they may be named by the President. Said committee shall meet at once and report back to this convention as soon as possible, with such recommendations as it may decide upon."

As this will be the principal business of the convention, an invitation is hereby extended to all organized branches of the industry to be represented at this meeting, prepared to suggest members of the committee above referred to and to take part in the subsequent business of the convention. An especial invitation is extended to the National Wool Growers' Association, the Interstate Cattle Growers' Committee, Live Stock Exchanges, Union Stock Yards Companies, Trunk Lines of Railroads and Packing Companies.

For the purpose of saving time and providing a basis of action for the Special Committee, the President of this association has appointed W. A. Harris, Fred P. Johnson, F. J. Hagenbarth, Munro Mackenzie and Alvin H. Sanders as a committee on the part of this association, to prepare and present to the Special Committee to be appointed by the convention, details of a plan for a revised constitution and by-laws as suggested above. Said detailed plan is simply to form a basis for discussion and action by the committee.

While the convention will consider the matter of constitutional revision as the principal business, other matters of great importance to the industry will be discussed. It is expected that the President of the United States will have called the attention of Congress to the necessity of more modern laws for the regulation of the use of the public lands for grazing purposes, a matter which is of vital importance to the industry. This matter will, therefore, come up for consideration.

Other matters in which national legislation is being sought, such as the necessity of a frequent stock census, the amendment of the interstate commerce law, will also come up for consideration.

Delegates will be admitted according to the provision of the constitution, as follows:

Each state, territorial, county or local range association of cattle, sheep, horse or swine-breeders may appoint one delegate for every 10,000 head of stock, or part thereof, represented by the members of such organization.

The governors of each state and ter-

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History may appoint three delegates-at-large.

Each feeders' and breeders' association may appoint one delegate-at-large, and one for every twenty-five members or part thereof.

Delegates may be appointed from Canada and the Republic of Mexico, but in all cases, except from state and county, the requirements regarding membership must be complied with.

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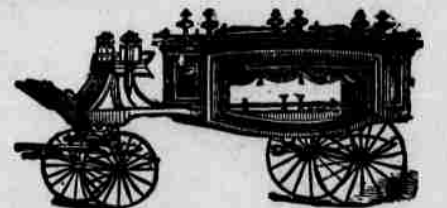
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
