REFORM SCHOOL NEEDED.
Some time ago THE CITIZEN suggested that the territory of New Mexico was greatly in need of a reform school, and on this important subject the Kddy Current contains the following timely hint:

The territory needs a reform school for the boys whose parents seem incompetent to bring them up properly. While we have normal schools, mechanical colleges and military institutes in the territory, no provision is made for the boys who are bound to till our primeval lands in life if not taken in hand at present. Kddy has a class of boys who go about breaking glass in vacant buildings. These boys should be punished, and a reform school is a necessity. A boy who would break more glass with one rock than he could earn money to pay for in a year certainly deserves punishment. There is too much expended on boys whose parents are able to bring them up as they should go, and too little on the other class. If one or two of our normal schools could be transformed into a reformatory for boys it would be a great blessing to the people of the territory.

RECENT WAR LOAN.
Eyes of not only our own country but of the entire world have been opened by the success of the recent popular war loan. It was a distinct innovation in the United States, and even for all the world, for while public securities have thus been placed on the continent of Europe, notably in France, there has never been such a wholesale response to the request for subscribers. Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Vandewater writes for the September Forum an extremely entertaining article on lessons of our war loan.

After remarking that it was no uncommon thing to receive a thousand dollar bill in an unregistered letter, he says "over one hundred million dollars in checks drafts and certificates of deposit were received from subscribers for the five hundred dollar and smaller bonds while the 2 per cent deposits on the subscriptions for the larger amounts were wholly in the shape of certified checks. About \$108,000,000 of the \$200,000,000 bond issue will be paid for by means of bank paper and certificates of deposit."

"Under the provisions of the law every subscription made by a syndicate, corporation or association was rejected, the preference being given to individuals. The entire loan was absorbed by individual offers for amounts less than \$4,000. Half of the loan, more than \$100,000,000, has gone to 230,000 people, each of whom subscribed \$500 or less. The number of persons who applied for the bonds reached 320,000; and if they were numbered in military ranks they would outnumber the regulars and volunteers enlisted for the Spanish-American war. Standing at rest, side by side, they would form a line 120 miles long—a line that would reach from New York to San Francisco and back, and half way back, or from Washington to San Francisco, and back, and half way back."

A part of the idea is to have the fair rotate between the three cities, Albuquerque, Las Vegas and Santa Fe. This is certainly a good suggestion and will bear pressing and absorbing.

The whistle blew and the fire bell rang, sounding the alarm of fire at about 12 o'clock Sunday night, arousing a large number of the citizens of Las Vegas from their peaceful slumbers. NEW TIME SERVICE.

The Santa Fe Railroad inaugurated it on October 2.

Commencing October 2 the Southern California railroad will put in operation the new time service, which requires all the following classes of employees to carry standard watches and to have exact time. Conductors, switch engine men, yardmen, engine men and foreman of switch engine.

Time signals will be sent daily at 10 a. m. "central" time, from the master clock of the Western Union Telegraph company. Stations where they compare time daily with the Washington, D. C., United States naval observatory, to all telegraph stations on the road. These signals are automatic clock beats, repeated over the company's wires by the master clock.

H. S. Montgomery, who has been appointed master watch and clock inspector for the entire Santa Fe system, arrived here yesterday from Topeka, Kan., with his assistants. In an interview with an Express reporter, Mr. Montgomery said they would commence immediately to put all clocks and watches of the company in perfect order, and to correct all errors. All watches are tested in three positions—pendant up, face up and face down. All watches are required to perform within limit of error not exceeding six seconds from one position to another, in a twenty-four hour test.

For instance, a watch running three seconds fast in the first position, three seconds slow in the second position and three seconds fast in the third position, would be passed into service, the extreme variation being six seconds. A greater variation would condemn it. Mr. Montgomery will make a tour of inspection once a year to every place on the entire road where standard time is kept. Employees will be obliged to see that their watches are within six seconds of standard time every day. With these regulations in effect, Mr. Montgomery says that accidents due to incorrect time (and a good proportion of railroad disasters are due to this) will be reduced to a minimum.—Los Angeles Express.
