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AMOUNT IS CLIMBING UP

Pretended Value of Securities of Mrs. Chadwick in Cleveland Bank Now Doubled.

DEBTS--NO HUSBAND

Search for Dr. Chadwick in Brussels--Results in Finding More Liabilities.--High Hotel Bill.

Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 13.—The total amount of securities deposited by Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick with the Wade Park bank have been found to approximate \$28,000,000. The highest estimate placed on them heretofore has been \$15,000,000. Herbert W. Bell, who, as receiver for the common pleas court took charge of the securities deposited with the Wade Park bank, declared today that he had found them to be nearly double what he had at first supposed. When asked if they possessed any value, Bell said with a smile, "Well, I would not care to pay much for any of them."

What Was Found in Brussels.

Brussels, Belgium, Dec. 13.—In a futile search in this city for Dr. Leroy S. Chadwick, the Etoile Belge asserts that it has discovered that his wife, Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick, left debts in Brussels, which are notably \$18,000 due a jeweler and \$12,000 owing a lace merchant. Mrs. Chadwick lived expensively while in Brussels, her hotel bill alone amounting to \$30 a day.

Fluctuation in Chadwick Securities.

Cleveland, Dec. 13.—Receiver Bell later altered his statement of the amount of the securities in his possession. He said that on further investigation he found that he had overestimated the amount by \$10,246,000. There were two copies of the trust agreement among the papers, neither being marked duplicate and he had considered them as separate documents.

TO IMPEACH FLORIDA JUDGE

Principal Business in House Passing of Resolutions Against Jurist--Senate Does Little.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 13.—When the House met today it had a serious duty to perform—that of passing on the resolution having for its purpose the impeaching for "high crimes and misdemeanors" of Federal Judge Charles Swayne, of the northern district of Florida.

It is alleged Judge Swayne spent on an average of 212 days somewhere else; neither in his district holding court nor outside holding court. The case had been up before the investigation committee, and Palmer, of Pennsylvania, read the evidence given before that committee.

The Senate today adopted a resolution for the Christmas holidays, extending from December 21 to January 4.

TO WAIT FOR BETTER PRICES

Cotton Planters May Reduce Next Year's Acreage as Result of Present Demoralized Condition of Market.

Shreveport, La., Dec. 13.—There was much discussion today among the delegates to the National Boll Weevil Convention of the movement to take action on the present low price of cotton. A meeting will be held tonight at which an appeal will be made to the planters to hold their product for higher prices and reduce next year's acreage.

Nearly 500 delegates were present today when permanent Chairman Peters, president of the Texas Cotton Growers Association, called the convention to order.

WINDY CITY IN DARKNESS

Heavy Fog Enveloped Chicago For Several Hours Today--Many Accidents Reported.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 13.—A heavy fog of inky blackness enshrouded Chicago today, causing confusion among pedestrians and seriously interfering with street car service and teams.

Numerous accidents were reported. The total absence of wind coincident with the combination of smoke and snow in the fog was the cause of extraordinary darkness. The duration of the phenomenon was nearly two hours.

VALENCIA REPUBLICANS NOMINATE

Jacobo Chaves Named to Fill Vacancy Caused by Death of Colonel J. Franco Chaves--Resolutions in Memoriam.

Los Lunas, N. M., Dec. 13.—At a meeting of the central committee of Valencia County held here yesterday for the purpose of nominating a candidate to be voted upon on the 24th of December to fill the vacancy of member of the council from the counties of Valencia and Torrance, caused by the death of Colonel J. Franco Chaves, Jacobo Chaves was nominated by acclamation.

The following resolutions were also unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we deplore the untimely death of Colonel J. Franco Chaves and we pledge the authorities of Valencia and Torrance Counties to do all in their power to bring to justice the cowardly assassin or other persons implicated.

Resolved, Further, That in gratitude to the many public services which the late Colonel J. Francisco Chaves rendered to Valencia County, it is agreed by those of this central committee to have the picture of the late Colonel Chaves framed and placed on the walls of the central rooms of Valencia County.

SHAKE-UP IN POSTAL CIRCLES

Postmaster General Dismisses Presidents of Letter and Rural Carriers' Associations.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 13.—Postmaster General Wynne today removed from office Frank H. Cunningham, of South Omaha, Nebraska, a rural route carrier, who is president of the National Association of Rural Mail Carriers.

The dismissal is the result of an investigation of the charges of insubordination, of being absent from duty without leave and violation of the president's order of January 31, 1903, prohibiting individual or organized attempts of government employees to influence legislation or solicit increase of pay.

James C. Keller, of Cleveland, Ohio, who is head of the National Association of Letter Carriers, was also dismissed.

INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION

Will Meet This Month to Inquire Into North Sea Incident--Fleet Sailing Eastward.

Paris, Dec. 13.—The International Commission to inquire into the North Sea incident is expected to meet here December 20, and proceed with the selection of a fifth admiral to complete the commission and arrange the procedure. The real work will only begin early in January, but it will be interrupted by the Russian Christmas holidays.

Squadron Sailing Eastward.

Lisbon, Portugal, Dec. 13.—Twenty-one vessels of the Russian Pacific squadron have arrived at Mossamedes, Portuguese West Africa, bound eastward.

NEXT YEAR'S WOOL CROP

Estimated That at Least Thirty-five Per Cent of It Has Been Contracted For.

Boston, Mass., Dec. 13.—A general reduction in supplies has developed a less active wool market, but no weakness is shown in prices. It is estimated that 35 per cent of next year's crop of Territory wool has already been contracted for.

JURY DISAGREES FOURTH TIME.

Minneapolis, Minn., Dec. 13.—The jury in the fifth trial of former Mayor Ames for bribery, has disagreed and was dismissed today by Judge Elliott. This is the fourth disagreement, one conviction having been overturned by the supreme court.

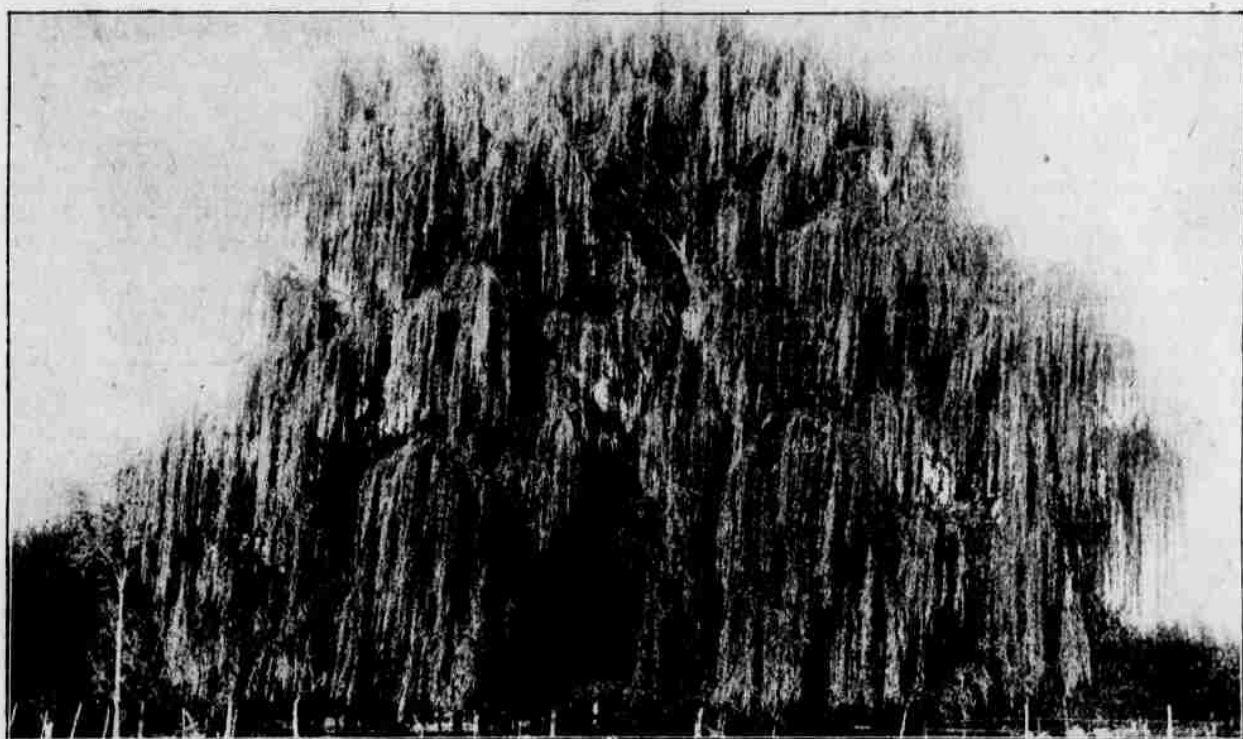
ASSASSIN IS SENTENCED.

HOT TIMES ON 'CHANGE

Panicky Times Continue and Prominent Financiers Appear on the Floor.

WORSE SINCE 1901

Bulls Force Copper Back to Over 65 But Market Gets Chill and Recedes to Monday's Close.

New York, Dec. 13.—It is no exaggeration that Wall street began the day with more anxiety than has been shown since the May panic of 1901. The reason for this was the complete collapse of the market at yesterday's close, revealing the weak spots in unlooked-for places. Almost every conceivable sort of rumor was in the air this morning. It is reported among other things that there was a meeting of big banking interests last night and that it was decided to support the market if it became worse. For this as well as other rumors there seems to be no foundation.

The floor was crowded with members, many of them old timers who seldom appear except on momentous occasion. The greatest crowd was around the Amalgamated Copper and Steel trading posts. The scenes were animated and exciting.

Bulls Show Strength.

Before the end of the first half hour the tape was at least ten minutes behind the market. Some support was shown in copper and other stocks, buyers being insiders. The bears finally rushed to cover and carried copper three points above yesterday's close. Gains were also made in other stocks, but recoveries were not complete all along the line, showing, however, violent rallies from the low point.

Trading was extremely feverish for a time on a rally but the market settled down to a quieter tone before 11 o'clock.

Recovers Toward Close.

The market became quiet later at the recovered level of prices and support was forthcoming at any attempt to force the level down again. The whole market was in close sympathy with copper which touched 65 5/8 in the afternoon and support for that stock, relieved the pressure at any other point.

Market Off at Close.

Another chill struck the market during the last hour and recovered gains melted to about yesterday's closing prices.

RUN DOWN BY TRAIN

Aged Man Meets Instant Death at Raton--Body Horribly Mangled.

A man named Domingo Almara, while attempting to cross the Santa Fe tracks in Raton on Saturday last, was run over by a switch engine and instantly killed, the wheels cutting the body in two at the waist and severing both legs below the knee. He was about 65 years old and leaves a wife and child. Almara was partially paralyzed in one arm and leg and only a week or ten days ago, had, through carelessness, coupled with bodily infirmity, almost met the same fate.

CANADIAN PREMIER MAY VISIT HERE

Likely That Sir Wilfred Laurier and Party Will Stop in Santa Fe.

Sir Wilfred Laurier, premier of Canada, and party, in their special car Violette, will pass through Lamy Thursday morning and in all probability will come to Santa Fe to spend a few hours. Sir Wilfred and party have been spending a few weeks in Los Angeles.

The Canadian premier is reputed the greatest orator in both French and English in the Dominion. As the champion of the proposed new government coast to coast railway, the Liberal party, of which he is the leader, was returned to power by an increased majority last month.

It is hoped the party will visit Santa Fe and it is needless to say that if this is done the members will be treated royally and shown the greatest courtesy and all the points of historic interest about the Capital City.

GOVERNMENT IRRIGATION WORK

Under Consideration in Mesilla Valley--Supervising Engineer Hall to Do Duty on Pecos River.

El Paso, Dec. 13.—Supervising Engineer B. M. Hall, of the reclamation service has left for Carlsbad and Roswell, where he will act as consulting engineer in connection with supervising Engineer W. M. Reed, in charge of the reclamation surveys along the Pecos River. Together they will investigate Pecos River conditions thoroughly.

In the Mesilla Valley.

Detailed plans have been completed by Assistant Engineer J. L. Read, under the supervision of Mr. Hall, for the Leasburg diverting dam, about twelve miles north of Las Cruces to be used in connection with the Elephant Butte dam.

As soon as the diversion dam and headworks are completed, it will be possible to utilize them in connection with existing irrigation canals in the Mesilla Valley. The headworks of the present canals are now washed out nearly every year and during the year there is more water in the canals than is desirable; at other seasons there is a scarcity and it is believed that this dam will equalize these conditions.

THREE MORE CONVICTS

Placed in the Territorial Penitentiary--Hailing From Chaves County--One Under Life Sentence

Sheriff Frederick Higgins, of Chaves County, accompanied by Mark Howell, as guard, came in from the south yesterday and placed the following prisoners, sentenced at the recent term of the district court for that county, presided over by Judge W. H. Pope, in the Territorial penitentiary: William Geaton, aged 28, murder, life imprisonment; James Brown, aged 20, larceny of livestock, three years' imprisonment; Will Bullo, aged 32, larceny of livestock, one year imprisonment.

VIOLENCE IN CAPITAL

Opposition Party in Hungarian Legislative Center Prevent Opening of Parliament.

BREAK UP FURNITURE

President of House and Guard of Forty Driven From Building--Will Meet Tomorrow.

Buda Pest, Dec. 13.—Violent as have been the scenes in the past sessions of the Hungarian Parliament, they were entirely overshadowed by the wreckage effected by members of the opposition party this morning in their successful effort to prevent the opening of parliament. A quarter of an hour before the time appointed for the commencement of business, the opposition mustered its full strength.

A guard of forty men had been provided as a protection to the president of the house.

No one of the government supporters had arrived and the guard occupied the approaches to the presidential platform. The opposition attacked the guard, destroyed the platform and with broken pieces drove the guard from the room. They tore to pieces the code on the president's desk and wrecked the entire interior of the house. The Liberals had been summoned to conference to decide on the course of action.

Later it was announced that the sitting in both houses arranged for today would be postponed until tomorrow.

The school population of New Mexico is now 65,000, as against 50,000 in 1898, and the number of public schools has increased during that time from 550 to 729.

The Congress is called for the purpose of establishing a broader understanding of the forest in its relation to the great industries depending upon it; to advance the conservative use of forest resources; to perpetuate the forest as a permanent resource of the nation.

FANCY PRICE FOR GOAT HAIR

Fleece of Prize Winning Buck Brings Five Dollars a Pound--Raised in Sierra County.

Kingston, N. M., Dec. 13.—The Angora goat industry of Sierra County seems to have reached the zenith of fame as well as prosperity, the fine mohair from the Black range country demanding the highest prices ever known, and a Kingston ranch furnishes the hair.

Thomas Wedgewood, one of the largest breeders of Sierra County, whose ranch is just above the town at an altitude of 8,000, has received the following telegram, which speaks right out in meeting without the need of an introduction:

"New York, Dec. 12, 1904.—Your letter received. Will pay \$5 per pound for entire fleece. Send at once by express. L. LEVINSSOVE."

The fleece of mohair referred to in the telegram was sheared from the well-known buck Kingston Lad. The hair is over twenty inches long and the weight of the fleece 18 pounds. The famous buck which produced this magnificent fleece of mohair in the year 1904, was raised by Wedgewood on his ranch, just west of the town limits, and is strictly a Kingston production. Kingston Lad is a very valuable animal, \$1,000 having been offered for him, but refused, as he is considered to be worth much more money. Kingston Lad took first premium at the Royal Stock Show at Kansas City in 1903, and is known among stockmen as one of the finest Angora goats in America. His beautiful coat of fine white hair was shipped to New York today, as requested by the telegram, where it will be manufactured into cloth.

LUNCHEON WITH THE PRESIDENT

Major W. H. H. Llewellyn and Governor A. G. Brodie, of Arizona, Guests of the Executive.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 13.—Governor A. G. Brodie, of Arizona, and Major W. H. H. Llewellyn, of New Mexico, lunched with President Roosevelt yesterday and arrangements for the guard of honor in the inaugural parade on the 4th of March next were made.

The president desired Colonel Brodie to inform the members of the Rough Riders that he would attend the annual reunion of the regiment at San Antonio the latter part of next March, and after the reunion the President probably will take a hunting trip with Major Llewellyn.

MAN FROZEN TO DEATH

Presumed He Lost His Way in Recent Snow Storm and Died From Exposure.

What is believed to be the first death due to the recent cold weather is reported from Roy, in Mora County. A man named Aban Garcia was found frozen to death near there one day last week. He was caught in the snow storm of Sunday a week ago while hauling a load of freight to Chicos and is supposed to have lost his way.

THE RECLAMATION SERVICE AT WORK.

According to the annual report of the Secretary of the Interior, recently issued, the Reclamation Service of the Department of the Interior which was established by an Act of Congress in June, 1902, has gotten into fair shape and the objects and intentions of the law creating it are being and some of them have been put into actual operation. What the officials of the service need first of all is experience and data upon which to base reports and plans for the construction of reservoirs and dams and of irrigation systems in the arid and semi-arid regions. Much has been accomplished in that line during the past two years and a half, and the New Mexican is glad to notice by the report that some of this is in New Mexico. The Denver Republican, commenting upon the work of the service during the past year, says that the Secretary makes prominent mention of the more permanent character compared with private enterprises of the work done by the Federal government. This involves, of course, greater cost, which in turn falls upon the owners of the land reclaimed. But the additional cost should be incurred, because the work done by the government is presumably final in its nature. It will be difficult, if not impracticable, to induce the government to enlarge any irrigation enterprise after it has once been turned over to the people.

With private enterprises there is more latitude, since, should circumstances show that a ditch or canal could with advantage be enlarged, the required changes could with but little difficulty be made. The initiative would be with the people from the beginning, and no long process of officialism would have to be gone through in order to inaugurate improvements that might be considered desirable.

The comments of the secretary upon the more enduring character of the work done by the reclamation service should not be considered a reflection upon private enterprises, the flexibility of which is one of their commendable attributes.

The work done by the reclamation service is intended to stand for all time, and this is especially desirable in those great enterprises which belong to the province of national reclamation. A canal or reservoir involving an expenditure of a million dollars or more should not be carelessly constructed. It is gratifying to know that permanency does characterize the work of the service, and that people acquiring land reclaimed by this means will have something the value of which will endure as long as the land continues to be cultivated.

BEST FOR THE PUBLIC WEAL.

The course of President Roosevelt in the removal of Associate Justice Benjamin S. Baker, judge of the Second Judicial District of this Territory, is meeting with universal commendation by the people of the Territory. The President gave careful and considerable time to the examination of the report upon the charges filed against Judge Baker and his written defense thereto. So did the attorney general. People in New Mexico at all acquainted with the facts have felt for some time that it would be best for the fair reputation of the courts, for public policy and for the commonwealth to replace Judge Baker. The President, in making the removal, has certainly done the right thing at the right time. His action may be criticised by a few who were personal or political friends of the removed official, or who gained or would have gained by his retention in office. This per cent is not large. The best classes of citizens all over the Territory are well satisfied with the situation.

The New Mexican suggests to Councilman-Elect Charles L. Ballard, although he is a Democrat, to train with the regular Republican majority in the council of the next assembly. He will be in good company.

THE APPOINTMENT OF SUPERINTENDENT CHAVES.

The Western Liberal, published at Lordsburg, Grant County, has the following to say in approval of Governor Otero's appointment of Amado Chaves as Territorial superintendent of public instruction:

"The governor has appointed Amado Chaves as superintendent of public instruction, to fill the vacancy caused by the murder of Colonel Chaves. Mr. Chaves has served before in this office, having been the first man to hold the office, having been appointed by Governor Prince, when the office was created. He it was who organized the public school system in New Mexico, and that his work was good is shown by the fact that the exhibit made by the schools of this Territory at St. Louis, at the Fair, was pronounced by prominent educators to be equal in quality to that made in any state. Mr. Chaves is a native of New Mexico, speaks both languages fluently, and is finely educated, having received his education at the Washington University. He has held various positions in the public service, having served in the legislature, and for one term was speaker of the house. The governor's selection was a wise one."

THE PRESIDENCY OF THE COUNCIL.

"Hon. W. E. Martin is mentioned in connection with the Presidency of the Territorial Council. Both long experience and natural aptitude combine to make Mr. Martin the peer of any man in New Mexico in qualification for the duties of this important position. The council will contain no member more meritorious than Mr. Martin upon whom to bestow the honor of its presidency."—Socorro Chieftain.

The above is true, every word of it. It seems, however, that the best interests of the people and of the party demand the services of Mr. Martin on the floor and at the head of two or three very important committees.

It now looks as if Councilman-Elect John S. Clarke, of Las Vegas, will become president of the council and as if Mr. Martin will do yeoman and efficient service on the floor.

The Colorado Supreme Court has evidently stirred up more of a mess than the Democratic ballot box stuffers in the Queen City of the Plains expected. It is becoming established right along that thousands of fraudulent ballots were placed in the ballot boxes by the Democratic election officials and that thus a majority for the Democratic nominee for governor of the state was obtained. What they do not know about stuffing ballot boxes and election frauds in Denver is not worth knowing. St. Louis had to retire in this respect and Denver now has first place.

Major William Warner of Kansas City, attorney for the United States for the western district of Missouri, has declined the offer of appointment as pension commissioner. Probably he was scared off by the assertion of Pension Commissioner Eugene F. Ware, who resigned a few weeks ago and who stated that the average experience of the commissioner of pensions can be aptly described by the same definition which the late General Sherman gave war.

Concerning the Hamilton joint statehood bill now pending in the United States Senate, the Socorro Chieftain very aptly asks: "President Roosevelt omitted all reference to statehood from his message. If the late election indicated anything at all concerning the sentiment in these two territories toward the joint statehood movement, it indicated opposition to that movement. Why, then, should the President or anybody else urge its consideration?"

In Santa Fe and the First Judicial District generally, saloons are closed on Sunday and the Sunday observance laws are respected and obeyed. This should be the case in every other judicial district in the Territory. There is no good reason, for instance, why saloons in Albuquerque should be kept open and do business on that day, while those in Santa Fe have to be closed. Fair play all around is what is wanted.

The Woman Suffragists of the country are taking a hand in the Hamilton joint statehood project. They want an enabling act passed which will provide woman suffrage for the new joint state of Arizona, and will give its female citizens the right to vote. If such proviso cannot be encompassed in the pending bill, they will fight it to the finish. Go on! Every bit of help helps.

The cattle growers and sheep raisers of New Mexico should attend the Live Stock Association in Denver next month. Matters of much importance will be considered and acted upon there. It will pay New Mexico's stock growers to be well and strongly represented at the meetings.

Colonel Bryan is still asserting that Congress is no place for any honest Democrat. Considering the results of the recent election, the voters of the country evidently went a step further and thought that Congress was no place for any kind of a Democrat and elected but few of them to that body.

PUEBLO INDIANS

Delegation in Mexico for Purpose of Finding Documents That Will Restore Thousands of Acres of Land to Them.

Pueblo Indians may dispossess thousands of whites of their lands in New Mexico, Arizona and southern Texas if their mission to the City of Mexico proves successful. A delegation of these Indians has gone to the City of Mexico to look up old Spanish documents to see if they are not entitled to millions of acres now occupied by Americans.

The Indians believe that they can find grants from the old sovereigns of Spain giving them absolute possession of some of the richest lands in the southwest. The Pueblos have secured the best of legal talent to represent them and have been informed that if they can produce the documents they can dispossess the whites.

It is said that if the Pueblos who are now in Mexico should secure the documents sought, suits of ouster will be filed upon their return in the federal courts of this territory.

THE FORUM.

A Session at Which the History, Geography and Resources of New Mexico Were Discussed.

The Forum held a very enjoyable meeting last evening at the home of Dr. J. A. Massie, as the guests of Miss Massie. "New Mexico" was the topic of the evening and proved of great interest. Dr. C. A. Wheelon, in a paper, covered the history of the Territory from the advent of the Conquistadores to the American occupation, succinctly but also comprehensively. In the discussion that followed the difficulty of separating fact from fable in the few authentic records that exist of those days, the uncertainty in dates and localities, the date of the founding of Santa Fe, the location of the Seven Cities of Cibola, were alluded to and dilated upon. A. H. Brodhead read a brief paper upon the geography and change of boundaries of New Mexico, which also proved very suggestive in the discussion that followed as to the prehistoric population of the Territory, its Indians, their original number and state of civilization. The New Mexican will publish both of these papers as they are an excellent outline of the history and study of geography of the Land of Sunshine. Mrs. Maud L. Hurt concluded the program with an entertaining talk upon the climate and agricultural resources of New Mexico which also gave rise to an exhaustive discussion of the relative merit of the agricultural sections and of the variations in climatic conditions due to local causes rather than to altitude and latitude. Refreshments were served before adjournment and an hour spent in social intercourse. The next meeting will be held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Rivenburg on January 9, at which meeting officers for the ensuing year will be elected and for which meeting a good program is in course of preparation.

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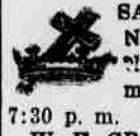

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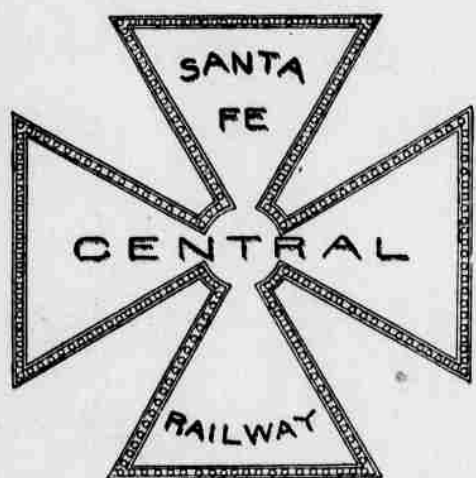
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MRS. CRUSOE'S WOES

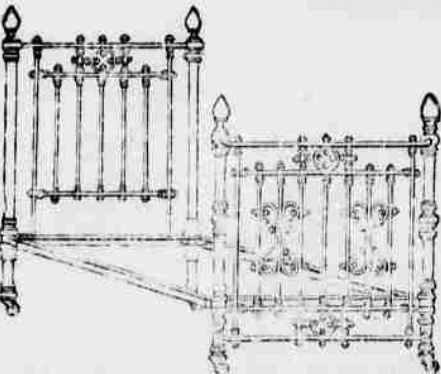

**SENTENCED TO
PENITENTIARY**

Seven Prisoners From San Miguel
County the Unfortunates—Court
Closes and Grand Jury Re-
ports.

The district court for San Miguel County, which has been in session at Las Vegas the past two weeks, closed Saturday. The grand jury returned several indictments and four of the parties were immediately arraigned. They were Romaldo Trujillo, who pleaded guilty to two indictments, charging larceny of cattle. Catarino Trujillo, a brother, pleaded not guilty to the same charge but later changed his plea and threw himself upon the mercy of the court. Fidel Garcia and Macedonio Garcia, charged with larceny of cattle, pleaded not guilty.

The grand jury brought in its report and unanimously recommended that the officers of the law be required to see that the Sunday law providing that the saloons be closed, be strictly enforced. It is also recommended that all saloons that were carrying on games and gambling without a license be required to pay the proper license or suffer the penalty for violation of the law.

John H. Loomis, of Hartford, Connecticut, obtaining money under false pretenses, two years.

Charles Williams, and W. C. Brown, larceny, two years.

Manuel Garcia, burglary and assault, three years.

Tomas aGrcia, larceny of cattle, two years.

Romaldo Garcia, larceny of cattle, two years and a half.

Catarino Trujillo, larceny, 18 months.

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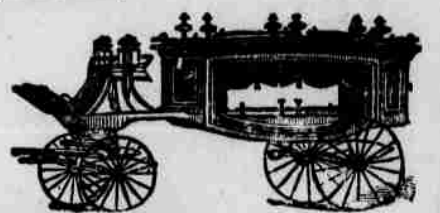
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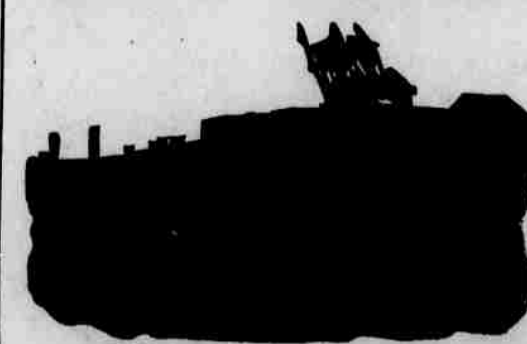
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
