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## IRA A. ABBOTT NEW JUDGE

Massachusetts Jurist Appointed  
By President to Succeed  
Baker.

### PERSONAL SELECTION

Short Biographical Sketch of Nominee—  
Esteemed Friend of Executive and  
Attorney General.

Special to the New Mexican.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 14.—Judge Ira A. Abbott, of Haverhill, Massachusetts, who has been appointed associate justice of the Territorial supreme court, vice Baker, has been for years a judge of the municipal court of Haverhill. He is a graduate of Dartmouth College, where he graduated with high honors and is a personal friend of the President and of Attorney General Moody. The judge is in very comfortable circumstances and does not accept the New Mexico appointment for the salary attached to it. He believes it the duty of every citizen to serve the people when called upon to do so, by appointment to public office, hence he accepted the appointment tendered him by the President. There are no indorsements on file and it is understood that the selection was made by the President on account of his intimate knowledge of the character, ability and legal learning of the new judge. The new appointee will start for New Mexico as soon as confirmed and will assume the duties of the office as soon as he reaches the Territory.

The Appointment of Judge Baker's Successor.

The Denver Post on Monday last contained a Washington dispatch wherein an item of interest to New Mexico appeared and which seems to have escaped the columns of the Denver morning papers and certainly the dailies of the Territory. It announced the appointment of Ira A. Abbott, of Massachusetts to be associate justice of the Territorial supreme court vice Baker removed. It was known here that the name of Judge Abbott, who is a personal friend of Attorney General Moody was under consideration, but no telegraphic or other notice even from the special correspondents of the daily papers of the Territory in Washington was received concerning his appointment on Saturday last. The telegram to the Post reads:

"Washington, Dec. 12.—The President sent to the senate today the following nominations:

"Assistant Secretary of Agriculture—William M. Hays, of Minnesota.

"Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of New Mexico—Ira A. Abbott, of Massachusetts.

"Commissioner of Labor—Charles P. Neill, District of Columbia."

Baker Case Will Not Be Reopened.

A Washington special to the Denver Republican under date of December 12th, says:

"Representative Needham, of California talked with the President today about the dismissal of Judge Baker of the New Mexico supreme court. Mr. Needham received a telegram from a number of Judge Baker's friends asking for a rehearing, but the President said this could not be granted and that the case was closed. Later the name of Ira A. Abbott, of Massachusetts, was sent to the senate to fill the vacancy caused by Judge Baker's dismissal."

Land Within New Mexico.

The Interior Department has ordered withdrawn from entry and settlement 17 townships, or 391,680 acres of land in the Roswell, New Mexico, land district, on account of the Orton Lake irrigation project; also, on account of the same project, four townships, or 92,160 acres in the Clayton district.

Baker Feels Encouraged.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 14.—Judge Benjamin S. Baker and District Court Clerk W. E. Dame, of Albuquerque, who arrived in Washington yesterday, had an interview with the President this forenoon. Both feel more encouraged and more hopeful than they did last night.

## WATER SCARCE IN COLUMBUS

Famine Feared in Ohio Capital—River Low and Frozen Solid—Situation Alarming.

Columbus, Ohio, Dec. 14.—The present drought has lowered the Scioto River to a very low stage and the river from which Columbus secures its water supply is today frozen solid. The situation is alarming and the water works officials today warned the people to hoard the water supply.

## ANOTHER NORTH AND SOUTH LINE

To Run From La Plata City, San Juan County, to Mastodon, Dona Ana County, Incorporated Yesterday.

Articles of incorporation filed yesterday at the capitol give the preliminary plans for another railroad for the western part of New Mexico. The name of the road is the El Paso & Durango and all of the work accomplished up to date has been done with much secrecy. The incorporators and promoters are evidently members of the Phelps, Dodge Company and the El Paso & Southwestern Railway Company, which now runs into Bisbee and Douglas, Arizona, tapping the rich copper fields in that section and in north-eastern Sonora.

The main line will begin at Mastodon, in Dona Ana County, at a junction with the El Paso & Southwestern, and proceed northwest through Dona Ana, Luna, Grant, Socorro, Valencia, McKinley and San Juan Counties. Putnam, which is at present an Indian trading post in the southeastern part of San Juan County, will be the northwestern terminus of a branch of 120 miles in length, which will run to Albuquerque, passing south of the Chaca Mesa and traversing McKinley, Sandoval and Bernalillo Counties.

S. W. French, of Douglas, Arizona, holds all of the stock of the company with the exception of one share, held by each of the other six incorporators. The capital stock of the company is \$800,000. According to the papers filed late yesterday afternoon, 10 per cent of this amount—\$80,000—has been placed in the hands of the treasurer of the company, Abraham L. Hawley, Charles A. Spleen, of Las Vegas, is the attorney for the corporation and Stephen B. Davis, Jr., of Las Vegas, also, the assistant attorney.

The members of the board of directors, of whom four were in the city yesterday, spent nearly the entire day in the office of the Territorial Secretary, perfecting their plans. Mr. French, who is said to be the president of the company, was represented at the meeting by Charles E. Mills, of Morenci, Arizona, who is one of the directors. Attorneys Spleen and Davis and Treasurer Hawley, of El Paso, were also present. The articles were not filed until shortly after four o'clock. Santa Fe is given in the articles as the principal place of business of the company.

The principal object of the company seems to be the hauling of coal from the western part of San Juan County to the mines of southern Arizona and Mexico, where the fuel is scarce and high priced.

It looks as if the surveys which have been made by the Colorado & Arizona from San Juan to Morenci and Clifton, Arizona, have demonstrated that the route contemplated will offer some great engineering difficulties and hence the parties therein interested seem to have taken time by the forelock by the incorporation of a more easily constructed road in order to have a more cheaply administered railroad from the coal fields in San Juan County to southwestern New Mexico and southeastern Arizona.

The main line of the road from La Plata City to Mastodon will be about 400 miles in length and the branch from Putnam, San Juan County, to Albuquerque, about 120 miles in length. Partial surveys, it is understood, have already been made and more careful and detailed surveys of the line will commence shortly and will be prosecuted vigorously.

Mr. French holds 7,994 shares of stock out of 8,000 shares of stock reported as issued and paid up.

## ON HER WAY TO CLEVELAND

Mrs. Chadwick, Closely Guarded, Leaves New York to Face Charges in Ohio Metropolis.

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 14.—Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick passed through here this morning on her way from New York to Cleveland. The train is due in Cleveland at 11:10 o'clock, but owing to the snow and cold weather it will be two hours late in arriving. Mrs. Chadwick was closely watched last night by U. S. marshals, but seemed to sleep the entire night. To an Associated Press representative she spoke optimistically of the ultimate outcome of her difficulties.

Arrives in Cleveland.  
Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 14.—The train bearing Mrs. Chadwick arrived here at 2:10 this afternoon. An immense crowd was in and around the station.

Thirteen Indictments Returned.  
The grand jury today returned five indictments against Mrs. Chadwick, four against President Beckwith, of the Citizens National Bank, of Oberlin, Ohio, and four against Cashier Spear.

## THE CASE OF JUDGE SWAYNE

Jurist, Who Was Impeached in the House, Will Suffer Likewise in Senate.

### AN IMPRESSIVE SCENE

When Committee of House Appeared in Senate With Notification—Urgent Deficiency Bill Discussed.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 14.—Immediately after the house met today, Speaker Cannon announced a committee of seven to prepare charges against Judge Charles Swayne, of the northern district of Florida, who was impeached yesterday.

From the committee on judiciary Jenkins (Wis.), its chairman, reported back the resolutions, recently introduced by Baker, (N. Y.), demanding inquiry into the so-called steel trust, with a recommendation that the resolutions be laid on the table. The recommendation was adopted and the House then went into a committee of the whole, to consider the Urgent Deficiency Bill.

Report of Impeachment Committee.

During the discussion on the bill the committee appointed yesterday to notify the Senate that the House had impeached Judge Swayne, appeared in the center aisle, and Representative Palmer, its chairman spoke as follows: "Mr. Speaker: In obedience to the order of the House that we proceed to the bar of the Senate and in the name of this body and of all the people of the United States, we impeached, as we were directed to do, Charles Swayne, judge of the district court of the United States for the northern district of Florida, for high crimes and misdemeanors in office, and we demanded that the Senate should take order to make him appear before that body to answer for the same, and announced that the House would soon present the articles of impeachment and make them good, to which the response was 'order shall be taken.'"

The discussion on the Urgent Deficiency Bill was then resumed.

Message to the Senate.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 14.—A committee of the House appeared at the bar of the Senate today and notified the Senate that the House had impeached Judge Charles Swayne. President Pro Tem Frye informed the committee that the Senate would proceed in accordance with the notice. No message from the house has been received in years, that so profoundly impressed the Senate.

More Postal Investigations.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 14.—Orders were issued today for the investigation of the case of Secretary Tumber, of Rural Carriers Association, whose signature, as signed to papers in possession of the postal authorities, was on a circular letter sent to candidates to Congress asking them as to their position on legislation affecting rural carriers. Tumber is employed as a rural letter carrier at Lockport, N. Y., and a large number of letters are alleged to have been sent out by him in contravention of the legislative order of President Roosevelt.

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## ADAMS MAY BE DEFEATED

Colorado Supreme Court Renders Decision Tying Up Denver Vote and Peabody's Election is Probable.

### REPUBLICANS CONFIDENT

Opinion Establishes a Precedent in Their Favor—One Judge Dissented.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 14.—The state supreme court today sustained the motion made by the attorneys for the Republican party to enjoin the Denver election commission from including in its official abstract of votes returns from precinct 8 of ward 7. Chief Justice Gabbert announced the decision in which Justice Campbell concurred. Justice Steele dissented and remarked that the action was "unwarranted, unprecedented and directly contrary to law."

In announcing the decision Chief Justice Gabbert said that the evidence showed that false ballots had been substituted for the genuine ones in this precinct and it was the right of the court to prevent the consummation of the fraud. Written opinions on the case will be filed later.

The decision is said to establish a precedent and the Republicans will ask for similar action in the case of all the precincts in which the supreme court took original jurisdiction at the election and in which it is alleged frauds were committed. There are about 50 such precincts. The court announced that the motions to throw out such votes of other precincts in which frauds have already been proved will be considered tomorrow.

The entire Denver vote, except on the Presidential electors and congressmen, is tied up. The election commission having been enjoined from counting the vote from the precincts in question, it is possible that the entire Republican legislative ticket in Denver will be elected and Adams' 5,000 majority over Peabody for governor wiped out.

## BOSTON HAS CITY ELECTION

Republicans Make Gains Although the Result was a Victory for the Democrats.

Boston, Mass., Dec. 14.—Although the municipal election yesterday resulted in a sweeping victory for the Democrats, the Republicans gained one member of the board of aldermen and two in the council. Of the 13 aldermen elected, 11 were Democrats. The council will stand 26 Republicans and 49 Democrats. No mayor was elected this year.

TREATY WITH ITALY.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 14.—The arbitration treaty between Italy and the United States was signed today. It is identical with the other arbitration treaties signed by this government.

## BIG FIRE IN MINNEAPOLIS

For a Time Whole Retail District of City Was Threatened With Destruction.

### THREE LIVES ARE LOST

Damage Estimated at \$700,000—Conflagration Started in Photographic Supply House.

Minneapolis, Minn., Dec. 14.—Three firemen lost their lives, several persons were injured and property valued at \$700,000 was destroyed by a fire, which started last night and was not brought under control until this morning.

The dead are: Jacob Miller, insurance patrol man; H. J. Buckley, insurance patrol man, and John Fellows, a pipefitter. For a time the entire retail business district was threatened with destruction and its escape was due as much to the absence of high wind as to the efforts of the firemen.

The fire started in the photographic supply house of O. H. Peck & Company and quickly spread to adjoining buildings, including the six-story furniture houses of Boutell Brothers, one of the largest establishments of its kind in the northwest.

## HAVE FINISHED BURYING DEAD

Japanese Losses Were Frightful in Attack on Meter Hill—Russia Confident of the Outcome.

Before Port Arthur, With Third Japanese Army, via Fusan, Dec. 14.—The work of removing the dead from the slopes and crests of 203 Meter Hill has been completed on the north side. The south slopes are still covered with bodies buried under the debris of trenches and bomb proofs. A long line of Japanese dead that was laid out on top of the hill and slopes previous to interment presented an awful appearance. Most of the bodies were partially naked and horribly torn by dynamite bombs.

Have Japanese Made Mistake?

St. Petersburg, Dec. 14.—The General Staff apparently is entirely satisfied with the military situation in Manchuria, being convinced that the Japanese have reached high tide. A high officer said to a correspondent of the Associated Press that the Japanese have missed the psychological moment. They should now be at Harbin with Vladivostok and eastern part of Manchuria literally cut off, instead of wintering where they are. The cold weather is Russia's ally, as it was against Napoleon.

They are not strong enough to attempt to turn Mukden now and will not be even if Port Arthur falls and 50,000 reinforcements are sent to join Oyama. In the meantime Russian troops are piling up behind Mukden. In February, before the port of New Chwang is ice free, Kuropatkin will have close to half a million men, amply sufficient to turn Oyama's position at the Shakhe River and force the Japanese back into Korea and Liao Tung Peninsula.

## ROSWELL PROGRESS

Views of One of the Oldest Settlers of the Pecos Valley.

### CONDITIONS PROSPEROUS

Changes in Revenue Laws Timely—Judge Pope Respected and Liked.

Mark Howell, treasurer and ex-officio collector of Chaves County, who was in the city yesterday from Roswell, is one of the oldest residents of that enterprising city; he went overland from Las Vegas 21 years ago, before a railroad to the Pecos Valley was even thought a possibility. He saw the possibilities of that section early in its history as an agricultural and horticultural center and time has borne witness that he showed good judgment in settling in that region of the Territory. When he went to Roswell, there were seven houses located on its site and three apple orchards in the immediate vicinity; now Roswell is a thriving city of five thousand souls and its orchards have become famous throughout the United States.

During the past ten years Mr. Howell has been in positions that kept him close to the finances of the county, and he has some excellent ideas as to tax reforms and revenue matters. To a New Mexican reporter he said: "There is a great necessity for legislation in New Mexico that will relieve the taxpayer. Especially is this the case in civil suits, in which I believe that the litigants, instead of the tax-payers, should pay the costs of suits. Legislation should be provided by which the plaintiff in a contemplated suit, be required to give a good and sufficient bond, from the time of bringing suit, so that in the event of losing the same, the county would be secured."

"In criminal matters the laws of the Territory are lax. Very often juries have been empaneled and are ready for the trial of the cases, when the attorneys come along and secure continuances, thus causing the county to lose the expenses incurred in the securing of juries and the attendance of witnesses. In our recent session of court Judge William H. Pope showed that he had been striving to economize in court expenses but in many instances was handicapped by existing improper legislation. The judge is well liked and respected, tries hard to expedite matters and perform the duties of his office in a manner that is just to the people."

"Another reform that would be beneficial to the taxpayers could be brought about by the legislature, notably in having the tax on personal property of owners of real property, placed as a lien on the real estate; and that personal property taxes be collected at the time the property is assessed. Large sums in the aggregate are lost annually by persons removing their property from the Territory to evade payment of taxes, and thus, the man who does pay, has more to pay."

"It would be a great thing for Roswell and the Valley if the extension of the Santa Fe Central to that city would materialize and the people of our city are hopeful that it may occur in the near future. One of the greatest advantages to be brought to Roswell by the road would be to bring coal into the city from the Hagan coal fields, which would be done at a greatly reduced rate than is being paid now and with cheap coal, manufacturing industries would be attracted to Roswell and vicinity. The Territorial capital would be brought into closer communication with the Pecos Valley and there are thousands of other advantages, which would accrue."

"When I first came to Roswell, I drove overland from Las Vegas, about 200 miles. Pecos City, 190 miles south was the nearest railroad point. In 1894 the Pecos Valley road was completed from Pecos City to Roswell, and five years later, the road was extended to Amarillo, Texas. The growth of the city from that time is well known."

"Recently, we had some oil excitement, that useful liquid being struck about 12 miles northeast of Roswell. There was a great scramble for land in that section, but the excitement has died down somewhat. There is oil there, but it is a question as to whether it can be secured in paying quantities."

"The artesian belt still continues to increase and all of the old wells keep up their flow apparently unmolested by other borings. The indications are that the Pecos Valley will enjoy a prosperous year as the ranges are in excellent condition, as are cattle and sheep. A great quantity of fruit was shipped east this year and the prospects are good for a decided increase in the business next year."

## NO AUSTRALIAN BALLOT FOR NEW MEXICO.

Some suggestions have appeared of late in territorial newspapers towards the adoption of the Australian ballot system in New Mexico. This paper believes that it is entirely too early even for the consideration of such a measure and that under existing conditions, the present voting system is the best and most satisfactory, especially if a few needed, although small changes were made in the election laws. The Australian ballot would be entirely too cumbersome and would defeat the privilege of voters and that in many instances, to participate in popular elections. Even a modified Australian ballot would not serve the needs of existing conditions.

It would be well enough among the amendments to provide that no ballot shall be legal unless it contains the names of the candidates nominated by a regular party organization, which has been in existence at least two years and a regularly adopted emblem; or a ticket which has been nominated by a petition signed by at least one hundred legal voters in the municipality or the county wherein such is to be voted upon or by one hundred voters in each county, if the ballot is used in a territorial election, say for a candidate for delegate, same also to have a party emblem.

The privilege of scratching or pasting any name the voter desires to vote for upon any ballot must of course in no manner be curtailed. The tickets should be printed at the expense of each county and should be distributed to the voters through the regular party organization at a certain date before the election. These ideas are only advanced for discussion. If it is the sentiment of the people that they shall be enacted into law by the Thirty-sixth Legislative Assembly, such will likely be the result. If not, there will be no harm done.

As there seems to be considerable misapprehension as to what the Australian ballot really is, the New Mexican desires to explain that the real Australian ballot conveys to the voter no hint whatever of the parties to which the several candidates belong. If a governor, a sheriff and a judge are to be elected, the names of all the candidates for governor are printed together, and so with the other offices and the voter must remember what parties they belong to and mark separately every candidate for whom he votes.

The theory is that the mixing of the names on the list compels the voter to keep himself posted in regard to political affairs before the election and to exercise his wits and his choice at the time of voting.

This device is too radical for the people of this country and various modifications of the Australian ballot have been adopted. In Illinois all the candidates of one party for all the offices are printed in one column, so that a voter may vote the party ticket without reading it. In Massachusetts the ballot is a cross between this and the Australian ballot, all the candidates for the same office being printed together, but the party affiliations being given, as follows:

Governor. Mark one.  
John Quincy Adams..... Socialist.  
John L. Bates..... Republican.  
Michael T. Berry..... Socialist Labor.  
Oliver W. Cobb..... Prohibition.  
William L. Douglas..... Democratic.

This arrangement, which like the Australian ballot, is intended to defeat the inclination of the voter to gulp down the party ticket without thought, is highly praised by a Chicago newspaper on that account and the interesting question is raised whether, after all, it is an evil for people to be assisted and encouraged by the form of the ballot to cast a purely partisan vote.

Theoretically, perhaps, it would be better to eliminate from the ballot all guiding influences whatever and compel every voter to think out the whole political situation for himself and then make a deliberate choice of all the candidates for whom he votes. That

is, such a plan would be best if human nature were not what it is and if every voter were a thoughtful and intelligent person. On the other hand, if nine voters out of ten vote as they are influenced to vote then it is best to have some arrangement by which the influence to which they are subjected shall be the best that it can be.

This is exactly the situation in this country, if not in all countries, and the question is whether it is not better that a voter should submit himself to the guidance of a great party than to the manipulation of some private and irresponsible influence, which is generally of a selfish character, such as a newspaper syndicate or a legislative voters' league or a municipal voters' league.

### LOCAL TRAIN SERVICE.

Much benefit would ensue to the three large cities of the Territory if they had a local train service that would offer some certainty as to the time of arrival and departure of trains. On many parts of its system the Santa Fe Railway maintains such local service and finds it a direct as well as indirect gain. While the railroad officials know their own business best, yet the newspapers which are close to the people and feel the public pulse at all times, can and often do make helpful suggestions when it comes to serving the public. The Albuquerque Journal, together with the New Mexican, are advocating the running of a daily train between Albuquerque and Santa Fe and between the latter place and Las Vegas, the two trains to Santa Fe to connect closely, one leaving Albuquerque at 11 p. m. and the other Las Vegas at 7 a. m. and both leaving here about noon. This would enable citizens of the Duke and Meadow Cities to transact their business at the capital and return home the same day, without any long and uncertain waits at Lamy. The runs being comparatively short, the time of arrival and departure of trains would not be the riddle that it is with the transcontinental trains. Santa Fe people could go to Albuquerque and Las Vegas to attend opera or to visit, and be home within twenty hours of leaving. There would be an undoubted increase of traffic which eventually would pay the railroad company in direct returns for the extra outlay and would help to make the Santa Fe System much more popular in this section. The transcontinental trains would not lose time in stopping at the small stations between Albuquerque, Lamy and Las Vegas and the local traffic could be handled entirely by the proposed local train. If necessary, one freight car could be attached to the local which would ensure a fast daily freight service. That each of the three cities would be greatly benefited admits of no doubt, even if it is only by establishing closer bonds, eradicating petty jealousies and bringing their people to a recognition of the fact, that what benefits one of them is apt to benefit the other two to a greater or less extent.

### AN EXCELLENT APPOINTMENT.

The appointment of Amado Chaves as superintendent of public instruction by Governor Otero meets with quite decided approval by the Carlisbad Argus, which paper concerning it says: "The vacancy in the office of superintendent of public instruction of the territory, occasioned by the death of J. Francisco Chaves, has been filled by Governor Otero by the appointment of Amado Chaves, of Santa Fe, to the position. It is a very excellent and singularly fortunate appointment, and is so regarded all over the Territory. As to fitness and competency, there is no question, and the public school system of the Territory will continue to be improved and put on a still higher and more permanent plane. Every citizen of New Mexico is vitally interested in all matters looking to educational growth, for only by that path can the Territory reach its maximum of success. The appointment, therefore, of a man properly equipped in every way, to the head of educational affairs, is a matter of satisfaction to every resident."

The Red River Prospector also thinks very well of Governor Otero's action in the matter, commenting thereon saying:

"The appointment of Hon. Amado Chaves, of Santa Fe, as superintendent of public instruction of the Territory, vice Colonel J. Francisco Chaves, deceased, by Governor Otero, is well received in general and especially in this section. He is well educated and those who know him report that he has the best interests of the public schools at heart. Such a man is needed, one who is acquainted with the needs of the common people and has their respect and confidence. In such a man, who is so well qualified, the Prospector feels that our common schools, of which Mr. Chaves now has supervision, will rapidly advance in efficiency."

Ohio people are very successful politicians, but in the banking line they do not size up so well. Certainly the state cannot boast of the financial ability and acuteness of the Ohio bankers who loaned Mrs. Chadwick millions of dollars on the security of bogus notes.

## GOVERNOR OTERO'S REPORT FOR 1904.

The final proofs of the annual report of Governor M. A. Otero to the Secretary of the Interior for the year ending June 30th, 1904, upon the conditions of the Territory, have been read here and have been returned to the Department of the Interior in Washington. At the request of Governor Otero, forty fine half-tone cuts of public buildings and educational institutions of the Territory have been furnished by the Bureau of Immigration for the illustration of the report. These illustrations will make the volume much more attractive and will help its appearance greatly. There will be about three hundred pages of printed matter and these illustrations contained therein. Very valuable information concerning the progress and advancement of the Territory during the past year is contained in the volume and while it will be bulky as the one of last year, it will be found nevertheless very interesting and timely.

The Territorial Sunday observance laws will have to be strictly executed hereafter. Put a pin right here. Under existing statutes each county is charged with the duty of inspecting all saloons and places where gaming is done to collect the annual license fees for each table or each gaming device in operation. It is reported that laxity in this respect exists in several counties of the Territory and that not all licenses demanded by law have been collected. The sheriffs will do well to enforce and support the letter of the law hereafter promptly. If not, the law may be invoked against them and against proprietors of gaming places. In this respect, a stitch in time may save nine.

The transcontinental railroads are wild over the reports that competent engineers have recommended the construction of a sea level canal across the Isthmus of Panama in place of continuing the plan upon which work on the canal has been prosecuted heretofore. The new plan, if adopted, will cost about two hundred millions of dollars to execute and it will take from twenty-five to thirty years for its completion. The railroad companies fear that the sea level canal plan will not be adopted.

Recruiting officers of the War Department report that it is rather hard to enlist men at present and the recruiting is slow, despite the fact that the enlisted men of the United States army are the best paid, best fed and the best sheltered on the globe. There are two reasons for this state of affairs: One, times are good and every able-bodied man who wants to work at remunerative wages can do so; second, the average American is not "dead gone" on military service in times of peace. After all these are very wholesome conditions.

On January 1, Progresso will become a county seat, that of Torrance County. Progresso is not a post office and information comes to Santa Fe that no steps have yet been taken to establish a post office there. That will necessarily greatly hamper public business and those particularly interested in the welfare and prosperity of the new county should prepare the proper petitions to the Post Office Department to establish a post office at Progresso, even if the county seat is to be removed to Estancia or Torrance by the next legislative assembly.

Sir Edward Clarke still insists that the name of the United States of America shall be changed to the United States of Usonia and that Americans should be called Usonian. He has evidently forgotten the fact that the United States of America established a strong title to that name about 125 years ago and does not care to give it up now.

"We are assured that the omnibus Statehood bill will be pushed again this session. It will probably be pushed across the path of any tariff revision measure that may try to make its way through the Senate."—Washington Post.

Well, the people of New Mexico and Arizona will not care. They want neither joint statehood nor tariff revision.

Springer has ambition of becoming a county seat. It had that honor before and those were prosperous days for the town. However, the likelihood of southern Colfax County being established as a separate County by the coming legislative assembly, is very slight.

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## INVESTIGATION REGARDING COAL LANDS

On the Eastern Side of the Tejon Land Grant in the Hagan Coal Fields—Case of Lizzie S. Dillman et al.

In the case of Lizzie S. Dillman, Mrs. E. H. Shields, Mrs. T. P. Gable and J. J. Sheridan to file coal declaratory statements for and involving the question as to whether the below described tracts of land are public land or within the boundaries of the Tejon Land Grant in eastern Sandoval County and in the Hagan coal belt, which has been pending for the past two years in the United States land office in Santa Fe and then on appeal before the commissioner of the general land office in Washington and thereafter before the secretary of the interior, the following decision has just been rendered:

The Commissioner of the General Land Office: Sir: This case arose upon the applications of Lizzie S. Dillman and others to file coal declaratory statements for certain lands in T. 13 N., R. 6 E., Santa Fe, N. M.

The applications were rejected by the local officers for the reason that the lands applied for are within the limits of the "Tejon Private Land Grant." The applicants appealed, contending that the lands applied for are not a part of said grant but were omitted from survey by a false closing of the township survey upon what was represented as the eastern boundary of the grant. Your office directed that a contract award for the survey of the grant, but upon the protest of the owners of the grant you vacated the order for the following reasons:

In view of the fact that the Tejon Private Land Grant was duly patented for 12,801.46 acres February 11, 1882, and after a careful consideration of the matter as submitted, I have reached the conclusion that the interests of the public service and that of the heirs and owners of the Tejon Grant will be best subserved by a revocation of the original order of June 29, 1903, authorizing a resurvey of the eastern boundary of said grant; and such revocation is hereby ordered, and you will act accordingly.

The applications of appellants were then taken up and the decisions of the local officers holding that the lands applied for are within the limits of the grant and rejecting the applications, were affirmed.

The question in this case is not whether the private land grant was or was not properly located and surveyed but whether the public land survey of the township in question was closed upon it. The grant as shown by a statement in your letter was surveyed in 1877 and upon the approval of that survey a patent issued for the tract surveyed as containing 12,801.46 acres. It conveyed no other land except that contained within the lines of the survey whether the quantity was more or less than the acreage named in the patent.

The public land survey of township 13 N., R. 6 E., which purported to close upon the east boundary of the grant, was made in 1880. The applicants contend that this line did not close upon said boundary but that a false closing was established through three sections of said township of a uniform width of 13.38 chains, submitting in proof thereof plats of survey made from the official records.

The plats of survey of the grant and the field notes thereof exhibited by appellants show that the beginning corner of the grant is definitely indicated by a large rock marked "Beg. Cor." and that the east line of the grant was run from the northeast corner on a due south line to the beginning corner. Said plats show that the closing of township 13 N., R. 6 E., upon said east boundary leaves the whole of section 4 and part of section 5 as public lands while the corresponding portions of the tiers of sections immediately above in T. 13 N., R. 6 E., were omitted from the township survey.

If the east line of the grant is a straight line as shown by the field notes of survey exhibited with said plats, and the beginning corner is located at the place upon the plats submitted with the appeal of appellants, it is evident that the public land survey of T. 13 N., R. 6 E., did not close upon the grant but left a strip of public land unsurveyed which is the land applied for.

Your office in vacating your order for a resurvey of the grant lines seemed to lay greater stress upon the quantity of land purported to be conveyed by the patent than upon the boundaries of the grant to which the patent must conform, whether the quantity designated be greater or less.

It is stated in a petition filed by appellants, with the record in the case, that an examiner of surveys was directed to make a survey of the east boundary of the grant, who reported to your office the result of his survey with a diagram showing the discrepancy in the public land surveys as alleged by appellants and that upon report, the Surveyor General was directed to award a contract for the "resurvey of the boundaries of the Tejon Grant in strict conformity with the act of Congress defining and confirming said boundaries."

It does not appear that the alleged report of the Examiner was discredited

ed by your office but you revoked the order for a resurvey in view of the fact that the grant was patented for 12,801.46 acres February 11, 1882, and that the interest of the public service and that of the heirs and owners of the grant will be best subserved by such action.

While the government has no authority to resurvey the grant or to change the boundaries as surveyed in 1877 upon which the patent issued, it has authority to determine whether the public land surveys were properly closed upon that line and to resurvey any public lands that may have been omitted from survey.

As it does not appear from the record that your office viewed the case in this light, it is remanded with instructions to make an investigation as to the alleged discrepancy in the township surveys and if the facts alleged by applicants are found to be true, to readjudicate the case.

## FATHER TROMBY PASSES AWAY

Well Known Priest of Old Albuquerque Goes to His Reward—Funeral Held Yesterday.

Rev. Father Vito Tromby, S. J., passed away in Old Albuquerque Friday night at the age of 67 years. He was one of the assistant priests of the old town church and had been a resident of New Mexico for 32 years. He was born in Italy and entered upon his career in the church in 1856, studying in Italy and Spain. The funeral took place yesterday morning at 9 o'clock, Rev. Father P. Tomassini preaching the funeral sermon.

Father Tromby came to New Mexico in 1872, and established in the old town the first school for boys. Albuquerque ever had. He taught and conducted that school with such a great success that the best educators at that time pronounced it one of the best of its kind in the whole Territory. In 1881, when the Sisters of Charity came to Albuquerque, Father Tromby resigned his position and employed his time in works of charity and zeal.

Father Tromby was a man of much scientific knowledge and literary ability; when he was yet a young man he published three different works of physics and mathematics. He was a Latin and Greek scholar of refined taste. As a religiousist his virtues were great, especially his piety and patience and in bearing with resignation the pain and discomfort of a lifelong illness, to which he was subject.

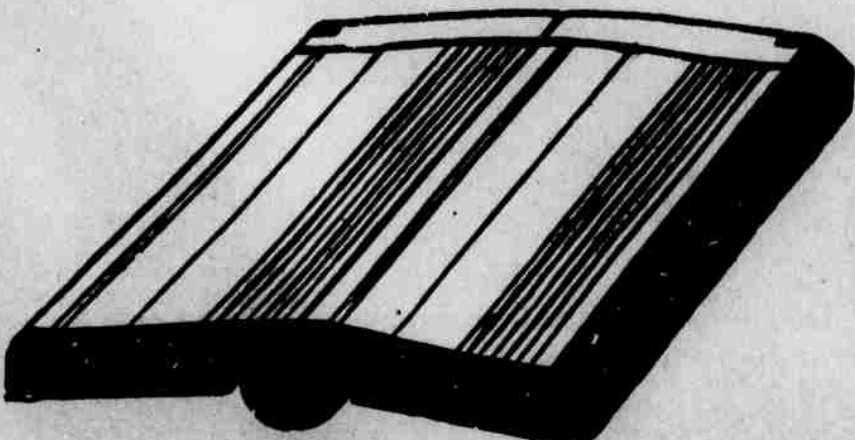

## MINES AND MILLS

The new Huntington mill and new table recently installed in the Porter mill near Hillsboro are working full time and the recent additions have doubled the capacity of the plant.

A rich strike is reported from Jacarilla, Lincoln County, where, Saturday, a ten-foot vein of ore was opened up in the second level. It shows up for about 25 feet and about one-quarter of the ore runs from 25 to 30 per cent copper. The strike was made on the Three Bears property.

H. B. Ridenour and B. J. Weitzel, who are interested in the Treasure group of mines in Sierra County, arrived at Hillsboro last week from Cincinnati and inspected their holdings. They are expected to return to that vicinity after the holidays, which they will spend at home.

A report that gold has been struck in the Sacramento foot hills three miles southeast of Alamogordo, had that city in the throes of gold fever for a while last week. Nothing authentic has been given out as yet as to whether or not the strike is bona fide, but the foothills in that section have always been considered barren by mining experts.

Fifty men are now employed in the mine and stamp mill of the Good Hope-Bonanza in Sierra County. The stamp mill is treating from 12 to 15 tons of ore per day. The company has nearly a carload of concentrates, which have a value of \$88 in gold, silver and copper, gold predominating, which is ready for shipment to the smelter. Mr. Ross, of Colorado, is in charge of the mill.

## TERRITORIAL TOPICS.

Work is progressing satisfactorily on the new Knights of Pythias Hall at Springer, and it is expected that it will be completed in time for dedication on New Year's day.

The Agua Pura Company, of Las Vegas, recently cut ice on one of its ponds near that city. The ice had frozen to a thickness of nine inches and is the first that has been cut this season.

Hagerman, Chaves County, is to have a newspaper. L. D. Roeder, a newspaper man from Alameda, Texas, will be the editor. The first issue will appear December 17th and the paper will be called the Hagerman Eagle.

Patrick Mason, who has been confined in jail at Alamogordo, has been released on bond. He was a prisoner from Quay County for safe keeping on a charge of horse stealing, and broke jail once and was recaptured near the Arizona line.

Hugo Seaberg, a Raton attorney, who is building a new hotel in that city, was in Las Vegas the other day for the purpose of inspecting the furniture of the Montezuma Hotel at that place, with a view to purchasing it for his hotel in the Gate City.

J. V. Latham, live stock inspector for the El Paso & Northeastern Railway and Santa Fe Central, inspected 25 cars of cattle at Ancho for the El Capitlan Land Company, Saturday last, after which the stock was shipped to the Kansas City market.

Lee Cherry, a fugitive from justice, gave himself up to Sheriff Hunter at Alamogordo last Saturday morning. He told the sheriff he was tired of dodging the officers since the killing of a man eight months ago at his home at Livingston, Alabama. Since the killing Cherry has been in hiding in Mexico and Texas and is now ready to go home and stand trial.

A quiet wedding occurred at Deming last Saturday morning when Edwin Woodhull, of Silver City and Mrs. Florence Gouin, of Winnipeg, Manitoba, were united in marriage. Mr. Woodhull is an old newspaper man, having been for many years on the editorial staff of the Winnipeg (Manitoba) Free Press. He owns a ranch near Silver City.

Early last Wednesday morning the Adobe saloon at Alamogordo was robbed and the place set on fire to cover up the crime. The fire was discovered, however, before it had made much headway and a few bucketfuls of water quenched the flames. Entrance was made to the place by prying loose the chain from the back cellar door and through a trap to the bar. In the cellar a barrel of whisky had been poured over straw and boxes and fire set to these. In the bar room a slot machine was robbed. This was all the money stolen. The loss, including that from the fire, amounted to about \$400. The officers claim to have a clue to the burglars.

Samuel H. McAninch Suddenly Stricken with Paralysis Sunday—Was Assessor-Elect of Grant County.

News was received here yesterday of the death very suddenly of Samuel H. McAninch a prominent citizen of Silver City, and assessor-elect of Grant County. He was stricken with paralysis Sunday morning and died 12 hours later.

The deceased had been a resident of Grant County for over 25 years, coming to Silver City in the latter part of the seventies. He was probate clerk of the county for several terms and was elected to the office of assessor on November 8th last and would have taken up the performance of the duties of the office the first of January. He leaves a wife and three small children.

An election to fill the vacancy occasioned by his sudden death will have to be called by Governor Otero.

**MARTIN OUT  
OF E. P. & N. E.**

General Manager Resigns on Account of Ill Health—Superintendent Sullivan May Succeed Him.

W. R. Martin, general manager of the El Paso & Northeastern Railway, has resigned on account of ill health and it is reported that he will be succeeded by General Superintendent Dennis Sullivan, of that road, who has headquarters at Alamogordo.

An order has been issued for heads of departments to make their reports to President C. B. Eddy, who it is said will handle the larger matters of the company but the report is current that Mr. Sullivan will virtually have control of the road.

Mr. Martin is at present sick with pneumonia at his home in El Paso, but is now on the road to recovery. It is announced that he will devote his time to looking after his business interests in the Pass City.

**Articles of Incorporation.**

The following articles of incorporation have been filed in the office of the Territorial Secretary:

The El Paso & Durango Railroad. The purpose for which it is formed is to construct, maintain, build, equip and operate a railroad with suitable telegraph lines; and to do all that is necessary for the construction and maintenance of such a line. The terminus of the road will be, on the south point at or near the vicinity of Mastodon, in Dona Ana County, where connection will be made with the El Paso & Southwestern Railroad; on the north at a point on the northern boundary line of New Mexico at the intersection of that point with a line running north from La Plata City in San Juan County, about 48 miles east from a point where the Territory corners with the state of Utah. And the branch of said railroad commencing at a point on the railroad near Putnam for its northwestern terminal and running south-easterly to the city of Albuquerque, which will be the southwestern terminal. The estimated length of the road from Mastodon to its northern terminus will be 400 miles and the length of the branch will be 120 miles. The incorporators, who are also the directors, are: S. W. French, Douglas, Arizona; C. F. G. Sherman, W. H. Brophy, Bisbee; Charles E. Mills, Morenci, Arizona; A. L. Hawley, El Paso, Charles A. Spies, Stephen B. Davis, Jr., Las Vegas. The capital stock is \$800,000, divided into 8,000 shares of the value of \$100 each. The entire sum has been actually subscribed. Santa Fe is the

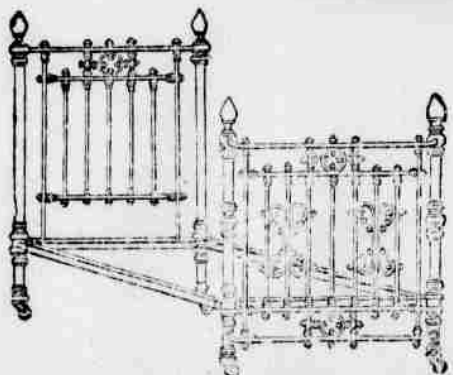

**SCHOOLS SHOW  
GREAT GAINS**

Increase in Pupils and Population Given in Report of Amado Chaves, Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The following figures are from the report of the Territorial superintendent of public instruction for the year 1904:

Teachers in the Territory in the public schools: male 412, female 440, total 852; enrollment, males 22,948, female 17,756, total 39,704; average daily attendance, males 16,248, females 13,334, total 29,582; number of pupils of school age, between the ages of 5 and 21 years, males 36,106, females 32,294, total 68,400; number of schools 729, months taught 3,094 1/4; receipts, balance August 1, 1904, \$172,418.34; from county school fund, \$214,643.88; poll tax, fines, etc., \$102,245.87, total \$489,308.09; expenditures, teachers wages \$250,123.39; rent, fuel, etc., \$50,195.82; school houses and grounds, \$52,693.01, total expenditures \$353,012.22; on hand August 1, 1904, \$136,295.87; value of public school houses and furniture, \$824,739.95; bonded indebtedness, \$287,196.00; number of volumes in school libraries, 4,886; value of school libraries, \$5,424.83.

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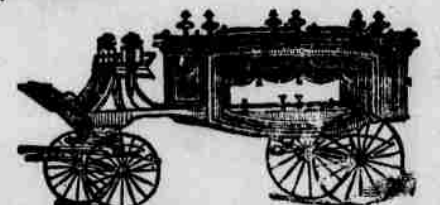
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
