BRITAIN owns one-fourth of the railways in the United States of America, and half of the railways of South America.

GEN. GARCIA is reported to have reached the conviction that Cuba ought to be governed permanently by the United States.

THERE are forty-six streams on the map of Porto Rico, and the authorities at Washington have sent men to ascertain how many there are on the island.

AGUALALCO, the Philippine leader, declares that the \$600,000 bribe which Spain paid to him less than a year ago was an insult. But it appears that he pocketed the insult without a tremor.

THE territorial fair closed this afternoon, and while it is no doubt a financial success, the smallness of the exhibits is disappointing to those who have the future welfare of the exposition at heart.

THAT part of Cuba already under the domination of the United States is to have a rural police force organized on the famous rurales of Mexico. General Wool has shown most excellent judgment in proposing such a plan for the policing of the rural districts of Cuba.

ACCORDING to advice received in Washington, the governor of Sierra Leone, Africa, has offered a reward of \$50 for the arrest of the persons who murdered three American missionaries in that province last May. The governor's extravagance in this matter is positively reckless.

"We have assumed the responsibilities of victory," says the New York republican platform, "and wherever our flag has gone there the liberty, the humanity and the civilization which that flag embodies and represents must abide forever." One of the good points about a republican platform is its definiteness.

It is fortunate for the country that the necessity for the election of a congress will support the administration in the adjustment of the problems of the war in being emphasized by the speakers who have opened the campaign in the various states. If this point is pressed upon the attention of the people from now on until November the disaster that would come from a hostile senate or house will be averted.

THE administration of President McKinley will pass into history as an epoch-making administration. Already we have seen the annexation of Hawaii, soon to be followed by the annexation of Porto Rico. Cuba has been liberated and will ultimately be annexed. And while the fate of the Philippines is as yet problematic, it is safe to assert that they will become United States territory. Next to this epoch-making period will be the construction of the Nicaragua canal.

THE charge of Colonel Roosevelt at Saratoga was as brilliant and successful as was the charge at San Juan Hill. The nucleus of the enemy did him no more harm than did the Manner bullets that whistled about his head as he urged the Rough Riders to victory. After a brave resistance the forces of Governor Bland retreated in great disorder and the rough riders from New York and Kings counties, reinforced by troops from the interior counties, captured the convention.

THE NEW NAVY.
With the completion of the arm of war now under construction, the United States navy will boast of thirteen battleships of a total tonnage of 142,214 tons; two armored cruisers of 12,471 tons; fifteen protected cruisers of 6,221 tons; four unprotected cruisers of 8,007 tons; fifteen gunboats of 2,579 tons, and sixty-three other vessels, monitors, torpedo boats, etc., of 48,945 tons; a total of 188 vessels of 391,620 tons. This includes none of the auxiliary cruisers or gunboats equipped for the late war, no dispatch boats and other vessels used by the navy, but only those built for fighting purposes. Our navy will then be nearly twice what it was four years ago in tonnage and armament, and the improvement will be even greater if the matter of efficiency be taken into consideration.

AMERICAN EXPANSION.
Of course nobody proposes to apply the American form of government to the Philippines, or even to Porto Rico, at once. These dependencies will be for a long time under a form of government that must closely resemble a military dictatorship, and it is an interesting question whether the curbing critics of

any proposed expansion are capable of realizing that the American system of government may not only prove itself equal to the demands put upon it but may itself derive incalculable benefit from the effort.

Holland, in all intents and purposes a republic, with only about 3,000,000 inhabitants, successfully governs 35,000,000 foreigners, and has grown richer, richer, and stronger in the operation. If our system is so narrow that it will not permit us to take in a d properly care for a few millions of semi-savages and see that they get justice, then some thing must be the matter with our system, as applied to ourselves, and the sooner we find it out and apply the remedy the better.

THE territorial republican convention which assembled in this city this morning is a representative body of the great west, and one which would compare in intelligence and ability with similar assemblies in the Union.

The Santa Fe Fruit company has leased its evaporating plant to Superintendent Gleason, who will run that part of the business and evaporate all wild-falls, seconds and fruit to ripe to ship; while all shippable fruit will be handled by L. D. Bassett, who is down here from Denver with Mr. Liddell. Later on, perhaps, not until another season, a power plant will be added to the plant, and the general scope of operations extended. This will be a good thing for the fruit growers of this part of the country, as the fruit grown here can now be taken care of, and not be left rotting on the ground, a loss to growers. There is no doubt but what the new concern will do a rushing and paying business.—New Mexican.

LET IT COME.
A Chance of the Flagstaff Observatory Being Removed to Santa Fe.

Professor Andrew K. Douglas, acting superintendent of the United States observatory at Flagstaff, arrived from Arizona last night and registered at the Palace, en route to Omaha, Washington and Boston, says the New Mexican. He drove around town this morning on a tour of observation, and thereby hangs a tale. Professor Douglas did not say what was the object of his drive, but it had a large sized object in view. He went up onto old Fort Marcy and the situation there seemed to suit him perfectly. And the reason it suited him was that there is a proposition to remove the observatory from Flagstaff to Santa Fe, as this location seems to be better adapted for the purposes for which the observatory was established. Professor Douglas went north this morning, apparently well satisfied with his morning ride in view of Fort Marcy, and there is a well grounded hope that the proposed transfer will be made. This would be a great addition to the town, and bring many scientific men to this part of the country.

Professor Douglas is a graduate of Trinity college, Hartford, Conn., and an honored member of the famous classical society of Phi Beta Kappa. He is an earnest student and a very pleasant gentleman.
