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EVIDENCE IS SENSATIONAL

In Smoot Inquiry at Washington
...Horrible Penalties Re-
vealed by Woman.

MORMONS IN POLITICS

Ideho Witness Says Church is All
Powerful in That State—Defeated
the Governor.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 16.—The first witness in the Reed Smoot inquiry today was Mrs. Annie Elliott, of Price, Utah, and her testimony was sensational. In a trembling voice and shaking with emotion, Mrs. Elliott said that the obligations of the Mormon Church were so indelicate that she could not bear to repeat them. By slow degrees, Mrs. Elliott repeated the various oaths and penalties ascribed for revealing parts of the ceremony. During the testimony concerning the penalties involving mutilation of the body, the witness trembled continuously and appeared to proceed with difficulty.

On cross-examination she was asked if she ever heard of the penalties being enforced against anyone and answered in the negative.

Political Power of Church.

The next witness was Charles H. Jackson, of Boise City, Idaho, who is chairman of the Democratic state central committee. He testified at length concerning the growing power of the Mormon Church and its interference with state affairs, which he said were made the paramount issue by the Democrats and Independents in the last campaign in Idaho.

Church Supreme in Idaho.

Mr. Jackson said further that the apostles of the church from Utah go into the state of Idaho and direct the people how to vote. Speaking of the influence of the church in political affairs of that state, Jackson took as an illustration the defeat of Governor Morrison for re-election. The administration had been satisfactory to the governor's Republican constituents, but he had run afoul of the Mormon Church and therefore was denied a second term. In this connection Jackson said with emphasis: "It is impossible for any man or party to stand against the Mormon Church in Idaho."

HEAR APPEAL IN NOTED CASE

Of Greene and Gaynor—Privy Council of En-
gland Will Hand Down Decision
in Matter.

London, Dec. 16.—The appeal of the United States against the decision of the Justice of the Crown at Quebec in the case of Greene and Gaynor came up before the Privy Council today. It is now more than five years since Greene and Gaynor, who were concerned with Oberlin M. Carter in the Savannah harbor contract, escaped to Canada and settled in Montreal.

Carter was sentenced to five years in prison and the United States government applied for a writ of extradition for Greene and Gaynor. They fled to Quebec. United States officials caught them there after a dramatic chase and brought them to Montreal. Through habeas corpus they were taken to Quebec and after a long legal controversy they obtained their liberty within the limits of Quebec Province. The United States government appealed to the Privy Council of England.

CONFLAGRATION IN ALGIERS SUBURB

Whole Garrison Fighting Flames—Loss Al-
ready Has Reached Millions of
Francs.

London, Dec. 16.—A dispatch to the News Agency from Paris says that a large part of Mustapha, a suburb of Algiers, having a population of 35,000 persons, is in flames. The whole garrison has been turned over to fight the fire. Damage to the extent of many millions of francs has already been done.

RENDER DECISION TOMORROW.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 16.—The supreme court was not in session today. It is expected a decision on throwing out the votes of four more precincts will be made tomorrow, as an application to this effect was made late yesterday afternoon.

DESTRUCTION OF FLEET CONFIRMED

Refugees from Port Arthur Tell of Jap-
anese Success—Sailing Vessel
Reaches Chee Foo With Im-
portant Messages.

Che Foo, Dec. 16.—Passengers who arrived here today from Kwang Tung Peninsula confirm the truthfulness of the official Japanese reports of the sinking of the various Russian warships. They say the Japanese would have been able to accomplish this in the past two months, but apparently preferred to use their big guns against the Russian artillery forces. It is believed the destruction of the ships indicates that the Japanese have abandoned the hope of capturing the fortress. The Japanese have lost three torpedo boats within the past month by mines, the last one sinking during the attack on the Sevastopol. The fighting during which 203 Meter Hill was captured was terrific, the Japanese alone losing 12,000 men.

Escape from Port Arthur.

Che Foo, Dec. 16.—Seven Russians in civilian garb, but with military training obvious in their bearing arrived here today in a sail boat, carrying dispatches. They refused to talk and went immediately to the Russian consulate. A high wind enabled them to make quick passage from Port Arthur.

MRS. CHADWICK TO MAKE STATEMENT

Satisfied With Her Jail Life.—Denies
Report That She Owes Any
Pittsburg Banks.

Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 16.—Mrs. Chadwick has settled down to the routine of jail life, and today expressed herself as well satisfied with her surroundings. After taking breakfast, she sent for Sheriff Barry and told him she did not care to receive any visitors during the day, as she was about to prepare a statement and did not wish to be disturbed until it was finished.

When asked the nature of the statement, she declined to reply, but said she would not make it public until after submitting it to her attorneys. If she does this, the chances are that it will never be made public, for Attorney J. P. Dawley, who is now in charge of her case, has the reputation of being able to compel his clients to refrain from discussing their cases before they are brought to trial.

Doesn't Owe Pittsburg Banks.

Pittsburg, Pa., Dec. 16.—In a telegram to the Pittsburg Dispatch, Mrs. Chadwick says: "Kindly deny the report that I owe money to any Pittsburg banks. I don't owe them a dollar."

MAY DISSOLVE PARLIAMENT

Premier Tisza, of Hungary, Will Bring About
Such if Present Trouble Does Not
Cease.

Buda Pest, December 16.—At today's session of the lower house of the Hungarian parliament, Premier Tisza announced that unless the house was organized within three days, as required by the standing orders, he would be obliged to dissolve the parliament, as he desired to appeal to the electors to ascertain whether or not they approved of his course.

The premier asked the house to grant him a bill of indemnity for a very brief period so that he might issue writs for the new electors. He added that even if the opposition party resisted his request, elections would be held nevertheless.

Francis Kossuth, for the opposition, declared there would be no difficulty in granting a bill of indemnity to the government which represents the law, but that they could not concede it to the Tisza cabinet.

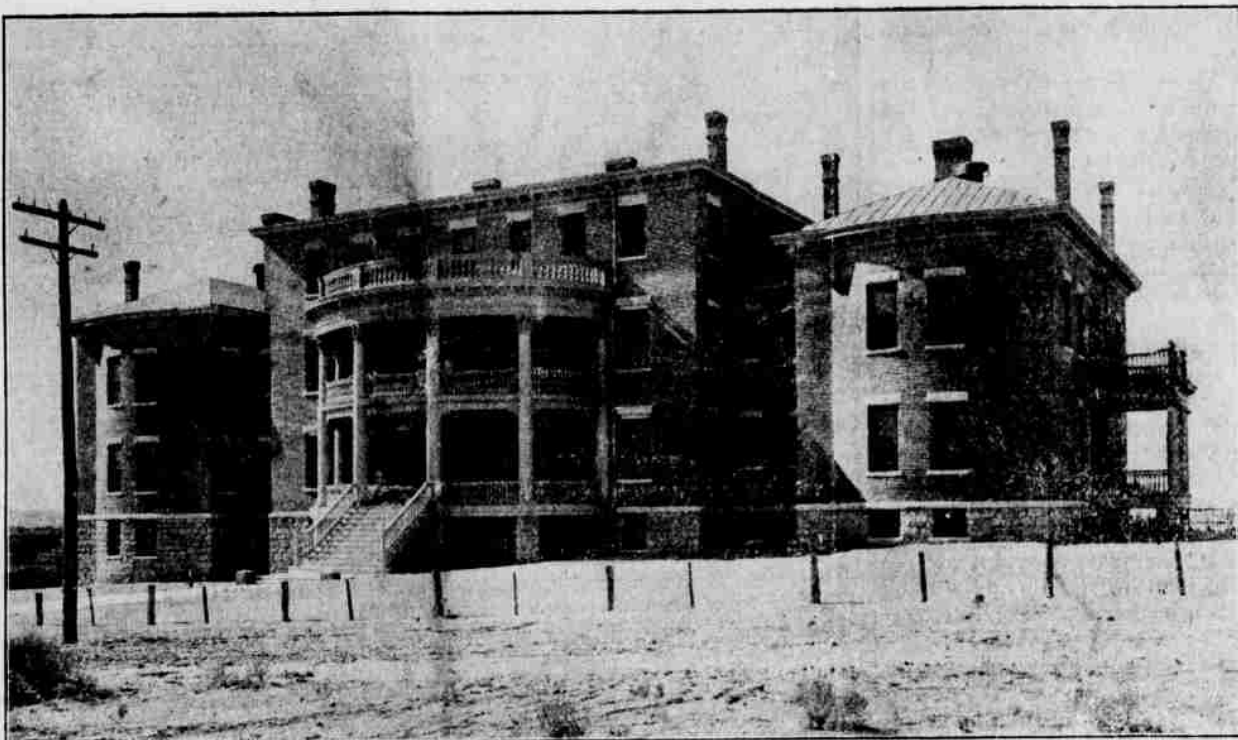
INSANE MAN HELD POLICE AT BAY

Exciting Time on a New York Thorough-
fare—Broke Many Windows and
Resisted Arrest.

New York, Dec. 16.—Pitched on top of a snow heap at Fourth Avenue and Twenty-second Street, a completely nude man armed with a crowbar, kept half a dozen policemen and a crowd of men at bay for half an hour today after he had smashed nearly a score of big plate glass windows, valued at \$200 each. The man was finally captured and taken to a hospital. He is undoubtedly insane. There was nothing to indicate his identity in his clothing, found in a doorway close by.

The man was about 25 years old and apparently a laborer.

HAMILTON JOINT STATEHOOD BILL

Amended By Senate Committee in
Important Particulars—Five Mil-
lions of Dollars For New Mexico's
Schools.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 16.—Senators Beveridge, Dillingham, Nelson, Dick, Burnham, Kean (Rep.) reported the joint statehood bill favorably. Bate, Newlands, Paterson (Dem.) will make minority report. Senator Clark, of Arkansas (Dem.), favors a two state bill for the four territories. Senator Bate moved to recommit minority report to be made after the holidays. Five million dollars are given the schools of New Mexico and Arizona, besides a large increase of public lands. It is believed the joint statehood bill will pass. It prohibits liquor traffic in the Indian Territory for ten years and that the constitution shall not contain any clause restricting suffrage on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

The Statehood Bill.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 16.—In the Senate today Senators Beveridge (Indiana) from the Committees on Territories, reported the Hamilton Joint Statehood Bill and gave notice that immediately after the disposal of the Philippine Bill, would move its consideration.

Representing the minority of the committee, Senator Bate (Tennessee) gave notice that he would enter a motion to re-commit the bill for the purpose of taking further testimony.

Sensor Bard (California), gave notice of an amendment, confining the provisions of the bill to a state to be formed of Oklahoma and Indian Territory and eliminating all reference to New Mexico and Arizona.

The Senate then resumed the consideration of the Philippine Bill.

Beef Trust in the House.

Representative Baker (New York), today introduced a resolution in the house requesting that the attorney general "report to the house whether he has ascertained that the so-called beef trust is in restraint of trade, and if so what steps he has taken under the provisions of the law to cause the forfeiture of property (in course of transportation from one state to another) of those constituting the so-called beef trust."

Statue of Ingalls.

The house today adopted the resolution offered by Representative Curtis (Kansas), providing that exercises appropriate to the reception and acceptance from the State of Kansas of the statue of the late John J. Ingalls, erected in Statuary Hall, of the Capitol, be made the special order for Saturday, January 21, 1905, at three o'clock in the afternoon.

The house then went into a committee of the whole for the consideration of claim bills on the private calendar.

Working Against Bill.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 16.—The Hamilton Joint Statehood Bill, which was reported favorably yesterday, by the United States Senate, with some amendments, will be pushed to passage by the joint statehood advocates in that body. Eastern influences are

very strong and it is believed the bill stands excellent chances for passage in the Senate, although some of the proposed amendments will encounter strong opposition and a bitter fight.

Governor Otero of New Mexico, and Governor Brodie of Arizona, Delegates W. H. Andrews of New Mexico and Delegate Wilson of Arizona are here and are doing substantial and strenuous work against the passage of the bill. Several Republican senators have announced their intention of voting against it, among them Senator Bard of California.

Utah Wants Arizona Land.

Senator Kearns has introduced a bill providing for the annexation by Utah of all that portion of Arizona lying north of the Colorado River.

The portion of Arizona affected is about 800 square miles in area. It is north of the Grand Canon and on that account inaccessible to authorities of Arizona.

It is said it now forms a haven for criminals and the purpose of the measure is to give Utah criminal jurisdiction over the tract.

Timber and Stone Act Not to Be Repealed.

The house committee on public lands has decided by a vote of 10 to 4, to postpone indefinitely consideration of a bill to repeal the timber and stone act. The members of the committee voting against postponement were Chairman Lacey, Needham, California; Miller, Kansas; Volstead, Minnesota. The bill in question passed the senate at the last session and is was thought that it would pass the house without opposition.

During the time it was pending in the house the disclosure was made that George H. Maxwell, an apostle of the land law repeal, was at the head of a railway lobby and was receiving \$30,000 yearly to advocate the repeal of the land laws. This discredited all efforts at land law repeal and undoubtedly caused the radical change in sentiment evident regarding the timber and stone act repeal bill.

Mineral on Land Grants.

Washington, Dec. 16.—The bill introduced by Delegate Rodey during the first session of the Fifty-eighth Congress allowing prospecting by miners and prospectors and to locate mineral claims on private land grants under regulations to be established by the Department of the Interior has passed the House and has been sent to the Senate. There is, however, but little

chance that it will be reached during the short session of that body.

Elephant Butte Dam Case.

The attorney general's office has decided to allow an appeal to the supreme court of the United States in the case of the Rio Grande Dam and Irrigation Company, of which Dr. Nathan C. Boyd is president and which involves the right of the company to construct a dam and reservoir system at the Elephant Butte in the Rio Grande Valley, and which has been pending in the courts of New Mexico for several years. This appeal will not interfere with the work of the reclamation service on the Elephant Butte dam site.

W. B. Childers, present United States attorney for New Mexico, will remain in office until this appeal case is heard by the United States supreme court, otherwise he would go out of office March 14th next.

BRIGAND CHIEF RAIDS CARAVAN

Hold-Up Occurred in the Town of Tangier—
Took Several Prisoners, But Later
Released Them.

Tangier, Dec. 16.—Raisuli, the notorious brigand chief, who captured Perdicaris, an American citizen, and his stepson, Varley, a British subject, last May, boldly raided a caravan within the town of Tangier today. Chief Raisuli had previously raided a caravan five miles outside of the town and taken eleven prisoners and a number of mules. He then came to Tangier and repeated the exploit. In the latter case he released the prisoners as the men he was seeking were not among them.

GIRLS JUMP TO THEIR DEATH

Explosion in Factory Caused Occupants to
Leap From Second and Third Story
Windows.

Portsmouth, Ohio, 16.—One girl killed, two fatally injured and a score of others were hurt by jumping from second and third story windows during an explosion, which wrecked the Lloyd Adams & Simpsons toy pistol factory here today.

COPPER KINGS GET TOGETHER

Thomas Lawson and Colonel W.
C. Greene Try to Settle
Their Difficulties.

IN PRIVATE CONFERENCE

No One Allowed in Room While New
Yorker and Author of Frenzied
Finance Confer.

Boston, Mass., Dec. 16.—Thomas W. Lawson, whose active campaign in the advertising columns of newspapers against the buying of Amalgamated Copper shares has attracted much attention, called at the Hotel Touraine here this morning to meet Colonel William C. Greene, of New York. Colonel Greene was at breakfast and the conference was delayed until after he had finished.

Colonel Greene, who is the leading promoter of the Greene Consolidated Copper Company, the stock of which declined heavily during the recent raid, came to this city to reach an understanding with Lawson, who was charged by Colonel Greene with attacking him unjustly. Lengthy statements appeared in the daily papers in Boston, New York and elsewhere early in the week, signed by Lawson and Greene, in which attacks were made upon each other. The New Yorker then announced he would come to Boston and demand satisfaction, but his visit was deferred until today.

Colonel Greene came from the dining room at 9:45 o'clock and walked up the corridor with a friend on either side. When the New Yorker appeared, Lawson advanced down the corridor to meet him. The meeting between the two men was like that of friends. They immediately retired to the room of Greene and shortly after newspaper men sent up a note and requested that one of their number be allowed to be present. Lawson sent back an answer saying that he was willing, but that Greene objected.

Police Guard Hotel.

While the conference was still in session, Chief Inspector Watts of the Boston police force and Inspector Houghton entered the hotel and looked over the register. When approached by newspaper men they said that they heard Greene and Lawson were conferring and had come to see that no cranks created a disturbance. They remained at the hotel for some time.

Shortly after noon, Police Captain Cain, in charge of the division in which the hotel is located, arrived. He said that he "looked in" partly out of curiosity. He also talked to other officers who were in the hotel for some time. At noon a small crowd assembled in the hotel lobby but there was no excitement of any kind.

Three in Later Conference.

Charles Hayden, a member of a firm of Boston brokers, who transacted business for Colonel Greene, arrived at the hotel and was admitted to the Colonel's room. Shortly after luncheon was served in the room.

Conference Still in Progress.

The conference was still in progress at 2:15 o'clock this afternoon. Police Chief Watts and his assistants remain in the corridors. It is unusual for Watts to remain away from his office so long, but he decided not to return to headquarters until later in the day.

KILLING AT CENTRAL CITY

One Man Dead, Another Severely
Wounded—Men Who Did Shoot-
ing Claim Self Defense.

A miner by the name of Queen, employed by the Burro Mountain Copper Company, was shot and instantly killed at Central City, nine miles east of Silver City, Monday night. D. M. Turner, a deputy sheriff, of Grant County, who was with him, was wounded, but not seriously.

Both men left Silver City late Monday night after drinking heavily and announced their intention of settling some difficulty with James Wiley, a saloonkeeper at Central City. Wiley was notified of the fact and closed the saloon. With Al Freeman, a son of ex-Judge Freeman, he armed himself and both waited for Turner and Queen in a doorway.

At their approach both Wiley and Freeman commenced firing. Queen went down with a shot in the stomach from a shotgun and two rifle balls. His death was instantaneous. Turner was shot through the thigh with a rifle bullet. It is said that neither the dead nor the wounded man was armed. Freeman and Wiley immediately gave themselves up to the sheriff. They will claim self-defense.

THE PEOPLE OF NEW MEXICO AND ARIZONA HAVE THE LAST WORD.

The St. Louis Globe Democrat is generally well posted on affairs in the Southwest, and has proven a good friend of this section many a time. On the joint statehood question for New Mexico and Arizona, the paper is, however, decidedly "off." The conditions existing in Oklahoma and the Indian Territory in no manner apply to New Mexico and Arizona, and the Globe Democrat makes a mistake, and a serious one at that, in bunching them together. The conditions that exist in Oklahoma and the Indian Territory on one side and in New Mexico and Arizona on the other are so radically different and so much apart that they really cannot and ought not be mentioned in the same breath and in the same article. That paper is of the opinion that it is the intention of the Republican leaders in the present Congress to pass a joint statehood bill for the state of Oklahoma to consist of Oklahoma and the Indian Territory and for the state of Arizona to consist of New Mexico and Arizona at the present session, and that this will be done. In this respect the paper says:

"The single statehood lobbyists for Oklahoma and the Indian Territory who have just gone to Washington place great reliance on the Democrats in Congress for aid. Just why the Democrats should aid them in this movement, unless they looked for party advantage by that policy, is not clear. In fact, this is the very reason why the Democrats all along have been in favor of letting in all four of the territories separately. They think that in that way they can get at least six senators, and have a chance to get eight. Under this state of things the workers for single statehood for Oklahoma and its neighbor on the east look for a great deal of help from Gorman, Tillman and the rest of the Democratic senators."

"But this sort of an argument works two ways. The consideration of partisan advantages which would induce the Democrats to vote for separate statehood for all the territories is calculated to make the Republicans work against it, and the Republicans are the majority party in Congress. So far as we are aware, the Republicans have not been swayed much by this dread of an increased Democratic vote through the admission of the territories as single states. The chief reason why the Republicans opposed separate admission is that the population and prospects of Arizona and New Mexico are against that idea, while the area of Oklahoma and the Indian Territory is not great enough to warrant their erection into two states."

"The single statehood boomers are wasting their time. The bill as it passed the House provided for the consolidation of the four territories into two states. It will pass in that form in the Senate, if it passes at all, and the chances are that it will pass. Unquestionably, a large majority of the people of Oklahoma and the Indian Territory want union, although the politicians, in order to make the offices more numerous, are working for separate statehood. The favor of the Democrats for separate statehood is not likely to make any votes for it among Republicans. It will be joint statehood or nothing this winter."

In view of the fact that the Senate Committee on Territories has just authorized a favorable report on the pending Hamilton joint statehood bill, the chances are that the St. Louis paper is correct, and that it is probable that this joint statehood measure, no matter how unpalatable to and disliked by the people of New Mexico and Arizona, will pass, but neither that paper nor any senator should take it for granted that the passage of the Hamilton joint statehood bill will induce the people of the two territories named to vote for a constitution under it. In the light of recent events and existing circumstances, such a supposition would be more than far-fetched. All indications point that a constitution under the bill, if submitted during the coming year, will be defeated by the people of New Mexico and Arizona. The New Mexican does not know what changes, if any, there were made in the bill at yesterday's session of the committee on territories, but this paper does not believe that any possible changes in it would induce the people of these two territories to look favorably upon its provisions.

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APPROVES THE CHAVES APPOINTMENT.

The Outlook, a bright weekly newspaper published at White Oaks, Lincoln County, seems well satisfied with the appointment by Governor Otero of Amado Chaves as superintendent of public instruction and comments thereon:

"The new appointee will come to the office with a wide knowledge of the public school system of the Territory and the important duties of the position. He was the first superintendent after the new law was put in force and held the office for the first six years thereafter. Under his able management the public schools were reorganized and they have been growing in their scope and efficiency ever since. He is a superior English, as well as Spanish scholar, and one of the best translators from one to the other in the Territory."

ANDREWS IS ALRIGHT.

"Congress is now in session and what 'Bull' Andrews does not get for his New Mexico constituency will be something enormous."—Portles Herald.

Mr. Andrews is not yet the delegate from New Mexico and he will not be until March 4th, 1905. In the meantime, he has done more good for New Mexico during the past five years in bringing much capital here for investment and in building the Santa Fe Central Railway from Santa Fe to Torrance, 116 miles long. The Albuquerque Eastern Railroad, of which he is president, is now in course of construction. That is more than enough for any one man at any one time. At any rate, he has done more in the past four or five years for the advancement and progress of this Territory than has the entire Democratic party, including all its bosses and newspapers, during the past fifty years. It is therefore no wonder that the people of New Mexico by a very considerable majority elected Mr. Andrews to be their delegate to the next Congress. That he will do yeoman service in that position and will attain some tangible results for the Territory may well be believed, judging from what he has achieved for the people of New Mexico since he became one of them.

A recent dispatch from Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, states that the American Sheet and Tin Plate Company has started thirty-seven tin plate mills. Of the 242 mills, all but seven are now running, and it is expected these will be going before the end of next week. For the first time in the history of the company or its predecessor, the American Tin Plate Company, every mill owned will be in full operation. Dispatches of this kind prove conclusively that the business conditions of the country have fully re-adjusted themselves and that times are prosperous and will continue to be so. This condition was bound to come about as soon as it became known that there would be no tinkering with the tariff during the year 1905.

Santa Fe must not allow the chance to secure the location of the sanatorium of the fraternal societies of the United States for their members who are suffering from lung and bronchial troubles to escape. This is an ideal spot for such a sanatorium, and no better could be chosen anywhere in this country. The New Mexican believes that with proper work and timely efforts the selection of Santa Fe for the project can be secured. The City Council, the Board of Trade and leading citizens should combine and act unitedly in the matter.

"How the New Mexican and the Otero followers will fight the joint statehood proposition. But it will avail little. When offered statehood New Mexico will accept."—Roswell Record.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS

Of the Board of County Commissioners of Santa Fe County.

Special Meeting.

Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 21st, 1904.

The honorable Board of County Commissioners met in special session at 3 o'clock p. m. Present: The Hon. A. L. Kendall, Chairman; the Hons. Arthur Seligman and Nicolas Quintana, Commissioners; and Federico Lopez, Deputy Clerk.

The following persons were allowed the \$200.00 exemption for the year 1904, to-wit:

K. Melvire, F. Garcia, C. Gann, S. Rivera, F. P. Crichton, B. Gonzales, A. L. Leeson, J. C. Garcia, V. Duran, N. Gonzales y R. M. Baca, L. Silva, C. Martinez, F. R. de Wright, T. Alarid, J. Pannila, J. Romero y V., D. Rodriguez, D. Ortega and J. A. Catanach.

Capital Coal Yard Company's assessment was finally fixed at \$1,370.00.

Beatriz Vigil was reduced on sheep from \$750.00 to \$500.00 and exemption allowed.

The following resolutions, introduced by Commissioner Seligman, were unanimously adopted:

Be it resolved by the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Santa Fe,

Whereas, This Board at its session as a Board of Equalization and Taxation, held on the ninth day of July, 1904, made a levy of 11 (eleven) mills upon the dollar of taxable property, as shown by the assessment rolls of this county for the interest on "Refunding Bonds of 1904,"

And, Whereas, The bondholders and owners of judgments and delinquent coupons of the County of Santa Fe, have not yet complied with the understanding which this board has arranged with them through its representative, and sent for that purpose to the City of New York, and

Whereas, The "Refunding Bonds of 1904" have not yet been issued and exchanged between the County of Santa Fe and the bondholders and owners of judgments and delinquent coupons of the county in lieu and for the several issues of outstanding bonds of the county issued to and prior to the year 1904, and

Whereas, There seems to be no likelihood that such exchange and refunding will take place during the remainder of this year, the time being too short and no information of a definite nature in regard to this refunding and exchange of the county's bonded and judgment debt having been received from the owners and holders thereof, and

Whereas, This board is of the opinion that it is impracticable to do so and to accomplish this exchange before the first day of January, 1905, and

Whereas, This board is of the opinion that it would be detrimental to the best interests of the county and of the taxpayers and property owners thereof to insist upon the collection of the 11 (eleven) mills tax levy for the reasons above given;

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the levy of 11 (eleven) mills on the dollar of taxable property in the county of Santa Fe made at the time above stated and for the purpose of paying the interest coupons of the "Refunding Bonds of 1904" be and the same is hereby repealed, cancelled and declared null and void and the treasurer and ex-officio collector of the county and the probate clerk and ex-officio recorder are hereby and herewith ordered and directed to make notations in accordance with these resolutions upon the tax rolls of the county for the year 1904, and treat the said levy as above, as null and void and as of no effect; the treasurer and ex-officio collector is directed not to demand from the taxpayers and property owners the said taxes above described and taxpayers and property owners are hereby cautioned not to pay the extra levy as above for the current year to the treasurer and ex-officio collector of the County of Santa Fe, even should such official demand the same from them and call upon them for payment thereof;

That in order to meet the payment of interest coupons on the present outstanding bonds of this county, a levy of two mills upon the dollar for the payment of coupons upon now outstanding bonds dated 1882, '84, '85, '90, '91, '92, '97, is hereby levied and made by this board and the treasurer and ex-officio collector and the probate clerk and ex-officio recorder are hereby and herewith instructed to place such levy upon the tax rolls of the county against the name of each individual property owner and taxpayer and piece of property as required by law, and to collect the same in due course of time as prescribed by law, placing the proceeds thereof in the fund for the payment of interest coupons of the bonds of the County of Santa Fe;

Be it further resolved, that the probate clerk and ex-officio recorder of this county be and he is hereby instructed and directed to send due notice and copies of these resolutions rescinding, cancelling and declaring null and void the 11 (eleven) mills levy on the dollar for the payment of the coupons of the "Refunding Bonds of 1904," and making a new levy of two mills on the dollar for the payment of interest coupons of the present outstanding bonds of the County of Santa Fe to all taxpayers and property owners as shown on the tax rolls of 1904, by mail, and that without delay, the county bearing the expense for postage and printing; and that he send

NEW ANNEX TO INSANE ASYLUM

At Las Vegas Ready for Occupancy January 1st—Cost \$32,000—Sewer System Extended.

The contractors of the new annex to the Territorial Insane Asylum at Las Vegas expect to turn over the new structure to the directors by the first of the year. Annex No. 2 is two stories in height and connected with a wide corridor on both floors with the main building and extends 180 feet through both stories. The corridors are 14 feet wide, and on both sides are well ventilated sleeping rooms for patients, 26 on each floor. There are two large rooms, with many windows facing the south and a large two story porch, also on the sunny side, is a pleasing feature of the new edifice. The first floor will be used for the male patients and the upper for females. The building is to be heated by steam. Holt & Holt were the architects of the building, and the Morrison Contracting Company had the contract for the work. W. W. Wallace furnished the stone and did the cutting. All of the carpenter work will be completed this week.

The new sewer system for the hospital, a much needed improvement, will be completed about the same time as the annex. An 18 inch pipe is used in the sewer, and it will be arranged so that ready connections can be made with any new annex to the hospital. The sewer plant will cost when completed \$2,600 and the cost of the annex will be \$32,000.

The work of the asylum officials will be made much easier by these improvements and more efficient, as heretofore they have experienced considerable difficulty in securing accommodations for all the patients sent to the institution. Dr. W. R. Tipton, the medical superintendent, is well pleased with the increase in accommodations, which will give him far better opportunities for treating and housing the unfortunates who are sent to the asylum from all parts of the Territory.

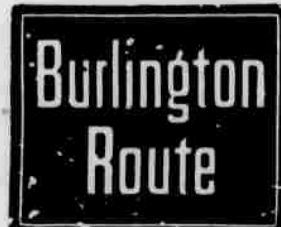

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE EL PASO & DURANGO RAILROAD COMPANY.

We, the undersigned, citizens of the United States of America, and subscribers to the capital stock of The El Paso & Durango Railroad Company, being desirous to form a railroad corporation under and in pursuance to the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, and having associated ourselves together for that purpose, have prepared and hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation:

ARTICLE I.

The name of said corporation shall be The El Paso & Durango Railroad Company.

ARTICLE II.

The purpose for which said corporation is formed is to construct, maintain, build, equip and operate a railroad with suitable telegraph lines, for the transportation and carriage of passengers and freight by force of steam, electricity or other mechanical power, or any combination thereof, between the termini of said railroad as hereinafter set forth and upon the branch or branches thereof.

Also to purchase or otherwise acquire all such property, real and personal, as may be necessary for its said road and the operation of said railroad and the telegraph line to be used in connection therewith, and for stations, depots, water lines, pipe lines, reservoirs, flumes, side tracks, yards, work shops, ware-houses, and all other properties incident to and necessary for the transaction of its corporate business; and generally to obtain, use, exercise and enjoy all the power, rights, privileges and immunities which now are, or hereafter may be granted to railroad corporations by the laws of the said Territory of New Mexico, and by the acts of the Congress of the United States in such cases made and provided.

ARTICLE III.

The place where the principal business of the corporation is to be transacted is at the city of Santa Fe, in the County of Santa Fe, in the Territory of New Mexico.

ARTICLE IV.

The term for which the said corporation is to exist shall be fifty (50) years from the date of the filing of these articles of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of the said Territory of New Mexico.

MADE GOOD HIS "BLUFF."

British Admiral's Successful Idea of Fooling Enemy.

In 1797, the Dutch, who were in alliance with the French, had equipped their fleet at the Texel, and had made precautions to embark in it their whole army for an attack upon Ireland, says Pearson's Weekly. It was imperative that they should be watched in force and prevented from joining the French fleet then in Brest, and this task fell to Duncan's lot.

Just as he was on the point of sailing from Yarmouth with the North Sea fleet to blockade the Texel the famous mutiny at the Nore broke out, and eleven of his line of battleships turned back and joined the ringleader Parker at the mouth of the Thames. In spite of this desertion the gallant admiral went on to his destination with his own ship, the Venerable (seventy-four guns), the Adamant (fifty guns), and the Active, a cutter.

He then proceeded to bluff the Dutch. By keeping up a regular succession of signals to the Adamant in the offing, as though sending orders to a fleet outside, he actually induced the enemy to believe that he lay off the coast in force. In fact, the Dutch never discovered that there were only two ships and a cutter watching them until the mutiny was over and Duncan's other ships had rejoined them. Later on in the same year the great victory of Camperdown came to crown his triumph.

Rouge Used by Royalty.

An entire sort of rumor is afloat that Consuelo, duchess of Marlborough, paints. Not with a common dab of rouge, of course, but with a most delicate shade of violet, the secret of which the duchess obtained from Mrs. Carnwallis West, the famous beauty, who in turn had it from a very exalted personage indeed—no less than her most gracious majesty, Queen Alexandra of England. This report comes by way of Washington, where some of the more passe belles are hoping that the new beautifier may ere long find its way across the Atlantic and come within the reach of women not as yet blessed with tilled husbands.

Use of Roentgen Rays.

As a rule, animals inoculated with bacteria and exposed to the X-rays die sooner than similarly inoculated animals which are not thus exposed. It is not to be denied that in the human subject certain infectious diseases, particularly those of the skin, may be successfully treated by the Roentgen rays, but it does not seem probable at the present time that such success is due to bactericidal action.

**NEW MEXICO
SHEEP ARE
IN DEMAND**

Over 300,000 of Them Shipped to Northern Colorado for Feeding—Buyers after More.

Correspondents of the New Mexican report that the ranges in western Leonard Wood County and in the Estancia Valley are in very good shape and that there is plenty of water in the lakes and water holes in those sections. The snow along the line of the El Paso & Northeastern Railway in Leonard Wood County has disappeared, but in the Estancia Valley, from Progresso to the Ortiz Mountains, there is a solid blanket of it and in places it is from six to ten inches deep.

This will insure good grass during the coming spring.

Lambs there have been pretty well sold out and at satisfactory prices to the sheep growers. They were mostly shipped to feeders in northern Colorado and many of them were sent to Fort Collins. It is estimated that not less than 500,000 sheep are being fed for the market in the agricultural sections of northern Colorado, and that over 300,000 of these came from New Mexico.

There are several Colorado buyers now in the Territory looking for more lambs to purchase. Sheep growers are holding back on account of the recent rise in the price of wool, and it is believed that about all of the New Mexico lambs have been disposed of for the winter.

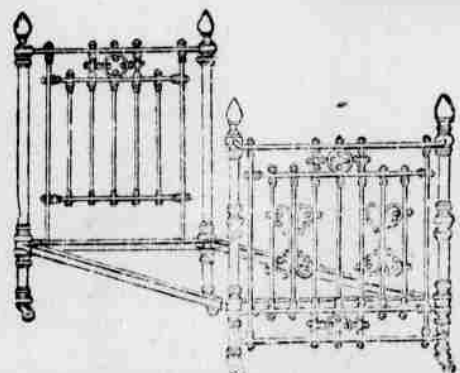

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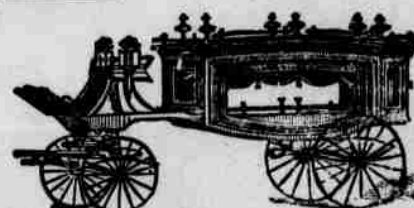
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
