A SOLEMN PAGEANT.

Remains of the Empress of Austria Laid to Rest.

American Peace Commissioners Have Sailed for Paris.

Gen. Schofield Refuse to Serve on Investigation Commission.

DR. JOHN HALL DEAD.

Vienna, Sept. 17.—Emperor Francis Joseph this morning received special representatives of foreign sovereigns and visiting sovereigns. The inhabitants of Italy are streaming in a dense crowd to the chapel of St. Stephen and kneeling before the casket containing the remains of the late empress.

Emperor Francis Joseph received Emperor William at the railroad station. The emperors shook hands and kissed each other's cheeks three times. They then proceeded to church where Emperor William, in behalf of himself and the Empress of Germany, deposited on the casket containing the remains of the late Empress of Austria, a floral wreath which his majesty brought from Germany. At four o'clock the tolling of bells announced the starting of the procession to the church of St. Stephen. The clergy marched down the aisle before the coffin, united in intoning prayers which were also exquisitely chanted during the service by the choir. During the last prayer, the coffin was lifted from the catafalque and the clergy, bearing torches, walked before it. Emperor Francis Joseph, attended by a priest bearing candles, followed. The procession slowly passed from the sight of the congregation down the stairs to the vault. After the last benediction had been pronounced in the vault, the mourners re-ascended and the high churchman handed the key to the vault to the captain, who is guardian of the imperial museum.

Importing Funeral Mass.
Washington, Sept. 17.—An imposing funeral mass, commemorative of the Empress Elizabeth, of Austria, was celebrated at St. Michael's Catholic church today, Cardinal Gibbons being the celebrant. The ceremony was under the auspices of the Austrian minister. Among those in attendance were President McKinley and the members of his cabinet.

New York, Sept. 17.—Weekly bank statement: Surplus reserve, decreased, \$2,530,875; loans decreased, \$2,130,500; specie decreased, \$666,700; legal tender increased, \$1,071,700; deposits decreased, \$9,837,500; circulation increased, \$40,900. Banks hold \$4,240,000. In excess require 25 per cent rule.

PEACE COMMISSION.

Judge Day Thinks a Treaty of Peace Will Be Promptly Arranged.

New York, Sept. 17.—The United States commissioners to conclude terms of peace with Spain sailed today on the Cunard line steamer Campania, en route for Paris. Prior to going on board the steamer Judge Day said: "We understand the wishes of the cabinet with reference to the terms of the treaty, and I believe there will be practically no change after our conference with the Spanish commissioners. I think the American terms will be regarded as reasonable, and, therefore, I believe the work of the commissioners will not be impeded by useless discussion."

Schofield Refuses to Serve.

Washington, Sept. 17.—After half an hour's conference with the president today, Gen. Schofield announced that he would not serve as a member of the commission to investigate the conduct of the war.

Death of Dr. John Hall.

Belfast, Ireland, Sept. 17.—Rev. Dr. John Hall, of New York, died this morning as he came down. Dr. Hall was on his annual visit. He died at his sister's residence. His health had been declining for more than a year. Dr. John Hall was born in the county Antrim, Ireland, in 1823 and is of Scotch descent. In 1867 he was a delegate from the general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the United States. After his return to Ireland he received a call to the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church of New York. He accepted. A new church was erected for Dr. Hall in 1875 at the cost of \$100,000. He was elected chancellor of the university of the city of New York in 1882.

Howell Will Serve.

Washington, Sept. 17.—Ryan P. Howell, of Atlanta, Georgia, who was asked by the president to serve on the commission to investigate certain departments of the army in connection with the war, formally accepted the appointment today.

First Spanish Ship.

New York, Sept. 17.—The Spanish steamer Gran Anita, which arrived this morning from Havana, is the first Spanish ship to arrive since the declaration of war, April 21.

Camp Wikoff, L. I., Sept. 17.—The transports Chester, Berlin and Romania left here for New York with regulars on the way to the north and west.

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SOCORRO SHOCKED!

The Earth Trembled Beneath the Town of Socorro.

Men Grew Dizzy and Ladies Were Ill for a Time.

MARK SMITH WITHDRAWS FROM CONTEST.

Socorro, N. M., Sept. 17.—A very distinct earthquake shock was felt at 10:30 last night by every resident in Socorro. Strong buildings shook and people that had retired sprang to their feet, alarmed at the unusual disturbance. The Windmill hotel, a substantial structure, rocked for a moment as if it was in a terrific wind storm, causing some of the guests to grow dizzy, and ladies were reporting that it made them ill for a time. The shock was perceptibly felt by people residing ten miles north of here, while San Marcial has asked to-day if Socorro felt the strange movement. Socorro experienced a similar sensation in 1885. A few of the buildings here are still showing the effects, by cracked walls, of the rude jar at that time. People who have resided in countries where shocks of the kind are frequent pronounced the one here last night as being quite severe.
