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TO REINFORCE DEWEY.

Battleships Iowa and Oregon
Ordered to Manila.Secretary Long Issues Orders Dis-
banding Eastern Squadron.New Battleships to be Christened Maine,
Ohio and Missouri.

BLANCO'S FERVENT TALK.

Washington, Sept. 15.—Secretary of the Navy Long stated last night that the battleships Iowa and Oregon are under orders to proceed to Manila, via Honolulu, to reinforce Rear Admiral Dewey's command.

The authorities say there is nothing in General's attitude to cause the belief that she proposes to interfere with any disposition of the Philippines which this government may see fit to make. It is appreciated, however, that it would be the part of wisdom for the United States to put in the Pacific a force so formidable as to discourage even the suggestion of interference.

Secretary Long has directed that the battleship, to be built by the Union Iron Works at San Francisco, shall be named the Ohio. Cramps will build the Maine, and the Newport News Company the Missouri.

GEN. BLANCO'S SPEECH.

Think He Sees the Beginning of the
Day of the American Nation.

New York, Sept. 15.—A dispatch to the Herald from Havana says: Capt. Gen. Blanco said: "I confess to feeling a deep resentment against the United States, who conduct in declaring war against us without a motive or pretext, just at the time when they are receiving from us the highest marks of our friendship and respect, can never be contented to see us. My government signed the peace of Madrid and has done so with a heavy heart. Nevertheless, I have eternal confidence in divine justice and therefore hope that this arrogant nation will receive its just deserts and God know when this act of national despotism is accomplished and the stars and stripes float from the walls of Havana; that day may mark the beginning of the day of the American Nation. I wish to put myself on record as having no dislike for the army of the United States. On the contrary I have the highest appreciation of their noble and courageous behavior."

EASTERN SQUADRON DISBANDED.

Wagon Assigned to Mare Island Navy
Yard—Colonel Colon Alvarado.

New York, Sept. 15.—A dispatch to the Herald from Washington says: Secretary Long has issued orders disbanded the eastern squadron and assigning its commander, Commodore J. C. Watson, to duty as the commander at the Mare Island navy yard.

These orders indicate the firmness of the belief entertained by the administration that there is no danger of resumption of hostilities. For the present the department proposes to retain the men of war, in the southern Cuban waters, to that section. Captain C. F. Goodrich, as senior officer, will have command. Captain Goodrich commands the cruiser Newark.

With the detachment of Commodore Watson from the eastern squadron all work in connection with raising the Spanish cruiser Cristobal Colon will cease. Lieut. George P. Blow, who had separate charge of the wreckage operations under Watson, reported it impossible to save that vessel.

Rejection in Japan.
Washington, Sept. 15.—The state department advises that the general election in Japan for members of the lower house of the Diet, the returns of which have just been made, resulted in an overwhelming majority for the constitutional party, at the combination, led by Count Okuma and Itami, is called.

General Miles Sick.
Washington, Sept. 15.—General Miles is confined to bed with a touch of malarial fever, resulting from work and exposure in his recent campaigns. The attack causes no apprehension to the general or his friends.

Special Cabinet Meeting.
Washington, Sept. 15.—The president has called a special meeting of the cabinet to be held this afternoon for the discussion of instructions to the Paris peace commission.

Dr. Samuel Eliot Dead.
Beverly, Mass., Sept. 15.—Dr. Samuel Eliot, former president of Trinity college, Hartford, Conn., is dead, aged 78. In Eliot was a notable contributor to literature. He was the grandson of Samuel Eliot, who founded the Eliot professorship at Harvard university, and a cousin of President Eliot.

SOUTH AMERICAN WAR.

Dispute Between Chili and Ar-
gentina Threatening.France on the Brink of the Gravest
Crisis in Recent Years.France Aims to Destroy Cabinet and
Establish a Dictatorship.

AFFAIRS IN HAVANA.

New York, Sept. 15.—A dispatch to the Herald from Valparaiso says: The boundary dispute between Chili and Argentina seems likely to develop into a great South American conflagration. It is believed, as a foundation, that Bolivia has signed a secret treaty with Argentina to make a common cause against Chili in case of war, however, Peru, I am informed, would checkmate Bolivia, leaving Argentina to care for Chili. This attitude of Peru is said to be due to the fact that Chile would cut off ten million dollars from the ransom for the provinces returned by the protocol. Chili is now completing naval and military preparations for a hostile climax to the negotiations with Argentina.

ON THE BRINK OF A CRISIS.
France Accused of Aiming at Dictatorship
in France.

New York, Sept. 15.—A dispatch to the World from Paris says: France is on the brink of the gravest crisis since the birth of the third republic. Premier Brisson and all other members of the cabinet, except Seignurien, the minister of war, and possibly Lockroy, are convinced of the absolute necessity of a revision of the Dreyfus case. At Saturday's meeting of the cabinet a revision will be decided.

President Faure has been a determined opponent of revision and must if it is to be granted. No one believes that he will resign, but every one sees a threat to do so as a desperate expedient to get rid of one blow of Brisson's cabinet and of the revision of the Dreyfus case.

FAURE IN MANILA.
Insurgents Are Respecting the Demands
of the United States.

Washington, Sept. 15.—General Otis to-day called the war department as follows: "The situation in Manila is much more satisfactory. The demands for the withdrawal of insurgent forces complied with. All have withdrawn or are withdrawing to-day except small forces in the outlying districts, which are not obeying the insurgent leader. Aguinaldo request a force of 500 men to withdraw from them by detachments and punish their commanding officers. Over 2,000 have already withdrawn. No concessions were granted the insurgents but strict compliance with the demands of the 8th instant. General good feeling is prevailing. Manila is quiet and business is progressing favorably. No difficulty is anticipated. Have been compelled to confine the Spanish prisoners temporarily within the walls of the city."

The Peace Commission.
Washington, Sept. 15.—All members of the peace commission, except Senator Olney, had an extended conference with the president to-day. It is understood that Gray arrives this afternoon.
