The daily fruit shipments from Santa Fe continue to be large in response to an active demand from the outside.

Margarita Rivera, widow of Jose Gregorio Rivera, of this city, has been granted a widow's pension of \$5 per month.

Hon. W. H. Ballache, formerly employed of public moneys at Santa Fe, is now employed by the government in California as Chinese inspector.

S. M. Folsom, formerly engaged in the banking business at Albuquerque and now operating in Arizona real estate, reached the Claire hotel from the south Friday evening.

A suit has been filed in the district court for Taos county, by the Territory of New Mexico against the Denver & Rio Grande railroad company to recover the sum of \$4,614.76 delinquent taxes. C. A. Splies for the plaintiff.

The downpour Friday afternoon was one of the heaviest in the modern history of Santa Fe. For the first time in five years the volume of water was sufficient to flow over the top of the College street bridge. The storm appears to have been essentially local.
