BLOODY BATTLE DOWN IN CUBA!



One Killed and Eight Wounded from This City.

THE ROUGH RIDERS GAIN A VICTORY.

Off Juarez, Friday Morning, June 24.—Four troops of the First cavalry, four troops of the Tenth cavalry and eight troops of Roosevelt's Rough Riders, less than 1,000 men in all, attacked 2,000 Spanish soldiers in the thickets within five miles of Santiago. The Americans beat the enemy back into the city, but left the following dead upon the field: Rough Riders—Capt. Allen K. Capron, Sergt. Hamilton Fish, Jr., Privates Thilman and Dawson, Troop L, Private Dougherty, troop A; Private W. T. Kewin, troop F.

First cavalry—Privates Dix, York, Hopt, Kolbe, Berlin, Lemmon.

Tenth cavalry—Corporal White.

At least fifty Americans are wounded, including six officers. Twelve dead Spaniards were found after the fight but their loss was doubtless in excess of that.

General Young commanded the expedition. Col. Wood directed the operations of the Rough Riders, several miles from the fight. The fight lasted an hour and the Spaniards were scattered.

Officers of the Rough Riders wounded—Major Brodie, shot through the right forearm; Captain McClintock, troop B, shot through the right leg; Lieut. J. H. Thomas, troop L, shot through the right leg. His condition is serious.

Other officers wounded—Captain Knox, condition serious; Major Bell and Lieut. Byram. These are of the First cavalry.

List of wounded soldiers, some of whom will probably die. The following are among the soldiers wounded: Rough Riders: Troop B—Privates K. M. Hill, Shelly Fisher, M. S. Newcomb, Fred N. Heale, Corporal Rhodes.

Troop F—Corporal James F. Bean, Privates Frank Booth, Albert C. Hartley, R. G. Bailey, H. E. Albers, R. J. Atterton, Clifford Reed and Sergeant G. W. Armijo.

Troop G—Sergeant Thomas F. Cavannaugh, Corporal L. L. Stewart, Privates George Howland, H. J. Haefner, Michael Coyne, R. M. Reid and M. Russell.

Troop L—Privates J. H. Keen, John P. Derruss, Thomas F. Meagher, Edward Calmes and Nathaniel Poe.

Edward Marshall, correspondent of the New York Journal, was seriously wounded in the small of his back. At least ten of the wounded will die.

TEN KILLED.

Washington, June 25.—A dispatch from Shafter received at noon to-day places the American loss at ten killed and forty wounded, and says our troops occupy the enemy's position, one and one-half miles from Sevilla.

SHAFER'S DISPATCH.

Washington, June 25.—The first dispatch from General Shafter, concerning the engagement between the Spaniards and the American forces, reached the war department at noon to-day as follows:

Playa del Este, June 25.—Adjutant General United States Army, Washington, Balquiere, June 24.—Further news from General Wheeler places our loss in this morning's fighting at about ten killed and thirty wounded. Captain Capron, of the First United States volunteer cavalry, was killed.

Wounded—Major Brodie, Capt. McClintock and Lieut. Thomas, First United States volunteer cavalry; Major Bell, Capt. Knox and Lieut. Byram, First United States cavalry; Capt. Knox seriously wounded. Capt. Winwright, formerly reported wounded, is unhurt.

The names of the killed and wounded are not yet known. The Spaniards occupied a very strong and entrenched position on a high hill. The fighting lasted about an hour. The enemy was driven from his position, which is now occupied by our troops, about a mile and a half from Sevilla. The enemy retreated towards Santiago de Cuba.

DEATH COL. J. R. HALLIOWELL.

New York, June 25.—A special to the Tribune from Washington says: General Miles has made all arrangements to leave Washington at once for Tampa to embark there as soon as possible with General Coppinger and the Fourth army corps, about 18,000 men, for Santiago, that point being definitely announced as the chief outlying base of supplies for the combined military and naval operations against the enemy in the West Indies.

Miles expressed the hope that Shafter would have succeeded in taking possession of Santiago before he reaches there; but in case this achievement is delayed, the large army of reinforcements will undoubtedly be able to effect a speedy termination of the siege as well as neutralize the heavy additional force constituting the flower of the Spanish army in Cuba, consisting of 10,000 men under Pando, known as their fighting general, now reported hastening to the scene overland from Holguin, seventy miles in an air line.

Shafter has been directed by cable to get all the supplies out of his transports as quickly as possible and hasten them back to Tampa for Coppinger's troops.

Secretary Long sent orders at same time to Admiral Sampson to furnish an effective convoy of warships for the expedition. It is believed that the big fleet can start on the return voyage not later than Sunday, and reach Tampa as early as Thursday morning.
