## SANTIAGO FORTS AGAIN BOMBARDED!



### Admiral Sampson's Fleet Pulverizes Spanish Fortifications.

#### ANOTHER BLOODY BATTLE AT MANILA.

(Copyright Associated Press.)  
On Board Associated Press Dispatch Boat Danitless, off Santiago de Cuba, Thursday, June 16, 9 p. m.—Rear Admiral Sampson's fleet, after the bombardment of Santiago de Cuba for three days at daylight this morning, for hours the ships pounded the batteries at the right and left of the entrance, only sparing El Morro, where Lieutenant Hobson and his companions of the Merrimack are imprisoned. The western batteries, against which the main assault was directed, were badly wrecked. One was utterly destroyed. In the others many guns were dismounted. At first the Spaniards replied passionately and wildly but impotently. Their most of the guns were deserted. Not a ship was struck, nor a man injured on the American side. It is believed the enemy's loss of life was heavy. As a preliminary to the bombardment the batteries of the Merrimack were fired. The design was to place the bay around the angle, back of the entrance on which El Morro is situated, where it was known the Spanish torpedoes best destroyers are lying. Two of the charges went true as reported were heard, a peculiarity of the explosion of torpedoes in water. Whether the destroyers were demolished is not known, but the destructive area of explosion is large and it would not be surprising if one or both of the torpedoes were destroyed. The third charge exploded with terrific force on Cayo Smith. From where the fleet lay the entrance to the harbor looked, in the black night, like a door opening into the lividness of a Titanic furnace. A crater big enough to hold a church was blown out of the side of Cayo Smith, and was clearly seen from the ships this morning.  
At 5:25 a. m. the New York opened with a tremendous salvo from the entrance to the harbor. All the ships followed in streaks of flames. The fleet, enveloped in smoke, poured the hail and kicked up dirt and masonry. It was a magnificent spectacle from where the Danitless lay. Though the gun captains had been cautioned not to waste ammunition, but to fire with liberation, the fire was so rapid that there was an almost continuous report. The measured crash of the big 13 inch guns of the battleships sounded above the rattling of the guns of the secondary batteries like thunderclaps above the din of a hurricane. A strong land breeze off shore carried the smoke out to sea, seawards, while it let down a thick curtain in front of the Spanish guns.  
The done responded spiritedly at first, but their frenzied half-crazed fire could not match the cool nerve, trained eyes and skilled gunnery of the Americans. In 15 minutes one of the western batteries was completely wrecked. The Massachusetts tore a gaping hole in the emplacement with a 1,000-pound projectile and the Texas dropped a shell into the powder magazine, blowing out the side of the hill. The loss of life must have been great. The batteries on East Morro were hardly hit at all. The New Orleans crossed the bow of the New York to within 1,500 yards off the shore and played into with her long 8-inch rifles, hitting them repeatedly, striking and squaringly, muzzles on, lifting it off its foundations and sending it sweeping some miles in the air. Several times Admiral Sampson signalled the ships to temporarily cease firing in order to allow the smoke to clear from the batteries. When the order came, at 5:30, to cease firing, every gun of the fleet had been opened for ten minutes, but as the ships drew off, some of the Spanish cannon returned and half a dozen shells were fired spitefully at the Massachusetts and Oregon, falling on their wakes.  
**SAMPSON SIGHS THE GUNS.**  
A second attack by the battleship New York.  
(Copyright Associated Press.)  
Off Santiago de Cuba, June 16, noon, per Associated Press dispatch boat Danitless, via Kingston, Jamaica, June 17, 1 a. m.—While Rear Admiral Sampson on the bridge of the flagship New York watched the bombardment of Santiago de Cuba, this morning, he saw two guns of the eastern battery apparently in position. He stopped the New York as she was going back to the blockade line, and personally directed the firing of the 8 inch guns at those marks. In the admiral's general orders for the bombardment, issued last night, occurs the following paragraph:

#### OUTBREAK OF ALBANIAN IN TURKEY.

#### POPULIST COMMITTEE.

#### Mountain Tribe in Turkey Committing Many Murders Excesses.

#### Constantinople, June 17.—The outbreak of the Albanians at Berat, near the frontier of Montenegro, the gravity of which is comparable to the trouble preceding the Servia-Montenegro war against Turkey in 1876, is due to the re-venge taken by the Christians upon Albanian murderers of Christians, notable last autumn. The Albanians in remote districts participated in the recent outrages.

#### In consequence of renewed representations of Montenegro, supported by Russia, the emperor dispatched troops to the disturbed districts from Vukovar. They were fighting all day Thursday and many were killed or wounded on both sides.

#### According to Cettinje advices many women and children fleeing toward Montenegro have been killed by the Albanians.

#### May be Going to Manila.

#### Gibraltar, June 17.—The captain of a German steamer which arrived here this morning, reports having sighted the Spanish Cadiz fleet off Ceuta, off the north coast of Africa, about opposite Gibraltar and about seven miles south of the mouth of the Gibralfaro river. The ships, it is added, were going in an easterly direction.

#### The fleet consisted of two battleships, four large cruisers and four torpedo boat destroyers.

#### DEATH OF THE ACCUSATION.

#### Havana Officially Denies that the Dead were Mutilated in a Recent Battle.

#### Madrid, June 17, 10 a. m.—Advice received from Havana from official sources characterizes the fighting at Guantanamo as "mere skirmishes," with "the net result that the Americans have been able to hold the place where they landed."

#### Continuing the Havana dispatch says: "The suffered greatly, both from the land and sea. The Spaniards are in the possession of several wells, none of which have been injured. Stories that the fortifications at Calimera and Morro have been destroyed are untrue."

#### The following official note has been issued: "The charges of Spanish cruelty to the wounded and mutilation of the dead are entirely unfounded. Twelve merchant vessels are anchored in the harbor, and the lives of the sailors are being caused the liveliest indignation among all classes in Spain, especially among the troops, who are indignant at the calumnies. The Spanish army is conducting itself in this war with the nobility that it has always shown, as is proved by the evidence of American prisoners who were released, and the discipline is so strict that any such conduct would have been relentlessly punished."

#### Resolution Favorably Reported.

#### Washington, June 17.—When the senate convened, Davis, chairman of the committee on foreign relations, favorably reported the resolution adopted by the house for the annexation of the Hawaiian Islands. Davis gave notice that to-morrow he would move consideration of the resolutions.

#### Decisive News.

#### Washington, June 17.—Secretary Long announced at the opening of the cabinet meeting that there will probably be no decisive news from Santiago before Sunday.

#### SPANISH REPORT.

#### (Copyright Associated Press.)

#### Havana, June 17.—The following is the Spanish report of the bombardment of Santiago: On June 16, at 5 a. m., fire was opened on the coast batteries at Santiago by four American battleships, two iron clad cruisers and a protected cruiser, while one yacht opened fire opposite the Aguadulce beach.

#### The Americans fired over one thousand projectiles, temporarily disabled the Honoria cannon at La Zoca, covering them with earth. The parapet was destroyed by shell. One cannon on Morro castle was damaged by the American projectiles. All damages were repaired to-day. The Americans suffered severe damage. Shells from the Spanish batteries were clearly seen to fall on the American ships, which were approximately two miles off.

#### The Spanish losses at Morro were one officer and corporal killed; second lieutenant Juan Arbel, eight soldiers and two sailors wounded.

#### At Zoapa battery, two artillery sailors were killed and Second Lieutenant Riquelme and Brugueta, of the navy, and two soldiers, wounded. General Linares congratulated the behavior of the troops and Captain-General Blanco will reward the several officers and soldiers wounded to-day and in the engagements of June 6.

#### Annexation of Hawaii.

#### Washington, June 17.—The senate committee on foreign relations agreed to report the Newland resolution for the annexation of Hawaii.

THE DR. HARTLEY CASE BEFORE JUSTICE.

In the case of Dr. T. D. Hartley, charged with a violation of a city ordinance in removing a person ill with a contagious disease without notifying the board of health, the defendant was found guilty and fined \$25 and costs. Judge Adams acting as attorney for Dr. Hartley immediately served notice of an appeal. Sumner Burkhart was the prosecuting attorney.

Two hack drivers testified that the physician had approached them on Sunday asking them to remove a boy suffering with scarlet fever. The first driver consulted with his employer and the second accepted the fare and the doctor and the boy's mother rode with the sick young man to their destination. The disease he is suffering from is even more dangerous than scarlet fever but as the boy is contagious disease there was no quibble as to the exact nature of the complaint. The defendant had prepared the plea that at the time the boy was removed that the disease had not developed far enough to allow the physician to determine whether or not the case was contagious. It was not presented, however, but perhaps will be when the case goes to the district court.

Being Hired To-day.
