ADMIRAL GERRARD thinks the war will last two years. Gen. Sickles thinks that one year will end it.
It was Ben Butler who said that every generation of Americans would have a war to contend with. Look at the dates: 1776, 1812, 1861, 1898.

The German army at present comprises 23,170 officers, 78,307 non-commissioned officers, 479,229 privates, 2,103 surgeons and 18,088 horses.
The recent victory at Alhara, Egypt, was won by total abstinence, as the English government has forbidden the use of intoxicants in the army.

EX-PRESIDENT CLEVELAND has gone fishing again. Let us hope that he is patriotically turning his attention to catching Spanish mackerels.
The New Mexico volunteers will leave San Antonio tomorrow for New Orleans. The regiment is fully armed and equipped and will be heard from in Cuba in the thick of the fight.

The entire regular army of Spain including home and colonial troops is about 250,000 men all told. Her troops, however, will scarcely cut much of a figure in present difficulties on this side of the water.

The peaceful patriots who have heretofore opposed a standing army of decent size now probably appreciate the fact that if we had had one, Cuba would have been under the stars and stripes two or three weeks ago.

The great naval victory of Trafalgar and the death of Nelson, which occurred on October 21, 1805, were not known in London until November 6—sixteen days afterward. The news of the battle of Manila, fought on the opposite side of the globe on May 1, was known in the United States on the day after its occurrence.

GERMANY should really be the friend of the United States, and it is believed that the attitude of the people of that country toward this country is kindly. It is not to be supposed that the spectacular young Kaiser is backed up in all of the foolish things he says and does by the populace, which he pretends to own.

If a Chinese dies while being tried for murder, the very fact of his dying is taken as evidence of his guilt. He has departed, but somebody must suffer, and his eldest son, if he has one, is sent to prison for a year. If he has no son then his father or brother gets a flogging. It is all in the family and justice must be administered.

The largest stock yards in the world are in Chicago. The combined plants represent an investment of over \$10,000,000. The yards contain twenty miles of streets, twenty miles of water troughs, fifty miles of feeding troughs and seventy-five miles of water and drainage troughs. The yards are capable of receiving and accommodating daily 20,000 cattle, 30,000 sheep and 120,000 hogs.

ARMORED CRUISERS.
The generous provisions made to increase the efficiency of our navy by the naval appropriation bill have caused general satisfaction. Three seagoing battleships at \$10,000,000 each, four coast defense monitors at \$12,500,000 each, sixteen torpedo boat destroyers and twelve torpedo boats at \$25,000 each and one steel floating and graving dock are included in the scheme for strengthening the navy.

QUICK WORK.
War was declared against Spain one month ago. Since that time a volunteer army of 100,000 men has been mustered; a Spanish fleet destroyed; vast quantities of war concentrated; the island of Cuba closely blockaded, and many minor battles fought along the coast. While many criticize the delay in attacking the fortifications of Havana, it must be admitted that, taken altogether, the war is being pushed with celerity and great care. No serious mistakes have been made, and the American army has added new laurels to its never fading laurels. The next month will witness the occupation of Cuba, and most probably the destruction or capture of every Spanish warship in the waters of the western hemisphere.

COAL OIL INSPECTION.
The El Paso Times has been showing up the coal oil monopoly in this territory, for which it deserves the thanks of the people. That paper says: "Texas led an oil inspection law similar to the

New Mexico law, but the people of this state were quick to perceive that the law fastened on them a monopoly and served no good purpose, so it was repealed. As a consequence, the people are getting as good oil to day as any sold in New Mexico, and at half the price charged for oil in that territory. The Times repeats that the New Mexico coal oil inspection law is a fraud and that this fact is appreciated in New Mexico and is attested by numerous letters the Times has received from merchants of that territory thanking this paper for unmasking the fraud."

WAS NOT HAMPSTERED.
Dewey has no need to struggle with when in Hong Kong. It did not take him a week to unload and get stores in two transports which he bought there. He notified the owners that the steamers must be unloaded in twenty-four hours. This was done, though they were loaded to the gunwales and ready to sail to the Carolines. Then he reloaded them in the same speedy fashion. His energy and executive ability caused favorable comment among the naval officers and merchants of Hong Kong. In fact, they predicted the victory which he gained at Manila.

PART of the war industry which the United States will exact from Spain will probably be the fleet. Spain is too poor to be able to pay much money, and Cuba, Porto Rico and the Philippines will be out of her hands before the war ends, and, of course, will form no part of the bill of damages which she will have to foot.

WHEN the next call for troops is made, his many friends hope that Pat F. Garrett will be given a good position. He wanted to go with the first volunteers, but he could not leave his duties as sheriff of Dona Ana county, where he is working up the evidence in the Fountain murder case.

The rebellion in the Philippines which broke out July, 1896, was caused by the rapacity of the Spanish rulers from the governor-general down to the lowest alcalde. For generations the people of the archipelago had borne successfully the oppression of their foreign overlords.

ACCORDING to recent Russian statistics there are now 17,600 factories in the empire, with an annual production valued at 1,467,000,000 roubles. In these factories there are employed 919,044 workmen and 294,030 women and girls.

UNLESS signs fall Fulo de Bernabe will leave Canada before he has a chance to ask for his passports. His departure from the dominion is likely to be as precipitate as from Washington, but scarcely as pompous.
It is pointed out that the state of California has owned and published the text books used in its schools for the last six years and that the system saves over \$33 a year to parents in the cost of school books.

The Eddy Argus says of the Democrat of this city: "In the position it has occupied in connection with the organization of New Mexico's volunteers has excited the disgust of every respectable citizen."

THE Oregon is all right. Let us hope that when her whereabouts is announced it will come through the thunder of her guns against the enemy.

THE colored citizens of Santa Fe have organized a company of volunteers and tendered their services to the government.
JAPAN will not interfere with the United States occupying the Philippines, reports to the contrary notwithstanding.

The Hawaiian annexation bill will be rushed through congress within the next few days.

ALONG THE STEEL RAILS.

Latest Items of Railroad Interest Gathered from our Exchanges.

WHAT THE EMPLOYEES ARE DOING.

Eight car repairers from Topoka arrived in Raton for service there.

W. L. Shipman, stenographer in the master mechanic's office at Raton, has been transferred to San Marcial.

Fireman Lee Boyd, of Las Vegas, has taken sixty days' leave. He will go to Kentucky on a visit to his parents and friends of his boyhood.

Boilermaker W. R. Sprinkle has resigned his position at Raton and will leave in a day or so for Albuquerque, where he will work, says the Register.

Al. Ross, a boilermaker, formerly employed in the shops at Raton, has returned, having got so far as Seattle on his way to the Klondike.

S. S. Mendenhall has secured a twenty-five-mile grading contract on the Pecos Valley Extension, from Roswell. Steve was at Las Cruces to bid on the Mann route.

Engineer Holman, who was badly scalded in the wreck on the Santa Fe Pacific a few days ago, was a brother of Engineer Al. Holman, who runs out of Las Vegas the past few years.

A committee of brotherhood firemen, composed of Firemen Linn, Garvin and McConnell are busy making preparations for their annual trip to be given on the evening of the 3rd of July, at Las Vegas.

The approximate earnings of the Mexican Central, whole system, for the whole quarter of May, 1918, were \$249,376 against \$258,237 for the corresponding period of 1917, making a decrease of \$8,861. Thus the railroad's stock is fast depreciating.

Machinist Albert Checkfield, who arrived at Raton recently from Topoka, returned to that city on Monday morning, being unable to stand the high altitude. It may be mentioned that a three weeks' ride awaits his home coming with the greatest delight.

H. Lofert, a resident of Needles for a number of years and late owner of a railway shops, left with his family on Monday for Coronado Beach, where he occupies a position with the Coronado Beach company. His successor is John Record, of Topoka.

The Las Vegas Optic says: Bruce W. Crumshaw, of San Marcial, a former student at the academy, spent yesterday visiting his schoolmate Miss Willie Mills. He left on the early train to accept a position in the Atchison, Topoka & Santa Fe office at Topoka.

Probably the best time on record was made in the shipment of the 700 head of cattle from Santa Rosa Island. They were shipped in two sections, the trains averaging thirty-three miles an hour on the time they left Los Angeles, Cal., until they arrived at La Junta, Colo.

G. W. Blood, an employee of the Santa Fe, in the superintendent's office at Topoka, and an uncle of F. O. Blood, has been in Las Vegas for the past two months for health reasons. He is so much improved that when he returns home he will think of his trip to Las Vegas only with pleasure, and no doubt always speak of New Mexico in the highest terms.

The Las Cruces Independent-Democrat says: The Santa Fe south bound passenger train reached Las Cruces two and a half hours late, Thursday, as a result of a head-on collision at Rincon. The freight train ran into an engine that was returning after helping the train up the hill. The engines were totally smashed, but no one was hurt, and the trouble resulting was the delay to the trains.

RECORD BULLETINS.
An engineer on a switch engine in a terminal yard was given ten days for being so careless as to allow his engine to back into a passenger engine in broad daylight.
Recently an engineer who is familiar with the division ran his engine off a dividing switch. This was carelessness, and the engineer has been suspended twenty days.
Engineer on switch engine ran his engine through a split switch causing nominal damage. He was given ten days for not keeping a lookout or for not having his dressman keep a lookout for him.
At a terminal station a yardmaster unnecessarily profane language on the platform at a passenger station. For this and insubordination he has been dismissed.
In calling the attention of all conductors and engineers concerned to the fact that freight trains will be allowed to exceed a speed of one mile in four minutes at any point between Glorieta and Lamy. At a terminal yard on this division a switchman was found to be drinking while on duty. He was immediately dismissed from the service.
Attention is again directed to paragraph 4, of the general superintendent's circular of July 20, 1917.
Recently while a train crew were backing some cars through a siding in a yard, a brakeman ran ahead and gave signal before switch was thrown, and failing to get switch over caused derailment. The brakeman has been discharged from the service.
