Dewey's Fleet and the Insurgents will Storm City of Manila.

VOLUNTEER ARMY EIGHTY-TWO THOUSAND.

New York, May 17.—A special from Hong Kong says that Consul Wildman has returned there from Kowloon bay, where he took the insurgent leader, General Aguinaldo, and cabinet on the McCulloch. Arrangements were made for the insurgents to storm Manila.

The dispatch adds that it is absolutely necessary that American warships and a strong military force be sent to Admiral Dewey's aid at once.

ANXIOUS FOR A FIGHT.

Blockading Fleet at Havana Ready for the Spanish Squadron.

(Copyright Associated Press.)

On Board Associated Press Dispatch Boat Kate Spencer, off Havana, May 16, via Key West, May 17.—The ships of the American blockading squadron are keeping a vigilant watch for the Spanish fleet, and will not be taken by surprise should the Spanish men-of-war round Cape Antonio, the westernmost point of Cuba, and swoop down upon Havana. Sailors are kept constantly in the tops, where they can sweep the horizon for thirty miles, looking out for the first sign of a hostile ship.

All naval officers on the blockade station are anxious for a meeting with the Spaniards.

When informed that the latest reports placed them off the coast of Venezuela, they jubilantly declared that the enemy could be hemmed in between the Windward Islands and Yucatan channel to be destroyed.

A Busy Place.

Chattanooga, May 17.—To-day is one of the busiest in the history of Chickamauga park. Special trains are arriving hourly and the park is fast filling up. By to-night there will be 7,000 men encamped at Chickamauga.

WATCHING FOR THE OREGON.

Several Spanish Warships Waiting to Get Well Whipped.

New York, May 17.—A special copyright dispatch from Santa Lucia, W. I. to the World, says: A large strange warship was sighted last night off the west coast of this island. Others were also seen northward of St. Lucia. These vessels are believed to be the Spanish squadron watching for the United States battleship Oregon, which may pass this island on its way to Key West.

FLEETS WILL UNITE.

All the American Iron Clads Will Meet Spain's Armada.

Key West, May 18.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Spain's fleet in the Caribbean sea is to be met by a squadron consisting of armor clads of the United States. Preparations are being made to effect a junction of Sampson's and Schley's squadrons with all possible despatch.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

Baltimore, Md., May 17.—The Riers of fire building and freight sheds of the "Old Bay Line" steamship company plying between this city, Norfolk and Richmond, burned to-day. A large quantity of freight was destroyed. Loss, \$250,000.

FIRING IN THE GULF.

Galveston and the Mosquitoes in That Vicinity Reported.

Galveston, Texas, May 17.—The Norwegian steamer Transit, from Progress, reports having heard heavy cannonading 100 miles off Galveston in the Gulf of Mexico yesterday. Alarmists think the firing was scouting vessels of the Spanish Cape Verde fleet, last reported at Curacao.

SECURITY NECESSARY.

No Further News of the Squadron Till a Battle is Fought.

Washington, May 17.—Brigadier-General Greeley, chief of the signal service, and in charge of all strategic control of the telegraph and cable lines, has adopted energetic measures to prevent the admiral of the Spanish squadron now in Caribbean waters from keeping posted on the whereabouts and movements of the

OFFICERS PROMOTED.

President McKinley Advances Several Officers of the Army and Navy.
Washington, May 17.—The president to-day sent these nominations to the senate: Captain Silas Cawley, U. S. N., to be commodore, Commander Benjamin P. Lambertson to be captain; Lieutenant Junior grade, Harry George, to be lieutenant; Lieutenant Commander Harrison G. O. Colby to be commander; John H. Moore, to be lieutenant commander; Lieutenant Commander Levitt C. Logan to be commander.

War—To be assistant adjutant general with the rank of major—George S. Hobart, New Jersey.

INFERNAL MACHINE.

Effort to Murder the Railroad Agent at Pueblo, Colo., May 17.—E. E. McClintock, city passenger agent of the Santa Fe railroad, received in his mail a small wooden box. When he opened it an explosion occurred which burned his face and hands severely. The box contained a four-inch stick of dynamite still intact, only the cap attached having exploded. Several weeks ago some unknown person shot at McClintock on the street at night. He does not know who his enemy is.

BLOW TO HIGH PRICE GAS.

The Acetylene Light Superior and Cheaper than Gas.

SUCCESSFUL TEST AT HOTEL HIGHLAND.

The Hotel Highland, (the office and lower floors), was as light as day last night, all on account of the new acetylene gas plant installed at this hotel by the Niagara Falls Acetylene Gas Machine company, which, so far as last night's test is concerned, proved a perfect success.

THE SENATE.

All of the President's Appointments Confirmed by the Senate.

Washington, May 17.—In the senate, Hale, chairman of the committee on naval affairs, offered the following resolution which was agreed to: "That temporary appointments made by the president on or after April 21, 1898, and up to the date of the passage of this joint resolution, of the line and staff of the navy are hereby ratified and confirmed to continue in force during the exigency under which their services are required in the existing war. Officials so appointed shall be assigned to duty with rank and pay grades established by existing law, and shall be paid from the appropriation for the pay of the navy."

The bill was reported from the military committee by Carter, of Montana, and was passed providing that the pay and allowance of volunteers enlisted in the United States army shall begin on the day of their enrollment at the state camps, with the provision that the volunteer troops sent to the Philippine islands may draw one month's pay in advance.

Consideration of the war revenue measure was resumed, Jones (Ark.) talking the floor. Jones said he doubted whether there was a man in the senate not ready to vote all the money and taxes necessary to carry on the war. He would not perform his duty, he thought, if he should vote too much money. The problem presented was how much money was needed.

TWO SPANISH GUNBOATS.

They Hide in the Day Time and Prowl Around at Night.

Cape Haytien, Hayti, May 17.—Two Spanish cruisers or gunboats are making their base of operations at Badiquier or Guantanamo bay. They are known to be moving every night in the waters between Hayti and Cuba. The Spaniards are supposed to hide in Cuban ports during the day and go out cruising at night.

NEW WARSHIPS.

Two New Torpedo Boats Ready to Go to the Front.

Washington, May 17.—The torpedo boat McKee, and the auxiliary torpedo boat destroyer Yankton were placed in commission at the Norfolk navy yard yesterday.

The cruiser Newark will go into commission at the Norfolk navy yard next Saturday, but may not be entirely ready for sea for two weeks yet. Captain Albert S. Barker, a member of the naval staff, has been assigned to the command of the Newark.

GLADSTONE DYING.

Hawarden, May 17, 7 p. m.—An official bulletin says: "Mr. Gladstone has taken a serious turn for the worse. His death is expected in twenty-four hours."

ELECTION CONTEST SETTLED.

Washington, May 17.—In the house to-day, the report in the contested election case of W. Godfrey Hunter vs. John S. Rhea from the Third Kentucky district, favoring the sitting member, was adopted. Dr. Hunter is now minister to Guatemala.

SPANISH TRAP FOILED!



Attempt to Damage Blockade Squadron a Failure.

Messengers Reach Camp of Gomez and Deliver Dispatches.

Havana Blockading Squadron on the Lookout for the Spanish Fleet.

LOSS OF SEVENTEEN LIVES.

(Copyrighted Associated Press.)

Key West, May 17.—The cruiser Wilmington, Commander C. C. Todd, when about thirty miles east of Havana, fired four shots into a Spanish derelict, sinking it and thus doing away with another piece of Spanish trickery. An old Spanish schooner with its deck loaded to the rails with rusty iron, ear wheels, etc., closely packed together, was found floating in the track of the torpedo and dispatch boats. It evidently had been sent out of Havana harbor in the hope that a torpedo boat or some small craft would crash into it and be so damaged as to cause her to sink. Commander Todd believed that the Spanish trap might also contain explosives, therefore lying off a considerable distance, his guns promptly sent her to the bottom.

VISITS GOMES.

John F. Jova, former United States vice consul at Santa Grande, who was landed by an American gunboat on the coast of Cuba about ten days ago, was picked up yesterday afternoon, after an exciting experience with a Spanish gunboat, which the American gunboat chased into the harbor. Jova succeeded in reaching the camp of Gomez and brought a dispatch from the latter to Commander Watson.

Jova was being chased by the Spanish gunboat when the American gunboat came in sight. The Spaniard, though several miles off, fired a number of shots at the American vessel.

BOAT BLOWN UP.

Seventeen Lives Lost—Name of Boat Not Given.

Madrid, May 17.—A dispatch from Havana says that a naval boat has been blown up off Cardenas, resulting in a loss of seventeen lives.

The dispatch adds that the torpedo exploded through the negligence of those aboard. The Spaniard, though engaged in removing torpedoes in the harbor, the dispatch does not indicate whether the boat was American or Spanish.

LECTION OF BISHOPS.

Baltimore, May 17.—The election of bishop by the general conference committee of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to-day, resulted in the choice of Rev. H. C. Morrison, Nashville, Tenn., and Rev. Dr. W. A. Chandler, Oxford, Ga.

OFFENDED RUSSIA.

Chamberlain's Speech Gave Deep Offense at St. Petersburg.

New York, May 17.—A dispatch to the World from London says: The Russian ambassador has been directed to demand from Lord Salisbury, it is reported, an explanation of Mr. Chamberlain's assertion that Russia is unreliable for an alliance because of her perfidy.

The prevailing opinion now is that the Chamberlain's speech, in which he advocated an Anglo-Saxon alliance, was a grievous indiscretion.

His indirect calling the czar "the devil" is sure, it is believed, to give undying offense at St. Petersburg.

Washington, May 17.—Eighty-two thousand volunteers have now been mustered and are being sent to the mobilizing points.

Fatal Accident Caused by a Falling Elevator in Boston.

Boston, May 17.—By the falling of an elevator used for hoisting building material at an uncompleted warehouse of the Boston War company to-day, three men were killed and five wounded.

Dead: C. A. Henry, foreman; Daniel Doyle and a Cardanian.

SPANISH FLEET.

The Armada is sighted near St. Thomas Island.

St. Thomas, D. W. I., May 17.—It is reported here this morning that on Sunday last from noon until 6 p. m. six or seven vessels slowly steamed westerly north of Tortola island, forty miles east of St. Thomas. One steamer which approached land showed the Spanish flag.

TRANSPORT SHIPS.

Two Vessels Granted Registry by House of Representatives.

Washington, May 17.—The house passed bills to grant American registry to the Centennial, now at Seattle, and the Catalina, now at New York, both proposed government transport ships, and to limit to eight hours, day work of laborers and mechanics on government work, whether contract or otherwise.

The bill to repeal the law providing that the electoral vote be brought to Washington by state messengers was defeated.

MORRO CASTLE FLASHLIGHT.

Chicago, May 17.—A special to the News from Key West says: The Wilmington's crew were amazed to see Morro castle's flashlights last night, the first time since the blockade began. It was suggested that the Spaniards were expecting the Cape Verde fleet.
