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COMMODORE DEWEY IS HEARD FROM!



**Annihilated Spanish Squadron with-
out Loss of a Man or Ship.**

NONPAREIL BATTLE IN NAVAL HISTORY.

Washington, May 7.—The navy department received a cablegram from Hong Kong announcing the arrival there of revenue cutter McCulloch. The department expects advice within a few hours.

DEWEY'S CABLEGRAM RECEIVED

At Navy Department at 9:30 O'clock it is ciphered.

Washington, May 7.—The navy department received the long expected cablegram from Dewey. It was dated Hong Kong and is in cipher, consisting only of four or five lines. Experts are deciphering the cable, which will be made public as soon as translated.

DEWEY'S GREAT WORK.

Silenced Batteries, Cut Cable and Everything at His Mercy.
Washington, May 7.—In brief, Dewey's message states that he has silenced the batteries completely; cut the cable and has the bay and everything else completely at his mercy.

RECORD UNPARALLELED.

Dewey's Report Says None Killed and Only a Few Injured.

Washington, May 7.—Dewey's report says none of his men were killed and but few injured. The American ships are uninjured. Dewey has, however, been unable to take possession of the town of Manila for lack of men.

Spanish Warships Sighted.
London, May 5.—Five Spanish warships are believed to have been sighted off the French West India islands.

TO SEND TROOPS.

From Pacific Slope to Enable Dewey to Control the Philippines.
Washington, May 7.—Arrangements are now under way to send troops from the Pacific slope and Idaho to enable Commodore Dewey to take control of the Philippines.

Suspected of Being a Spy
Cadiz, May 7.—An Englishman, giving the name of Otting Boyer, attempted to telegraph yesterday evening details of the movements of the Spanish warships. He was arrested and handed over to the military authorities, who strongly suspect him of being a spy.

DEWEY'S REPORT IN FULL.

Secretary Long Gave It Out to Newspaper Men at 10:30 A. M.
Washington, May 7.—Secretary Long at 10:30 read the following to the news paper men as Dewey's report:

Manila, May 1.—The squadron arrived at Manila at daybreak this morning. Immediately engaged the enemy and destroyed the following Spanish warships: Reina Christina, Castilla, Ulloa, Isla de Cuba, General Lezo, The Duero, Correo, Velasco, Mindanao, one transport and the water battery at Cavite.
The squadron is uninjured, and only a few men were slightly wounded.
The only means of telegraphing is to the American consul at Hong Kong. I shall communicate with him.

SECOND DISPATCH FROM DEWEY.

Has Taken Fortifications and Manila Can Be Taken at Any Time.

Washington, May 7.—A second dispatch from Commodore Dewey announces that he has taken the fortifications, effected a landing at Cavite, has 250 wounded Spaniards as prisoners and Manila can be taken at any time. He said he was not in serious need of anything at present.

Wheat Makes a Record.

Chicago, May 7.—May wheat rose ten cents in thirty minutes after the opening of the board of trade, touching \$1.60, new record.

Free Entry for Cereals.

Madrid, May 7.—A decree has been gazetted allowing the free entry of cereals, etc., into Spain.

The Lafayette Released.
Washington, May 7.—The French steamer Lafayette, captured by the gunboat Annapolis, off Havana, has been released by the state department, as the

murdered missionaries Miss "Keg," possibly a mispronunciation of Schenk. Miss Cain fled into bush; her fate unknown. All these missionaries were sent out here by the United Brethren of Christ mission at Dayton, Ohio.

Crew and Passengers Lost.

Sydney, N. S. W., May 7.—The British steamer Matland, Captain Anderson, from Sydney for Newcastle, is believed to be ashore at Broken Bay. The crew and passengers, numbering sixty-eight souls, are believed to have been lost.

Later it became definitely known that the steamer ashore in Broken Bay is the Matland. But only six of her passengers were drowned.

Rear Admiral Dewey.

Washington, May 7.—Chairman Boutelle, of the house committee on naval affairs, says he will introduce Monday a resolution of thanks to Dewey, also a bill creating an additional rear admiral.

Martial Law at Milan.

Rome, May 7.—Martial law has been proclaimed at Milan on account of bread riots.

FORCES INSUFFICIENT.

To Make a Landing but Dewey Has Complete Control of the City.

Washington, May 7.—It is said at the navy department that the advice also shows that Dewey's forces are not sufficient to make a landing, but this in no way interfered with the complete control he exercised over the city and fortifications.

The Frigate Captured.

Key West, Fla., May 7.—The Spanish brigantine Frangulit, from Barcelona, bound for Montevideo and Havana, having a cargo of jerked beef, was brought in here by the dispatch boat Hamilton. The Frangulit was captured off Havana yesterday by the United States cruiser Montgomery, Commander C. A. Converse.

SPANISH SHIPS DESTROYED.

Their Names, as They Appear on the List, Given by Secretary Long.

Washington, May 7.—Owing to the complicated names of the Spanish ships destroyed by Commodore Dewey, the following is taken direct from the list given by Secretary Long: Reina Christina, Castilla, Don Antonio, Isla de Luzon, Isla de Cuba, General Lezo, Marques del Duero, El Correo, Velasco, and one transport, Isla de Mindanao. Isla de Cuba, probably means Isla de Cuba; El Correo probably means El Cano. Don Antonio is the Don Antonio de Ulla; Isla de Ulloa is given in accessible data of Spanish ships and is confounded with Don Antonio de Ulloa.

Recommends a Colored Army.

London, May 7.—The Spectator urges America to raise a colored army of 50,000 men and hold the Philippine islands, Hawaii and Porto Rico.

SPANIARDS SURRENDERED.

Says Message from American Consul to Manila.

Rochester, N. Y., May 7.—Mrs. O. F. Williams, of this city, wife of United States consul to Manila, received the following cable message from her husband at Hong Kong: "The Spaniards surrendered. All well."

Martial Law Proclaimed.

Madrid, May 7.—Much excitement prevails here. A serious riot is anticipated. Martial law has been proclaimed at Ciudad Real, owing to further rioting.

MAJOR SMITH KILLED.

By Spaniards While Escorting Some Newspaper Correspondents.

New York, May 7.—A special to the World from Tampa says: A telegram from General Laet, received here to-night, gives the information that Major Smith, who, on April 24, landed at Calabration to escort a party of newspaper correspondents to General Gomez's camp, has been captured by the Spaniards and killed. Nothing is said of the fate of the newspaper men.

The Pope Misrepresented.

Rome, May 7.—There is no truth in the statement that the pope advised the queen recent to mediate.

HOSTILITIES IN CUBA.

Thirty-two Rebels and One Spanish Officer Have Been Killed.

Madrid, May 7.—An official dispatch from Havana says: Since April 30 hostilities have been pursued against Gomez with the greatest activity and vigor. Several engagements have taken place. Thirty-two rebels have been killed and one Spanish officer, and thirty-three soldiers wounded.

Mail at Springfield.

Springfield, N. M., May 7.—Tuesday afternoon a heavy snow fell here, covering the ground to a depth of one inch. Some damage was done to blossoms and early garden truck. All night a snow fell of about an inch. Yesterday the heaviest rain of the season fell with some snow again last night. Stock is not injured.

SECOND NAVAL FIGHT!



Admiral Sampson May Meet Cape Verde Fleet Sunday.

The Greatest Naval Battle in History Will Be Fought.

The Utter Destruction of Spanish Fleet Confidently Expected.

WOULD PROBABLY END THE WAR.

New York, May 7.—A special to the World from Washington says: "We expect important news from Rear Admiral Sampson's fleet about Sunday night," said a member of the cabinet.

Sampson, with a number of his ships, is rapidly sailing toward the Porto Rican coast. He is expected to arrive off Porto Rico on Saturday evening.

The Spanish Cape Verde fleet, which is believed to be making for San Juan, Porto Rico, should make its appearance some time Sunday. Should the two powerful fleets meet, as now seems imminent, the greatest naval battle in the world's history will be fought.

The Spanish fleet is considered by American authorities as presenting a formidable array of fighting vessels and the ability of the commander, Admiral Villamil, is well known.

The administration wants first to destroy the Cape Verde fleet. After that has been done, Havana will be given twenty-four hours to surrender and American troops will then be landed.

The president hopes that with two of her fleets destroyed Spain will sue for peace and Cuba will be conquered without sending an American soldier to Cuba.

RIOTS IN ITALY TOO.

Royal Decree Issued Proclaiming Martial Law in Tuscany.

Rome, May 7.—The general situation here is regarded as grave. It now seems clearly demonstrated that politics mixed up in the disturbances which occurred at various parts of the kingdom, owing to the high price of bread. The election party is believed to be fomenting disorder. A royal decree, issued to-day, proclaimed martial law through Tuscany.

There was renewal of serious rioting at Florence, the capital of Tuscany, last night, and further disturbances at Leghorn, the capital of the province by that name. At both places a number of rioters were killed or wounded by troops.

DON CARLOS' MANIFESTO.

Calls Upon His Followers in This Country to Join Him at Once.

New York, May 7.—The Commercial Advertiser says: "A manifesto has been issued by Don Carlos, calling upon his loyal followers throughout the United States and South America to join him at once. Rafael Diaz La Cortina, the official representative of Carlos in this country, will leave for Europe this coming week. According to Cortina the general ferment in Spain to-day is the beginning of the end of the present dynasty. Emigrants of Don Carlos have reported an overwhelming majority of the people ready to flock to his standard. General Weyler and the army are only waiting to receive the word to openly declare their allegiance to him."

TWO MORE PRIZES.

Lorenzo and Francisco, Loaded With Cattle, Captured.

Port au Prince, Hayti, May 7.—The United States cruiser Montgomery arrived at Cape Hayti this morning. She captured yesterday, between Hayti and Cuba, the Spanish steamer Lorenzo and the Francisco, loaded with cattle, bound from Montevideo to Havana. The prize crew was put aboard. The French steamer which arrived here reports three Spanish warships and one French warship at Porto Rico.

New Mexico Volunteers Left Santa Fe Special to the City.

Santa Fe, May 7.—2:14 p. m.—New Mexico volunteers for the cowboy regiment are at the depot 350 strong, and will leave in a few minutes for the south, via Newton, Kan. A finer body of men for fighting purposes could not be wished for. The greatest enthusiasm is being manifested, and all Santa Fe has turned out to see the boys off.

DEPARTURE FROM SANTA FE.

Splendid Display of Enthusiasm at Depot When Troops Leave.

Santa Fe, N. M., May 7, 4:08 p. m.—Major Hudson on yesterday issued a proclamation that all places of business should be closed to day and our citizens should march to the train and bid the New Mexico troops of mounted riflemen good bye. From the thousands gathered at the depot when our gallant boys marched to the train it looked as though the nation's request had been carried out.

Promptly at 3:30 o'clock the line of march was formed, headed by the regimental band, then came the governor and his full staff followed by company B, infantrymen, and the four troops of riflemen, that have been promised to the honor to the territory. The train, consisting of one Pullman, nine tourist cars, one baggage car and one stock car, was escorted by the brave hearts of the boys who were in the most cheerful mood. Many compliments were made as to the fine appearance of the Albuquerque boys. Col. Cooper, the mustering officer, will accompany the train to San Antonio.

MILITARY MOVEMENTS.

Gen. Nunez Gone to Washington to Confer With Gen. Miles.

Tampa, Fla., May 7.—Lieut. Col. W. H. Lawton, inspector general of the department of the southwest, who went to Key West on Thursday for the purpose of holding a conference with Admiral Sampson and making final arrangements for the co-operation of the blockading squadron with the military expedition from Fort Tampa, returned to-day and reported to Gen. Shafter. It is almost certain that the exact point of landing on Cuban coast has been decided upon and probably also the date of sailing, but three army officials absolutely refuse to give any information on the subject, merely saying that notices will be given twenty hours before the time set for departure.

General Nunez left for Washington last night for the purpose, it is said, of having a conference with General Miles. He is not expected back before Wednesday and no movement either of the United States or Cuban troops is looked for before.
