GOV. OTIS made a patriotic speech at a recent war meeting at Santa Fe. He has informed the president that he is ready to go to the front as a volunteer.

THE Democrat is casting unnecessary slurs at Capt. Luna's recruits. Many of them do not wear white shirts, but when it comes to fighting they can be counted upon.

THE Missouri state superintendent of insurance has levied \$253,304.17 taxes against foreign insurance companies doing business in the state on \$11,008,349.99 premiums received.

BULL fights have been arranged in all the larger towns of Spain, the proceeds to be devoted to the national defense fund. Gov. Weyler is to be sent to Cuba in command of an army corps.

FORTY-SEVEN women, sixteen of them married, were graduated with the law class of the New York university last week. Women lawyers are especially in demand in the four woman suffrage states.

THE first big naval battle will be fought off the shores of the Philippine islands. The American fleet will win the fight and take immediate possession of those islands, which will be used as a coaling station by the United States.

THE war department has designated this city as the place for the concentration of New Mexico troops and camp of instruction. It is the most central and in every way is the best point in the territory for a military camp.

THE youngest member of Capt. Luna's cavalry troop is the eldest son of the editor of THE CITIZEN. His forefathers were in most of the troubles that have afflicted the world since the discovery of America, and he is expected to do his share.

THE people of Santa Fe resent the insinuations made in eastern papers that the Spanish-American citizens of New Mexico are not loyal to the American flag. At a meeting strong resolutions on the subject were unanimously and enthusiastically adopted.

Was it fate which made Commander Marx the judge advocate of the Maine naval court of inquiry? Strange that a Jew, a descendant of the people who were driven from Spain four hundred years ago, should preside at the trial which declared Spain guilty of one of the most atrocious crimes of all ages.

THE CITIZEN heartily endorses the following from the Santa Fe New Mexican: "The people of New Mexico should feel very grateful to President McKinley for the appointment of Governor Otero. His whole heart is devoted to the welfare of the people of the territory, and it is believed that his administration will be the most successful this territory ever had."

WAR is a great stimulus to invention. The departments in Washington already are flooded with plans and projects bearing directly or indirectly upon the impending conflict. Of course a large proportion of these schemes are worthless, but there is good reason to hope that in the measure of rubbish something will be found which will demonstrate its value and establish the scientific world.

SUBMARINE CABLES.
The number of submarine cables throughout the world is 1,549, of which, however, 1,141 are coast and river cables belonging to governments, and of comparatively small strategic value. The total length of cable is 102,928 miles. France commands twelve cables of 2,025 nautical miles in European waters and thirty-three cables of 28,356 miles in colonial waters, while Germany controls eleven cables of 3,040 nautical miles in European waters and three cables of 470 miles in colonial waters. In times of war

it has always been the practice for messages to pass without question through neutral states. For instance, during the recent war, telegrams between Turkey and Greece were forwarded by way of Austria, though direct communication was suspended. In the Chinese war there was no interruption of the telegraphic service with China and Japan. But in the event of war with France or Germany 28,359 miles of cable in the case of France and 3,150 miles in the case of Germany would be deducted from the mileage control of England.

FAKE VS. REAL NEWS.
All kinds of fake war news may be expected now from day to day. The judicious newspaper reader will consider the source of news before yielding implicit confidence to its authenticity. — Los Angeles Times.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war testing whether that nation or any nation so conceived and so dedicated can long endure." The civil war was brought to vindicate a great principle. The war in which we are now engaged is to vindicate another great principle, and it will be conducted as becomes an up right Christian nation.

ENGLAND continues to show her good will towards the United States in a marked manner. She has issued a neutrality proclamation which is regarded as highly favorable to the United States, as it serves notice on the rest of Europe that she will be no party to any schemes of intervention and will not countenance any policy meddling in our affairs by any European nation.

THE Spanish hatred of the American negro will help to strengthen the arm and direct the aim of the brave black regiments that are now carrying the flag of liberty in the direction of Cuba.

THE Santa Fe company has completed its calculation of losses at the Fairview tunnel burning last winter, and places the amount at about half a million dollars.

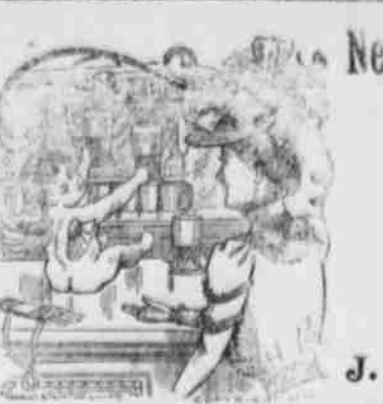
