BOOKS RECEIVED

Alaska Fisheries Policy: Economic, Resources, and Management. Ed. by Arlon R. Tussing, Thomas A. Morehouse, and James D. Babb, Jr. Fairbanks: University of Alaska. 1972. 470 pp. Price unknown. This collection of essays contains discussions ranging from that of management regimes to paralytic shellfish poisoning to marine education. As the title indicates the discussions are in terms of Alaska fisheries and the book's chief contribution to the natural resources literature is its description of Alaska's fisheries within the context of state policy. It places a perspective on the place of fisheries in Alaska's economy and centers on the critical policy issue of license limitation.

International Regulation of Marine Fisheries: A Study of Regional Fisheries Organizations. By Albert W. Koers. London: Fishing News (Books) Ltd. 1973. 368 pp. £5.50. In picking a complex topic, Koers was presented with the difficult task of making a lucid yet meaningful presentation. He failed in that he oversimplified and thereby diminished the value of his work for professionals. The material is hardly suitable for laymen.

Outdoor Recreation and Environmental Quality. Ed. by Phillip O. Foss. Fort Collins: Colorado State University. 1973. 215 pp. Price unknown. This book is the published proceedings of the 1972 Western Resources Conference and, as with most proceedings, the quality of the discussions varies from mediocre to excellent. Ralph d'Arge's and James Wilen's "On Social Rates of Discount and the Preservation Versus Development Controversy" is certainly in the latter category and may have made the conference worthwhile.

Rock Art in New Mexico. By Polly Schaafsma with photography by Karl Kernberger and Curtis Schaafsma. Santa Fe: State Planning Office. 1972. 209 pp. No charge. The magnificent photographs combined with the comprehensive text make this the definitive work on petroglyphs in New Mexico. As an information source, it could play a significant role in the discussion of aesthetics, resources, and degradation, although it does not raise these issues.

Water Well Technology: Field Principles of Exploration Drilling and Development of Ground Water and Other Selected Minerals. By Michael D. Campbell and Jay D. Lehr. New York: McGraw-Hill. 1973. 681 pp. \$24.50. This handbook is well worth the high price to those people interested in water well technology. The basic text is a readable, comprehensive survey of the engineering aspects of water wells. The text is followed by perhaps the most useful section of the book: an annotated bibliography of 673 entries. An appendix of mostly mathematical information and a glossary help make this handbook useful.
