WATCH that surplus in the city treasury go glimmering.

THERE will be a big fruit crop this season in New Mexico.

If the rain would fall on the ungrain in New Mexico, there would be no need of irrigation ditches.

THE president cannot keep the country in suspense much longer. The people want peace or war.

ENGLAND and Russia now control the larger part of Asia, and they are each year adding to their vast Asiatic possessions.

THE United States has left nothing undone to bring about a peaceful solution of the Cuban question. If there is war, Spain will be responsible.

THE fact that Gen. Lee has been ordered to leave Havana is a strong indication that open hostilities will begin next week between the United States and Spain.

THERE is perhaps no more humane nation in the world than the Japanese, who have recently erected a monument in memory of the horses that fell in the war with China.

WAR is in actual progress with Spain. That country has blown up one of the United States warships, and the lives of American citizens are in danger in Spanish territory.

CONGRESS will surely decide by next Monday whether it is to be peace or war with Spain. The continued uncertainty is more detrimental to business interests than actual hostilities.

THE president and congress are getting together on a Cuban policy. On the main issue, that Cuba must be free, there is no difference and those as to details are rapidly being eliminated.

ONE of the subjects to be talked over before the meeting of the National Educational association at Washington next summer, at which 15,000 presidents, principals, superintendents and teachers will be gathered, will be the educational exhibit to be made by the United States at the Paris exposition in 1909.

WAR with Spain would force the government to become a large borrower, but it would not be necessary to borrow all the money that would be needed for war. An increased tax on beer and tea and a tax on coffee would add nearly 100 million dollars annually to the revenues of the government, and there are some other articles upon which additional revenue could be collected without causing hardship to the people.

TRoubles in the east seem almost as imminent as a conflict between this country and Spain. Russia's policy to monopolize the China trade and England's attempt to stop her are rapidly bringing matters to a focus and both countries are making sinister displays of force.

England has demanded possession of the island of Chusan and has a strong war fleet at Chee Foo and hovering about Port Arthur ready for a warlike demonstration against the latter port unless the lease to Wei-Hai-Wei to the British is agreed to. England has notified China that unless the lease is granted she will seize Port Arthur regardless of Russia's lease.

MAN FOR THE NAVY.
There will be no scarcity of men for our navy no matter how soon war may come. Commander Miller, of the receiving ship Vermont says that during the past five weeks the work of recruiting has been going on all over the country and has reached the high-water mark. And with all the recruiting that has been going on the greatest care has been exercised in accepting men. Intelligence and the qualifications for good citizenship have been demanded of all applicants for enlistment and every one of the new recruits is a valuable acquisition to the service.

NEW MEXICO HORTICULTURE.
The first annual report of the New Mexico Horticultural society, covering the year 1907, has just been issued. Of the report the Denver Republican says: "It contains an account of the fruit exhibit held last year in the city of Santa Fe and the efforts of the society to awaken an interest in horticulture and stimulate, by offering suitable prizes, the production of valuable varieties of fruit. The exhibit referred to was highly successful. It brought together a display which in many respects was remarkable. It showed that New Mexico in the variety of its fruit products, having regard to quality as well as species, stands in the foremost rank among fruit-producing countries of the United States. Some states may produce certain species of fruit of superior quality to any yet produced in New Mexico, but the same states may fall short in respect of certain other species in which New Mexico surpasses the other parts of the Union."

Horticulture is a business to which the people of New Mexico may well give great attention. It would be practicable for them to supply large quantities of excellent fruit to the markets of the Mississippi valley and the lake region. The climate of their territory will admit of planting the products of their orchards and vineyards in the market at an earlier date than many competitors in places, and care and experience in cultivation would in time enable them to produce varieties of a very superior grade.

Practically all the irrigated valleys of the territory are adapted to fruit growing. The soil of the Rio Grande and Pecos valleys, for instance, is highly fertile and irrigation has demonstrated its adaptability to both viticulture and horticulture. A good quality of wine could be produced by care in selecting the proper species of grapes. This has already been shown by what has been achieved in the production. Altogether, the New Mexico Horticultural society has an excellent opportunity for the accomplishment of a work of enormous value to the territory.

CROP REPORTS.
H. B. Hughes, observer for the department of agriculture, wishes to make the weekly crop bulletins of greater interest and more complete than they have been at any time in the past, and to this end desires to secure more crop reporters than he now has. He would like to have every community and locality in the territory represented by the report.

On application to the section director at Santa Fe, free postal cards and full instructions will be furnished to persons willing to send his office weekly, or as often as convenient, a statement showing the condition of crops, stock and stock ranges. All persons furnishing the report will receive a copy of the bulletin and other publications from his office.

CANNOT FIGHT.
Spain is in no condition to go to war. Her navy is in bad shape. Her army is in a state of disorganization. Her best ships, her best soldiers, her best officers are short of powder. Coal supplies on the side of the Atlantic are wanting. The fleets are lacking in machinery, and the machinery of several of the best war vessels of her navy is in need of overhauling. Spain has no naval force fit to stand against the United States on this side of the water, and no haste to send over reinforcements is shown at Madrid. Her Cape Verde islands have been halted at the Cape Verde islands. Spain is not acting like a nation that is ready to go to war, and the impression deepens that she will surrender before she will fight.

The senate is in accord with the president. There can be no doubt of this. The president has explained his views to the leaders of the senate committee on foreign relations, and a majority of the committee has agreed to bring in a resolution which will meet the recommendations of the message.

MINISTER WOODFORD once came near being president of the United States. When Garfield was nominated the choice for vice president lay between Woodford and Arthur, and the former was for a time the favorite.

After the Fountains Murders.
Orders have been issued by the executive to Major Van Patten, at Las Cruces, to hold his three companies of territorial national guards in readiness for duty and upon call or orders from the governor to report at once to Sheriff Patrick F. Garrett, of Dona Ana county, for the purpose of preserving the peace, keep law and order and to act as a posse to aid the sheriff in making arrests. This action was had by Governor Otero as it was reported by the proper officials and leading citizens of Dona Ana county that trouble might arise over the arrest of the men charged with the murder of Albert J. Fountain and 12-year-old son, or that an attempt to rescue the men already arrested and in jail, charged with this offense, might be made.

Hon. T. B. Catron has been employed by Governor Otero on behalf of the territory to assist District Attorney John D. Ryan, of Dona Ana county, and W. B. Childers, Esq., employed by the citizens in the prosecution of the men charged with the murder of the late Albert J. Fountain and his 12-year-old son, on Feb. 1, 1906.

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Victory Grants a Soft Soap.

Ex-Solicitor General Victory, being of the opinion that he may get some of the territory's profits from the solicitor general's office, has filed a petition with the auditor of the territory, stating that he was solicitor general and entitled to the pay and emoluments of the office, says the New Mexican. If the auditor takes any notice of Mr. Victory's petition the chances are that the law will be invoked against him. There are several penalties prescribed for failure of duty on the part of the auditor. The best lawyers agree that it is the auditor's duty to recognize the governor's commission and the certificate of appointment filed by the secretary of the territory and officers appointed in his office.

ORDINANCE NO. 82.

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Albuquerque, N. M.:
Section 1. That Joseph H. Baldridge, Frank E. Sturges, J. G. Albright, of said city, and William Seagrave Magill, of New York, their heirs, executors or assigns, are hereby empowered and granted the right to construct, maintain and operate by electric or compressed air power a street railway line, upon and along all streets, ways and passages and their intersections now laid out and accepted by the city authorities of Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Sec. 2. That the authorization conveyed by the preceding section to the parties therein named shall constitute a franchise for a street railway upon and along all streets, ways and passages throughout the city of Albuquerque, New Mexico, for a period of twenty years from the date of the passage of this ordinance upon the following conditions and limitations:

First—The parties to whom this franchise is granted hereby agree to construct and operate, at least two miles of the road within eighteen months after the date of the passage of this ordinance.

Second—Before the franchise mentioned in the last section shall become vested or said parties therein mentioned shall be authorized to locate, construct or maintain said street railway on any street, way or passage, they shall first obtain the consent of the city council, and shall present a petition to the mayor and city council signed by the owners of the land represented by the petition, one half of the frontage of each and every street or part of street that is sought to be used for such street railway purpose.

Third—It is further provided that the parties mentioned, on accepting the franchise and privileges herein granted, shall deposit in one of the banks or in some other equally safe depository in the city of Albuquerque, one thousand dollars (\$1,000), to be a forfeit to the city if they shall fail to commence and execute the work of constructing and operating said street railway according to the terms, conditions and limitations set forth in this ordinance; said sum to be deposited within sixty days after the acceptance of this ordinance.

Fourth—It is further provided that until the city shall reach a population of fifteen thousand inhabitants, there shall not be any license or charge against said franchise, but when the population of the city shall reach fifteen thousand inhabitants a license of thirty dollars per annum shall be paid upon said road; and when the population of the city shall reach twenty thousand inhabitants there shall be paid a license of fifty dollars per annum for each car used on said road.

Fifth—The rights and privileges herein conferred to the parties named by the passage of this ordinance shall not be interpreted as exclusive; but it is hereby agreed by the mayor and city council of Albuquerque, New Mexico, of the first part, by the persons herein named of the second part, that from the date upon which the construction of this street railway is commenced, no other public privileges or franchises for a street railway within the city limits shall be granted by the city authorities until the expiration of the term of the franchise granted in the preceding section, eighteen months, shall have expired, subject, however, to the conditions and limitations of said ordinance, and to the effect upon rights now existing.

Sec. 3. Full authority for the construction of the road, including the laying and maintenance of the ties, rails, single or double track, switches, poles, and wires shall be subject to the approval of the mayor and council of the city, and the construction and operation of an electric street railway is hereby granted to the parties herein named with the express condition that all construction shall conform to the grades of the streets already, or in the future to be, established; that all crossings at intersecting points of the public highways with street railway lines must be maintained by the operators of said railway in such a manner as to cause no public inconvenience; and upon said operators rest the charge and maintenance of the portion of the public highway as shall be included between the tracks and two feet on each side of the road track or tracks in such manner as to render it at all times safe and proper roadway for vehicles.

Sec. 4. The validity of this franchise shall depend upon the strict conformity of the parties to the conditions and limitations of this ordinance, and the continuous operation of such line as may be constructed by them under the terms of this grant exception made for strikes, accidents of flood, fire or other force major.

Sec. 5. The said line of street railway shall not interfere with the drainage or water system of said city, which reserves all rights to intersect the line at all points where the needs of its present or future water and sewage system may require it.

Throughout the life of this franchise the operators hereby agree to charge a fare for each passenger of not exceeding five cents, with transfer on intersecting lines or lines of the said company for each continuous trip from point to point within the city limits, now or hereafter to be established, the conveyance of passengers to be performed in a safe manner and with due regularity and dispatch.

Sec. 6. The operators of said street railway shall be liable for all damages to life or property resulting from the negligence of the operators, their employees or faulty construction, equipment or maintenance of the street railway system.

Sec. 7. Any interference with the rights embodied in this franchise, the obstruction of the track to delay the passage of cars, destruction or injury of any part of the equipment or property of this street railway system, shall constitute misdemeanor and be punishable by fine of not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for a period of not less than three nor more than sixty days, or both.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon its passage.
