FOR EMERGENCIES!

Navy Department Making Preparations for War.

The Navy to be in ideal condition for defense and offense.

Others have proof that Big Forward Magazine is Unexpended.

SECRETARY SHERMAN'S TALK.

Washington, Feb. 25.—Emergency preparations of the navy for war have been decided upon and the necessary orders for carrying them out have been issued by Assistant Secretary Roosevelt. The preparations include: First—Orders to vessels in different parts of the world looking to their better strategic disposition. Second—Shipping of guns and mounts for auxiliary cruisers from Washington to New York navy yard, where in a few hours they can be placed on board the vessels of the International Navigation company, Columbia Steamship company, Red Star Steamship company, and New York Cuba Mail Steamship company. Third—Collection of stores and completion of repairs to cruisers Minneapolis and Columbia, monitor Albatross, and other vessels. Fourth—Shipment to the works of Harbottle of the torpedo tubes and appliances and torpedoes for the torpedo boats Talbot and Osmin, which will shortly undergo their steam trials. Steps are being taken to put the navy in a condition to meet any emergency. Assistant Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt, when asked concerning the probability of war and the condition of the navy in case of emergency, replied: "While we do not expect war, the navy department is simply making every preparation for it. The work of the navy is going on as rapidly as we could wish. To get it into an ideal condition for defense and offense will consume much time and a great deal of patient labor."

EX-COMMUNIST TO ORGANIZE.

For War with Spain—Fitzhugh Lee to Command a Division.

Middleboro, Ky., Feb. 25.—A card in a local newspaper asking ex-Confederates to form a regiment to serve in the case of a war with Spain brought more than enough responses to fill the ranks from southwest Virginia, east Tennessee and Kentucky. The originator of the idea now contemplates the formation of a division to be commanded by Fitzhugh Lee.

NO TORPEDOES THERE.

Agents of the United States Corroborate Spanish Government.

Washington, Feb. 25.—The representation of the Spanish government to the effect that there were no mines or torpedoes in the Spanish harbor, exactly agrees with the result of inquiries by the agents of our government. So far they have been unable to find the slightest existence of any plan of defense in the harbor by means of mines or torpedoes, much less to locate the same. It is reported in some quarters. Officials say that the effect of this statement is almost certain to be a negative supposition that the disaster resulted from the accidental causes, in almost the unanimous testimony of experts here, based on the history of torpedoes war, is that no single torpedo of any kind has ever caused the terrible wreck of the Maine.

FOREWARD MAGAZINE UNEXPENDED.

Divers Working on the Forward, Found Absolute Profits of this.

New York, Feb. 25.—A special copyright copyright to the Forward magazine from Silver Star at Havana, says: "Divers working on the forward wreck, found absolute proof that the forward magazine, which was supposed to be damaged, is surely unexpended. Many divers have sworn to have before the investigation. It is believed by experts that the big torpedo or mine aided by 500 pounds of salting powder in the reserve magazine next to the big magazine, might have exploded, but the actual results found in the wreck."

Attempt at Assassination.

Athens, Feb. 25.—An unsuccessful attempt was made to-day to assassinate King George of Greece.

Naval Board Disagreed.

Washington, Feb. 25.—After being pronounced physically unfit for promotion by a board, to be retired by another board, Captain Henry Robeson, commandant of the Portsmouth, N. H., navy yard, has at last been recommended to the president for promotion, and will succeed to the vacancy in the grade of commodore to be created by the retirement of Admiral Schrevel.

An Officer Killed.

South Bend, Ind., Feb. 25.—Officer Louis Keller, at midday, noticed the back door of his cigar store unlocked, went in to investigate, and a fusillade followed. Keller fired rapidly. A moment later he rushed a crowd of armed men, leaving Keller dead. Officer Bennett had just come up and one of the men ran directly into his arms. Bennett found him mortally wounded. He gave the name of Jack Burke, of New York. Four more midnight marksmen were soon captured, Robert Powers, James Burns, Frank O'Connor, Frank Monroe. Burke, in a dying statement, said he fired the shot which killed Keller.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Resolution Introduced Condemning Woodford for Feasting Spaniards.

Washington, Feb. 25.—The house resumed consideration of the sundry civil bill immediately after the reading of the journal, on the pending amendment, being that of Tongue (Rep., Oregon), to appropriate \$100,000 for Yagou, Yagou, Oregon. Dockery (Mo.), vigorously opposed

the amendment, which he said would make the government liable for expenditure of over a million dollars on a project that was an engineering impossibility. The amendment was lost by a vote of 36 to 76.

The amendment appropriating \$300,000 for a harbor at Cleveland, Ohio, offered by Burton (Republican, Ohio), was adopted. Representative Lewis (Washington) offered an amendment to the sundry civil bill a resolution condemning Minister Woodford for giving a banquet to the Spanish cabinet. He declared that he was opposed to the feasting of the ministers of those whom the nation was burying. The amendment was ruled out on a point of order.

FALSE REPORT.

The News Regarding the Condition of Puerto Arrijo Dead.

This morning a report was put in circulation that Puerto Arrijo, the well known politician and ex-sheriff of this county, had died at his ranch home a few miles above the city last night, after a short illness from pneumonia. This afternoon at 2 o'clock, Hon. B. F. Perea, county school superintendent, called at this office and stated that he had heard the report, but could not verify the information.

Later, however, Sheriff Hubbell was seen, and he stated that he had passed the residence of Mr. Arrijo this morning coming into town, and it was his opinion that the report of his (Arrijo's) death was premature.

At 3:20 this afternoon Pablo Lucero rode in from the precinct of Mr. Arrijo, and denied the truthfulness of the rumor, stating that Mr. Arrijo, while yet a very sick man, was considered better today than on yesterday.

Mariano Arrijo, a brother of the sick man, drove out to the ranch this afternoon, and at 4 o'clock he reported his brother better.

The women of the company went to the sheriff's office and asked that the manager be brought back to this city.

The proprietor of the Hardwick hotel is justly exercised over the departure of the manager of the Night Owls, the theatrical combination that burlesqued at the opera house Tuesday night. The combination stopped at the hotel and the manager departed last night with the company funds. As the members of the company had salaries due them and the board did not being paid, they are in a deplorable condition. The sheriff has been appealed to, but as the statute does not cover defaulting theatrical managers nothing can be done.—Phoenix Herald, Feb. 24.

PRESCOTT SHOOTING!

Lient. Cordier, of Cuban Army, Narrowly Escaped Death.

Assassin Fired a Shot at Him, then Fled and Escaped.

Cordier is in Arizona Raising Funds to Aid Insurgent Cause.

THE SECOND ATTEMPT.

Prescott, Ariz., Feb. 25.—Lieutenant Cordier, of the Cuban army, who is raising funds to aid the insurgent cause, narrowly escaped death at the hands of an assassin last night. An unknown man took a shot at the lieutenant and then fled. Cordier fired two shots at the retreating figure but failed to stop him. Cordier says that a similar attempt was made on the life of Captain Mahoney a few months ago in Montana.

SPANISH LIABLE.

Secretary Sherman Says an Indemnity Will Be Demanded.

Washington, Feb. 25.—Secretary Sherman said to-day that should the naval court of inquiry find the Maine disaster the result of an accident, indemnity would certainly be demanded. The secretary did not think the Spanish authorities had been aware of the intentions of anyone who may have caused the explosion, but he advanced the opinion that whether they were or not, the Spanish government would be liable for indemnity if it was shown any Spaniard caused it.

RETURN TO HAVANA.

After Court of Inquiry Finishes Its Session in Key West.

Key West, Feb. 25.—The United States coast survey steamer Bache arrived here this morning from Havana. She had on board four of the Maine's wounded, and two were well enough to walk. Regarding the movements of the fleet, Admiral Sigsbee said: "The boats at Antigua are doing some target practice, but the elaborate plan of maneuvers, which I had laid out, has been postponed pending developments. I brought the New York here because I wished to be in close communication with the navy department." A prominent naval officer said the court would almost certainly return to Havana after the session here.

SENATOR PROCTOR IN HAVANA.

He There on a Business Venture, Accompanied by a Real Estate Man.

Havana, Feb. 25.—Senator Proctor arrived here to-day from Florida via Key West. He says his coming has no connection in connection with political matters. The senator is accompanied by M. M. Parker, a real estate man of Washington, and it is given out that they are engaged in a business venture.

A number of newspaper men will return to Key West to-day in anticipation of the transfer of the United States court of inquiry into the loss of the Maine to that place.

Arrivals here are not many and departures about up to the average.

In the Senate.

Washington, Feb. 25.—Hansbrough, of North Dakota, secured the adoption of a resolution calling upon the secretary of the navy for the reason why he shipped certain freight over the Canadian Pacific to My Island, Cal. Kyle, of South Dakota, addressed the senate in support of Corbett's claim to a seat. Thurston, of Nebraska, regretted his views. The case would force him to vote against admission of Corbett.

Weekly Bank Statement.

New York, Feb. 25.—The weekly bank statement shows: Surplus reserves, decrease, \$2,729,125; loans, decrease, \$5,030,500; specie, increase, \$2,325,700; legal tenders, decrease, \$1,118,149; deposits, decrease, \$4,946,309; circulation, decrease, \$50,400.

The Banks now hold \$22,050,325 in excess of legal requirements.

Six People Perished.

Charleston, S. C., Feb. 25.—Mrs. Knickerbocker, with six other people, perished in a tenement house fire here last night. She is the wife of Theodore Knickerbocker, a carpenter, also the call man in the fire. The others killed were: Mrs. Knickerbocker, her children except two, and his brother-in-law.

Wants to See Cuba Free.

The Honorable Republican says Ben Rothe, the junior member of the firm of Quicker & Rothe, quite a compliment to his issue of yesterday in the following manner:

Capt. Ben Rothe, of Albuquerque, who cruised along the coast of Cuba a few years ago, states that if the civilized countries only knew half the sufferings and hardships of the Cubans, brought on them by their cruel taskmasters, they would rise up as one common nation and free the island. The captain was with the fruit scholar, George B. Douglas, playing between New York and Baracoa, and thus came in contact with the cruelty inflicted upon the Cubans by Spain. He is decidedly in favor of the United States freeing Cuba.

Duran Lets a Divorce.

In the case of Pablo Duran vs. Guadalupe Madrid de Duran, for divorce, a final decree was entered by Judge Crumpacker granting an absolute divorce to the parties. Duran is the man who was found guilty of bigamy by a jury in the October term of the district court and sentenced to one month in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$1 and costs. Duran had been informed by Father Persons that his first marriage was illegal and void and that he could therefore marry again. On the strength of this advice Duran married again. The jury, in finding him guilty of bigamy, said that they did not think he had intentionally committed the crime.

Salamanca, Spain, Feb. 25.—Three thousand workmen, accompanied by women carrying flags paraded to-day shouting for work and bread. Many houses were stoned. The railroad station was stormed and considerable wheat stolen. The authorities promised to find work for the unemployed and are restoring order.
