ANCIENT TOWNS MUST GO. (El Paso Times)

The homes of nearly 2,000 people will be inundated when the water is finally turned into the big Elephant-Butte reservoir and six villages whose history runs back 200 and 300 years will be obliterated.

This information was brought to El Paso by P. W. Dent, an attorney connected with the reclamation service who spent nearly three weeks in that region securing purchase contracts for the small holdings of the Mexican ranchers. Mr. Dent traveled by wagon, accompanied by a native interpreter and during his whole journey met but one American, Fred Hanna, who conducts a store at Santa Beico.

He found the most primitive conditions prevailing all along the way, the people living very much as they must have lived a century or two ago. The old time flint and steel for starting fires and lighting cigarettes is still in use to a limited extent and the people are extremely expert in it's use, throwing the spark into a small rag greased with some resinous substance and applying the flame to the cigarette as quickly as a match could be used.

Among the towns to be obliterated is the historic old town of Paraje, which in Santa Fe trail days was a great distributing center and had a population of from two to three thousand. There was found the last water before entering upon the dreaded Jornada del Muerto, (journey of death) which ended at old Dona Ana. Paraje now has a population of 300, its ancient glory having departed.

The two largest villages are Santa Beico and Cantadero, each with a population of six or seven hundred and with about 150 separate dwellings. A sentiment attaches to both of the names, the former meaning loud singing and the latter the song of the river. San Albino, San Jose and Alamoচিত are smaller towns. In each instance the villages are the centers of farming communities, the people living in a sort of a community system, a relic of the days when mutual protection was necessary.

The government is now engaged in buying up all the small farms and the village property as well and will within a few weeks have a title to every foot of the 40,000 acres which will be included in the reservoir. About 33,000 acres of the tract was included in the purchase from the Victoria Land and Cattle Co., the balance being in innumerable small irregular tracts. The price paid ranges from \$5 to \$25 an acre according to the value.

The people will not be required to move until the water drives them out. Under the contracts they may remain in their homes, till their land—rent and taxes free—as long as the water does not interfere. Subsequently such improvements as are of value will be sold and removed.

Mr. Dent secured 37 contracts during the stay in that region, representing several hundred acres. He will continue to work along the same lines until all of the land desired is in the possession of the government.

long enough. Unless King David was right when he said that all men are liars, for I have 180 votes pledged to me and I only need 114 to win. I live in the hope that when I lay down the gravel I will be personally as 'Uncle Jon' is. He is getting more fan out of the present situation than I am, for his troubles are about over and mine are but beginning. The last election was good for the Republicans as well as Democrats. It chastened them. But I can assure you that all the legislation by the Democratic house will be for the good, for glory and welfare of the country. While we of opposing parties in congress fight in debate, I am free to assert that every man in that body works, according to his light, for the country's good. We may differ as to what is best but the sincerity of purpose of congress, regardless of party cannot be questioned."—Ex.
