BREVITIES CULLED FROM OUR EXCHANGES.

PRESCOTT.

Thomas Frye, an experienced lumber and mill man from Coconino county, has taken a position in A. J. Reed's lumber yard and planing mill.

Wallapaiu Jim brought in a monster lion head recently from China valley to claim the bounty on it. It is said to be one of the largest ever killed in this county.

The inventory and appraisement in the estate of George Moore, deceased, was filed in the probate court. The property consists of a claim in the Pinalito mining district and twenty-five tons of ore on the dump.

Indications are that Prescott and vicinity will experience considerable business activity and show more material growth during the present year than for some years previous.

S. K. Fuller, of Prescott, has filed in the county recorder's office thirteen location notices of placer claims in the San Domingo mining district, Maricopa county.

PHOENIX.

Recorder Jobs did a rushing business Monday afternoon in the police court. Twenty-one prisoners were lined up before him.

Meas. Ryder and Swayze were in front of the court in South Pass. They report their property improving and are still doing more development work.

The establishment and maintenance of a corporation organ at Phoenix to silence the newspaper champions of the people will not wait. The people are aroused and will maintain their rights.

Mrs. W. C. Gilbert, a daughter of Governor McCard, arrived in the city from her home in Grand Rapids, Minn. She is accompanied by her three children and will remain in the city during the winter.

Fred Cocker, a well and favorably known ranchman located north of Phoenix, is about to leave for his old home at Myrtletown, Wales. He is accompanied by Mrs. Cocker and will take up his permanent residence there.

Charles Fielding, of the Adams hotel, is very proud of his twin boys. They were born in the early part of last week and their weight is nine and eleven pounds respectively. Charlie will make good republicans out of the twins.

Joseph Tamborino, who was in the city from Jerome, reports that the burned district will be built up as fast as the weather will permit. Mr. Tamborino, who has been in Jerome some six years and was burned out, has acquired means and is ready to start again.

Second Lieutenant Edward A. Shuttleworth and R. L. Carmichael arrived in town from Fort Whipple. They have been detailed to work in the topographical survey about to be made along the Colorado river below Yuma. They left for Huachuca, where they will be equipped with horses and other necessities for the expedition.

One may give offense in even the soft and mellifluous language of Castile. This was Pedro Salazar, editor of El Observador, who had another fight yesterday on account of a stricture which appeared in his last issue against a countryman. As usual, Senior Salazar came out on top, notwithstanding the person criticized was a much bigger man. It was a pitched and agreed upon battle and took place near the Maricopa & Phoenix depot. There was some delay about the beginning, because the aggrieved person insisted on decorating himself with a six-shooter. He was induced to leave off his armament and the debate began. It was stubborn, and Senior Salazar won, but he emerged panting and sweating, with some of the skin and some of the hair knocked off of him. He has been running El Observador two years and has had to lick a Mexican a week over since. He is now going to take a vacation of two months visiting friends in Sonora.

ARIZONA AT LARGE.

A large soap and candle factory is the next industry which will be added to Tucson's home producing industries. Last week several horse races took place at Globe. The races have had the effect of interesting a number of business men in the proposition to organize a racing association, with the view of establishing a circular half mile track in Miami valley.

There is another spurt for the Tucson land office. There are several dark clouds about the prize. Many citizens would be pleased to see the honor fall on Judge Culver for receiver and John R. Magee for receiver.

The service of the Tucson Electric Light company has become so much in demand that the company is compelled to double its steam capacity so as to add 1,200 more lights to the business. This is also a good evidence of prosperity and the substantial growth of the city.

A short session of the Sazera Lying club was held in the Palace barber shop in Prescott. One of the barbers employed in the shop carried off the honors of the evening, when he will hold till the next meeting of the club, and until some member takes a bigger "whopper" than his. An ex-Kansas Sazera club man who was in the shop during the session, left in thorough disgust, remarking as he went out of the door that "Kansas is not in it with Arizona in the lying business."

Surveyor Coutzen writes his father at Tucson that the survey of the line separating the Deer Creek coal fields is progressing rapidly as has been expected, and the work will be carried forward as nearly continuously as the weather at that comparatively high altitude will permit at this season of the year.

Postoffice Robbed. On Wednesday night the postoffice was broken into and robbed of the change in the cash drawer, amounting to about \$10. The thief, or thieves, were either a little particular about their booty or they were frightened away before they had finished their work, as no stamps were taken.

A registered letter box lying beside the money was untouched. The safe was not bothered, nor were the cash, jewelry, or other goods in the front of the building interfered with, except a few cigars were taken. It is probable, however, that the thieves were interrupted, as Mr. McCall, the postmaster, went into the room from the front after the performance at the opera house, to get a cigar, and to take the money from the cash drawer in the store. It is his belief, as well as the general opinion, that the thieves escaped from the rear, as Mr. McCall entered at the front door. There is no clue to the perpetrators of the act—Roswell Register.

Engineer Dies at His Post. Express Train Dashed Along With a Dead Man at the Throttle. A special dispatch from Philadelphia, Penn., details an account of the death of Jeremiah O'Brien, engineer on the north-bound Chesapeake & Ohio express, due at Wilmington, Del., at 10:40 o'clock last Friday morning. The unfortunate man was stricken with heart disease and died with his hand on the throttle of his engine between Prince and Newark stations. The train was moving at the rate of thirty miles an hour at the time. It is customary for the train to slow up for the water tower when nearing Newark from failure to do this, the engineer was killed. The dispatch also states that the deceased was subject to heart trouble, but upon consulting Dr. Franklin Miles, the celebrated heart specialist, he was cured. He was a native of New York and had been in the employ of the Chesapeake & Ohio for many years.

UNITED STATES LAND COURT.

Announcement of Rejection of Three Small Grants in Tazoo County.

The United States court of private land claims, with Chief Justice Reed presiding and all the associate justices present, continues its good work at the federal court room.

The following grants were rejected this morning: Jose Ignacio Martin claim, No. 174; Juan N. Martinez, claimant, No. 175; Juan Antonio Valdes, claimant, No. 176; Manuel Fernandez claim No. 170; Manuel Espinosa, claimant, all of Tazoo county.

These three grants are all covered by the confirmed Arroyo Hondo grant and are rejected without prejudice to the people to claim under the Arroyo Hondo grant.

The taking of testimony in the matter of the objections of the claimants to the survey of the Ujo del Borracho grant, No. 176, was continued this morning and the objections were taken under advisement.
