Telegraphic Tidings

WASHINGTON MATTERS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The senate is today further considering the Panama and Nicaragua canal affairs which occupied its time on Saturday.

The president has directed the removal of Alfred E. Lewis, deputy of the 5th auditor of the treasury, for neglect and inattention to official duties.

Springer introduced a joint resolution proposing a constitutional amendment authorizing congress to make a uniform law of marriage and divorce, referred.

The subcommittee of the house committee on Indian affairs has completed the Indian appropriation bill. It appropriates about \$5,000,000, which is a reduction of about \$500,000 from the previous bill. It will be submitted to the full committee tomorrow.

The secretary of war has given instructions that the Indian agent at Union Agency in Indian territory, have the assistance of the military in driving out intruders from the land of the Chickasaw nation. A large number of intruders have assembled there on the borders of Oklahoma, with the intention of taking possession of the latter country.

The United States consul at Matamoros, Mexico, has informed the secretary of state that after February 2 the Mexican government will collect an additional duty of 2 per cent on all imports, the proceeds of which are to be devoted to harbor improvements at Vera Cruz and other ports.

Negotiations which have been in progress for some time were concluded Saturday evening by which the Morning Post which was founded by Stilson Hutchins, passes under control of Frank Hutton and the Perish Wilkins, a denaturalized member of congress from Ohio, whose term expires with the present session. Hutchins announced his permanent retirement from journalism yesterday morning in order to attend to other business interests.

Seeking for Gold and Diamonds.

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 7.—One of the biggest land deals on record has been consummated by the Brazilian government by New York, Pittsburgh and Washington capitalists. The principal object of the promoters of the scheme is to open up valuable diamond and gold fields in far western Brazil. In order to prosecute investigation and carry on the work a company with a capital of \$1,400,000 is in process of formation. The grant is for between 50,000 and 60,000 acres of land bordering on the Amazon river in the region of the Andes mountains.

Gould's Order.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—Jay Gould has issued a peremptory order to General Manager Clark of the Missouri Pacific railroad to investigate and if he finds any agent who has embezzled or is about to embezzle, to discharge him at once. George Gould says he doesn't believe any embezzlers have been made on that road.

DEEP WATER PROJECT.

How the Proposition will be Laid Before Congress.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—At a conference Senator Coke and Representative Crain finally agreed upon the form in which the gulf of Mexico deep water harbor proposition shall go before congress. The measure authorizes and directs the secretary of war to appoint a board of three engineer officers of the United States army, whose duty it shall be to make a careful and critical examination of the northwest coast of the gulf of Mexico, of 33 degrees and 30 minutes west longitude, excepting therefrom the mouth of the Brazos river in Texas, and select the most eligible point for a deep water harbor, to be of ample depth, width and capacity to accommodate the largest ocean going vessels and the commercial and naval necessities of the country, which can be secured and maintained in the shortest time and at the least cost. And the said board of engineers shall report through the secretary of war to the next congress the point selected, and the estimated cost of securing such port. The sum of \$2,000 is asked to foot the cost of such expedition.

Representative Crain has received from Wm. M. Douglas, of Galveston, a formal proposition for submission to congress, in which he agrees for the sum of \$2,250,000, to obtain at least twenty feet of water across the bar at Galveston, payment in installments as increased depth is attained. The government authorities are manifestly averse to committing any great improvements of this character to private parties or to corporations. This spirit prevails in congress as well as in the executive departments, hence there is but little prospect that Mr. Douglas' proposition will command any consideration in official circles.

The measure will be introduced in both houses as an independent measure, and then its friends will be governed by circumstances. If they can see any prospect of getting it through in that shape more readily than as an amendment to the river and harbor bill they will press it. But they will be debarred to attach it to the river and harbor bill if that seems to offer the better plan.

An Erroneous Report.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 7.—In regard to the Boston rumor that President W. B. Strong was to retire from the Santa Fe, which was afterward denied, George W. Nettleton, president of the Kansas City, Springfield & Memphis railroad, whose name was suggested as Mr. Strong's successor, said today: "There is not the slightest foundation for the report. The position has not been offered me, consequently I have not declined it."

Provoking an Outbreak.

MACON, Miss., Jan. 7.—Some fifty men from Huntsville and eight from Bevier, are camped near the new mines operated by the Kansas & Texas Coal company, ten miles south of Macon. It is reported that their purpose is to dissuade the miners from working.

His Prosecution Abandoned.

BERLIN, Jan. 7.—Prof. Geffcken, who has been in custody on the charge of being responsible for the publication in the Deutsche Rundschau of the diary of the late Emperor Frederick, has been released and his prosecution abandoned.

SOL. LUNA'S HERDERS.

An Arizona Report of the Late Border Tragedy.

TUCSON, Jan. 7.—Advices from Solomonville, A. T., say: J. Lassiter, foreman of the Chiricahua Cattle company's camp on Bonita, a tributary of the Gila river, has arrived and brings news of trouble between the company's men and some Mexican sheep men from Apache county which resulted in the killing of at least three Mexicans on Thursday. He states that the Mexicans had been grazing their flocks of sheep near the company's range, which brought on trouble, and that the Mexicans Thursday ambushed some of the company's men. It seems, how-

ever that none of the latter were killed, while it is probable that all the sheep men met their deaths. The under sheriff and coroner have gone to the scene of the trouble.

Another Enoch Arden.

MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—A man named Charest went to California eighteen years ago to seek his fortune, and after some time the news reached the wife that he was dead. She married again, but her second husband was killed by an accident and she married a third husband.

A short time since the first husband appeared with \$23,000 and wished to live with his wife, but she declined. The case is likely to come before the courts.

THE SUGAR QUESTION.

Producers are Opposed to the Bounty System and Want the Free-ent Tariff.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—At a hearing on Saturday afternoon Parkinson and Representative Peters spoke in behalf of the sorghum-sugar producers in Kansas, asserting that if the sugar tariff was disturbed the business would be greatly dejected in the immediate future. They objected to a bounty, because it was likely to be of only temporary duration. Henry Minor and Henry McCall, of Louisiana, on behalf of the sugar planters of that state, spoke against a bounty system and pleaded to be left under present conditions.

Fighting Jake to Sullivan.

BUFFALO, Jan. 7.—Jake Kilrain has issued the following: "In reply to Sullivan I wish to state that the American people will not be humbugged. Sullivan must come to the scratch at the appointed and arrange for the \$20,000 and the Police Gazette diamond belt which represents the championship of the world. Myself, or representatives, will be at the place appointed—Toronto, I mean, as I have been late for Sullivan's excuses about 'leave.' A Boston dispatch says Sullivan and his backers will meet Kilrain at Toronto today."

Under Consideration.

CITY OF MEXICO, via Galveston, Jan. 7.—The government is considering a proposition to erect federal buildings in the capitals of all the states and territories.

BRIEF WRITINGS.

Major E. B. Eno, a well known provision broker of St. Louis, is dead.

James Richard Hallowell Phillips, Shakespearean biographer, died in London.

Col. Dan M. Chase, assistant paymaster in the army, has been placed on the retired list.

Another rare war to Colorado points is in progress, despite the agreement of January 1.

Prince Bismarck's health is in a critical condition and his physicians have ordered the strictest repose.

An earthquake at San Jose de Costa Rica killed and injured a number of people and damaged much property.

The president's recent pardon of five convicted Mormon adulterers is unanimously and heartily condemned.

The marriage of Lawrence Barrett's daughter Gertrude and Mary Anderson's brother Joseph was celebrated in Boston Thursday.

Italy has just launched a new war vessel whose displacement is 13,200 tons, or more than that of England's largest two war ships.

Postmaster Shelley, of Kansas City, has been removed and his successor, Adkins, appointed. Mismanagement is charged against Shelley.

The granite monument of Custer's Michigan cavalry brigade was finished Friday at the scene of the cavalry fight east of Gettysburg.

Grain to the amount of 10,000 bushels and 70 tons of hay were destroyed by the burning of Boston's paving and health department buildings.

The omnibus bill for admission of territories is still a bone of contention among our legislators, with the chances for New Mexico rather slim.

The long delayed pardon papers of Benjamin Hopkins, of the defunct Fidelity bank, arrived last night, and he was taken to his home in Cincinnati.

The New York dry goods store, at Omaha, occupied by A. R. Logie, was gutted by fire at midnight, Wednesday. Loss, \$80,000; insurance, \$40,000.

The Idaho legislature is about to pass a bill requiring that a man must have been out of the Mormon church for three years before being entitled to a vote.

A strong vein of natural gas has been struck in southern county, N. M. The gas was struck at a depth of 700 feet, and in the first rush the drills and casing were blown out.

Dora Eisenbeis, a young German girl near Cleveland, Ohio, was so brutally assaulted by a tramp who attempted to outrage her that her life is despaired of. The tramp escaped.

E. W. Rile, county treasurer of Montague county, Texas, is short in his accounts \$4,000. A called meeting of the county commissioners is now in session considering the matter.

David Erwin, aged 115 years, a resident of Waseka county, Minn., died yesterday and was buried today. He was acquainted with President George Washington and served in the war of 1812.

The wife of Jacob Schroop, the confessed murderer of Antoine Schilling in Philadelphia, has been arrested for complicity in the murder. She is in a hospital, undergoing treatment for cancer.

In his annual message to the legislature Gov. Ames, of Massachusetts, advises an early submission to the people of a prohibition amendment and increased penalties for violations of the liquor laws.

Another case of "didn't know it was loaded" resulted fatally in Indian territory to James Bush, aged 12. The gun was loaded for the battle of San Jacinto, and has never since been discharged until now.

At Laredo, Texas, C. H. Anderson, superintendent of bridge construction on the Mexican National road, and James Sloan, of New York, disagreed over a game of craps, when both drew pistols simultaneously and each fell mortally wounded.

THE THROTTLE PULERS.

Further News About the Compromise with the Burlington Officials.

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—It transpires that Mr. Arthur is going to California, as he says, "on private business for the brotherhood." He denied that his trip had any connection with a threatened strike on the Central Pacific road. Arthur expressed himself as exceedingly well pleased with the "Q" settlement terms, and said they were such that would meet with the approval of the brotherhood men. He declined to make the terms known, but said it was far from an unconditional surrender on the part of the brotherhood. That several items of importance to the brotherhood had been conceded by the Burlington officials.

The local paper says a man standing high in railway circles told a reporter Saturday afternoon that the engineers had abandoned their claim for the abolishment of the trip system and the inauguration of the mileage plan used by other roads. They had also withdrawn the demand for the arbitration of classification or graded pay-roll. On the other hand, the company refused to employ brotherhood men in preference to others, as long as vacancies occurred and would reinstate old men whenever they could. The blacklist is also done away with. It is also reported that the compromise will result in the dismissal of the accusation against the alleged dynamiters, but this is uncertain.

They "Chewed Tobacco."

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 7.—One of Osman Digna's lieutenants has deserted his leader and arrived here. The deserter reports that the rebels are enraged with Osman Digna for seizing their effects and their wives. He gives as reason for such course that the rebels chewed tobacco, which is contrary to the precepts laid down by the Mahdi. He also reports that 2,000 dervishes at Handan are squabbling with Osman Digna concerning the evacuation of the place, a majority of the dervishes being desirous of retiring from the town. The deserter declares that Ermin Bey has been captured and that he is a prisoner at Khartoum, where he is well treated by his captors.

Texas Ball League.

FORT WORTH, Jan. 5.—Representatives of the base ball organization of Galveston, Houston, Waco and Fort Worth met here yesterday and formed a Texas State league for the coming season. Letters were read from Austin, Texasians and Denison asking admission. A salary limit of \$800 was agreed upon, with an extra \$125 per month to the managers. The league will be composed of six clubs, including Austin and Dallas, in addition to the four now organized.

The Germans Repulsed.

ATLACKLAND, Jan. 7.—Advices from Samoa say: The German man of war Olga lost twenty men killed and thirty wounded, of a party of 120 men who went to assist Tamasano against Matafao. The Germans were compelled to retreat to their boats. The commanders of the British and American men of war received an intimation of the German intentions, but they remained inactive.

Fought Forty-nine Rounds.

DES MOINES, Jan. 4.—Two coal miners fought a most brutal fist duel in the presence of 20 men and women in Jasper county yesterday. The men are named Gallagher and Clark. The latter was knocked out in the forty-ninth round. Both were horribly pummeled and disfigured.

A Cardinal Speaks Violently.

PESST, Jan. 7.—At a banquet at the Grand hotel Saturday night Cardinal Simor, primate of Hungary, offered a stinging rebuke to the pope. In a violent speech he denounced Italy's treatment of the pope as infamous.

TIMBER TRESPASS.

Millions Involved in a Government Suit Against the Northern Pacific.

ST. PAUL, Jan. 7.—The most important suit that has been filed in the United States district court for many years was begun yesterday on behalf of the United States government. It is an action against the Northern Pacific Railroad company which involves between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000. It is charged that ever since the road has been built, about 1800, it has been trespassing on government land along its line, cutting government timber and causing great loss and damage to the government. The losses extend to land and timber in various parts of Idaho, Montana territory and Minnesota. In Montana the road has cut over 50,000,000 feet of lumber worth \$1,000,000; in Idaho 10,000,000 feet worth \$200,000; in Washington territory 20,000,000 worth \$4,000,000, and in Minnesota 200,000,000 feet worth \$3,000,000. The road, which was stumping the timber on the lands it owned under the grant, which was every alternate section and which was not yet surveyed, instead of cutting the timber to such alternate sections, cut it continuously along its lines.

The Turbulent Anarchists in Court.

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—Arguments were begun before Judge Foley Saturday on a motion of the Arbeiter Bund to enjoin the police from interfering with their meetings. Arguments were not finished when the court adjourned and were resumed today.

INCORPORATE Santa Fe.

The territory needs a good and effective school law.

Tex Republicans to two Democrats, so stands the council.

Why not organize an electric light company and light the streets.

Divide the territory into smaller districts for prosecuting officials.

The state of New Mexico would prosper and grow. Give us statehood.

And now we will see what the new board of county commissioners will do.

Santa Fe ought to move in the matter of statehood. Wake up, men and brethren.

The El Paso Herald takes a lively interest in New Mexico affairs. Pleading pastime evidently.

After March 4 next, there will be no factions in the Republican party, we hope. Unity makes strength.

SENATOR RICHARD RODEY made an excellent speech in the council on Saturday last in the Prichard-Feeder contest case.

The council did the proper thing in endorsing Hon. Pedro Perea. He has the courage of his convictions and acts accordingly.

The cabinet will not be announced by the president elect till the 20th of February. Hence, hold your peace, gentlemen, till then.

The council bill changing some points of practice in the territorial supreme court was approved by the governor Saturday evening and is now law.

JULIAN is making already strenuous efforts to hold on to the official fief pots, but he will have to go, no less volens, and that soon. The people rejoice.

The territorial supreme court met today. His honor the presiding judge might with great propriety have read an essay on court expenses and fees.

The Republicans of New Mexico should unite upon their candidates for federal offices and then push ahead. Such a course will secure the appointments for residents and good men.

Congress should be memorialized in the matter of cutting down the Mesquero reservation. Nearly 600,000 acres for about 400 Indians is just a little too much. One hundred thousand acres of some of the finest land in New Mexico is good enough for any 400 people. Cut down the reservation.

We understand that F. L. Cowart, U. S. Indian agent at the Mesquero reservation, will resign at once after March 4 next, and that he and his wife and his sons and his nieces and his cousins will return to lovely Alabama. Sensible man he. The sooner he carries out his intention the better all around.

The territory needs a high license law. Such a one would be of great benefit to all around. In places of over 3,000 inhabitants, saloons should pay a license of \$500; in places having from 1,000 to 3,000 inhabitants the license should be \$300, and in places of less than 1,000 inhabitants the license should be \$150. The legislature should take this matter in hand.

Our Democratic contemporaries and the Democratic politicians throughout New Mexico are greatly worried over alleged disensions said to exist in Republican ranks in New Mexico. But they need not, and may just as well possess their souls in peace. The cry of "disension" is simply a bugaboo. When the proper time comes the Republicans of New Mexico will act in harmony and for the best interests of their party and of the territory.

It is reported that during the three years of his incumbency of the office of attorney of the 3d district, Mr. S. M. Ashenfelter has made \$20,000 out of fees and allowances. Is it not about high time that the legislature now in session looked into such matters. In this matter of fees to territorial and county officials it looks to a man up a tree as if the taxpayers of this territory were here solely for the benefit of the officials, and not the officials for the benefit of the territory. Set to work, gentlemen of the legislature, and remedy this evil state of facts.

COL. PRICHARD SEATED.

The Prichard-Feeder contest was settled in the council late Saturday evening by the seating of the contestant, Col. Prichard. While the NEW MEXICAN, as a Republican paper, was naturally disposed to favor Col. Prichard, who was the candidate of the Republican party in a strongly Republican county, it refrained from espousing his cause until convinced beyond a doubt that he had received a majority of the legal votes cast and was really entitled to the seat. We do not believe that might makes right, and we would strongly oppose the unseating of any member of the legislature, for political reasons, if it appeared to be the will and intention of the constituency represented to elect him, but we do believe that it is as cowardly and unjust to do evil for the sake of avoiding the appearance of evil as it is to do wrong for the sake of the benefits, personal or political, that might be derived from wrong doing.

Regarding public opinion the council was placed in a delicate position in this case, as it was and is in other contests before that body, and the danger seemed to be that it would do injustice to the party of the majority rather than heap further defeat on that of a powerless and harmless minority. In other words it was to be feared that the Republican majority, in a spirit of magnanimity, born of victory and power, would choose to wrong themselves, their party, and the people, rather than do an act which might be construed as an outrage against their vanquished and helpless opponents—would stand so straight that they would lean backward, as the saying goes.

Col. Prichard presented a case so clean and strong, however, that no member, imbued by party or personal considerations could vote to keep him out of his seat, and while some members, with exceeding carefulness, saw it to go behind the report of the majority of the elections committee (which presented the case in the most fair, impartial and unpartisan manner) and investigate the matter for themselves, they found nothing to warrant them in opposing that report. The NEW MEXICAN congratulates Col. Prichard and the Republican majority that he does not owe his seat to party bias or feeling. He was fairly elected by a majority of the legal voters of his district, and we believe he will make them as able and faithful a representative as they could have chosen.

NEEDED LEGISLATION.

ADVERTISE THE TERRITORY.

It is to be hoped that the coming legislature will be progressive and liberal enough to make an ample appropriation for the purpose of advertising the territory and inducing immigration. Instead of the system that has heretofore been adopted, let a commissioner be appointed at a good salary to devote his whole time to the matter. Provide him with ample funds for printing and other necessary work and something will be accomplished for the good of the territory. Another thing that would aid the work would be to make an appropriation to each paper in the territory which issues a special edition devoted to the interests of New Mexico, more especially those of its own immediate locality, to be placed in the hands of the intelligence and progress of the community in which it is published. A well sustained local paper is the best advertisement any locality can have.—Socorro Times.

FAVORS STORAGE RESERVOIRS.

The legislature should pass joint memorials to congress strongly urging the passage of acts making appropriations for the building of water storage reservoirs and a deep water harbor on the Texas coast. Both will be very important factors in the development of New Mexico's resources.—Lincoln Independent.
