## Telegraphic Tidings

The District Attorneyship.

SANTA FE, N. M., April 14.—The regular term of the district court opened here this afternoon, Judge Brinker presiding. The court refused to recognize Hon. E. C. Wade as district attorney. The governor's appointee to the district attorneyship, Mr. Bryan, failed to put in an appearance. The court will appoint some one to represent the territory in the absence of Mr. Bryan.

WASHINGTON MATTERS.

THE "SERVICES"

WASHINGTON, April 14.—The president has been compelled to listen to a great many calumnies against applicants for office. The men who circulated these calumnies have come to be known as "spikes."

They earned the title by the persistent manner in which they had performed, or attempted to perform the task of spiking the political guns which have been trained against them. These delegations of "spikes" have no candidates of their own. They have no ambition save to lower the standard of some aspirant.

They annoy the president very much, but he has to listen to them, because he wants the truth, and only the truth, as to the character of men who are looking for public office. He recognizes the animus which incites and moves the "spikes," and yet there is no escape from hearing them traduce one of their neighbors simply because they don't want him to succeed in his quest after salary and distinction.

SOME FEINT TALK.

The president's policy with relation to the southern agitators has been made clear to the southern offices here, and there is not a little unavailing discontent. He has declared his intention to select none but men who have the respect of their neighbors, and who are intelligent and capable. He wants to recognize young men and progressive men, who can do the party good, and will not act merely as leeches for the party because of what they can get out of it. Any distinguished and capable man, who is a Republican in principle whether so by avowal or not, may be selected for appointment. The idea is to get rid of the self-constituted leaders who bring the party into disrepute and to let down all the barriers that keep white protectionists out. It is reported that the president spoke very plainly to a southern "leader" who called with a delegation lately to see about the appointment of the patronage of his state. The same leader had been there many times before, and was assuming to control the patronage of the state. "Now," the president is reported as saying after listening to him for a moment, "you have been here several times and I have heard you. I know you, Mr. —, and know of you very well. I don't think you are the sort of man to distribute the patronage of that state."

COURT MARTIAL.

In the Ames' court martial trial Judge Hubbell appeared as counsel for the accused, Capt. Knox having withdrawn. Judge Hubbell's argument that the major belonged to civil, not military, jurisdiction was set aside and Major Ames entered a plea of not guilty.

THE NEW NAVY YARD.

It is understood that the naval board selected by Secretary Whitney to locate another navy yard on the Pacific coast has decided to report favorably on Puget sound, opposite Seattle.

SOMETHING OF A STAY-ALL.

Jerome B. Burke, chief of the gazette division in the patent office, has been notified by the commissioner of patents that his tendered resignation would be accepted. Burke, however, desires to resign and declares his intention to allow the commissioner to dismiss him if he so desires. Burke is a Grand Army man and was at one time commander of the department of the Potomac.

GONE ABROAD.

Lieut. Parker, of the navy, accompanied the Samoa commission which sailed from New York Saturday, in the capacity of secretary. He was attached to the Adams for three years, and it is expected that his knowledge of Samoa affairs will be of assistance to the commission.

PENSION MATTERS.

Commissioner of Pensions Tanner has issued an order holding that "Whenever a pensioner is disabled in the hand or foot in a degree entitling him to \$24 per month under the act of March 3, 1883, such pensioner shall by reason of that fact be entitled to the rate of \$30 per month under act of August 4, 1886." This order will favorably affect the pensions of some six to eight hundred disabled veterans of the late war.

The pension office has allowed the claim for \$14,000 for arrears of pension to Philip Flood. This advance was made for blindness contracted in the service.

STAR ROUTE CONTRACTS.

The second assistant postmaster-general yesterday began opening bids for carrying the United States mail over 1,500 star and steamboat routes, in several states and territories. About 25,000 bids have been received for this service.

Suits to be Suspended.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Secretary Noble, in a letter to the attorney general, requested that the United States attorney for Montana be directed to suspend all action, civil or criminal, against the Missoula Mercantile company, formerly the Montana Improvement company, and the Northern Pacific railroad, for timber trespass on public lands in Montana, until the same can be investigated, with a view to dismissal, as recommended by the United States district attorney. The amount of lumber involved is over 40,000,000 feet, besides a large amount of cord wood and railroad ties. This action is taken, it is understood, upon information that it will be extremely difficult, if not altogether impossible, for the government at this late day to secure sufficient evidence to maintain these suits.

Flagstaff Folly.

FLAGSTAFF, A. T., April 14.—Louis Wolfley, the newly appointed governor of Arizona, was hanged in effigy here amid great excitement.

The appointment of Wolfley is condemned by the best citizens throughout Arizona, owing to his past record. The citizens of northern Arizona are highly indignant over the veto of the proposed new county bill, creating the county of Coconino, by the governor yesterday. Charges have been brought forward that the veto was purchased by the bondholders of the Prescott &amp; Arizona Central railroad for \$30.

Texas Road.

St. Louis, April 12.—Advices from Texas say that, in spite of all denials,

there is no doubt but that the St. Louis &amp; San Francisco company has bought the Dallas &amp; Fort Worth division of the Santa Fe and will take charge on May 1. Two hundred gravel cars will begin work in a few days to ballast up the road to Dallas. When placed in proper condition the run from Dallas to St. Louis will be made in twenty-two hours. The people of Paris continue daily suing for the recovery of certain property donated the Santa Fe for depot, yards and shops when they abandoned it because the company has failed to keep its contract with the city.

Chicago's Sewerage.

SEASIDE, April 14.—The bill which proposes to drain Chicago's sewerage into the Mississippi river through the ship canal and Illinois river, passed the house after a hard struggle.

OFFICIAL AND POLITICAL.

Short Items of a New Year Gathered Here and There.

Judge Long opened the regular term of the district court at Las Vegas today.

County Commissioner Geo. L. Wyllis took the oath of office at Cerrillos and qualified by filing his official bond with Clerk Garcia.

Capt. A. M. Swan, editor of the Gallup Review, is strongly indorsed for the Gallup post office and his chances are counted as good.

Judge Brinker opened the regular Soconito term of the district court this morning. The vexed question of the district attorneyship is probably on today.

Ex-County Commissioner Green is up from Cerrillos to-day consulting with Hon. N. B. Laughlin and Col. Smith relative to the Indian land proceedings.

Joseph B. Harrison has resigned his position as assistant clerk of the district court of this district, and will remove with his family to his former home in Indiana.

Col. E. L. Bartlett left New York on Friday last and is now again in Washington where his prospects for the surveyor generalship are said to be growing brighter daily.

The deeds to the land on which the agricultural college will be built are being transferred, and by tomorrow the transfer of the property to the territory will be made. So says the Las Cruces News.

Judge McFie has decided not to hold court in Lincoln county this month, from the known fact that a term of court was held in February and there are no cases now crying for speedy adjustment.

Mrs. J. H. Teats, prison representative of the W. C. T. U., who lives at Las Vegas, has declared her intention to print her side of the story in the Optic this afternoon.

The members of hose company No. 1 last night all united in a written petition to President Harrison, asking the appointment of W. D. Kistler, of this city, to the position of secretary of New Mexico.

Col. D. B. Abraham, of this city, has been strongly indorsed for the New Mexico Pueblo Indian agency and is said to have strong backing at Washington. He is a most excellent business man; a consistent Republican, and in every respect thoroughly qualified for the position.

According to the New Mexican's information from the national capital the chances of Mr. Ben Luclock, of Watrous, for being the new internal revenue collector are very materially on the wane, while Mr. L. A. Hughes' chances are correspondingly on the increase.

In the case to test the validity of the meat inspection law of New Mexico, which has been instituted by Fred Harvey, the hearing will be held before Judge Brinker at Socorro at a date during April and yet unnamed. Neill B. Field, of Albuquerque, will argue the case in behalf of the beef producers and butchers of the National association. Mr. Harvey, will be represented by able attorneys and a right spirited debate is anticipated. Great interest is felt in the result.

A Washington dispatch of the 11th inst. says: "Messrs. Dwyer, Griffin and Lesnet, of the New Mexican delegation, left for home last night. Dwyer was one of the candidates for governor. Al. Morrison, another one of the defeated candidates, is applying for an Indian inspection. Dwyer, after seeing to the confirmation of Prince, the successful candidate for governor, has indorsed his other competitor, and now goes home rejoicing as a private citizen."

DIAMOND DUST.

Mr. Geo. Cuyler Preston has agreed to undertake the organization of a home talent base ball team about May 1. Good enough.

All our former league players are making a fine record in Texas. Capt. Jones of the Waco team has thus far won four straight games and lost none.

Lieut. Van Vliet is an enthusiastic base ballist and himself plays a fine game in almost any position. He is counted one of the best umpires in the west.

Those St. Michael's college seniors can play a little ball themselves. They are fine batters and fielders, and the town boys will have to lump themselves to beat them this season.

The soldier boys are a little out of trim just now, and yesterday's game made them sore in the flesh, but in a few days they will be permanently organized. Then look out for the beginning of the summer's sport.

In yesterday's game on the college grounds between a picked nine from Fort Marcy and the St. Michael's college team the score resulted 5 to 5 at the end of the ninth inning. At this time the game closed because two of the Fort Marcy boys had to join in the plaza concert.

Intelligent Witnesses.

Some very amusing evidence is occasionally introduced before the land office at Las Cruces. One witness recently testified that he had a mahogany bedstead in his house. On cross examination he stated that it was a very rustic pattern, and had the bark on. It was made from mountain mahogany. Another witness testified that he had a glass window in his house, and when questioned closely acknowledged that it consisted of an auger hole bored through a log, with a bottle stuck in it. Still another testified that he had a board floor in his residence. When asked what kind of boards his floor was composed of, said that it consisted of auger holes bored in the dirt. None of these people were from Grant county.—Enterprise.

## THE LAND BOOMERS.

Concessions by the Secretary of the Interior.—The Great Invasion.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—In answer to an inquiry from the secretary of war in behalf of a large number of persons contemplating settlement in Oklahoma, asking if permission is given to these intended settlers to cross the Cherokee outlet to the north line of Oklahoma, about the 22d of April, the date upon which the president's proclamation opening the territory goes into effect, the secretary of the interior has replied in part as follows:

"I think they may be allowed to cross without extraordinary delay; and I therefore recommend you to instruct your commanding officers to place no obstruction in the way of persons who desire to journey in good faith in a quiet, peaceful and orderly manner upon and along the highway, post or military roads or established and customary cattle trails through the Cherokee outlet in going forward to the tract to be opened to settlement."

Care should be taken to have the Indians understand that by this passage there is no disposition to appropriate their lands and that it will be continued no longer than necessary. After the first migration to the Oklahoma country is over, the military forces should then sweep the Cherokee outlet, and require all persons unlawfully there to move on—either back to Kansas or over the Oklahoma lands. The secretary in another part of the letter, says he believes settlers are entitled to as much consideration as has been given to cattlemen and others heretofore, who have been permitted to travel through the outlet.

It is urged upon the secretary, among other reasons for granting this permission, that settlers coming through the Cherokee and other Indian lands are gathering the immense herds of cattle, and are thus putting those in Kansas who must pass through the Cherokee outlet, at a disadvantage. No movement will be allowed under this permit until full authority and instructions shall be received by the military having the matter in charge.

The recommendations of Secretary Noble were laid before the president by Secretary Proctor, and after consideration an order bearing upon the subject was sent from the war department this afternoon to the army officers in charge of the forces of the Indian territory, prescribing the manner in which they were to carry out effect Secretary Noble's recommendations.

A Standard Gauge.

SALT LAKE, April 13.—General Manager D. C. Dodge of the Denver &amp; Rio Grande Western railway here says that the road will be standard gauge this summer whether the Denver &amp; Rio Grande reaches Grand Junction or not. New steel rails will be laid outside the narrow gauge as fast as eight-foot ties are laid. When all is down the narrow gauge will be removed. Sleepers will be run from Grand Junction to San Francisco.

Poisoned by Wild Parsnips.

ST. JOSEPH, April 13.—Four children of Sebastian Merdan, a German farmer, while playing in the fields ate roots of wild parsnips, which had been picked up. They soon became very sick and three of them died in terribly agonies. They were boys of 6 and two girls 4½ years old. Another girl aged 3 who also ate some of the poisonous roots is still living and may recover.

Suppressing Cigarettes.

LANSING, Mich., April 13.—The house has passed the Jackson cigarette bill which prohibits "the manufacture, sale or keeping for sale or giving of any cigarettes or any imitation thereof composed in whole or in part of tobacco, or any substance in the form of cigarette, containing narcotic element, or any rice paper or any paper designed for cigarette wrappers."

Prince may be given the grandest welcome ever received by any governor of New Mexico.

**FINAL ARRANGEMENTS.**  
Since the above was placed in type this morning the committees have been hard at work and have now perfected all details for the reception of Gov. Prince. As near as can be definitely stated at this writing the governor will reach Santa Fe on the 11:30 train Wednesday forenoon. If any change in this respect is made necessary due and timely notice will be given in these columns.

The executive committee have designated the following named gentlemen to proceed to Las Vegas and there meet Gov. Prince and escort him to the capital city.

At 11 o'clock the procession will proceed from the plaza to the A. T. & S. F. depot.

Upon the arrival of the train Gov. Prince and the citizens accompanying him will be met by the reception committee, assigned carriages, and then the procession will again form and retrace its steps as far as the front door of the capitol. Here upon a commodious platform will occur the inauguration ceremonies. Rev. Dr. Meany will lead in prayer, after which Hon. Geo. W. Lane, territorial secretary, will administer the oath of office to the new governor. Hon. S. B. Axtell will then deliver the address of welcome, followed by Larkin G. Read, esq., who will speak on behalf of our Spanish-American populace. After a response by Gov. Prince the procession will resume its march and proceed via bridge street to the plaza, thence via Lincoln avenue to Fort Marcy, through the Fort Marcy military reserve to Grant avenue; thence via the United States court house building to Washington avenue and thence to the plaza, where the procession will disband and each will be escorted to his residence on Palace avenue. During the passage of the procession through the military reserve a salute will be fired by the Fort Marcy guns. In the evening Gov. Prince will be tendered a social reception at the Palace hotel.

## OUR U. S. BUILDING.

The Handsome Public Structure Turned Over to Col. McGorty by the Contractors.

Some Description of It—A Splendid Addition to Santa Fe Public Institutions.

Santa Fe's handsome United States court house building was transferred by Superintendent Brigham on Saturday to Col. J. P. McGorty, the government custodian, authorized by the treasury department to accept the work of the contractors, Messrs. Donoghue & Monier. With the exception of receiving a few finishing touches from the painter's brush, the building is now completed.

The structure occupies ground space 60x150 feet. The basement is used for the steam heating apparatus and for storage for the different offices. The first floor is divided into ten spacious office rooms, will be occupied by the register and receiver of the United States land office, the surveyor general and the collector of internal revenue. Two of these offices have spacious vaults. There is also a lavatory on this floor conveniently arranged for the accommodation of the officials and their clerical forces.

On the second floor is the United States court room, 50x35 feet, with a gallery on the west end of the hall for use of the judges. On this floor also are the offices of the United States attorney, clerk, and two large rooms for the United States grand and petit juries. The building is well lighted and the corridors and rooms are unusually large.

The heating and ventilating apparatus is of the latest and best, and is in the opinion of the superintendent the most complete of anything of the kind in the territory, every room being supplied with cold, pure air directly from the exterior. This comes once in contact with the fresh air from the rooms on the first floor and is then the direct radiator for the rooms of the second floor, where it is heated and distributed.

Every office room in the building will be carpeted, and the furniture will be of both a substantial and elaborate character. Inside shades and outside awnings will be provided for the entire building. Information from Washington is to the effect that contracts for this latter work and for furnishing the buildings will be let in a few days, and it is now the intention to have the structure in every respect ready for occupancy within six weeks.

The government appropriation for completing the building amounted to \$52,148, and this has been most judiciously expended under the direction of Col. McGorty. As is well known, the walls of the building are of a first story having been completed for years, and representing a very rough and unsightly work, but under the supervision of Architect Brigham regularity, order and beauty have replaced this rough work and the building is much more attractive in exterior appearance than it was at first thought possible to make it. It stands it could probably not be duplicated for \$125,000.

The contractors, Messrs. Donoghue & Monier, have done their work well. The sub-contractors for the different branches of work on the building were: Plumbing, J. F. McKeen, Santa Fe; steam heating, J. F. McKeen, Santa Fe; carpenter work, Antonio Windsor, Santa Fe; painting, Samuel I. Pope & Co., Chicago; painting, James Bell, Santa Fe. Each of these has executed his contract in a first-class, workmanlike manner.

Messrs. Donoghue & Monier also have the contract for putting \$10,000 worth of improvements on the spacious grounds surrounding the structure, which work they are now pushing to completion.
