SANTA FE, N. M., April 3.—A compact has been signed by the Estancia Savings Bank and Walter L. Regal, president of the First National bank of Mountainair, acting as agent for the Farmers and Stockmen's bank of Estancia where the business of the Estancia savings bank is sold to the Farmers and Stockmen's bank. The transaction was made at the close of business Saturday. J. N. Burton is president of the Farmers' and stockmen's bank.

This is the third important deal involving the banks of Torrance county, made within the past two months. The First National bank of Wilcox was purchased by the interests who controlled the Citizens' State bank of Mountainair, the name changed to the First National bank of Mountainair and was moved to Mountainair and merged with the other state banks. The new bank then purchased the assets of the Mountainair State bank from the owners of that institution, and assumed its deposits, making the largest and strongest bank in the country. Walter L. Kevil, formerly auditor of the First National bank of Santa Fe, is president of the First National bank of Mountainair. The assets of the First National bank show total about \$140,000.

**Las Cruces Chamber
Plans Tourist Camp
Mile East of Town**

LAS CRUCES, N. M., April 3.—Plans are in motion to establish a tourist, camping and picnic ground near the mile east of town. The project is backed by the Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce, represented by a special committee consisting of Gustave Muccio, Carl Charles Hill and Fred S. Hess.

Mr. Frank Weisenhorn, a director of the chamber, who suggested the plan, said the camping ground and grove would be a great attraction for cross-country tourists, as well as visitors from points in New Mexico and West Texas.

JILLINS STOPPED IN ADDRESS AND WOMAN IS SHOT

British Republican Army
Breaks up Meeting
At Castlebar

BLINN, April 3.—(By The Associated Press)—The meeting addressed by Michael Collins at Castlebar, County Mayo, last night, was stopped by members of the British Western division of the Irish republican army after stormy scenes in which a woman was wounded by a bullet, according to reports reaching Dublin this morning.

The chief of the provisional government and his party returned to Dublin, and the officer who organized the meeting at Blinn followed, declaring that none would be allowed to leave until Collins and his friends had surrendered their arms.

The accounts received here do not indicate the number of persons dispersed, merely saying the one people who left the house were searched.

The telegraph wires around Castlebar were cut, and when the newspaper correspondents there decided to train for Athlone they were ordered to return to the station because of the inclemency of the weather. The newspaper was convened in the bar of an automobile where they met J. A. McNamee, a member of the British army with Commandant Kavanagh and his staff. The commandant stated that Mr. McNamee had been sent to Blinn to draw a decision from the side of the contestants. He believed he was the last British man, said to be Captain of the British army, a member of the Collins party, who surrendered and was accepted.

According to Mr. Collins' emissary and the representatives of the British Independent, Dublin informed him that he had visited Mr. McNamee in the barracks and found him in a cell with only a pincushion for bed and no bedding. "Lincoln's Grandfather Believed To Have Been Found

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J., April 3.—The son of Abraham Lincoln, grandfather of the president, has been found in a church yard here, in the belief of several abolitionists who recently have started an extensive investigation.

The investigators found two sets of their inscriptions melted away by long exposure to the elements—which they believe mark the grave of the ancestor of a confederate who died in 1785 within sight of his birthplace before the eyes of his son.

According to H. C. Hallinan, attorney, who has made a preliminary investigation of deeds in the Jefferson county court house, the excavation warrants the belief the hand pointing the church yard is part of the ancient property, which includes the site.

Additional details of the death of the emancipator's grandfather have not yet been revealed by the investigation.

**DEEP OIL TESTS
WILL BE MADE
NEAR MAGDALENA**

Discoverers of Mexico Field to Begin Operations in New Mexico

Mr. Charles P. O'Connor, of Philadelphia, president of the Texas-Magdalena oil company, who is in Albuquerque today, announced that his company will begin immediately a series of deep tests for oil in the Valencia-decora county, eastern part of Magdalena, which forms the company's principal operating area.

Mr. O'Connor and his associates have been working for two years in this region, conducting extensive geological investigations and blocking out acreage. Their attention was first directed to the district by the report of Dean Winslow to the United States geological survey on what is known as the Red Lake Anticline, between Parley and Brundin mountains, in Colorado, and Valencia counties, and the first well will be drilled on that structure. It will go to 10,000 feet unless oil should be encountered at lesser depths. Tests will be drilled on the Red Lake Anticline and the same through test will be given to the same. Drilling done, assuming promising information in the previous work, which a number of distinguished geologists have reported favorably. The operations of the Texas-Magdalena company will furnish the first thorough tests for oil that have been conducted in western New Mexico.

Mr. O'Connor and his associates will move to the Red Lake Anticline well as soon as possible. The geologist who located that well made the location for the New Mexico test and the drilling will be directed by the driller who brought in the Mexican well.

Operations on the Red Lake Anticline will be under way by the middle of May. The first test will begin in the ground within two weeks.

Stewart's Trial at Las Cruces Tuesday

LAW OFFICES, N. M., April 3.—Trial of Wesley Stewart, charged with killing G. L. Major, set to begin Monday, was continued until Tuesday. Judge Edwin H. McLean said Stewart was indicted by the grand jury. He is alleged to have shot Major when the latter attempted to shoot off a water gun on the Stewart farm in the Pinoso district, half miles west of Las Cruces. He is being held at the state penitentiary.

U. S. Cannot Sign White Slave Treaty Of World League

PHILADELPHIA, April 3. (UPI)—The American government is in no position to sign the white slave convention proposed by the League of Nations, as it conflicts with the police regulations of certain states in the Union. Secretary of State Hughes has notified the League secretary here.

The American government, however, is fully willing to take the lead in the fight against prostitution and vice, and has passed laws to the same effect, Mr. Hughes points out.

**FIVE INDICTED IN
THEATER COLLAPSE
COSTING 98 LIVES**

Men Connected With Construction Accused Of Manslaughter

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Five of the nine men held by the court-martial as responsible for the collapse January 22 of the Knobelsdorff theater with the loss of 98 lives were indicted yesterday on charges of manslaughter. The other four men were exonerated, the grand jury determining their exemption from the construction of the building was sufficient to make them criminally liable.

Those indicted are: Regimental Quartermaster, Captain W. G. Gease, architect of the theater; John Howard Ford, of the United Iron Works, who revised the original plans for the steel roof structure; Donald Wallace, general foreman of Frank J. Wagner, contractor for construction of the theater; Edward H. Chappell, foreman for the Holman Fire Proofing company, which had the subcontract for ceiling and masonry work, and James H. Dismann, assistant building inspector during the period of the theater's construction.

Frank Gease, charged with driving a car while under the influence of liquor and Thomas Clark, who was alleged to have been driving the auto with Gease, were fined \$100 each and sentenced to 20 days in jail. The fine on Gease was imposed because of his conduct before he was arrested.

The case of David Canfield and Ed Drewes, charged with fighting last night, was also dismissed and a verdict was returned.

Four women who were tried into court on the charge of violating the parking ordinance were dismissed with a lecture.

It was alleged that the Robinsons failed to make returns to the government as to wool sold outside the government, thus depriving the person this commodity was under contract of the war industries board and that Mathews failed to report his dependency.

Burch Trial Goes Over for a Week

LOS ANGELES, April 3.—The trial of Arthur C. Burch, indicted on a charge of the murder of J. Colton Kennedy, born last August, was adjourned to the first week in June, pending the completion of an investigation of reports of the existence of the man held incommunicado with Burch.

Two watchmen were kidnapped. One was found bound and gagged. The other was forced to aid the robbers.
