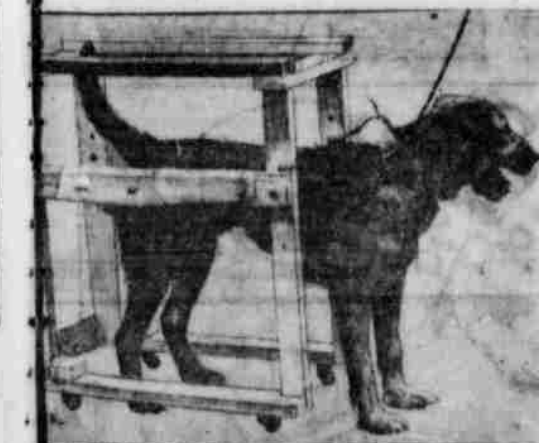

### NO SIGHT OF PEACE IN COAL STRIKE

#### Week Passes With Both Sides Maintaining Positions

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The first week of the nation-wide coal strike has not shown any signs of settling down. The coal fields are still closed and the coal shortage is still acute. The miners have not yet accepted any terms and the operators have not yet made any concessions. The situation remains as tense as ever.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., April 8.—Jean P. Day, millionaire political power of Oklahoma, was exonerated by a coroner's jury following a dramatic trial by Day and his wife of the killing of Colonel Paul W. Beck, American senator.



The jury found that Beck was accidentally slain by Day. Day's explanation followed a dramatic trial by Day and his wife of Beck's attack on Mrs. Day.

The jury, seated in the courtroom with a judge by Coroner A. W. McWilliams, was out only about a half hour.

## Estancia Line Man Reports Robbery in Tijeras Canyon

A. A. Brewer, driver for the Estancia stage line, held up by three masked men in Tijeras Canyon early last night and robbed of \$2,900 in currency, according to Brewer's report to the police.

Brewer says he was driving for Estancia when he came to a bad place in the road in the canyon and was compelled to slow down. He did as another car headed towards Albuquerque drove up behind him and stopped. Two of the men in the stage car jumped out and one of them putting a revolver into Brewer's side as he sat in the car, demanded, "Hands up."

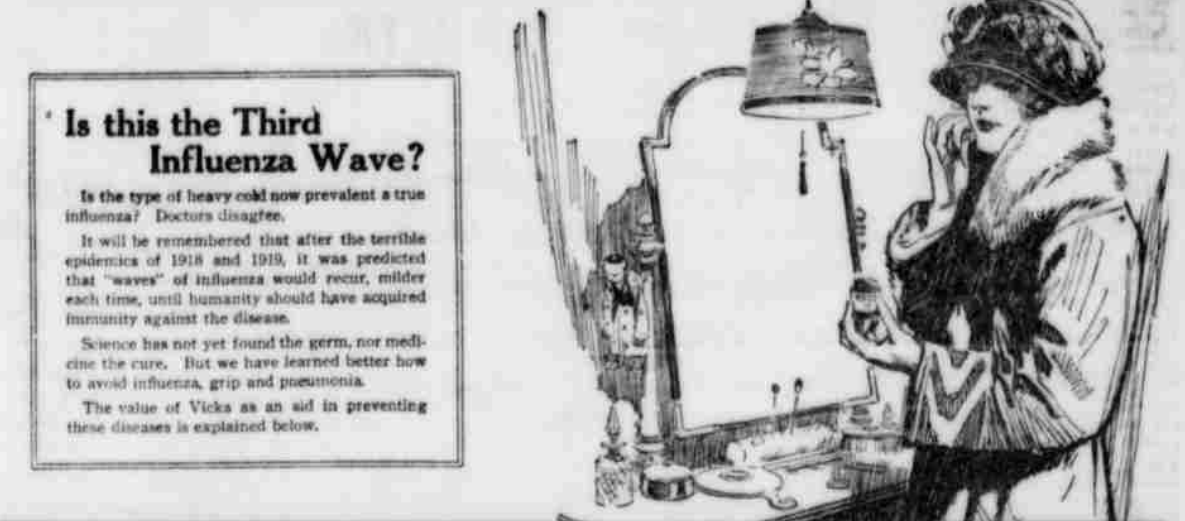

### CELSO LOVATO SHOT BY SANTIAGO BACA, VERDICT

#### Coroner's Jury at Belen Hears Testimony of Four Witnesses

That Celso Lovato, county commissioner of Valencia county, "came to his death from a gunshot wound" and that the "bullet was in the hand of Santiago Baca," his brother-in-law, was the verdict of a coroner's jury which was convened at Belen yesterday morning. Baca is being held in jail at Los Lunas and will be given a preliminary hearing Monday on a manslaughter charge. The coroner's jury heard four witnesses, all eye-witnesses of the shooting. They testified that Baca fired at Lovato in the latter was advancing toward him and appearing to him to be taking him home. Baca was testified, was flourishing a revolver, and asserting that no one was big enough to take him home. The shooting was last Tuesday evening on the street of Belen, following the closing of the polls in a rather exciting city election. The inquest was held in the court of Justice Telesforo Aragon and members of the jury were Vinze Baca, chairman; Prospero Garcia, secretary; Eladio Baca, Eugenio Cortez, Juan H. Sanchez and Fred Chavez. The verdict as reported was: "We the undersigned coroner's jury duly impaneled in justice of peace court, precinct 3, Belen, on investigation into the death of Celso Lovato, deceased, find on investigation that Celso Lovato came to his death from a gunshot wound. We also find that the wound was inflicted with a pistol which was in the hands of Santiago Baca at the time the shot was fired."

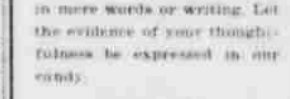

**Harding Shakes Hands Annually With 150,000 Persons**

 WASHINGTON, April 8 (United Press).—President Harding, carrying out his policy of the open door at the white house, is shaking hands annually with more than 150,000, close friends estimate. He is breaking all white house handshaking records, the oldest at-lackey says. The handshaking list probably averages close to 2,500 a week, counting the numerous white house receptions at official society and the scores of conventions which meet in the capitol each year.

As a result tourist guides and rubberneck wagon managers are reaping a golden harvest. With the coming of spring, hundreds of out-of-town visitors troop up to the white house daily to shake hands with President Harding. If they have the proper letter of introduction from their congressman—who in view of the approaching campaign is only too glad to loan these—they are likely to have little trouble in passing by the alert secret service men into the big round room where President Harding works.

Whole schools, sometimes numbering 400 or 500 students, flock in scores from almost every convention that meets in Washington are sure of being received by the president. School teachers, lodge members and large families crowd into the small executive offices and stand in line to be ushered into the president's office.

Since the preliminaries are arranged through a friendly congressman or senator, the rest is easy. The delegation gathers in the white house grounds in front of the executive office just before one o'clock, when the president's business engagements for the day are supposed to end. Police officers and secret service men line up the visitors in double file and start them back through the corridor to the president's office in the rear of the building. Two secret service men man the door leading into the

president's office and the visitors are guided into single file and each is passed by the guards. All are requested to keep their hands out of their pockets and no one is allowed to carry packages. The United States secret service takes no chances.

# NEW ENGLAND STARTS UNIFORM ROAD MARKING

## Plan Is Expected to Spread Throughout The U. S.

BOSTON, Mass., April 8.—What is expected to develop into a uniform road marking system for the entire country is being inaugurated in New England.

Roads hitherto marked by lines and symbols that confused rather than helped motorists are being numbered so that no doubt may arise in the mind of strangers as to the correctness of their routes.

Red, blue and yellow bands are being painted out in Massachusetts. The various markings along the New Hampshire roads are disappearing and the individual state highway designations in Maine, Vermont, Rhode Island and Connecticut are giving way to the new system.

**New Symbol.**  
Instead of those there will be a uniform symbol on all the highways. Federal, state and local—a large yellow square, with a heavy black border. Within the square will be a black numeral—the number of the road according to a systematic designation of all the country's highways.

The symbol and other details of this new plan were decided upon at a recent meeting of the Automobile Club of America, the New England Hotel Men's association, Automobile Blue Book publishers and highway officials from all the New England states.

**Numbering System.**  
Route No. 1 is to run north and south along the Atlantic coast from the international boundary at Maine, Me., down to New York and eventually to the southern end of Florida.

In the same manner other main highways will be extended, in accordance with this numbering system, so that all designations will be the same throughout the country.

Mr. M. Wells, chief road man of the Automobile Club of America, is plotting the routes and numbering them. Short state routes, not reaching beyond state boundaries, are to be numbered also.

The lettering will be four inches high. The larger highways will be numbered from 1 to 100, with six-inch black numerals within the uniform square.

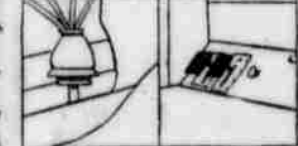
The numbering plan will not interfere with naming the routes, Mr. Wells, but will help motorists keep on the same highway.

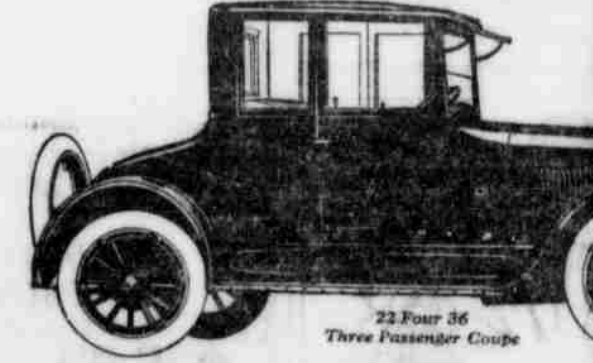

Authorities fought the disease from its start with great determination. They slaughtered sheep whenever an outbreak occurred.

Wool was utilized and sold in cases to far coal bunkers like in all 42 counties infected with the disease.

The British government has three million dollars to help in the fight against the disease.

It is almost certainly predicted that the disease will be completely eradicated in the United States.

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Enemy Nations and Russia to Meet Victors in Conference At Genoa Beginning Monday

By J. W. T. MASON (Written for the United Press) Whether Europe is to remain unified in economic and territorial rivalry or to re-operate for general salvation will be decided at the Genoa conference which opens Monday, April 10. For the first time since the ending of the war, the enemy nations and Russia will be permitted to meet in a friendly conference. There will be little conflict between the victors and the vanquished as a whole and the conference will be a success. The conference at Genoa will be attended by France and Great Britain.

The Genoa conference is likely to witness an Anglo-French struggle for the economic leadership of Europe. Great Britain wants the enemy nations and Russia to be treated leniently and assisted to their feet. So that there can be a quick revival of international trade. France is interested only in the enemy nations. The French people are largely self-supporting and do not depend primarily on foreign goods for their prosperity. They want France to be the center of the world and demand that Russia recognize her foreign obligations before there is any French aid about helping everybody at large to prosper.

THE FRENCH WAR INDEMNITY The French have succeeded in having their claims on the war indemnity from the Genoa conference. If France's delegates can hold the representatives of the other nations to this policy during the two months which the conference is expected to last, France's claims will have secured a victory. Despite the absence of the representatives of the other nations, however, there are ways by which it may be brought to the front. M. Poincaré threatens to advise the French delegates to leave the conference if this is done.

Should such a crisis arise, the European powers will then have to decide whether they will proceed with the presentation of Europe to a general conference, while the French are out. France's delegates are expected to be in a position to force the other nations to recognize the French claims. The Chamber of Deputies and a new government, perhaps headed by Clemenceau, may be formed. France's interests are being protected. 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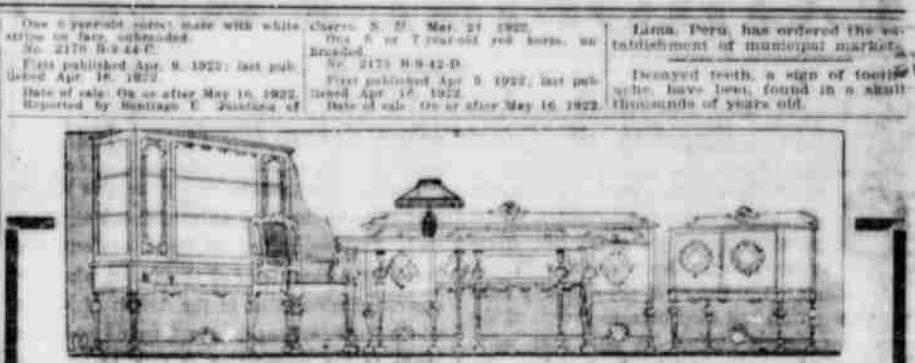

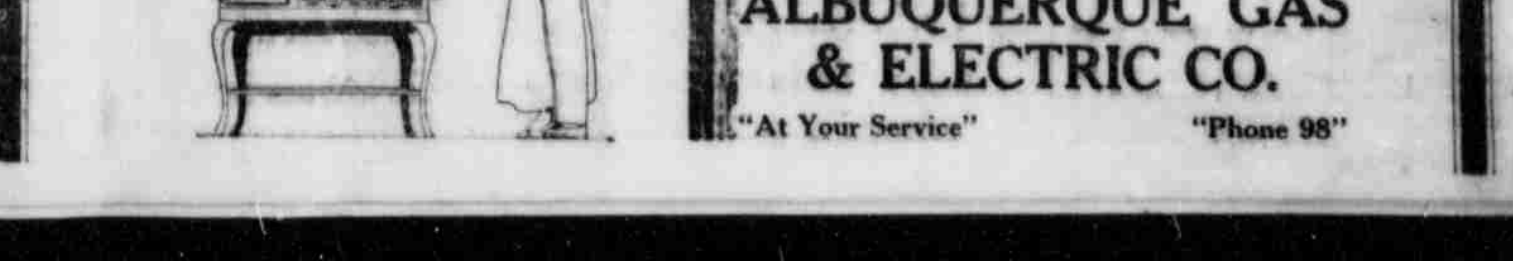

Perhaps the Mosquitoes Should Be Left to Flourish: Enough of Them May Sting Us Into Action

ONE of the promises made for the new city administration was that it would provide immediate relief for Albuquerque from the mosquito nuisance.

It was stated in behalf of the new city commissioners that had they been in charge of the city government during the past four years they would most certainly have taken the steps suggested by various engineers and experts in mosquito extermination as necessary to relieve this city of a serious pest.

No doubt that assurance made some votes for the new commissioners. It should have had influence with thousands who have suffered.

The Herald's first impulse was to indulge in riotous rejoicing over the fact that we now have a city government pledged to exterminate the mosquitoes and that it is undoubtedly fully qualified to carry out the pledge.

An event occurred during the past week, however, which has caused us to wonder if a little delay in the war on the mosquitoes might not be wise.

A meeting of the associated committees on drainage and reclamation was held in the Chamber of Commerce Monday night. The

purpose of the meeting was to receive the report of the committee on permanent organization. The report was an important one, prepared by a committee of three men who gave careful consideration to the details of a plan, which if properly carried out, would add thousands to the population of this valley, and many millions of dollars to its wealth and annual productive power.

In addition to the manager of the Chamber of Commerce, three men were present at that meeting. Capt. W. C. Reid, of the state drainage commission was one of them; F. S. Donnell, a member of the committee on organization, was another, and Edmund Ross, county engineer, was the third. Mr. Donnell presented the report to the assembled four.

The mosquitoes are a pest. They are dangerous to health, destructive to comfort, and can counteract a large part of the most efficient climate advertising that Albuquerque can do.

But on mature consideration we believe that the new city government might let them alone for a time. If they thrive and multiply long enough they may sting us into action.

The Primary Fails Its Creators

(Chicago Tribune)

A direct primary for the nomination of candidates for various state, legislative, congressional, and local offices will be held April 11. Some of the voters who go to the polls will know how to vote for a man or woman. Some will recognize a name and there because it has been used in prior many times. Some will vote for a candidate because his name indicates a certain nationality.

Others will vote for Bohemian names, Irish for Irish, Poles for Poles, Swedes for Swedes, etc. Most of the candidates will be entirely unknown as to character, ability, and even identity to most of the voters.

Candidates may be known to the sections in which they live and unknown elsewhere. They may be known by partisan labels and by no other. A democratic candidate may be known as a Democrat, a republican as a republican, a progressive as a progressive, a socialist as a socialist, and so on. Any one can make his own selection on the basis of the intelligence of the vote which will be cast.

The voters are unqualified by information for the task they have to perform. They are unqualified by nationalistic considerations, by race, and by color. They are controlled in masses by bosses and organizations.

In many of the primary elections in this state a candidate with a screw loose in his head received a large vote for one of the most important offices the state can fill. Those voters who did not know a thing about him voted for him because they liked his game.

A woman picking a horse in a horse race for her own money did not pick the Kentucky winner, "Da Card," as a much more qualified as a racing expert as the average voter in Chicago will have to pick candidates in the primary, next week.

A political method of theoretical perfection is a practical failure, and the citizens can see their candidates by looking at the cards which have been holding office under the direct primary. No republican

state convention would have nominated such a man as Small. The selection would have been made on the basis of his name, and they would have been afraid he would make a poor rat under the fire of his opponents.

No person could nominate him under the direct primary by throwing a great big organization to his support in communities which do not know the political record. The voters who are unqualified to make every office would not go in with the conventional system, because the bosses, knowing the character and ability of each candidate, would not give them the support they deserve. The bosses would select the man they think best qualified to do the job, and they would not give the voters a chance to elect a man who is not qualified for the job.

It is not necessary to go back to the old caucus days to see how the voters were controlled. These days are lawless because of the bossism and corruption of the caucus. In the coming primary an agency such as the National Association of Manufacturers and for the good of the community and for the good of the country, do it. The voters are unqualified by information for the task they have to perform. They are unqualified by nationalistic considerations, by race, and by color. They are controlled in masses by bosses and organizations.

MOVING FORWARD

A direct primary for nomination of candidates for state, judicial, congressional and all other elective offices will be held in the state of Illinois on April 11.

Admitting its responsibility as one of the powerful influences that helped to fasten the direct primary on Illinois, the Chicago Tribune gives us a kind of editorial shudder of apprehension at what is likely to result from its creation, in the way of candidates.

In an editorial, reprinted on this page today, the Tribune announces itself fully and frankly as a convert to the growing opposition to the direct primary as "a political method of theoretical perfection," but "a practical failure."

UNSATISFIED MINDS

IN the current number of "The Independent," Henry Vandyke has "a message for Religious Book Week," which has just been observed. He says that a home without a library is poorly furnished, and that a library is not a library without religious books. "It has no message," he says, "and no sustenance for that part of our nature which, however it comes to us, is beyond doubt the most important, because its needs are so vital that to leave them unsatisfied means intellectual and moral starvation."

Dr. Van Dyke holds that "one reason why some of the younger generation (and quite as many if not more of the older generation) seem to have frivolous, restless, and unsatisfied minds today, is because so many of our modern homes have no real religious books in them. Old volumes of sermons, perhaps, and records of theological disputes and quarrels may be found in dusty corners of the bookcase or on the top shelves of closets. But those are not what I mean by real religious books. I mean books which in any form—fiction, poem, essay, biography, or autobiography, deal with the most and ultimate desires of the human spirit and with man's natural longing for a better understanding of and a more perfect harmony with the great source of life and its final goal. Books of this kind are of the deepest interest and of the highest value. Some of them are ancient, and of these it seems to me the Bible is incomparably the best, not only for its literary excellence in the English version, but also for its indelible and inexplicable power of inspiration."

But there are also modern books, thoroughly up to date in their knowledge and treatment of the conditions under which we people of today have to live, and entirely frank in their way of facing and meeting our present problems and needs as they change their form almost from year to year, yet remain always essentially the same. Among the best of these modern books, it seems to me, are "A Laborer's Testament," an Autobiography, by Dr. Wilfred D. Grenfell; "What Men Live By," by Dr. Richard C. Cabot; "The Direction of Human Evolution," by Edwin Grant Conklin; "Christ and Life and the Light of the World," by Robert E. Speer. I do not know the names of the publishers of these books, so you may be sure that they are not mentioned for advertising purposes. I speak of these among many others doubtless of similar quality, only because they seem to me excellent as well as modern. Anyone who will read them will find that they help him not only to defend his liberty to believe, but also to maintain his liberty in believing.
