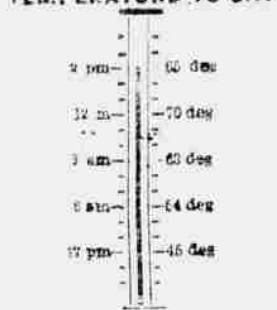

SANTA FE WINS.

all the First Fruit Prizes at the Ter-Minorial Fair Come to Our Valley.

The Collection to Go East—Horticulture in New Mexico—What the Exhibit Cars Do.

Again Santa Fe carries off first honors for horticultural products at the territorial fair. The exhibit which Mr. Arthur Boyle took to Albuquerque and placed in the fair one week ago, proved one of the most attractive features of fair week, and challenged the admiration of every visitor. All were free to admit that there was nothing in New Mexico that could approach it, and for Mr. Grant Riverburg's fruit tree display, public comment was equally as flattering. The awards were made on Saturday and the following are the premiums won by Mr. Boyle:

- Best of all kinds of fruit raised from one locality by one contributor—First premium.
- Best plate of winter apples—First premium.
- Best collection of seedling apples—First premium.
- Best collection of peaches—First premium.
- Best plate of seedling peaches—First premium.
- Best plate of plums—First premium.
- Best plate of grapes—First premium.
- Best plate of walnuts—First premium.
- Best plate of winter pears—First premium.
- Best collection of fall pears—First premium.
- Best plate of quinces—Second premium.
- Best collection of fall and winter apples (not less than ten varieties)—Second premium.
- Best plate of grapes of any new variety—Second premium.
- Mr. Grant Riverburg took for Santa Fe: Best collection of apple, peach, pear, plum and apricot trees—First premium.
- Best collection of grape vines and roses—First premium.

On Saturday the exhibit of fruit from this city was purchased and sent to Chicago, where it will serve to replenish the display of New Mexico products sent out under the auspices of the bureau of immigration.

In this connection the New Mexican can but congratulate the people of Santa Fe county upon the very important part taken by them in making the territorial fair just closed a success. The county will certainly profit by it, for the fact that Santa Fe was able, in the face of strong competition, to carry off first premiums for fruits, minerals, coal and coke, is something of which every citizen may feel justly proud.

Especially with regard to the horticultural display this triumph has a lesson which every business man in Santa Fe can well afford to ponder. It shows that the Santa Fe valley, with its fertile loam, superior climate, excellent market facilities and abundance of water can do—and all depending upon water development. At present 10,000 to 12,000 acres are under cultivation in this valley, but this is a mere bagatelle to what the water supply is capable of if only the precious fluid is caught and stored. With hundreds of American farmers ready to come and make their homes in this beautiful healthful region; with 100,000 acres of virgin valley land yearning for the waters that in sight, is it not high time that some concerted action were taken looking to a utilization of this combination of wealth and local prosperity?

THE TRAVELING EXHIBITS.
The two cars of New Mexico exhibits which have attracted such great attention in Colorado, Kansas and Missouri during the past two weeks, left Kansas City on Saturday and will be side-tracked at Galesburg, Ill., during the next forty-eight hours. Thence they make a tour through the Sucker state, and reach Chicago in about ten days. W. N. Emmert today received a letter from Mr. Sanniss directing that several hundred pounds more of Santa Fe fruit be forwarded at once, and this, with the large exhibit at the fair from this county will serve to freshen up the display about the time it gets into Chicago. The sending out of these two cars will undoubtedly do great deal to promote New Mexico's immigration interests. Everywhere a stop has been made the press and people have opened their eyes in wonderment and the newspapers have given us an amount of advertising that is priceless. In many instances these exhibits have inspired the publication of column articles. Appended are a few quotations tending to convey the sentiment of the press in different localities:

"A great many merchants, produce dealers, millers, etc., examined the exhibit and pronounced it a most beautiful and meritorious display."—*St. Louis Globe-Democrat*, who is the largest importer of grapes in Denver, pronounced these tokens as vastly superior to the California variety and says they have better shipping qualities."—*Denver News*.

"This show was something more elaborate than Denver people are in the habit of witnessing and they went into ecstasies over the magnificence of the display."—*Colorado Field and Farm*.

"People were simply astounded when they saw the magnificent display of the agricultural and horticultural resources of this modern garden of Eden. The prevailing impression of northern and eastern people has always been that New Mexico was simply a sandy desert inhabited by Mexicans and Indians and that it was next to an impossibility for a white man to live there. It is in reality a fine country in almost all respects."—*Denver Republican*.

The products the car contained were indeed fine and will be a credit to that territory all over the east, as far as Ohio. Taken all in all this car will be an excellent advertisement for that country and the party behind the project will probably never regret the expenditure."—*Hutchinson, Kas., Clipper*.

Lengthy write-ups of these exhibits on wheels have also been made by the press at Topeka and Kansas City.

MINOR MENTIONS.
John Engler's orchard contains sixty-five varieties of pears, most of them of the fall and winter sort, when pears are pears—for a cash consideration.

In Mr. Boyle's collection of Santa Fe fruits at the fair there were twelve varieties of pears, seven of plums, three of peaches and fifteen of apples.

Mr. Weltner has on exhibition at his store a fine perfect beauty in the shape of an apple. It was grown in his garden, which two years ago was a sandy arroyo, and it weighs fifteen and a half ounces. But the wonder about it is that the tree is only 2 years old. It is imported French stock.

Live Stock Agent Major Newell, of the Santa Fe road, came in from Las Cruces, N. M., yesterday, and regaled his friends with stories of the wonderful things that grow in that country. He has a basket of apples that were grown on his ranch near Las Cruces, the major claims that New Mexico is superior to California for fruit raising.—*Denver Republican*.

SOCORRO ALL RIGHT.

The Gen. City's Health Officer Has Some-thing to Say and Says It.

A Santa Fe mail line conductor is responsible for the following: "There were Socorro people on my train today and they told me that 150 cases of small pox were reported in Socorro Tuesday night, but that the city officials were trying to suppress all reports of small pox and I am surprised that no precaution is being taken to prevent the spread of the disease to other towns in New Mexico and Texas."
