WASHINGTON MATTERS.

THE NAVY.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—It is said that among recommendations to be made by Secretary Tracy in his annual report is one that the plan formulated by the board of officers upon many yard sites, to largely increase and improve the Brooklyn navy yard, be carried into effect. The principal features of this plan are the construction of a fresh water basin in which new vessels of the navy may lie without fouling their bottoms and thus always be ready for service, and the construction of several additional dry docks. The estimated expense of the additions is \$8,000,000, the outlay to be made at the rate of \$500,000 a year.

TANNER OVERRULED.

In the claim of a pensioner on appeal from the Commissioner of Pensions, Assistant Secretary Bussey has rendered a decision reviewing and rescinding the order issued by Commissioner Tanner on April 25, which abolished the rating of \$2 per month and established for the same the sum of \$4 per month in all cases dating from March 27, 1889.

In reviewing the order, which he holds was an error, Mr. Bussey says the error was manifest and the rescinding of it necessarily follows, as it has neither color of law nor authority of precedent.

Episcopal Convention.

New York, Oct. 12.—In the general convention of the Episcopal church the committee on prayer book reported in favor of substituting psalm 64 for psalm 69 in the psalms of God Friday; that the committee on the constitution has added to the book of common prayer and that the insertion of the athanasian creed is deemed inexpedient to place on the calendar. Committee on constitutional amendments reported in favor of an amendment to constitution providing that no change shall hereafter be made in the book of common prayer, the article on the constitution unless it has been adopted by a majority of the house of deputies and house of bishops of a general convention and similarly approved by the succeeding convention. The resolution was adopted. The report of the committee on the judicial system of the church brought on a long discussion, but finally a vote was taken on the resolution which reads: "In every diocese the mode of trying presbyters and deacons may be instituted by the convention of the diocese except in as far as the general convention shall otherwise provide. The resolution was adopted by a vote standing: clerical, 23 ayes, 18 nos, 5 divided. Lay, 23 ayes, 24 nos.

Carpet Combine.

Boston, Oct. 10.—The American Wool Reporter says: "A meeting was held in New York yesterday to consider the proposition to form a carpet manufacturers' trust. Many of the largest carpet manufacturers of New England, New York and Philadelphia were present. The real object of the meeting was to discuss the situation and if practicable to take initial steps toward forming a trust or close combination."

It is stated on reliable authority that the promoters of the scheme have interested a majority of manufacturers considered as to the amount of production, and they expect to be able to control 75 to 85 percent of the whole production. It is said that German and other capitalists stand ready to put \$25,000,000 into the scheme.

Lady Pythias.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 12.—In compliance with a call of J. A. Hill, founder of the order of Pythias sisters, for the organization of a supreme temple of the world, delegates from seven states, including California, assembled here and elected officers, among whom are past supreme chief of temple, Mrs. McFarrar, of Richmond, Ind.; supreme chief of temple, Mrs. Ida M. Weaver, of Warsaw, Mrs. C. L. Lawrence, of San Diego, Cal., was elected supreme mistress of records and correspondence. This organization is what is known as the ladies band of Knights of Pythias authorized at the last session of the supreme lodge Knights of Pythias of the world.

The result of their protestations was that only four menials were arrested.

MEXICO LEAD ORES.

A Colorado Smelter Man Makes Some Points of Moment.

New York, Oct. 12.—The Tribune has an interview on the lead ore question with Deunla Shedy. He said in part: "The admission of any lead ore into the United States, even when it contains silver whose value is in excess of the lead value, is not only contrary to law, but injurious to the silver and lead mining interests of Colorado, and the entire west is a unit in asking that the duty fixed by law shall be collected for our protection."

"The Democrats and Republicans alike believe it to be no more than just. It is not a question of party politics with us, but a matter of policy that is life or death to the state."

"The bulk of the precious metals now produced in this country—fully 75 percent—is produced incidental to lead mining. If lead mining becomes unprofitable by reason of ruinous untold competition, the production of precious metals will fall off to the serious detriment of the whole country. If a stringent collection of the duty should be ordered made, there are 500 mines in one county in Colorado that could at once be put in operation, giving employment to thousands and adding enormously to the wealth of the country in gold and silver, besides supplying the full demand for long ago metted. Guarding the Car.

BERLIN, Oct. 12.—Gen. Von Werder and Von Kollenbornsteden have been deputed to attend the car during his stay in this city. The route through Berlin to be traversed by the car will be lined with troops of cavalry from Wehrer station across Keonings Platz as far as the Charlottenberg road, thence with infantry to the Russian embassy.

MINERALS ON GRANTS.

An Important Ruling on Mineral Lands by Sec. Noble.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—In the case of the Central Pacific railroad company Sec. Noble has overruled the decision of Comr. Sparks, made May 3, 1887, which required the company to file with its lists selected under its grants, the usual non-mineral affidavit is use in agricultural cases generally. The practice in the case of land grant railroad companies is for the agent to make out lists of land within the grant and submit the same to the department with an affidavit to the effect that the plots and surveyor's returns show the lands to be non-mineral. Mineral lands are reserved from the grant. Ordinary agricultural claimant must make oath that he knows no personal inspection that the land he claims is non-mineral in character. The secretary holds that inasmuch as existing requirements were complied with by the company at the date of selection, no retroactive rule should be applied to it. These selections were made during the years 1885-88. Similar rulings were made in the cases of the Santa Fe, Pacific and Atlantic & Pacific railroad companies. These decisions will release from suspension and pass to patent about 6,000,000 acres of land within these grants.

Mending Matters in Mexico.

MEXICO, Oct. 12.—Congress will soon be called upon to revise the constitution by increasing the length of the presidential term, allowing the president to be re-elected, and creating the office of vice president. It is rumored that Gen. Ceballos, governor of the federal district, will be vice president.

Governor Martinez de Castro, of the state of Sinaloa, is favoring the McWood concession. McWood is now here and makes merry over his arrest in New York, which is denounced by the Mexican government officials as a vile trick.

New Line Completed.

ST. PAUL, Oct. 12.—A telegram received in St. Paul yesterday announces the completion of the Oregon Railway & Navigation line from Rockford to Spokane Falls, Washington territory. This opens another line from the east to eastern Washington, the new line is via the Union Pacific, Oregon Short Line and Oregon Railway & Navigation. It is further stated that the Oregon Railway & Navigation's projected line to Malien has been completed to St. Joe, Idaho.

California Railroads.

SAN DIEGO, Oct. 10.—The directors of the California Southern railroad in a meeting at National City, agreed to a plan for the consolidation of that road with the California Southern and the Redondo Beach road, under the management of the California Southern. The final consummation of this plan was made at Los Angeles.

Rain in California.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10.—Telegraphic reports from different parts of the state indicate the rainfall was the heaviest in northern part of the state. The grape crop has been injured slightly. In general, the rain was not heavy enough in middle California to do any damage.

STEADY DEVELOPMENT.

No Boom, But the Greatest Activity in Santa Fe Mines.

San Pedro has a hook and ladder company, with June Moore as foreman. Steve Arnold is hauling over the heavy machinery for the new copper smelter. Cerrillos is shipping now more than double the coal handled at this time one year ago. The town's business in every line has also doubled.

The editor of the Cerrillos Rustler got a daily mail for San Pedro "in a few days," just like the Shanghai rooster grew tall. Bully for the Rustler man.

Another week and the Copper company's cable tramway will be in operation. Thirty-six out of the forty stations are now up and the terminal houses have yet to be erected.

Col. Blake, secretary of the San Pedro Town company and interested in the Tres Hermanos property, was in the city last night en route to Las Vegas. He says the ore chamber in this latest to develop carbonates is enlarging as the tunnel is run in.

Las Vegas seem to have struck a nice thing by investing in the Tres Hermanos before there was a pound of ore in sight. Since the strike of carbonates Sept. 1st of the Las Vegas Gas company has refused an advance of \$50 on his block of stock, which originally cost \$25.

The Dolores mill is running along steadily on Santa Rita ore. Harry Clancy has always been the chief owners of Santa Rita, but the mill has proven it good enough for him to take a hand on one-third of the property held by other parties. Mr. Clancy leaves to-night for a trip to the mines.

A. Leonard, editor of the Silver City Enterprise, spent several days at San Pedro this week, and while he don't like it much because the people wouldn't tear their shirt to give the "Outlook" preference over the "Golden Nine," still, he was impressed with the wondrous mineral wealth of Santa Fe county and he promises to write about it in next week's issue of the Enterprise.

Just think of it! At San Pedro a gold property is being developed wherein a tunnel seventy feet long in one direction and 133 feet long in another has been run—and every inch of the distance is in mineral. The rock runs from \$8 to \$12 per ton in gold and 6 to 11 per cent copper. Old miners long ago admitted that San Pedro had one of the biggest copper producers in the union, but many of them now believe that the greatest gold mine in the world is to be found. And its name is "Apex."

TERRITORIAL TOPICS.

J. K. Byers, of Lincoln, has received the appointment of county superintendent of public schools for the county of Lincoln, in the place of Prof. F. H. Richmond, resigned.

C. B. Ladd has sold his entire sheep interest in Colfax county to D. C. Holcomb and has purchased a large flock of Joseph Cloutier, of Taos county, the same to be delivered near the town of Springer.

Las Vegas note: Four electric lights will soon be erected on the plaza, location yet to be decided upon, and an electric light is being placed on Bridge street. The expense to parties accommodated and benefited by this arrangement is \$50 a month.

It is rather remarkable that Col. Ashenfelter, who raised such a howl against the change of venue law, should avail himself of its "villainous" privileges immediately on being indicted by the grand jury of Dona Ana county.—Enterprise.

Stallord & Robinson have completed a very nice model for their straw-binding harvester. Mr. Robinson took it out to the Pueblo fair last Tuesday. It is a very excellent piece of mechanism whether it ever performs its work or not.—Katon Range.

Out of 100,000 head of cattle handled this season by Uncle Joe Overlund, not more than 5,000 head went to market, the large majority having been shipped either to grass or feed pens. And at present the demand for stock cars on the Santa Fe road is greater than can be met by the company.—Optic.

Clayton and George Dorsey left on Monday for school. Clayton goes to Yale college, where he graduates next year at the age of 19. He is a most exemplary young man, brainy, ambitious and industrious, and if the essential elements count for anything he will be heard from in the future. George is one of the brightest students at the Fort Collins, Colo., college, where he goes this, the second year.—Range.

The news from Ute Creek is of an unusual and startling nature. Santiago Martinez was recently killed by a wagon running over his body while he was driving from the house of Emeterio Gallegos. This is another instance where whiskey deprived a wife of a husband and five children of a father. And it is street talk here that Francisco Gallegos, of Ute Creek, offers a snug reward of \$2,000 for the apprehension of the men who assaulted the wife of his bosom in her own home.—Optic.

Thomas Nolan, the "father of the camp," as he is known in Georgetown, died from an overdose of morphine, taken with suicidal intent, on the morning of the 3d inst. On the forenoon of the 4th Mr. Deemer called on Dr. Brown and requested the latter to accompany him to Nolan's place of residence, saying that he had seen old Tom in a dream last night, lying on his bed dead. On opening Nolan's bedroom door, there he lay, dead, sure enough, with the bottle of morphine lying beside him empty.—Silver City Enterprise.

Speaking of the Ada Humes case (the southern papers spell it "Humes") the Silver City Enterprise says: "The trial itself was lengthy, it had its ridiculous, ludicrous, solemn and tragical phases. One moment there was a comedy and the next there was a stage tragedy enacted. There is no scene on the stage that could have depicted so lifelike the various peculiarities and characteristics of that famous trial. It is generally believed that Ada Humes deserves her punishment. That although the deceased had the reputation of being a bad man, yet the circumstances of the killing clearly showed she had not one jot of justification for taking his life. We learn that she will not apply for a new trial and that she accepts the verdict of the jury and sentence in good grace. It is said she will throw herself on the clemency of the governor by asking for a pardon in the near future. How she will succeed remains to be seen."
