COUNTY BOARD'S BUSINESS.

A Record of the Proceedings of Yesterday's Meeting.

The county board of commissioners had a short session yesterday afternoon. The amount of \$1,000 was taken off of J. P. Victory's tax return, his interest in the Herald Printing company having been taxed against the company itself. Also Jas. A. Donovan's return was reduced \$500, he claiming that the assessor had assessed his property at \$500 more than it was worth.

Tedoro Martinez, a member of the board, had the temerity to ask that his taxes also be reduced, for the alleged reason that he "couldn't get water." Commissioner Wyllis couldn't see it, and the tax was not reduced.

The district attorney was authorized to bring suit against delinquent tax payers in cases where the amounts due exceeded \$1.

The following accounts were allowed, and warrants ordered drawn for the same:

R. E. Twitchell, services as attorney for the county for six months, from March 4 to September 4, \$200; D. D. Harkness, justice of the peace, fees, etc., \$73.49; J. P. Victory for stationery, \$30; J. P. Victory, salary for school superintendent for six months; \$222.52; E. H. Salazar, publication of proceedings of the board, \$98.65.

The board appropriated a sum not to exceed \$100 for supplying the current expense bond blanks and District Attorney Twitchell was instructed to have the work done and the bonds ready during the present month.

D. D. Harkness resigned as road overseer for the Cerrillos district and J. J. Chandler named to fill the place.

Adjourned to December 5, when the issuance of current expense bonds and the question of funding a portion of the county's indebtedness will be the special order.

Southwestern Prosperity.

A commercial man writing from Southwestern Texas to a friend in Santa Fe says:

To give you some idea of the tremendous crops raised here, let me say that many farmers will be engaged till February picking cotton; fine weather all fall, and cotton growing right along. Train load after train load of native people from Mexico have been brought in here to pick cotton, the majority of them being employed at \$1 per 100 pounds for picking, with railroad fare paid by the employer to destination. A good picker can pick from 3.0 to 3.00 pounds per day. A Mexican with three children large enough to work, with his wife, can pick 1,000 pounds a day. Just think of it, \$10 a day for those poor fellows who work a month for it in Mexico. The most of this class of labor remain in this section, open up new land, and in a few years own their own places and make very good citizens.

THE DENVER MINING EXCHANGE.

Mr. Creamer Speaks of Its Success—Comments on San Pedro's Carbonate Ores.

C. M. Creamer, president of the Santa Fe Board of Trade, was the recipient of very many courtesies at the hands of Denver business men on the occasion of his recent visit. He had a seat on the floor of the mining exchange, where Denver business men meet twice a day and do themselves proud in the way they transact their affairs. This exchange has some 250 members and has proven a splendid success. Since its organization not long ago its transfers in mining stock figure up \$5,330,275, or an average of \$13,302 per day. Mr. Creamer exhibited samples of carbonate ores from San Pedro, taken out of the black Hawk, which attracted very general attention. He says the members, many of them old mining men, unanimously declared these samples similar to the Leadville ores, and their display aroused an interest in San Pedro's future, which is likely to be productive of good results. To Col. D. J. Ezekiel, U. S. A., retired, and an active member of the exchange, Mr. Creamer is especially indebted for kindness.

Lowitzki & Son's new heavy barn is receiving its finishing touches to-day and the firm will get into it the first of next week. It is 200 feet long by thirty-five feet in width and contains 25,000 feet of lumber, the general excellence of which is remarked by all. The lumber came from the Tres Piedras mills and was supplied by Dubrow & Fisher.

IN THE MANZANO VALLEY.

Pinon Nuts and State Matters—The Season's Crops and the Winter Range.

"If it is true that the past season has been the driest New Mexico has experienced for twenty years, the Manzano valley is surely the favored spot in the territory," said E. A. Dow, merchant and late member of the state constitutional convention from the Manzano country.

This region, lying 100 miles south of Santa Fe on the eastern slope of the Manzano mountains, has this year produced its usual excellent crop of corn grown without irrigation, and rains have been sufficient to bring out a good grass crop. Cattle are in very fair condition for the winter, and sheep are rolling fat.

Mr. Dow says the statehood movement's friends are largely in the majority in that locality, despite the efforts of the local priest to the contrary. He says the priest there preached against the constitution and told the people that under his provisions no voter who can not read and write English after five years will be allowed to vote; but this is not the case at all, and the people have pretty generally been made aware of the fact that misrepresentation, either willfully or ignorantly, has been resorted to in this matter, hence an endeavor to solve the state question a black eye has acted like a boomerang and worked the other way.

There was never so large a pinon crop as this year, says the visitor. The nuts are coming into Manzano and Tejuque at the rate of 2,000 pounds per day, and the merchants pay 5 cents a pound for them. Mr. Dow has thus far bought 20,000 pounds and his brother-in-law, Chihli as much more. He brought to the city yesterday 2,500 pounds of pinon nuts and a wagon load of hides and pelts which he is trading to local merchants for merchandise. Mr. Dow says the Manzano valley has strong hopes of catching the narrow gauge extension south from Santa Fe next year, and he considers that that fertile region will then enjoy a boom second to that of no other locality in the west.

HUMAN BLOOD FOR BRUIN.

Two Gatherers of Pinon Nuts Eaten by Bears in the Santa Fe Mountains.

News comes from Las Truchas, in the northern part of this county, that an old Mexican woman, who with her son was in the pinon groves gathering nuts, was eaten by a bear a few days ago. The mother and son became separated during the afternoon, and at night the son went to camp and built a fire, but waited all night long for the absent mother. As soon as it was light he started to find her, and after several hours search found her torn clothing and bones and hair. There are plenty of bear tracks where the remains were found.

News is also at hand from Abiquia that a 12 year old boy who went gathering pinon nuts several days ago is missing. Bears are certainly lusty, but have devoured him, and a large pursuing party has gone out to try and get trace of him.
