SANTA FE NEW MEX**Telegraphic Tidings****GEN. SCHOFIELD'S REPORT.**
Condition of the Military Service—Important Recommendations.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The annual report of Gen. Schofield has been made public. It pays special attention to the desertion question, saying: "A sufficient remedy may perhaps be found in the case of all worthy men who find, after a few months' trial, that they are mistaken in their calling, by a more liberal exercise of the power to discharge soldiers upon their own application than has ever heretofore prevailed. Great care is required to prevent the enlistment of men of bad character and habits may be found practicable. Measures having these ends in view have already been instituted."

"After all possible has been done to remove reasonable excuses for desertion, at the same time it is true that the means now provided for the arrest and punishment of deserters are wholly inadequate. Only one in five is ever captured. This is not sufficient to deter men from committing the crime. The remedy is to authorize civil officers to arrest deserters and increase the reward so as to compensate them for their service."

Gen. Schofield recommends that the present five regiments of artillery be reorganized into seven regiments, the organization to remain the same except that there be but one first lieutenant to a battery.

He also recommends that the enlisted strength of the army be increased to 30,000, which would supply the force necessary for the proposed reorganization of the artillery and infantry, as well as giving more margin for recruits under instruction.

He recommends the battalion organization for infantry regiments, suggests that hereafter promotions from the grade of second lieutenant to that of colonel, in cases of all officers who are not now above the lowest grade, should be made according to seniority of commission in the arm of service to which the officer belongs, and not as now in particular regiments.

He further suggests that hereafter officers be commissioned in the arms of service to which they belong, and not in particular regiments, so that they may be assigned to regiments and transferred from one to another as the interests of the service may require.

He recommends that the pay of non-commissioned officers of infantry, cavalry and artillery be made the same as that now established for like grades in the engineers.
Referring to the work of the board of ordinance and fortifications, he says: "Provisions should be made for the necessary garrisons at the principal seaports. A table is given showing the necessities of this work. The war garrisons of our sea coast defenses should be about 85,000 artillery men and 1,305 guns of modern construction."**Our Jury System.**
NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 18.—Ex-President Hayes delivered the annual address before the national prison congress in this city on Saturday. A feature of his address was his reference to the inefficient jury system which prevails in most of the states. He said the lack of popular confidence in the fairness and justice of criminal trials breeds crime, and delays criminal proceedings in these days when wealth is the power, the offer of temptation to bribe gives and bribe taking. He referred to the Cronin case as a recent and notorious example.
Referring to the jury system, Mr. Hayes spoke particularly of the technicality that no man can sit on a jury who reads newspapers. Already the states have been expunged from some states and the national rule has taken its place. It would be far more reasonable, he said, to exclude from juries men who do not form or express opinions from what they read. Ignorance, and not intelligence, should be shut out from the jury box. Another example of the unreasonableness in our jury system is the "unanimous" jury. If five-sixths or three-fourths of a jury agree on a verdict of guilty, and if the presiding judge approves the verdict, why shall it not stand? Under our Republican system the gravest questions are decided daily by a majority vote of the citizens, and these reforms depend on the popular judgment and popular will.**New Catholic Order.**
PITTSBURGH, Nov. 18.—It has been authoritatively announced here that Miss Kate Drexel, known in relation to the Catholic order, will not remain in the order of Mercy. She is merely making her novitiate in that order so that she may become a nun and found a new order.
The sisterhood she will establish, it is said, will be American, and will have for its object missionary and charitable work among the Indians. Miss Drexel, it is said, will build a house for the proposed order somewhere in the see of Omaha, Bishop O'Connor's diocese, and will endow it handsomely out of her private fortune. She will obtain recruits from the various orders to assist in her work and will establish a novitiate for new members.
She has really adopted a habit for the new order. It resembles the Mercy habit slightly. The veil is shorter and the dress is made without the regulation trail. The material is coarser than now used in most habits of the different orders.
Members of the new order will be expected to do all kinds of domestic work in addition to educating the Indians. The name has not been decided upon.**To Rival Jules Verne.**
New York, Nov. 18.—The World announces that its female reporter, Nellie Bly, has sailed on the steamer Augusta Victoria in an attempt to travel around

the world in seventy-five days, beating Jules Verne's fancied time of eighty days as made by Phineas Fogg. The itinerary of the trip includes Southampton, London, Calais, Paris, Turin, Brindisi, Ischia, Aden, Colombo (Ceylon), Penang, Singapore, Hong Kong, Yokohama and San Francisco. Nellie Bly, according to her schedule, will be due in New York on January 27.

SAN JUAN DEL NORTE, Nov. 16.—Every body is enthusiastic over the canal. American engineers will lay siege to the rock to make the cut three miles long, which will sever the backbone of the new world and eventually connect the Atlantic with the Pacific ocean. To-day the chief engineer and the Nicaragua commissioners start for Managua to make the route of peace and generally still, hands over the pleasant and promising state of affairs which has grown out of the little unpleasantness between Nicaragua and Costa Rica.**The Sioux Reservation.**
ST. PAUL, Nov. 18.—A Pioneer-Press special says: "Private advice from Washington say that the proclamation throwing open the Sioux reservation to settlement will be issued by the president immediately upon the receipt of the commission of the report. The report caused considerable excitement among intending settlers and they are making preparations to go upon the lands at once."**A Strong Combine.**
ATLANTA, Nov. 18.—A federation of the Knights of Labor with the Farmers' Alliance is a forgone conclusion. It is stated that the ends for which both orders are working are identical, and associated together they could form an irresistible power, and what each singly is obliged to struggle for united they could demand and obtain.**The Alton's Latest.**
CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—A ten years agreement has been made between the Alton road and the Kansas Pacific branch of the Union Pacific, covering freight and passenger business to all points between Chicago and the Pacific coast; the Union Pacific to fix east bound rates, and the Alton those west bound. It goes into effect March 1 next.**A New Regime.**
LONDON, Nov. 18.—The new Brazilian government has issued a manifesto announcing that monarchy has been abolished. Various provinces have been assured of support to the new regime. The former prime minister has been arrested. The emperor will be treated with great consideration.**Stirs up Coffee.**
NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—The report of the revolution in Brazil is followed by the report of another in Venezuela, and has caused a vast amount of excitement among down town merchants engaged in the South American trade. The coffee trade is excited and the market has advanced twenty points.**Fleet Animals.**
NAPA, Cal., Nov. 16.—Palo Alto started this afternoon to beat the stallion record of 2:12, but made a bad break and failed. His time was 2:12½. Stamboul trotted an exhibition mile in 2:15. Stamboul again lowered the record this afternoon and trotted a mile in 2:12¼.**Indian Commission.**
ST. LOUIS, Nov. 18.—The Choctaw Indian council has authorized the governor of the nation to appoint three commissioners to confer with the United States commissioner, now at Talequal, in regard to the lease of lands west of the 95th meridian.**Miners Frozen.**
DENVER, Nov. 18.—A Glenwood Springs, Colo., special says Pat Gallagher and Ed. Connelly, two miners at Coolidge, eight miles from here, lost their way last night while returning to the mines from New-castle, and were both frozen to death.**Rumors as to the Fort Worth.**
BOSTON, Nov. 18.—President Adams said to-day in regard to reports concerning the Union Pacific and Denver, Texas & Fort Worth that there is nothing to give out.**CONDENSED NEWS.**Jeff Davis is not very sick.

WARNING MONOMETALISTS
A Washington Paper's Sound Talk on the Silver Question.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The Press, in commenting editorially upon the coming silver convention at St. Louis, says: "We advise the monometalists not to make the foolish blunder of supposing this movement, as has been said of any 'ring,' it is a mighty movement of the people of the great west, of a region in which 'the state of Rhode Island and Providence plantations' could be hidden away in the corner of a county."

We suggest, too, that any party which ventures to plant itself across the track of this movement will be run over and crushed out of all shape.

President Harrison and Mr. Secretary Windom will, we trust, keep their eyes and ears open while the silver convention is in session.

New York.—The World says: "During the past fortnight or so the price of silver has advanced nearly two points, to 95, and there is a good deal of inquiry for it from all over the country. It is quite possible the United States may increase its silver coinage even more rapidly than has been done for two or three years."

"The government has found that there is a distinct loss in the coinage of gold dollars. In fact every gold dollar has cost it 10 or 20 cents more than its face value, and money brokers on the street are very eager to get hold of them at 15 per cent premium. In consequence the coinage of gold dollars has been stopped and very few \$5 gold pieces are being turned out."

"The English government, it is interesting to state in this connection, has suspended the coinage of half sovereigns, and smaller gold coins, both in France and Germany, are being withdrawn. These withdrawals will, of course, increase the demand for silver and add to its speculative character."

Boom New Mexico.

Boom the statehood movement for New Mexico.

Let Canada follow suit and declare her independence.

The way of the Cronin murder trial is tedious and devious.

Mexico wants Guatemala, and wants it badly. Well, she can have it, for aught we care.

Gov. FORAKER has issued his thanks-giving proclamation. He has pluck, say what you may.

We can do very well without emperors, kings, princes and dukes on the great American continent.

The monarchies upon the great American continent are going by the board. Long live the Brazilian republic!

The statehood movement is gathering strength. Let us fight the good fight honestly and loyally and we will be successful.

The city authorities of El Paso have determined to suppress gambling within the city limits. They are attacking the tiger in his lair.

Looking it over dispassionately and calmly, we are safe in asserting that in the recent elections the Republicans have held their own everywhere, except in the places where the Democrats got it away from them.

Whisky and prohibition did the Republicans in Ohio and Iowa, with a little mismanagement and bossism thrown in. But it was a wholesome lesson, and one which the Republicans of those two states will profit by.

America is ahead as usual. The exhibitors from the United States at the recent Paris exhibition received more than 1,000 prizes—more than the proportion obtained by any other nation. Let the American eagle proudly flap his wings.

We are informed that it is pretty hard on Thomas Smith to give up the United States attorneyship for New Mexico. We presume so. The softest thing he ever had. But, on the contrary, the people seem to stand this apparent great loss brought about by Smith's removal with great equanimity and fortitude. Such is life in the far west.

The full Ohio election returns do not seem to indicate that third termism defeated Gov. Foraker. Gen. Brown, the Republican candidate for state treasurer, was running for that office for the third time and is elected by over 3,000 plurality; whereas Lampson, the candidate for lieutenant governor, who ran for the first time for the office, only received a plurality of forty-one votes.

NEW MEXICO MUST HELP.

The New Mexican indulges the hope that a full delegation from this commonwealth will be present when the national silver convention opens at St. Louis on the 20th instant. Colorado has just organized a state silver association, some 300 business men being in attendance at the meeting for this purpose, and the state is making more than ordinary preparations to create a good impression at St. Louis on the occasion of the national convention.

It is not improbable that this will prove one of the most memorable gatherings ever held in the west. It has now been sixteen years since silver was demonetized, unquestionably a trick into which congress was inveigled by several European powers who had axes to grind, and in that time it has become painfully evident to the American people, especially those of the west, that it was all a grievous mistake. These sixteen years have been marked by constantly declining prices of staple commodities and of all the products of the farm and shop, and also taking from producers of silver over 30 per cent of their gross production, thereby taking that amount of the miner's earnings for the sole benefit of the United States treasury and increasing the amount of all debts and fixed obligations, requiring more and more pounds of wheat and corn, and cotton, and beef, and pork, and lead, and iron and coal to liquidate the debts, with no definite assurance from any source as to when this construction of prices will cease.

This condition of things has been traced by the most careful observers in the world to the demonetization of silver; to the wanton destruction of one-half the world's standard money. To undo this state of affairs New Mexico must lead a strong and steady hand. A positive demand must be made of the 51st congress to re-monetize silver. This undoubtedly will be done by the St. Louis convention, and this, together with the stand that President Harrison is known to have taken on the subject ought to result in giving the white metal its former position in this country and, eventually, in all the nations of the world. Let New Mexico have a full delegation in the national silver convention.

GIVE US STATEHOOD.

What New Mexico wants is two U. S. senators from the state of New Mexico, and then New Mexico's needs and wishes will receive speedy and prompt attention from the government.—New Mexican.

The New Mexican is wrong. What New Mexico wants is more water and less politics; more farmers and fewer politicians; improved and more extended methods of irrigation and fewer conventions and less statehood for the present. New Mexico's most immediate needs are those that will be satisfied by her energetic producers and business men.—Las Cruces Democrat.

We will get more water, more farming, more irrigation, and our producers and business men will be more energetic and prosperous, with statehood. Let us have that also. It will inaugurate an era of prosperity never before experienced in New Mexico.

It is all bosh to decry the influence of politics and the work of politicians. Such work is as necessary to the prosperity of a state or nation as that of the business men. True there are good and bad politicians—intelligent, progressive politicians, and those-back, reactionary politicians; but it can not be said that the statehood movement is included in the latter category. The fact that it is a movement in its favor. There is no such thing as standing still in politics nor in life. We must either progress or retrograde. New Mexico has progressed in population, intelligence, industry and production to a point where she is justly entitled to the privileges and blessings of self-government. For a minority of politicians—disappointed would-be leaders and would-be pap-suckers of the public treat, to say she has not thus progressed is reactionary in itself. For them to succeed in defeating statehood, would be to relegate us, in the estimation of the world, to a half-barbarous or semi-civilized condition. The estimation in which the world holds us will largely control immigration to New Mexico, as well as the introduction of capital, which is needed to give us more water, irrigation, farming, and the general development of our rich, vast and varied resources. If we have lived there so long and have accomplished so little, as the opponents of statehood would have the world believe, what assurance can we give immigrants and capital that in case they come to our aid, our future would be so much better? Those who can not, or have not helped themselves, should not expect others to help them. Even "God helps those who help themselves." This question of statehood is indeed a political question; but it is also a question of immediate and personal interest to every poor man in the territory. It is a question which each man may decide for himself independent of political parties and party control. If it is your opinion that the admission of New Mexico into the union as a state will benefit you or your friends, you are at liberty to vote for it, without the fear of being boycotted by the Democratic or any other party, to deter you.
