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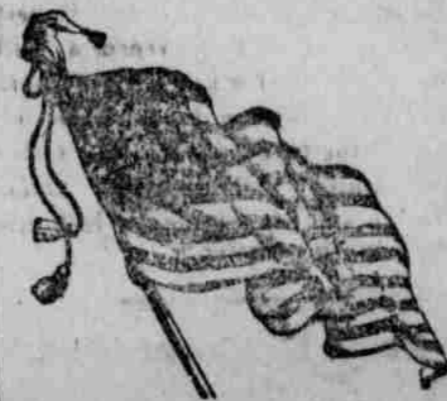

**President Signs  
War Army Bill.**

Washington, May 18.—The war  
army bill passed by congress and  
finally reviewed at the war department,  
went back to the White  
House tonight and was signed by  
President Wilson. The president's  
signature set in motion immediately  
machinery designed to produce  
within a year's time a national  
army of more than 1,000,000 trained  
and equipped men, backed by  
adequate reserves of men and supplies  
and by an additional 500,000  
soldiers under training.

The war bill was carefully gone  
over during the day by Brigadier  
General Crowder, judge advocate  
general and provost marshal general.

The war department is pushing  
vigorously its preparations to mobilize  
the national guard, which with the  
regulars, form the first line army.  
It was announced today that all  
existing regiments of the guard will  
be called into service by August 5,  
and officials estimate that with from  
a month to six weeks' intensive  
training these troops will be ready to  
go forward or final preparation behind  
the fighting lines in Europe for the  
fighting that is before them.

Regular army regiments already  
are in motion northward from the  
border, preparatory to the regular  
service to full war strength. Of  
the 183,398 men necessary to bring  
the regulars up to the 293,000  
mark, 74,933 already have been  
recruited and the remainder are  
expected to come in before June 1.

The national guardsmen will be  
drafted into the federal service in  
three increments on July 15, July  
25, and August 5. As a general  
order is issued by the president  
drafting specific regiments, the  
forces will cease to be militia and

become part of the armies of the  
United States. They will be relieved  
by the limitations upon the use of  
the militia and be available for  
service in any part of the world.

State authorities were authorized  
today to fill present regiments or  
other units up to full war strength,  
making a force of approximately  
329,954 men and 9,847 officers.  
No new national organizations  
will be accepted by the federal  
government until this is done and  
reserve battalions for each regi-  
ment organized. The result will  
be virtually to triple the present  
strength of the guard, but reports  
to the department show heavy  
recruiting.

The department announces also  
the distribution by military de-  
partments of the sixteen divisions  
of the new selective draft army  
and sixteen national guard divisions  
for training purposes. All of the  
guard divisional cantonments  
and most of the selective army  
camps will be in the southern part  
of the country.

In all of the forces first to be  
formed will comprise seven divi-  
sions of regulars, four of which  
will be available for mobile duty  
in continental United States, sup-  
plemented by sixteen national  
guard divisions. Behind this force  
a second call on the selective forces,  
provided for in the bill, will add  
sixteen additional divisions.

Allowances must be made when  
the military census of men be-  
tween the specified ages has been  
completed, for probable variation  
from census bureau estimates as to  
the total number of persons in  
this classification. It is regarded  
as unlikely that the registration  
will show the exact 10,000,000  
persons liable fixed by the census  
estimate.

There will be some delay also in  
hearing from men absent from  
their homes who will register by  
mail. The officials of every state  
and town, however, have been  
authorized to issue cards to such  
men in their communities in order  
to avoid delay.

An analysis of the war depart-  
ment's statement regarding mobi-  
lization of the national guard  
shows that equipment for all the  
force is not yet expected to be  
ready until August. By that time,  
however, the re-doubled output of  
American factories will be able to  
furnish clothing, small arms and  
other equipment for the selective  
army, to be assembled a month  
later, as well as for the full strength  
of the regulars and the guard.

**As to Registration.**

County Clerk P. S. Kelley has received the following letter regarding military registration:

Santa Fe, New Mexico, May 18, 1917.

Mr. P. S. Kelley, Hillsboro, N. M.

Dear Sir: Governor Lindsey is just in receipt of the following telegram from the Secretary of War:

Washington, D. C., May 17, 1917. Governor of New Mexico, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

A change will be necessary in regulations for the registration of the sick and of persons who expect to be absent from their home counties on registration day. Tentative regulations furnished you prescribe that such persons report to their county clerk on the sixth day after the President's proclamation. For instructions as to how they may register see paragraphs 31 and 36 of Registration Regulations in hands of sheriff. Since local authorities now have cards there is no reason why such persons should wait until the sixth day and the president's proclamation will direct them to report at once. Please direct all county clerks to obtain registration cards, certificates and placards of instructions from the sheriff and to be prepared to register such persons immediately after the publication of the president's proclamation. This will require that you at once direct the attention of such clerks to paragraph 31 and 61 of the tentative regulations which are in the hands of all sheriffs.
