Registration Regulations.

Sierra County Advocate, Hillsboro, N. M.

Dear Sir: The following taken from the Registration Regulations, Bureau of the Provost Marshal General, are matters that should be brought to the attention of all peace officers of the state:

Sec. The law authorizing use of Federal, State, County, and Municipal—It will be found by these regulations, which contain the president's directions to officers of the nation and of the states, counties, and municipalities, that the president has directed specific duties to be performed by certain persons as agencies in the execution of this act. Since the act prescribes the penalty of imprisonment (with no alternative of fine) for the failure or neglect of such officers and agencies to perform duties so prescribed by the president, it behooves every person charged with duties herein carefully to study the instructions in general and in particular so much of them as pertain to his own peculiar duties.

Sec. 4. Procedure in case of Failure or Refusal.—In every case in which officers when called upon refuse to act, the governor will proceed at once to prosecute such officers, and will name other officers if he deems the law can be executed by such other officers. If the governor should be of the opinion that the law can not be executed fully, faithfully, and effectively in any city or county by the means thus provided, either because officers have refused to act or because, although no refusal has been indicated to the governor has reason to believe that the law will

not be executed, he will report by telegraph to the provost marshal general without delay.

Sec. 15. Police Officer.—Police officers of any grade or class or town, township, county, state, or nation are required to render every assistance in the execution of the law. It is especially more the duty of such police officer to see that all male persons within the designated ages have registered and to report those who have not registered to the proper registration board for such action as may be necessary. Police officers may require any such person to exhibit his registration certificate.

Sec. 38.—On the day set for registration all police officers of the nation, state, counties, townships, or towns and cities shall hold themselves in readiness to render whatever assistance may be necessary in preserving order at the places of registration and in

On Wednesday an officer from El Paso came to Hillsboro. He returned to the Pass City yesterday taking with him two soiled doves whom it is alleged know something about a \$600.00 diamond robbery that occurred in El Paso not long ago.

Lawrence A. Lee was here Monday and organized a local committee for the purpose of procuring seed and otherwise assisting the farmers to raise war crops. The members of the committee are, F. M. A new mining company, says the El Paso Herald, has been organized, called the Kangaroo Consolidated Mining company to work the properties of N. S. Thousands of questions as to who should be exempt from registration June 5, for selective conscription, have been sent to the war department at Washington and the following are selected and answered, as covering practically ev-

Q—I have only one leg, but am 25 years old. Will I have to register?

A—Even though a man be deaf, dumb and blind, with arms and legs missing, he must register.

Q—My husband is sick with typhoid fever. What shall I do about his registering?

A—Those who, through sickness, shall be unable to register should cause a representative to apply for a copy of the registration card. The card should be mailed or delivered to the register. The sick person will enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope for return of his certificate.

Q—I tried to volunteer in the infantry, but was turned down. Do I have to register since I have already been refused?

A—You must register, no matter what efforts you have made to get into military service.

Q—I was recently divorced and my wife gets \$10 a week alimony. She has the baby to care for. I am 28 years old. How does it look for me?

A—You must register.

Q—Will a former convict, who is forbidden to enter the army or navy, be obliged to register?

A—If he is between the ages of 21 and 30. The government will refuse him later, but he must register.

Q—What is the penalty for making false affidavit in registering?

A—Imprisonment, the same as if in a civil or criminal trial.

Q—I am 25 years old and a Quaker by descent. I have strong scruples against war. Will I have to register?

A—You will. Your religion does not excuse from registering.
