Telegraphic Tidings**WASHINGTON MATTERS.**

WYOMING.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The Wyoming bill is also ready for the consideration of the house. The new code of rules provides that bills providing for the admission of new states may be called up at any time. This will most likely result in very early action upon the Wyoming bill, which is ready to be reported by Mr. Baker. It would not be very surprising if the Wyoming bill should become a law within thirty days.

THE WORLD'S FAIR.
The world's fair question promises to make one of the most exciting scenes of the session when it comes to a vote in the house. If the plan proposed by the committee is carried out. At the meeting of the world's fair committee before the report was adopted, motion was made in the interest of New York to postpone the fair until 1893. A loud cry of protest was made against it, and it was finally agreed that after the site had been selected by the house the New York men might have the motion to postpone and let the house vote on it. If New York is selected as the site, this motion will be made.

THE CONTESTED ELECTION CASES.
The house committee on contested elections, by a strict party vote, recommended the seating of Mr. Featherstone, Republican contestant, for the seat of Mr. Gates in the 1st Arkansas district, and of Mr. Mudd, Republican contestant, for the seat of Mr. Compton, of the 5th Maryland district. By a unanimous vote that Mr. Clarke, Democrat, sitting as the member from the 1st Alabama district, be allowed to keep his seat.

Fenner Lee, of Maryland, to be secretary of legation at Rio Janeiro.
Supervisors of Census—Idaho, A. J. Pinkham; Montana, W. O. Speer; Wyoming, Homer Merrill.

NEW RULES.
In the house on Friday evening the new rules were adopted by a strict party vote—yeas 161, nays 145.

COAST DEFENSES.
The senate committee on coast defenses had before it today Gen. Miles, commander of the division of the Pacific, and Gen. Benet, chief of ordinance, who gave their views upon some matters in connection with the subject of coast defenses.

THE OKLAHOMA TERRITORY BILL.
Representative Struble, from the committee on territories, has reported favorably a bill to organize the territory of Oklahoma.

CONGRESSIONAL.**SENATE.**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—In the senate a number of bills passed, including the following: House bill for the relief of sufferers by the wreck of the United States steamer at Samoa; providing for an assistant secretary of war with salary of \$4,000 for the relief of soldiers or sailors who enlisted or served under assumed names; to prevent the obstruction of navigable waters and to protect the works against trespass or injury; appropriating \$50,000 for a first order light-house at North Head, Cape Disappointment, Wash.; appropriating \$10,000 to restore telegraphic communication between Tacoma island and Fort Angeles, Wash.; appropriating \$125,000 for United States revenue cutter for service on the Pacific coast, with headquarters at Astoria, Ore.; providing for the acquisition of land for town sites and commercial purposes in Alaska; to prevent the introduction of contagious diseases from one state to another; concurrent resolution for international arbitration; for the benefit of actual and bona fide settlers on lands in Colorado lately occupied by the Uncompaghe and White River Indians; to provide for the disposal of Fort Sedgewick military reservation in the states of Colorado and Nebraska to actual settlers under the provisions of the homestead laws.

HOUSE.
The debate in the house Saturday on the farm mortgage census bill was the most interesting that has yet taken place this session.
Mr. Dunnell, who had charge of the bill, held the floor throughout the discussion, which lasted an hour and a quarter, and farmed out his time in two-minute and three minute installments to the many members who desired to be heard. The speeches were short, bright and good natured. Everybody seemed glad that that bitter contest over the rules was ended at last.
The senate bill providing for the ascertainment of the mortgage indebtedness of the country was taken up and amended so as to provide outside pains and penalties for any person or corporation who refused to answer the questions propounded. After considerable debate the bill, as amended, passed.

Rio Grande Western Attached.
NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—A sheriff's officer walked into the Fourth National bank yesterday and served papers attaching property in this county of the Rio Grande Western railway, of which the bank is fiscal agent. The attachment was issued upon the suit of Simon Rothschild, a bondholder who did not assent to the reorganization plan, by which the road was placed on its feet two years ago. Rothschild owns \$10,000 worth of 6 per cent bonds of the old road. When the road reorganized holders of nearly all the \$900,000 bonds exchanged them for 4 per cent

bonds, receiving in consideration of their acceptance of the reduced interest, additional common stock. A few holders whose bonds for some reason or other were not deposited, though they were in accord, the company's officials say, with the reorganization. The exception was Rothschild, who waited all this time and suddenly finding he would like to turn his overdue coupons instructed his lawyer to take proceedings.

Tammany Hall Doomed.
NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—The Republican state committee held a meeting Saturday and upheld the action of the Republican state senators in their endeavor to have amended the so-called "Tammany Hall" world's fair bill.

Also resolutions vigorously condemning Tammany hall as seeking to make political capital out of the world's fair. Resolutions were passed endorsing the course of Speaker Reed and commending Sec. Windom for his proposed abrogation of the federal contract with the commissioner of immigration.

The Free Zone Must Go.

EL PASO, Feb. 17.—It is reported that parties in Juarez have received official or semi-official information to the effect that the Zona Libre has been, or will at once be abolished by the Mexican government. All sorts of conflicting rumors on the subject are afloat, and are causing quite a stir on both sides.

A NEW QUARANTINE LINE.**The Government to Make Changes Regarding Texas Fever.**

FORT WORTH, Feb. 17.—News comes from Chicago through Col. Pierson, agent of the government bureau of animal industry, that the government authorities have decided on a new quarantine line against "Texas" or splenic fever. The action is regarded as another outrage against the livestock industry of Texas.

It has been but a short time since the territorial veterinary surgeons of several northwestern territories and the state veterinarian of Colorado were in Texas on a tour of investigation into the cattle conditions, with a view of establishing the quarantine line of those territories and Colorado against Texas cattle. After a diligent inquiry and a most painstaking investigation of every feature that had any bearing on the matter, these gentlemen concluded that the then existing fever line was too far north at some points, and agreed to change it so as to take in several counties west of Fort Worth.

These gentlemen sent here for the special purpose by their action said that the ban had been laid on too much Texas territory and too many Texas cattle, but the government has decided to establish the fever line nearly a hundred miles farther north, and by this place and the ban all of the Indian territory and Texas except that portion of the Panhandle lying north of the thirty-fourth parallel, an action that will do much harm to the Texas cattle interests.

Why the change has been made is unaccountable unless it has been brought about by unfair representations made to the government.

Long and Short Haul.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—A number of letters and memorials have been introduced in the senate of late advocating the repeal of the long and short haul clause of the interstate commerce law. Most of those come from the west and that the law increased the cost of transporting western products to the eastern markets and had so materially increased the cost of goods to western consumers.
Before taking action upon the resolutions the senate committee on interstate commerce has appealed to the interstate commission to send a special agent to the territory covered by the complaints in order that full investigation may be made on the spot.

The Sun for Chicago.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The New York Sun comes out in a leading editorial abandoning New York's claim to the world's fair and advocating the claims of Chicago.

This action is considered to be significant as indicating the second choice of at least a fair share of New York people. Some others are expected to vote for Washington as second choice.
The sun says New York there is but one place where there is any prospect that an undertaking so gigantic can be accomplished, and that place is Chicago. The proposition to have it in Washington because that is the seat of the federal government turns out, when it is carefully examined, to be destitute of merit.

Colorado Oil Field Notes.

FLORENCE, Colo., Feb. 17.—The Triumph Oil company, recently organized by local capitalists, yesterday struck oil in well No. 1 at a depth of 1,000 feet. It is now being pumped and the show is good. It is the third well struck within a month inside the city limits.
The Florence Oil company has begun the erection of an addition to its refining works for the accommodation of another still, making five stills this company will own.

To Close up a Watch Company.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—A motion was made Saturday before Judge Dykman at White Plains for the appointment of a receiver and to dissolve the Non-Magnetic Watch company of New York city. The company was organized about two years ago by Charles W. Ward, of Detroit, in Bernese, Switzerland. Ward, who is a son of David Ward, a millionaire of Detroit, went to Switzerland to establish a large watch factory at Bern. It is said he has nearly \$1,000,000 sunk in the business. Proceedings are brought to close up the affairs of the concern.

THE SOUTHWEST'S RICK.**Further Protest Against the Removal of Apaches to Fort Sill.**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—Gov. Wolfley, of Arizona, and Gen. Miles appeared before the house committee on Indian affairs with regard to the proposed removal of the Apaches to Fort Sill. Gov. Wolfley presented a large number of clippings from western newspapers which he said showed that the sentiment of the people was that these Indians should not be returned to the west. In speaking of the Indian situation, Gov. Wolfley said he was no more a red hatched hunter than he; that the people in Arizona believed in and liked Gen. Crook, but they thought he made a mistake in recommending the transfer of the Indians.

At the conclusion of Gov. Wolfley's testimony Gen. Miles, at the request of the chairman of the committee, gave a detailed account of his campaign against the hostiles from the time he relieved Gen. Crook in April, 1886, to the time of their surrender. He declared he had no confidence in the Indian scouts. If they were true to their word, he had no use for them who would hire out at the rate of \$13 per month to trail their friends and relatives for delivery to the enemy. He related his efforts in trying to get the Indians moved to a place that was healthy and beneficial to them, and of their removal finally to the east.

He then referred to the desperate character of the Apaches, and said if they were sent to Fort Sill there would be practically nothing between them and the mountains of Mexico. If they got back west they would in all probability be nomadic in six weeks. Gen. Miles said in conclusion that he thought the people of Arizona and New Mexico had a great cause for apprehension if the Indians were removed to Fort Sill.

A Big Mortgage on the Midland.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Feb. 15.—A consolidated mortgage on the Colorado Midland railroad for the sum of \$500,000 was filed in the office of the county clerk last evening. This makes the fourth mortgage put on the Pike's Peak road since 1886.

The money will be used in completing the Midland extension from Glenwood Springs down Grand river toward Junction, and in purchasing additional rolling stock for the road. The Central Trust company, of New York, are the holders of the mortgage, which bears interest at the rate of six per cent.

Races at Trinidad Next Month.

TRINIDAD, Feb. 17.—A grand free-for-all trotting race is looked for March 10, at the City Park association company's grounds. Four entries have already been made. They are George W. Thompson's "Ethan Allen," Simpson's "Black Empire," Murdo McKenzie's "Cowboy Sorrel" and E. L. West's "Doctor Tanner." Other entries will probably be made.

James' Slayer Released.

DALLAS, Texas, Feb. 17.—Bradley, the pugilist who killed Tom James in a sparring match, has been discharged on the grounds that there is no law to indict a man for killing another in a licensed exhibition. The other members of the party, including Kilman, were also released.

The Bank Statement.

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—The bank statement shows reserve decrease of \$23,000 and a specie decrease of \$2,302,000. The banks now hold \$7,479,000 in excess of the rules.

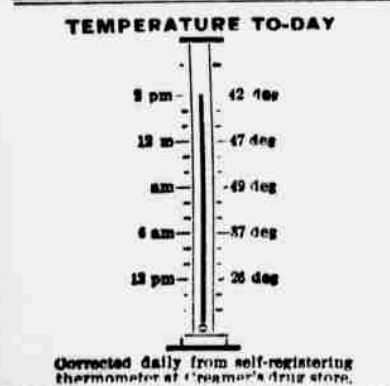

A SPLENDID SHOWING.

Official Figures on New Mexico's Agriculture - A Flattering Future Assured.

Statistician Dodge, of the government agricultural department, has just issued some official figures on western agriculture for 1907 which make a very gratifying exhibit for our fair yet much-maligned territory; figures which will prove of especial interest to a large class of the New Mexican's readers, not only the friends of statehood, but also to the hundreds of people at home and abroad who are now engaged in making it possible to enlarge the cultivable area by the construction of irrigation enterprises. These figures show what New Mexico has done while handicapped in a manner that no other section of the union has ever been called on to fight against; they make it plain that New Mexico will advance, despite every obstacle, and when one considers that more than a million dollars are now going into new irrigation companies which will reclaim within the present year more than 200,000 acres of New Mexico valley land, some idea of New Mexico's outlook from the standpoint of horticulture and agriculture may be arrived at. Statistician Dodge's figures for the corn crop are as follows:

Acres Planted—Colorado, 42,963; New Mexico, 26,779; Utah, 3,917.

Bushels Realized—Colorado, 1,092,000; New Mexico, 1,126,000; Utah, 141,000.

Value of Crop—Colorado, \$1,333,373; N. M., 674,468; Utah, \$392,000.

The returns for the wheat crop are from a more extended territory, as follows:

Acres Planted—Colorado, 57,340; Nevada, 18,390; Arizona, 20,353; Idaho, 81,427; Montana, 85,000; New Mexico, 80,230; Utah, 122,878.

Bushels Realized—Colorado, 1,551,000; Nevada, 335,000; Arizona, 337,000; Idaho, 1,440,000; Montana, 1,519,000; New Mexico, 1,290,000; Utah, 1,880,000.

Value of Crop—Colorado, \$1,332,517; Nevada, \$261,200; Arizona, \$252,818; New Mexico, \$85,041; Utah, \$1,410,929.

The following are the estimates of the oat crop:

Acres Planted—Colorado, 97,791; Idaho, 5,720; Montana, 85,937; New Mexico, 10,618; Utah, 36,618.

Bushels Realized—Colorado, 3,129,000; Idaho, 1,000,000; Montana, 2,278,000; New Mexico, 340,000; Utah, 910,000.

Value of Crop—Colorado, \$1,261,725; Idaho, \$440,135; Montana, \$1,124,282; New Mexico, \$142,642; Utah, \$412,403.

It will be seen that in quantity and value, excepting oats, of the three grains estimated, New Mexico ranks Colorado and Montana.

OFFICIAL AND OTHERWISE.

New Charters and Other News Notes Gathered About the Territorial Capital.

The Southern Coal company filed articles of incorporation to-day at the office of the territorial secretary. The incorporators are Joel D. Harvey and W. P. Harvey, of Geneva, Ill.; Altheon B. Wadleigh, W. B. Henderson, of Glendale, and Edward W. Nelson, of Cerritos. Capital stock, \$100,000. Principal place of business, Albuquerque. The company is now engaged in opening promising coal deposits not far from Wallace. Also the Chidena Mining & Milling company has filed articles. The incorporators are James N. Eastwood, A. G. Bodwell, L. A. Bryant, of Kansas City; Alphonso Applepie and W. H. Smith, of Grant county. Capital stock \$10,000. Principal place of business, Lordsburg, N. M.

The grand jury took up its grind again at 10 o'clock this morning.

Survivor General Hobart spent Sunday at Las Vegas, returning home last night.

Adolfo Chavez, of Albuquerque, and John B. Block, of Arhuetia, Betulillo county, have been commissioned notaries public.

Gov. Prince has received for distribution a large number of pamphlets on the silver question, including the proceedings complete of the recent national silver convention.

A. F. Miller, of Chamita, has been in the city several days seeking appointment as deputy U. S. marshal in San Juan county, where he was formerly postmaster at Farmington.

A certificate has been filed at the secretary's office showing the headquarters of the Vermojo company from Horseshoe ranch to Deuing. C. H. Dune is president of the company.

Judge Whitman is gradually recovering from his sick spell, but was scarcely well enough to make the trip from Albuquerque this afternoon. Court is being resumed from day to day, but will probably resume business tomorrow.

The governor has issued a requisition upon the governor of Chihuahua, Mexico, for the arrest of Francisco Lara, charged with the crime of seducing and carrying away a minor in Grant county last July. Porceto Rodriguez is designated as agent to go after Lara.

At the last meeting of the capitol commission Gov. Prince was authorized to expend \$50 in the purchase of additional shrubbery for the capitol park. He has made out an order for a collection of beautiful long trees, which will soon have prominent places in the park.

The national superintendent of the census has asked the county officers for a complete report of the financial condition of Santa Fe county. It is on occasions like this that those who fail to take an interest in the cause of good government on election day ought to feel like crawling into their holes and pulling the haws in after them.

There is some inside history connected with the arrest of E. W. Nelson, of Wallace, recently noted in these columns. He was formerly clerk of Apache county, A. T., and was opposed by a bitter faction at St. Johns. After his term of office expired, about a year ago, he removed to this territory, and engaged in mining. After his departure he was indicted on the charge of taking illegal fees. A grand jury instituted by the Democratic-Monarch grand jury of Apache county.

ALONG THE ROAD.

Affairs for the extension of the narrow gauge to San Pedro are brightening daily. Passenger traffic in and out of Santa Fe over the narrow gauge system is reported to be improving.

Morris R. Locke's scheme to have New Mexico counties vote bonds for the completion of the White Oaks road has fallen flat.

It is said that the D. & R. G. is still bound by the tripartite agreement not to do business south of Espanola on its own hook.

The D. & R. G. expects to put a fast train over its road to southwestern Colorado and northern New Mexico sometime next month.

The Eddy Argus says the Warburn & Pecos valley gap will be filled in by the A. T. & S. F. This spring. It would boom southeastern New Mexico.

At Waco, Texas, the other day the Gulf, Brown Valley & Pacific railway company organized by electing Mr. C. W. White, president; E. J. Garley, vice president and treasurer; R. G. Gurley, chief engineer; W. H. Ross, general manager, and H. M. Taylor, secretary. The general office will be at Waco. A contract has been closed with the citizens of Mineral Wells to connect from that point with a railroad now in operation. Hon. Charles B. Eddy, of the Pecos, is one of the prominent men of the organization.

De Remer has a force of thirty teams and sixty men at work, extending the branch some thirty-one miles to the head of Red river in New Mexico, presumably for the purpose of finding new fields of lumber. Of these thirty-one miles of road fifteen have to be completed by July 1. The work will be pushed soon with renewed energy as the force now in Road canon will be transferred to the Maxwell branch, and two car loads of large lumber will be brought in from Kansas City for this purpose. The camp itself is a busy place as far as work is concerned, the railroad track being lined on either side with piles of lumber, ready to be marketed, so says the Trinidad Citizen.

Hon. Tom Burns, of Rio Arriba county, says to the Navajos to a reporter of the Los Angeles Tribune:

"As to the whole Navajo tribe going to war, I am satisfied they would not. They have too many cattle, sheep and horses to do so, but in case of trouble such would make it so much the worse for the homes and ranches of the powerful Indians would be the rendezvous for the hostiles, both for rest and provisions when they got hard pressed, and after they were once in the reservation you could not tell one from the other."

"The policy of the government toward the Indians is as inconsistent as it is vacillating. It makes a treaty with them as it would with a foreign nation and at the same time treats them as wards. If the land on a payment was turned over to the military the Indian question to a great extent would be settled."

John P. Wilson died suddenly at Hillsborough. The immediate cause of death, as shown by the autopsy, was general mania, resulting from the denudation of the lining membrane of the stomach and intestines, which prevented all food from being digested or absorbed. Mr. Wilson will be remembered as the unfortunate victim of a mistake through which corrosive sublimate was taken into the system.

The stock men held a meeting in Roswell last Monday at which they discussed ways and means of watering the back dry range. A system of reservoirs at distances of from fifteen to twenty miles last week, was agreed to be the most approved. A VALUABLE DISCOVERY.

Volcanic Sand Near Santa Fe and their Conversion into Cheap Building Material.

Samples of a new building material, produced through the ingenuity of Mr. Q. Monier are on exhibition at the Second National bank to-day, and have attracted general attention. When Mr. Monier visited Paris recently he found huge structures, five and six stories high, built of a sort of concrete mixture, the basis of which is volcanic sand. Being familiar with similar deposits near Santa Fe, an idea struck him and he at once sought out, through some influential Parisian friends, the manufacturers of this material, and they spared no pains to let him into all the secrets of their process, knowing that any similar manufacture established in western America could not in the least interfere with their success. Mr. Monier spent much time familiarizing himself with the details of the French methods of manufacture, and upon returning home he immediately set about experimenting with the volcanic sands which exist in such vast quantities near this city. As a result he displays to-day specimens of his manufacture which seem to bear out every claim made for them as a building material. Four ingredients are used in its manufacture, though volcanic sand, lime and water are all that the public need to know of; the secret exists in the fourth ingredient and in the proportion of materials used to produce the required result. The stuff is one-half lighter than stone, is turned out in moulds, requires no burning and can be manufactured as cheaply as brick, which at the present time are selling here at \$4 a thousand. It is claimed for it that it is more durable than sandstone and that the action of the weather has no effect upon it. In appearance it is of a chunky white mottled like granite. It can also be made into hollow brick or laid in a concrete between these specimens of blocks belong to Mr. Lehman Spiegelberg, and is distant about fifteen miles from Santa Fe and near the railroad.
