Telegraphic Tidings

WASHINGTON MATTERS.

HON. W. D. LEE CONFIRMED.
WASHINGTON, March 8.—The senate yesterday confirmed the nomination of William D. Lee as associate justice of the supreme court of New Mexico.

THEY WON'T TELL.
In the executive session another day passed without the senate coming to a decision as to what is to be done with newspapers correspondents who refuse to tell Senator Dolph's special committee how they get the proceedings of the executive session. The discussion yesterday was devoted largely to the power of the senate under the constitution to punish correspondence.

UNCLAIMED LAND GRANTS.
The senate committee on public lands yesterday reported a general land grant forfeiture bill framed on the same lines as the bill passed by the senate during the last congress. The bill forfeits to the United States all lands opposite to any railroad not now completed and in operation, for construction or the benefit which the lands have heretofore been granted, provided, however, that this shall not be construed as a forfeiture of lands heretofore earned by the construction of any portion of a railroad under any act of congress making a grant of public lands.

CHICAGO IN TROUBLE.
It looks as if Chicago would yet have difficulty in getting the bill through congress for the world's fair, for the reason that there is unexpected difficulty in getting the guaranty fund in shape. Messrs. Hitt and Springer have charge of the bill, and they are looked to make the changes in it to fit the situation at Chicago, but so far they have done nothing, and some of the representatives are beginning to think that the necessary \$10,000,000 fund is still an unrealized one.
Said Representative Belden, of New York, a member of the world's fair committee: "We find that they have no corporation or other organization in Chicago to carry on the fair and no guaranty fund. Really they have to substantiate subscription to any extent. Instead of having a subscription list binding in law, the committee there made assessment upon various industries, trades, mercantile houses, etc., 2 per cent of which they collected."

WILL THE UTES GO?
Indian Commissioner Morgan, in a report to the secretary of the interior, protesting against the passage of the bill now pending in congress providing for removal of the Southern Utes now in Colorado to a reservation in the eastern part of Utah.

The Cat Out of the Bag.
ATOKA, I. T., March 8.—It has transpired that while the attention of the public was directed to Louisiana and North Dakota, the lottery plan was quietly being worked in the Choctaw Nation, so quietly that the fact was generally unknown in the nation until yesterday, when the "Laws of the Choctaw Nation" appeared in pamphlet form. The lottery scheme resembles the North Dakota proposition in outline and details, and like the proposed inducement of the Louisiana Lottery company to the sugar bowl state for an extension of its charter, is conditioned upon the payment of an annual sum into the Choctaw treasury.
The pamphlet comprises a total of eighty-four bills, fifty-eight of which were passed at the regular session and twenty-six passed at the called session of the Choctaw legislature. Some of them are peculiar. One pledges 25 per cent. of the proceeds of the sale of the \$5,000,000 acres of the leased district.

Short on Sugar.
HOUSTON, Texas, March 7.—The Texas Sugar Planters' association convened here yesterday. From reports received it appears that the recent frost has done more than high tariff for the next crop. Nearly all the cane, which was ten inches high, is killed.
It is also feared that the lower eyes are destroyed, and the only hope is for the stubble. Conservative estimates place the damage to the sugar crop at 50 to 75 per cent. Last night a terrible hail storm, the worst for many years, came up, and what was not damaged by the freeze is killed by the hail.

McKinley's Bill in Europe.
PARIS, March 8.—Lecomte, member of the chamber of deputies, had an interview with Spuler, minister of foreign affairs, in which was presented the disadvantage the French dry goods trade would suffer from the adoption by the American congress of the McKinley bill. Spuler stated that France, England, Italy and Switzerland had agreed to communicate with Washington authorities in regard to the matter.

THE RENEGADE APACHES.

Their Wives and Children to be Sent to Fort Union, N. M.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The secretary of the interior has approved a recommendation of military authorities at San Carlos Indian agency in Arizona that about 100 of the wives, children and other relatives of the renegade Apaches be removed to Fort Union, N. M., for temporary confinement. This action is taken, it is supposed, for the moral effect both upon the renegades and those at the agency. It is the intention of the Indian bureau to place at some Indian school the children who are of school age.

The Lottery in Dakota.
MINNEAPOLIS, March 7.—The Journal's Grand Forks, N. D., special says: The following circular was received here to day

from Mayor Bentley, of Bismarck: There are strong rumors that the famous lottery bill will be reintroduced in the legislature May 1, or soon thereafter, and that M. A. Pauphin, president of the lottery of the Louisiana company, is now in this city. "Circulate and forward protests to the secretary of the commission and at once arrange to have leading citizens ready to come to Bismarck to exert their influence against the bill." The citizens here are considerably excited and sentiments are that the bill will pass if introduced again.

SOUTHWEST'S VICTORY.

The Apaches will not be Transferred from Florida to Fort Sill.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—In response to a letter from Gen. Howard, Chairman Perkins, of the house committee on Indian affairs, writes:

"I am in receipt of your letter. In reply I have to inform you that it is not the desire of the committee on Indian affairs to become a party in any way to a controversy or feeling that seems to exist between the friends of Gen. Crook and the friends of Gen. Miles. Some things have already been said before our committee that had no relevancy to the question we desired to consider, and so far as the committee is concerned will have no influence with us in our deliberations. We have Gen. Crook's recommendations, and have also been addressed by members of his staff, and by those who believe with him that the Apaches can be safely confined on the Fort Sill reservation; and we heard Gen. Miles and delegates and representatives from New Mexico and Arizona.

"We think it would be unwise to remove the Indians to the Indian territory. The desire of the committee is only to do what is fair and right in the matter—what seems to be for the good of these Indians and at the same time fair to the people of the territories. I believe much of the fear that is entertained by the settlers of New Mexico and Arizona is exaggerated fear. But while considering the good of the Indian I think it is but right to take into consideration the wishes and interests of thousands of settlers who are living in these territories, who have their homes there, and who assert that since the removal of the Apaches they have enjoyed their first security as settlers in these territories. Whether their fears are exaggerated and excited or not, I think it is the duty of the committee to realize that they exist, and under such circumstances it becomes quite important for us to determine whether, for the good of these Indians, we will to some extent at least sacrifice the comfort and prosperity of the people of Arizona and New Mexico. On Mexico is also opposed to their removal to the Fort Sill reservation. But the committee has not yet determined what action to take in the matter."

HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

The Cole Collection.

To the Press and the People of New Mexico.
Your attention has before been requested to the importance of securing the collection of New Mexican antiquities made by the late Leslie W. Cole, for the territorial Historical society, and thus preventing its sale to any institution outside of New Mexico. Mr. Cole's price in his life time was \$1,500, but we have proposed in an attempt for its purchase by the Historical society for \$1,000, payable in instalments. As the only method to obtain this sum was by voluntary contributions, an appeal was made last year to some of our most public spirited citizens, asking that each would subscribe \$25 for the purpose, and that by the same time become a life member of the society. Letters were written to forty-eight persons on this subject, and of these no less than fifteen have responded favorably. One gentleman sent \$25 without solicitation, from reading of the obituary notice of the late Mr. Cole, and the amount of these donations being \$400 in all, the purchase of the collection has been paid to Mr. Cole, and another instalment of the purchase money will become due very soon. Forty-three additional letters have recently been written, but thus far but one sum of \$25 has resulted from them. This makes it necessary to make a general appeal to the public in order that all who are interested in the subject may have it brought to their attention and be afforded the opportunity of aiding in preserving this unique collection for public exhibition within our territory.
We earnestly ask, therefore, that contributions of \$25 each may be received without delay, and we also ask of the territorial press that it will again aid in this work by giving publicity to the foregoing appeal.

GRAND JURY'S REPORT.

The Lengthy Document on Public Affairs Presented in Court this Morning.

The grand jury presented its report in the district court shortly before the noon hour today and the court hall was jammed with people who listened intently as the document was read. It is addressed to the court in the usual manner and reads as follows:

The grand jury for this term would respectfully submit the following report. We have endeavored to discharge faithfully the duties imposed upon us, and in the investigation of matters brought before us we have found that many of the territorial statutes bearing upon criminal matters and the duties of territorial and county officials are inadequate and ineffectual.

We take occasion to call attention to this fact that the next legislative assembly may remedy such defects.

We have carefully and diligently examined into all matters affecting violations of the laws of the United States and of the territory which were brought to our notice, and have found "true bills," only in such cases where the evidence before us was strong enough to justify us in so doing.

During our examination of the United States cases we were informed of considerable drunkenness among Indians, but were unable to ascertain from whom they obtained the liquor.

In investigating territorial officials we found the books of the auditor and treasurer in good and satisfactory condition. We noticed that the present sheriff of Valencia county has failed to pay any funds into the territorial treasury since he has been in office, that the ex-sheriff of Taos county, Lorenzo Lobata, has not turned over the funds in his hands belonging to the territory and made his final settlement with the auditor as required by law, and we would suggest that the auditor general institute suit to recover said moneys from these officials.

We also found that the county commissioners of Santa Fe, Rio Arriba, Taos and Valencia counties have failed to comply with the requirements of section 2895, of the Compiled Laws of the territory of New Mexico.

We visited the territorial penitentiary found there ninety convicts. We consider this institution conducted in an orderly, proper and economical manner.

We would, however, state that in our opinion the territorial board of penitentiary managers have violated section 31, chapter 26, of the laws of 1880, in failing to advertise for bids for the supplies furnished the penitentiary in November, 1889. We found on examination of the books of the auditor and treasurer that the accounts of the collector of Santa Fe county with said officers are as follows:

The charges against said collector from the time he came into office in 1885 up to Jan. 1, 1889, are \$89,558.29. Payments made during same period are \$58,338.02. Collector's commission on the same \$3,332.44. Uncollected tax list returned by him, \$27,773.76. Total credit \$89,404.22, leaving a balance in his favor of \$40,337.

In the year 1889 the charges are \$20,062.83. Payments to February 1, 1890, \$19,827.24, to be accounted for at the expiration of the fiscal year of 1890. Of this last amount the collector is entitled to his commission as provided by law.

We deem it our duty to call attention to the fact that the collector general of the territory and the attorney of this district are both in the employ of railroads as attorneys, and believe it to be detrimental to public morals and the proper administration of the duties of the said officers, who may be required to appear for the territory or county in suits and tax matters against railroad companies at any time, and would suggest that the legislative assembly pass a law prohibiting such officials from acting as attorneys for railroad companies or any other corporations.

We have examined carefully into the condition of the county affairs and are sorry to state the many complaints of the press and the public at large, which made it necessary for your honor to give such a detailed charge in this respect, were substantially verified by the facts brought forth in our examinations.

The present county commissioners, as well as their immediate predecessors, have grossly violated the law and overstepped their authority in the paying of accounts against the county without the same first being itemized and verified, as provided by section 375, Compiled Laws of New Mexico; also in the matter of publishing the proceedings of said board of county commissioners, as required by section 376 of same laws, and drawing warrants against the school fund.

Said board has failed to comply with section 3, chapter 8, of the laws of 1887, by not advertising for bids on the construction of certain bridges in the town of Santa Fe.

We consider that the board of county commissioners has violated the law and the performance of its duties in not requiring the sheriff to make settlements as provided for.

We found that the chairman of the board of county commissioners in the year of 1888 exceeded his authority in directing the treasurer of the county to pay a draft, drawn on him as chairman of the board, of the amount of \$5,000, for the payment of coupons then due on the bonds of the T. S. F. & N. railroad, without the surrender of the corresponding amount of coupons; and that he further exceeded his authority by allowing the said coupons to be retained as collateral security for a loan of \$4,000, made to the holders of said bonds and unpaid coupons by a certain banking firm in New York city, on which loan said banking firm now claims interest at the rate of 6 per cent from the county, amounting to the sum of \$934.43, which interest is an unjust and unlawful claim against this county.

The aforesaid coupons are still in the hands of the said banking firm.

Upon examination of the county records, we found that on July 20, 1886, the said board of county commissioners authorized the issuance of warrants to the amount of \$75,000 for the purpose of the construction of a county court house, and that in the latter part of August, 1886, the said board did issue \$50,000 of such warrants dated July 1, 1886, with interest-bearing coupons attached. There were afterward issued \$4,000 of these warrants bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent, for the completion of this court house.

The original contract for the furnishing of the court house was \$1,297.90, payment of which the chairman sold \$1,000 in warrants for \$500, which was applied thereon, leaving a balance still due of \$1,297.90, for which were issued \$3,000 in warrants bearing interest at 8 per cent.

We are of the opinion that all these warrants were issued in violation of the act of congress approved July 30, 1886.

Yet, notwithstanding the fact that a suit was pending to test the validity of these warrants, the present board of county commissioners did in last September fund said warrants at a special meeting, without notifying one of the members of said board, and continued in session all night and participated with the holder of said bonds in a champagne supper.

A further violation of the law by the county commissioners consists in the practice of issuing warrants at a depreciated valuation. We mention only one of

many instances: Chas. Wagner, of this town, presented a claim against the county for the amount of \$1, for which the chairman issued a warrant for \$30.

The present board of commissioners have violated the law by directing the sheriff not to turn over to the county treasurer any money collected by him and further by ordering him to pay out of such money the policemen, the county clerk and other parties.

We had before us the original franchise of the Water company, and found that the said company had failed to comply with the original conditions thereof. This franchise stipulated that the said company should construct three reservoirs within one year from the date of same, which was not complied with. In 1888 the board of county commissioners passed a resolution releasing said company from any further obligations to construct the third reservoir, on the ground that the supply of water in the already constructed reservoir was sufficient for the present demands of the public.

The grand jury believes that the said board exceeded its authority by passing such resolution.

We found that the chairman of the present board has rented the court house hall for theatrical performances and for other purposes without receiving any compensation therefor. Although by so doing he created a higher rate of insurance on the building, and having no authority to do so.

The total county debt to date consists of the following:

Furthermore, about \$12,000 for 1889 for which no warrants are drawn as yet, and about \$13,000 for coupons on the T. S. F. & N. R. R. bonds.

We examined the accounts of the collector, Francisco Chavez, and found that he has never made final settlement with the commissioners as required by law, and upon investigation of his accounts with the county, have to report as follows:

Charges made by the county against him from the time he entered in office up to January 1, 1889, are \$214,814.62. Payments made by him during same period into the treasury, \$122,202.20. Collector's commission, \$8,148.80. Expenses paid by him, \$72,176.57. Uncollected taxes during period, \$208,232.00.

Leaving a balance in favor of the county on January 1, 1889, of \$6,559.77. A further charge made by the county against F. Chavez, for the year 1889 to 1890, for taxes and licenses, \$5,943.44.

Total, \$12,503.21. Payment to the treasury up to February 10, 1890, \$16,486.03.

Total balance Feb'y 10, 1890, of \$4,017.18 in favor of the county, from which will be deducted the commission on taxes and license for the year 1889 to 1890. The uncollected tax list returned by Francisco Chavez to the county commissioners, amounting as above stated to \$72,176.57, including the uncollected taxes from 1881 to 1889, as the board of county commissioners have never made a settlement with the said collector for the uncollected taxes, therefore have never given him credit for any portion of a considerable sum of this very large tax list, consisting of taxes on unconfirmed grants, Indian grants, taxes against property which does not belong to this county, or persons who have no property in the county.

At this time such taxes are uncollectable, and proper action should be taken by the county commissioners in relation thereto. The collector has violated the law by obeying the order of the county commissioners to withhold certain moneys in his hands and in not returning same over to the county treasurer, also in that he has taken the functions of treasurer by paying out certain amounts of money by same order.

Of the balance of \$6,559.77 due from the collector on taxes January 1, 1889, there is nearly \$6,000 belonging to the N. M. & S. F. & N. R. R. funds, which he has paid out by the direction of the board of county commissioners.

We found also that he has grossly violated the law by not turning over the money collected by him on the 10th day of each month as provided by law.

We have examined the accounts of the treasurer, Gavino Ortiz, and find that the amount on hand to the credit of the county on February 10, 1889, are as follows:

of the said suits, and we are of the opinion that compromise in such cases should not be made.

We have further to state that certain fees have been received from the county by a district officer in the alleged compromise and settlement of the San Pedro tax suit; this is considered irregular and illegal by this grand jury, and that the proceedings by him in that matter are not such as should be expected by the grand jury of an officer so high in position.

We state that from evidence submitted against certain district and county officials we brought in "true bills." But after consulting the solicitor general and being informed by him that in his opinion convictions could not be secured upon trial on account of the insufficiency of the existing laws, we have therefore reconsidered the matters and concluded not to return indictments against said officials.

In concluding, the grand jury desires to thank your honor and all the court officials for the many courtesies extended to them.

Having completed their labors, the grand jury asks to be discharged.
