## Telegraphic Tidings

**IN FAVOR OF STATEHOOD.**  
The Delegates Pushing their Work Pre-  
paratory to Leaving for Home—  
Stewart Favors Admission.

Special to the New Mexican.  
WASHINGTON, May 8.—Statehood for  
New Mexico has been the feature of the  
work of the delegates thus far this week.  
Yesterday they discussed the question  
fully and many hours and all were prac-  
tically of one opinion, but final agree-  
ment on the matter was postponed  
until Saturday, when Gov. Prince and  
Messrs. Childersleeve, Smith and Stover  
are expected to return to the city from  
their brief vacation.

What is considered a feather in the  
statehood cap is the kindly interest Sen-  
ator Stewart is exhibiting in the matter.  
He said he would favor admission, which  
is very encouraging to the delegation.  
Senator Edmunds is still confined to  
his room, but is expected to be on hand  
when the delegation calls on the senate  
land committee the last of the week.  
In the talk with Minister Romero, of  
Mexico, that gentleman expressed his  
gratification that the question of land  
titles was being pressed by representa-  
tives of New Mexico, and added that  
any and all which he could properly  
render should be cheerfully given. The  
interview was a very agreeable one, and  
showed that on all points of interest  
there is entire unity of action on that  
subject.

The delegation attended the funeral  
services of Senator Beck, at the capitol,  
and Judge L. A. Trimble, formerly mem-  
ber of congress from Kentucky, was one  
of the honorable pall bearers. Judge  
Trimble served in congress with Senator  
Beck, and they were intimate friends.  
The delegates are beginning to scatter,  
but most of them will return and will  
be here by Saturday. Quite a number of  
them will remain here ten days longer.

**The Asylum Fire.**  
LONG PONTIAC, Quebec, May 8.—The  
laundry of the insane asylum, in which  
100 patients were housed during the night,  
has just taken fire. The inmates were  
being removed when the fire broke out,  
and all are now safe on the outside.

Sister Theresa de Jesus, superress of  
the burned asylum, places the loss of life  
at certainly twenty and possibly fifty.  
Dr. Duhaute, government medical inspec-  
tor, places the loss of life at least sixty.  
He is strongly opposed to the system of  
placing inmates under the care of the sis-  
ters and will ask the government to place  
the incurable and furious inmates in a  
small institution where they can have  
skilled treatment. "The harmless insane  
could," he said, "be placed in greater at-  
tention under the care of the sisters."  
The ruins of the asylum are nothing but  
heaps of smoking brick and mortar, and  
no vestige of the dead can be traced.

In the rear of the asylum are stables,  
where about 100 patients were quartered  
last night under the supervision of the  
sisters and four Montreal policemen. The  
scene is not one easy to describe or for-  
get. Lying on heaps of straw, sickly and  
feeble inmates were to be seen, moaning,  
twisting and jumping. It made one  
shudder to pass down between the two  
large hay mows in which were confined  
the worst cases, so fierce was the expres-  
sion of their countenances.

It is yet merely a matter of speculation  
as to the number of dead, but the con-  
clusion is that it can not be fewer  
than 100, perhaps nearly double that.  
The only names of victims known are  
Sisters Gravel, Bouletur, Lumins, Lisra,  
McNicholas and L. Thayer, of the Sacred  
Heart convent. The latter is a patient  
in the violent ward.

**Panama Canal.**  
PARIS, May 8.—The report of the spe-  
cial commissioner sent out by Brunet,  
liquidator of the Panama Canal company,  
to investigate into the condition of the  
canal, estimates that it would cost 450,-  
000,000 francs to complete the canal on  
the Hock system. To this should be  
added 20 per cent for unforeseen expenses  
and 29 per cent for expenses of the man-  
agement and interest. The total cost is  
fixed at 900,000,000 francs. The report  
further says it would take between seven  
and eight years to complete the canal at an  
annual cost of management estimated at  
10,000,000 francs. According to the esti-  
mates of the commissioners the net re-  
ceipts for the first five years after open-  
ing would be 35,000,000 francs annually  
and gradually increasing year by year  
until twelve after the opening, when they  
would amount to 61,000,000 francs. The  
material of the old company and work  
already performed is valued at 450,000,-  
000 francs.

**One Man Killed.**  
FOUNTAIN, Colo., May 8.—The north  
bound freight train side tracked in the  
Denver & Rio Grande yards last night to  
allow the Trinidad & Durango, express,  
south bound, due at 2:51 a. m., to pass.  
The freight crew left the switch open and  
the express engine, baggage car, smoker  
and one coach were thrown from the  
14 foot embankment. The engineer of  
the passenger saw the open switch, but  
was unable to stop, as he was running  
down grade. The engine was badly dam-  
aged and its fireman killed. Engineer  
Dan Mark escaped by a miracle with only  
a few bruises. There were a few pas-  
sengers in the smoker and coach, as

nearly all were in the sleepers, which  
did not leave the track. Those that  
were in the cars that left track escaped  
without injury other than getting  
up. The tender, baggage and smoking  
cars were turned over and the day  
coach was thrown on one side, and one  
sleeper was derailed, but none of the  
passengers experienced any bruises.  
Fireman Spies was 31 years old and  
married. His body will be taken to  
Pueblo for burial.

**Italians on the War Path.**  
NEW ORLEANS, May 8.—There is a ven-  
detta between the Carosond Provenzano  
factions of Italians. Yesterday morning  
one of the Provenzos lay in wait in the  
esplanade and fired twenty-five shots into  
a wagon load of the Carosond faction. Ten  
Provenzos have been arrested, but it  
will be difficult to prove anything against  
them as the Carosonds probably prefer to  
get even in their own way.

**Married in Washington.**  
WASHINGTON, May 8.—The marriage  
of Lily Rosecrans to governor Toole, of  
Montana, was solemnized quietly at St.  
Matthew's church at 11 o'clock today.  
The wedding was private, with only  
general Rosecrans and a few intimate  
friends present. The governor and his  
wife will leave the city this afternoon for  
a week's sojourn at the seashore, and  
then go to their home in Montana.

**M. E. Conference.**  
St. Louis, May 8.—This morning the  
quadrannual general conference of the  
Methodist Episcopal church, south, be-  
gan. Forty conferences are represented,  
including, besides the southern states,  
Colorado, California, Montana, Brazil  
and Mexico. The morning session was  
devoted to an address of welcome and the  
bishop's address.

**WASHINGTON MATTERS.**  
**TARIFF DEBATE.**  
WASHINGTON, May 8.—The tariff debate  
in the house tomorrow will be opened by  
Major McKinley, chairman of the ways  
and means committee. Mr. Carlisle was  
to have followed McKinley, but as that  
gentleman will be absent for several days  
in attendance upon the funeral of Senator  
Beck, it has been arranged that he shall  
close the debate on the Democratic side  
and that Mills shall follow McKinley.

**MAXIMUM REWARD.**  
Asst. Sec. Tichenor to-day made an  
award of \$5,000 to S. L. Morehead, a citi-  
zen of San Francisco, for services in con-  
nection with the seizure of a large quan-  
tity of opium smuggled into San Fran-  
cisco a year ago. The award was the  
maximum allowed by law. It is said  
Morehead was offered large pecuniary in-  
ducements not to betray the smugglers  
and spurned them.

**McKINLEY'S BILL.**  
Several reports have been sent from  
here to the effect that the Republicans of  
the ways and means committee, alarmed  
at the prospect of a deficiency in the re-  
venues, owing to the large and extravagant  
appropriations, were seriously thinking of  
passing the McKinley tariff bill in opera-  
tion one year after its passage. There is  
the highest committee authority for say-  
ing that the bill, if passed in June, will  
go into effect July 1. Should it not re-  
ceive the president's signature until a few  
weeks later it will become operative with-  
in the thirty days succeeding.

**PENSION MATTERS.**  
A meeting of the senate committee on  
pensions was held to-day at which the  
Morrill disability and service pension bill  
combined, substituted by the house for  
the senate dependent pension bill, was  
considered. The action was postponed  
until the next meeting of the com-  
mittee. It is understood, however, that  
opposition to the house measure is unani-  
mous and the committee will recommend  
that the senate non-concur in the action  
of the house.

**CONGRESSMEN GOING HOME.**  
There will be a decided exodus of con-  
gressmen within the next ten days. Many  
of them have been anxious to get to their  
districts for a couple of weeks to look  
after the selection of delegates to the con-  
vention which will decide their fate for  
years to come.

The tariff debate has just begun and  
will end two weeks later, just long enough  
to suit the exigencies of the members.  
**Mexican International Railway.**  
Lima, Peru, May 8.—An important deal  
was made here Tuesday. W. J. Marks,  
the representative of a wealthy English  
syndicate, Major Sisson, of New York;  
Gen. Huss, of Chicago, and B. C. Faurst,  
of this city, signed a contract for build-  
ing 1,350 miles of the Mexican Inter-  
national railway from Deming, N. M., to  
Topolobampo bay, on the Pacific coast.  
The amount involved is \$21,550,000.

**Asphyxiated.**  
GRAND ISLAND, Neb., May 8.—Mr. and  
Mrs. C. M. Burt, of Fairfield, arrived in  
this city last night on their wedding tour  
and registered at the Dunphy house.  
This morning Mrs. Burt was found dead  
in the room with her husband at her side  
in an unconscious condition. The physi-  
cians say he can not live. The gas had  
been blown out.

**Shot his Love, then Himself.**  
ASTORIA, Neb., May 8.—Charles Clark,  
of Freeport, has been paying attention to  
Miss May McIntyre, a young girl of  
wealthy parents. He proposed marriage  
and when she rejected him he shot her  
twice and then, putting the weapon to  
his own temple, blew out his brains. Miss  
McIntyre is fatally wounded.

**He Will Quit.**  
PITTSBURG, May 8.—On his way to Des  
Moines, Iowa, this morning, to attend the  
funeral of his father, Assistant Postmas-  
ter General Clarkson said that he had  
definitely decided to leave the postal  
service July 1.

## CONGRESSIONAL.

**SENATE.**  
WASHINGTON, May 7.—The senate to-  
day voted to take up the bill to transfer  
the revenue marine from the treasury to  
the navy department.  
At 2 p. m. Senator Vest objected to  
further delay in considering the silver bill,  
and it was taken up.

**HOUSE.**  
In the house the committee on elec-  
tions reported on the Alabama contested  
election case of McMillan vs. Turpin in  
favor of the contestant. The report was  
ordered printed.  
McKinley, of Ohio, moved to go into a  
committee of the whole for the considera-  
tion of the tariff bill. McKinley said he  
hoped to close the debate by Saturday  
evening.

Mills, of Texas, protested against the  
short time allowed for the debate, but  
McKinley's motion was agreed to.  
The house then went into committee of  
the whole. McKinley took the floor in  
support of the bill. He said that as a  
result of the last political campaign the  
majority in this house and the presence  
of Harrison in the president's chair meant  
a revision of the tariff was demanded by  
the people and that the revision should  
be along the line and in full recognition  
of the principle and purposes of protec-  
tion. (Applause.)

The bill presented was in full contin-  
uation of the policy of protective tariff. The  
bill has not abolished the internal revenue  
tax, as the committee had found this  
abolition unnecessary. The bill recom-  
mended the abolition of all special tax and  
a reduction of the tax on tobacco and  
sugar, and removes the restrictions upon  
the growers of tobacco and sugar. It also  
repeals the internal revenue law of 1892  
as to present law, which allows 22 per  
cent drawback. The new law allows 30  
per cent. This disposed of the free raw  
material question.

## COOLNESS OF A MAJOR.

Major Warner, Chosen an Attorney Who  
Attempted to Shoot Him.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 8.—Major Wil-  
liam Warner, who has a national reputa-  
tion as being ex-commander in chief of  
the Grand Army of the Republic, had a  
personal encounter in a court room yester-  
day which, but for the major's quickness  
and coolness, would in all probability  
have ended disastrously for some one.  
Mr. Warner is attorney for John L. Sher-  
man, who is charged with the murder of  
W. C. Wrightman, whose bones are sup-  
posed to be in possession of the court.  
The case against Sherman is being pro-  
secuted by a nephew of Wrightman  
named W. E. Grayston.

An altercation arose between Grayston  
and the court over the possession of the  
bones, during which Grayston made the  
remark that the county officials were all  
disgraced. Major Warner took it up and  
said Grayston was badly mistaken in his  
assertion. Grayston immediately an-  
swered by calling Warner a liar. The  
major calmly walked over to where Gray-  
ston was standing, saying: "What do you  
lie, do you?" As he approached, Grayston  
threw his hand behind him and a revolver  
was seen protruding from his pocket.

Before he could draw the weapon War-  
ner was upon him and forced him down  
on a corner. The major said he was  
and was heard to say: "If you attempt  
to draw that revolver I will break your  
neck."

## POLITICAL POINTERS.

The good citizens of this county, namel-  
y, Santa Fe, are tired of the fearful mis-  
management and dishonesty that has  
prevailed in county affairs here for years,  
and with good nominations the Republi-  
cans have the best chance of carrying  
Santa Fe county that they have had for  
ten years.

It is asserted that Hon. Antonio Joseph  
has positively declined to be a candidate  
for a re-nomination. He said he was tired  
of the time and leave his seat in the hands  
of the convention. He has very likely  
come to the conclusion that the signs of  
the times point to the election of a Re-  
publican to represent New Mexico in the  
old congress.

The Democratic central committee of  
Lincoln county has had a meeting. The  
committee decided to call the county  
convention for the nomination of county  
officers at Lincoln on August 14, and a  
district convention for the nomination  
of district and legislative candidates at  
Roswell, August 21 next. The district  
convention will also select delegates to  
the Democratic territorial convention.  
Precincts are authorized to elect one dele-  
gate for every twenty votes cast for the  
Democratic delegate for congress at the  
November, 1892, election.
