WASHINGTON, May 9.—Nominations as

Isaac Miller, Ontario.**SILVER CAUCUS.**
A meeting of the Republican senatorial
caucus was held today, at which the sil-
ver question was under consideration. It
was said the only proposition discussed was
one to make the certificates to be issued
for purchases of bullion a full legal ten-
der. The bullion redemption clause has
been abandoned. The caucus was at-
tended by about two-thirds of the Repub-
lican senators, and while a majority were
in favor of making the notes a full legal
tender it was decided to postpone formal
action until there shall be full attendance.
The opinion is expressed that a satisfac-
tory conclusion will be reached.**CERTIFICATES OF PENSION.**

Santa Fe.**QUAY WILL STAY.**
There is much talk of an intent on the
part of Mr. Quay to retire from the chair-
manship of the Republican national com-
mittee. The committee meets here next
Monday, and there is evidence of a
hard fight to dislodge the shrewd Penn-
sylvania politician. Had there not been
a personal fight made upon him, Quay
would probably have withdrawn from
the management of the party affairs, but
under the present circumstances it is
generally believed by well informed Repub-
licans that he will have no desire to
retire, and they say he will certainly not
be deposed. They also say that the fight
is one against Quay, who is dis-
satisfied minority, who do
not like their political methods, and that
the more the Mugwump and Demo-
cratic papers say about this combination
the firmer the party will stand by them.
It is likely that Quay would
withdraw under fire.**INTER STATE COMMERCE.**
Senator Gorman today introduced a
bill to amend the inter state commerce
law to provide that it shall be unlawful
for any company operating a railroad in
an adjacent foreign country to transport
passengers or freight from the United
States into such foreign country, or vice
versa, unless the company shall have ob-
tained a license from the inter state com-
merce commission.**Crocker is Dying.**
New York, May 10.—The Times states
on the authority of Charles F. Crocker,
the mention of whose name could
it be proved would be instantly accepted
as a guarantee of the accuracy of his in-
formation, that Richard Crocker, the
financial leader, now sojourning at
Westwood, is dying. Mrs. Crocker is
about to start for Europe. It is
stated that Fire Commissioner Purroy
will probably succeed Crocker as the Tam-
many "boss."**They Want It.**

WASHINGTON, May 10.—In the senate
a communication from the treasury de-
partment, with reports from special agents
as to the evasion of the laws against the
entrance of Chinamen coming from
Canada was referred to the committee on
immigration.The annual pension appropriation bill
was taken up, the question being on the
amendment increasing a number of pen-
sion agents' salary \$400. This was agreed
to, by a vote of yeas, 25; nays, 19; a
party vote, except that Payne voted aye,
and Allison, Ingalls, Plumb and Teller
nay. The bill having been reported back
from the committee of the whole to the
senate, the question of that amendment
came up again for action, and after an in-
teresting debate the amendment was
agreed to, and the bill passed.The military academy appropriation bill
was then taken up and passed.Consideration of the army appropriation
bill then began.**HOUSE.**In the house Hitt, of Illinois, called up

year to Della L. S. Parrell, daughter of**THE MISSISSIPPI FLOOD.**Hundreds of Dead Horses, Mules and
Cattle.SHEPHERD, La., May 10.—The Pan-
dora levee in Bossier parish broke last
night in several places, and the water is
sweeping down over a large area of coun-
try. It is a great disaster, involving heavy
losses to hundreds of planters.A dispatch from Greenwood gives a
gloomy description of the situation in the
Black Bayou country. The Red river
and coast line steamer New Haven, with
a relief committee, reached that section
just in time to save 250 people, horses and
cattle. There is not a foot of dry land in
that whole section, embracing thousands
of the most productive acres in the world.
Columbia, Texas.—This town, with the
exception of one street, is under water,
and railroad traffic is suspended.**Silver, Lead and Copper.**The price of silver has been somewhat
irregular, for bar silver on the street
reached its highest point at 1.05, while
the silver bullion certificates of one day
ran 1.07 with the total dealings of the
week over \$1,000,000. Silver legislation
has met with a slight halt and caused a
set-back in prices. The fact is that the
silver men are determined to shout for all
they can get, whereas they are equally
determined to take the best that is given
them. The best is not likely to be free
coinage, but pretty certain to be \$4.50, 000
per month.Lead.—There has been lively trading
and high prices this week, and, with
good reasons, for outside of copper the in-
trinsic merit of the metal is greater than
all the others. The surplus through the
west have been drained dry. Hundreds
of smaller sources have been checked
during the last few months through the
mining districts. The Mexican supply
has been cut down fully one-half, and the
old Cornish stocks have been re-
duced more than 50 per cent. On the
other hand, consumption is large on all
sides, and the use of the metal is increas-
ing, and faster than is the production.
There is also a far chance that congress
will protect the American miner.Copper shows greater strength than any
metal on the list. The large sale turns
out to have been 7,000,000 pounds of lake
ingots by the bankers, over seven months
time, being 1,000,000 pounds per month
at \$14.25, f. o. b. New York. It was nat-
urally expected that this sale would fill
up buyers and the market be easier; but
to the contrary, this large sale inspired
confidence, and was followed by higher
rates.**MARRIED A MOHAWK.**A Philadelphia School Teacher Weds an
Indian.PHILADELPHIA, May 10.—There is no
accounting for a woman's taste in the
selection of a husband. The marriage of
Miss Sensenbath, one of the teachers at
the education home in West Philadelphia,
to one of the Indian pupils has just come
to light. The name of the groom is Al-
lison, a full blooded Mohawk, who has been
in the institution about five years, where he
learned the trade of harness maker.The wedding took place some months
ago, but the fact of the union was kept
a profound secret until May 1, when the
bride, who is somewhat older than her
husband, went to Superintendent Lewis
and some of the managers of the institu-
tion and announced their marriage and
presented her resignation. The resigna-
tion was accepted and at the same time
the bridegroom received government per-
mission to leave the home.He has been employed in a harness
shop on Market street, and Assistant
Superintendent Hill says that he is fully
equipped to earn enough at his trade to
maintain his new home.**A Military Transfer.**SAN ANTONIO, Texas, May 9.—The 400
soldiers, including the officers and six
companies of the 10th infantry, left the
government military post here at Chi-
cago, from which city they will be dis-
tributed to the several forts in Michigan
and the northwest. They occupy three
sections of trains. Ten companies will
arrive Monday from various parts of the
country to take the place of those who

gone to Carlsbad, Germany, on a visit.
Fruit trees on the Rio Grande are looking
well and the wheat crop is an assured
success.The Vermorel irrigation system has
plenty of water now, and the reservoirs are
all full.A number of excursions to Maxwell
grant from the east have been arranged
for this season.A couple of Nebraska gentlemen are
fighting on the establishment of a plant
for manufacturing fence at Raton.
Arthur Stevens, of Las Cruces, is get-
ting the machinery in place for the manu-
facture of fruit baskets at that place.Several horses have arrived in Albu-
querque for the May meeting of the Gen-
tleman's Driving association at that place.
M. J. Duzan has resigned his place as
foreman of the Santa Fe shops at Raton.
He will be succeeded by John M. Smith,
of San Diego, Cal.The extension of the Fort Worth from
Denver is said to be moving along rapid-
ly. The grade is completed eight miles
above Martineau, and the track is fol-
lowing close behind.Arthur L. Cannel, of Pinos Wells,
has secured a judgment in the district
court against Messrs. Stouffer, Dyer,
Kathura and Mingo on a promissory
note for \$1,247.The state tracks on the road between
Las Cruces and San Marcial are filled
with cars, and the A. T. & S. F. is hav-
ing all the business it can attend to in
New Mexico in the way of handling
freight.A train of seventeen cars loaded with
hogs went over the A. T. & S. F. the
other day from Kansas City, going to the
City of Mexico. The Mexican govern-
ment imposes a duty of \$2.25 per head on
all hogs sent to that country.The U. S. Indian agency at Fort Stan-
ton is still looking up, and the party in
charge is sparing no pains to make it one
of the best self-sustaining agencies in the
west. The Indians are working hard, the
employees are busy and the crops looking
well.The trial for the fence-cutters has been
set for the 19th inst., and the Mora
county commissioners, charged with bribe-
ry in the matter of letting the court
house contract, will have an opportunity
to clear themselves the day following.—
Optic.**Celebrated Murder Case.**Oskosh, Wis., May 10.—One of the
most celebrated murder cases in the his-
tory of Wisconsin is now on trial in this
city. Jean Paul Soguet, of Green Bay, is
charged with the murder of his wife, who
died about fourteen years ago under sus-
picious circumstances. Ten years after-
ward Soguet was arrested for the crime
and at the trial was found guilty of murder
in the first degree and was sentenced to
Wausau for life. After serving one year
the supreme court reversed the decision
of the lower court and granted him a new
trial, and a change of venue was granted
to Winnebago county. Several of the
witnesses in the first trial are dead,
among them being the physician who
testified as an expert to the presence of
poison.**Going East.**SAN FRANCISCO, May 9.—The 1st United
States artillery regiment left Presidio
on a special train for New York. The
batteries leaving today are seven in
number, and consist of 300 officers and
men. Two batteries will remain here
until relieved by the 3th regiment from
New York.**G. A. R. National Encampment.**The 24th national encampment of the
Grand Army of the Republic will be
opened in Boston, Mass., August 13, and
close on the evening of the day following.
The G. A. R. has reached a membership
of nearly a million, including in its ranks
soldiers and sailors from all the armies
and fleets of the union, and the gathering
in Boston next August will probably be
the largest yet seen in the United
States. The object of the G. A. R. is
"to perpetuate the patriotic memories
of the great struggle in defense of the
nation, to more closely cement the ties of
comradeship born of battle, to care for
the widows and orphans of those who
died in defense of the flag, and to lessen
the burden and sweeten the life of him
who did and dared that the nation might
live."The railroads will furnish greatly re-
duced rates from all parts of the country,
and a large number of the distinguished
