**Telegraphic Tidings****WASHINGTON MATTERS.****CORNER ON SILVER.**

WASHINGTON, May 12.—Western people need not be surprised to hear shortly some very sensational stories about corners in the silver market. There are nuttings here and there to the effect already, and if the price of the white metal continues to advance it will not be long until all the western papers will charge somebody with making a big corner in the metal.

One of the Washington correspondents sent out a short story to that effect this evening. It was vague and indefinite and had no apparent foundation in fact, but it made a good story and will no doubt be eagerly read by the gold men and perhaps be used as an argument against the silver bill in the senate next week.

**WASAMAKER REPLY.**

The postmaster general has made an answer to the resolution adopted by the house inquiring what postoffice inspectors or special agents had been employed to investigate the standing and claims of rival applicants for appointment as postmasters. He says:

"I know of no instance where an inspector under this administration has been detailed merely to ascertain whether or not the applicant was a Republican, Democrat or member of any other party, unless it was where a charge of deception has been made in seeking the appointment." The postmaster general adds: "The practice of occasionally sending inspectors to report upon the applicant is not new, and has been followed by all postmaster generals for years past."

**TARIFF DEBATE.**

To-morrow an effort will be made by the Republicans in the house to terminate the general debate on the tariff bill and proceed to the consideration of that measure by Senate under the five-minute rule.

To accomplish this and to secure each section through they will try to hold a majority during the entire week. While it is not expected that the Democrats will make any tactical opposition, the Republican managers think it necessary that their whole force shall be at hand.

To secure their attendance notices have been sent to all members to be back on Monday. The debate during the past three days has been very interesting. Not even a ripple of excitement has broken the monotony of the talk. Nearly all the speakers have read carefully prepared speeches to an array of empty seats on both the floor and in the galleries.

The eight days debate under the five-minute rule will, without doubt, be of a sharper character.

**CELESTIALS COMING IN.**

Information was received at the treasury department to-day that thirty Chinese laborers were trying to enter the United States from Mexico near Nogales, A. T. The special agent of the treasury at that place was instructed to call upon the federal authorities to assist in keeping them out and to assist in the arrest of any one who may have entered.

**PROHIBITION BILL.**

The bill to prohibit the transportation of intoxicating liquors from any state or territory of the United States into states where prohibitory laws are in force will be called up by the house at the first opportunity.

**CONGRESSIONAL.****SENATE.**

WASHINGTON, May 11.—The house amendments to the senate bill to increase the limit of cost for a public building at Sacramento, Cal., was concurred in.

The army appropriation bill was then taken up.

Hale's amendment providing that no alcoholic liquors, beer or wines be sold or supplied enlisted men in any canteen or building in the garrison or military post. Agreed to—yeas 30, nays 13.

Cockrell's amendment striking out the words "beer and wine," were disagreed to and the bill passed.

The calendar was then taken up and the following bills among others passed: Senate bill appropriating \$12,000 for a steam launch for the collection of the district of Puget sound.

The senate then took up the individual pension bills on the calendar and passed all of them, 185, in an hour and a half.

After executive session the senate adjourned.

**HOUSE.**

The house went into committee of the whole on the tariff bill.

Mr. Latham of Texas, in a speech generally critical of the measure, urged the importance of reciprocity with Mexico. He especially antagonized that feature of the bill which places a duty on silver-lead ore, declaring it would destroy the smelting industry of Texas and neighboring states and it would invite retaliatory legislation on the part of Mexico.

McAdoo, of New Jersey, opposed the bill. Laflin, of Wisconsin, spoke in favor of it.

Springer, of Illinois, opposed the bill. He denounced granting bounty on sugar and raw silk and then in a facetious manner proceeded to point out the benefits which would inure to the farmer of Illi-

nois from the provisions of the law. Cabbages were now taxed 10 percent ad valorem. It was proposed to tax them 3 cents a head. According to agricultural reports no cabbages were imported at 10 percent. How many would be imported at an equivalent of 50 percent. [Laughter.] After ridiculing the imposition of a duty on cabbages as a measure of protection to the chicken business, Springer reviewed the free list and declared that the American hog was discriminated against in that list while the pig was placed upon wool. Was it for the benefit of the Illinois farmer that his sick fat hogs were placed on an equality with the razor-backs of New Mexico. [Laughter.] The Democratic party was ready to meet the issue in the bill and he predicted the house in the 52d congress would have a Democratic majority of fifty. In 1892 there would be a Democratic congress pledged to repeal the bill, if it should become a law.

Dingley, of Maine, supported the bill and Barnes, of Georgia, Andrews, of Mississippi, Cummings, of New York, and Buckner, of Wisconsin, opposed it. The committee then rose and took a recess until evening.

**Fremont Fainted.**

WASHINGTON, May 11.—When John C. Fremont was a lieutenant in California his accounts with the government were left in such a state that he has always been regarded as an official debtor to the government to the amount of \$19,000 and it has been one of the chief sorrows of Fremont's latter years that he was unable to secure this balance against him, and the other day he called at the office of the second comptroller of the treasury. It is said his financial circumstances are such that if his salary as a retired major general were retained to meet this alleged shortage he would be for some time in actual want.

At his request the comptroller investigated his accounts and discovered that instead of Fremont being a debtor to the government the latter had actually owed him for over forty years \$21,000. The records are perfectly clear, and it was proven beyond dispute that through mistakes in bookkeeping Lieutenant Fremont has been charged with a voucher which was on file. When Fremont called again to ask whether some arrangement might be made to pay his supposed indebtedness by installment he was so unprepared for the glad news that awaited him that he fainted. A warrant for the amount due him was made out, approved and signed.

**Improved Postal Service.**

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The new mail service from Kansas City west will be arranged to go into effect on the 25th instant. The new train will leave Kansas City over the Atchafalaya, Topeka & Santa Fe road at 8 o'clock a. m., on the arrival of the mail train from Chicago via Fort Madison, and will arrive at La Junta at 4 o'clock on the following morning. Hither to the earliest train on the Atchafalaya road which would carry morning newspaper mail, left Kansas City at 11 o'clock and this train also carried the St. Louis newspapers of the same morning. The new train will be overhauled by the train leaving Kansas City at 11 o'clock at La Junta.

**Three Men Killed.**

SCRANTON, Pa., May 12.—The entire plant of the Conamera Powder company, near Winton, was destroyed this morning by an explosion and fire. The force of the explosion was terrific and plainly felt in La Junta. It happened in the corning mill and in rapid succession the glazing, mixing and packing departments followed.

Three workmen are reported instantly killed and several others badly injured. All buildings in the vicinity were partially destroyed. Some families had very narrow escapes.

**Caught a Bass.**

NEW YORK, May 11.—An evening paper says that Senator Wolcott, of Colorado, will be married Wednesday. The bride will be Mrs. Lyman K. Bass, of Buffalo, widow of ex-President Cleveland's old law partner. Senator Wolcott has arrived in town and will remain a couple of days. The wedding will be a quiet affair. A few relatives and close friends of the bride and groom will be the only guests. It will take place in the Buffalo home of Mrs. Bass.

**Winnie's Wedding Trouseau.**

PARIS, May 10.—Miss Winnie Davis, daughter of Jefferson Davis, who is betrothed to Alfred Wilkinson, a young attorney prominent lawyer of New York state, sailed for the United States to-day, taking with her the wedding outfit which has been prepared for her by Worth. The marriage, which will be solemnized in the early part of next month, will take place at the old Davis homestead in Mississippi, and will be attended by many prominent people.

**Evidence of Crime.**

KANSAS CITY, May 11.—Evidence of a gashy crime were discovered at the Union depot this morning. In a pine box two feet long, was found a horribly mutilated body of a woman. Most of the flesh had been cut from the bones, and the face was mutilated beyond recognition. The body was packed in charcoal. Life could not have been extinct more than twenty-four hours. The box was checked through from St. Louis last night.

**Wholesale Poisoning.**

ACQUESA, Ga., May 11.—The wholesale poisoning of a negro family residing near Brownwood occurred yesterday. George Johnson's wife, in preparing bread for breakfast for her husband and eight children used by mistake, strychnine for soda and the whole family was stricken down. Four of the children have died and the doctors apprehend that the poison consumed will kill the rest of the family, including the mother.

**NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION.**

Democrats Object to It Under Any and All Circumstances—They Accept No Modifications.

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The committee of the New Mexico delegation on statehood met this morning for the purpose of agreeing, or trying to, on a plan for admission.

Delegate Joseph and C. H. Gildersleeve reported some correspondence from several New Mexican Democrats objecting to the constitution, and neither Mr. Joseph nor Mr. Gildersleeve would consent to an agreement in the matter under any circumstances. When the time arrives for them to do some good work they go square back on the movement toward admission on account of the apportionment in the constitution. The Republicans offered every concession asked, but without avail. While this sort of business is not as it should be, the delegates are hopeful and in excellent spirits. It is pretty generally believed that the statehood bill will pull through in good shape.

Santa Fe, the city of the Holy Faith of  
St. Francis, is the capital of New Mexico.

The history of its first European settlement was lost, with most of the early records of the territory, by the destruction of all the books and papers by the earthquake of 1680. It shows it then to have been the capital and the center of commerce, fertility and influence. In 1804 came the first venturesome American trader—the forerunner of the great line of merchants who have made traffic over the Santa Fe world-wide in its celebrity.

New Mexico is considered the finest on the continent.
