## Telegraphic Tidings

### WASHINGTON MATTERS.

#### WYOMING IS IN.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—The house bill for the admission of Wyoming as a state passed the senate yesterday by a vote of 23 to 18.

#### DISMISSED.

Sec. Windom has written a letter to the United States appraiser of New York enclosing a copy of a report of the committee appointed to investigate the charges against Dr. Edward Sherer, and saying that "the department concurs in the conclusion of the committee, and you are instructed to relieve Dr. Sherer immediately from charge of the sugar laboratory and assign another chemist to the duty of polarizing sugars at your post."

#### GALVESTON HARBOR IMPROVEMENT.

Senator Coke has proposed the following amendment to the river and harbor bill, which was referred to the committee on commerce: that for the purpose of completing the work of improving the entrance to Galveston harbor, Texas, the secretary of war, upon the application of the chief of engineers, is hereby authorized to cause contracts to be made, to be such amounts as may be necessary to do such work, not to exceed in the aggregate \$620,000, the amount estimated as necessary for the completion of the same and the sum of \$1,000,000 is hereby appropriated to be applied to the payments on the contracts herein authorized.

#### INDIAN LANDS.

The secretary of the interior has received a telegram stating that the Potawatomi Indians to-day in council signed an agreement with the Cherokee commission ceding to the government surplus lands of their reservation.

#### The World's Fair.

CHICAGO, July 28.—The World's Columbian fair commissioners at their meeting to-day elected permanent officers. Palmer, of Michigan, president; Dickinson, of Texas, secretary. Five vice presidents will be selected by a committee for that purpose. Richard Mansfield White, of New Mexico, appeared before the committee and urged the appointment of Gutierrez, of New Mexico, as one of the vice presidents.

### CONGRESSIONAL.

#### SENATE.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Consideration of the bill for the admission of Wyoming was resumed. Morgan addressed the senate in opposition. The senate then passed the bill. Ayes 29, nays 18. Strictly a party vote.

#### HOUSE.

In the house Dockery, of Missouri, made a motion to reconsider the vote by which the postal clerks leave bill was passed yesterday. He said he had been informed yesterday by the gentleman who called up the bill, Ketchum of New York, that it did not involve an appropriation, whereas he now learned that it would involve the expenditure of \$116,000. As Ketchum was not present, Dockery was permitted to make his motion. A motion was made to suspend the rules to consider the bill. It was agreed to.

Consideration of the election bill was then resumed. Wilson, of Washington, addressing the house in its support. The bill was further discussed by Covert, of New York, and Flower, of New York, in opposition to it.

#### The Trust Ahead.

CHICAGO, June 28.—A sensation was caused here yesterday afternoon by the filing of a stipulation dismissing the suit of Charlton against the Chicago gas trust. It was on this suit that Col. George R. Davis was appointed receiver, and the dismissal of the suit will end his receivership.

#### Strike Ended.

CHICAGO, June 28.—The strike on the Illinois Central railroad was settled yesterday afternoon, and the men go back to work on a compromise. They withdrew their demand for the dismissal of Division Superintendent Russell, and the company takes from him power to hire or discharge the men.

#### The Drummers.

DENVER, June 28.—The eighth annual convention of the Travelers Protective association elected G. S. McGraw, of St. Louis, president; L. T. Libeune, of St. Louis, secretary and treasurer; Geo. H. Randall, of New York, Jos. Wallsten, of Virginia, John Kennedy, of Texas, H. C. Churchill, of Arkansas and Alloy Jacobs, of Colorado, vice-presidents. Little Rock, Ark., was selected as the place for holding the next annual meeting.

#### The Grand Junction Indian School.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Senator Teller is making an effort to have the sundry civil appropriation bill amended so as to give \$30,000 to the Grand Junction Indian school. The building is said to be in need of repairs, and there are various improvements needed, one of which is a supply of water for the school. A girl's dormitory is one thing needed, there being at present accommodations for boys only, and it is estimated that this, with all the accessories, kitchen, laundry, etc., would cost \$12,000.

Shops for teaching harness making, shoemaking, carpentering, etc., \$2,500. Water pipes, \$5,000. Outhouses, tools, machinery, etc., are badly needed. The senate committee on appropriations will be asked to amend the bill in accordance with these estimates.

### Taylor Nominated.

STEUBENVILLE, Ohio, June 28.—Joseph E. Taylor was nominated for congress by the Republicans of the 18th district.

### St. Louis Gets It.

PITTSBURG, June 28.—The International Sunday school convention yesterday decided to hold the second world's and seventh biennial international Sunday school convention together at St. Louis in 1893.

### In Ashes.

DENVER, June 28.—A Carbon, Wyo., special to the Times says that the business portion of the town was destroyed yesterday. The loss is placed at \$100,000, with a small insurance. The fire started in a room of one of the hotels in which a drunken man had been put to sleep.

### Will Open a New Through Line.

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 28.—Though President Hill, of the Great Northern railway, has repeatedly denied it, there is reason to believe that he and his friends are quietly purchasing Burlington & Northern stock. The object in acquiring possession of the stock is to be in a position the moment the Pacific coast extension is completed to open a through line from Chicago to north Pacific coast points.

### Foreign Objections to Protection.

PARIS, June 28.—The excitement among French merchants arising from the difficulties caused by the new American regulations, concerning the importation of goods into the United States, is spreading to the chamber of deputies and to the newspapers. A few excitable people talked about retaliation. The government officials and the artistic community are both startled by the news that the finance committee of the United States senate has stricken out the clause in the tariff bill putting works of art on the free list. There is a great outcry over this action.

### Another Lottery Scheme.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—President Diaz, of Mexico, has dashed to the ground the hopes of the syndicate which intended carrying on a lottery prize at Tia Juana, eighteen miles south of San Diego, in lower California, by vetoing the bill after it had passed both houses. It was the intention of the promoters of the lottery scheme to make Tia Juana a veritable Monte Carlo, and with this in view, they had arranged to purchase all the land in the town. The California syndicate organized about a year ago, with a capital stock of \$5,000,000, \$500,000 of which was paid into the hands of the treasurer, a resident of Los Angeles. After considerable successful lobbying and the expenditure of large sums to carry the lottery bill through, and when the syndicate was apparently on the road to success, President Diaz vetoed the bill and knocked out the Mexican Monte Carlo.

### A Bishop's Views.

NOTRE DAME, Ind., June 28.—The radical declarations of Bishop Spalding, of Peoria, in speaking to the faculty and students of Notre Dame university on the position of woman, has created a sensation here among Catholics. Last evening at the commencement of St. Mary academy he went even further. After having complimented the work of sisters of the congregation of the Holy Cross, he said that the position of woman had been the position that southern planters gave their slaves. It was no better to-day than it was years ago. They were treated kindly as the slaves of some men, he knew had been treated, but were kept in ignorance. In this country, however, women had emancipated themselves. The American women were more intelligent than the American men. He demanded the highest education for women and declared he must henceforth work side by side with man for the prizes for which men work and win. The bishop's words seemed very like a statement of advanced belief in woman's rights. They were applauded again and again.

### MR. PRESTON'S VIEWS.

The Contest for Delegate and the State Constitution--The Apportionment.

To the Editor of the New Mexican.

SANTA FE, June 28.—Your policy of calling for an expression of opinion on the recent action of the central committee is, in my estimation, a wise one.

The party to-day is in better shape for carrying out a strong and aggressive campaign, with an almost certainty of success, than it has been for years. We have, to use a Democratic simile, all the cards in our hands. All we have to do is play them right and we are sure to win.

A mistake now would be ruinous; not for the issue of the approaching election alone, but also for the future.

Personally I believe the resolution of the central committee to run a full state ticket to be, if not unwise, at least hasty and should receive full thought and discussion before final determination. It strikes me the better plan would be to not even submit the constitution at the coming election, but rather concentrate all our time and energies on the single issue of the race for delegate. With the mistake the Democrats have made of opposing admission under the present constitution, as a handle, we are in condition to make the fight on our lives this fall, and if we can then elect a Republican delegate, the remaining part of the voyage will be plain sailing.

Then reconvene the constitutional convention and let that body change the apportionment in accordance with the figures of the present census. This will be no recognition of a law in the present constitution, but simply a change to the latest authoritative figures. That will silence the present criticism, or rather howl, for I can not call it a criticism, and will show that the party means fairly and only seeks statehood through straight channels. Submit the constitution so changed and it will carry beyond a doubt there will be found hundreds of Democrats who "would rather live in a Republican state than a Democratic territory," so much so that even the party lash will not whip them into line. That is a factor in carrying the constitution which we surely should avail ourselves of in fact it would be suicidal to throw it away. Yet if we run a state ticket for visionary offices at the same election we vote upon the constitution, we can as certainly count on one of two things: Democratic votes going against the constitution as we are now sure of them for it.

The strongest argument I have heard advanced in favor of submitting the constitution along with the state ticket, is that the interest of the candidates in their own election will counterbalance the feeling of apathy that otherwise may exist. But is it not also true that there will be another feeling of apathy and indifference to be met even if the ticket is run? The election itself will not be the real contest, that will be practically ended with the nominations, and the defeated candidates for nomination will hardly be as enthusiastic over the result of the vote on the constitution as they would be if the hope of office were still before them. The whole situation can be put thus: A vote on the constitution, changed to meet the howl about the apportionment, is sure to carry a vote on it, with a state ticket fail to the kite, may fail. Is it not more prudent to take no chances by antagonizing friends of statehood? Respectfully,

### A NATURAL SELTZER FIND.

Discovery of a Valuable Spring Near Santa Fe--Sampling the Waters.

A bubbling pool of natural seltzer water has been discovered not far from Santa Fe. Samples of the water were brought in last night by N. McKinney, the fortunate discoverer, and it is exciting no little public attention to-day. The spring is located eighteen miles west of the city and about two miles south of the Santa Fe Southern railroad as it turns north to cross the Rio Grande. Mr. McKinney states that the pool is probably four feet in diameter, the water bubbling up in its center with a considerable force. The water is clear, sparkling, of a rather sweetish taste; is strongly impregnated with soda and highly charged with carbonic acid gas. Samples of the water can be seen at Mr. Creamer's. This gentleman is much interested in the find and will have the water analyzed. Mr. McKinney says he has spent weeks in camp near the Cayote springs, not far from Albuquerque, and thinks this water is superior to the waters of the spring. To the taste it is much like imported seltzer and is evidently very valuable for table service and for use in the sick room. Mr. McKinney has filed a location on the spring and intends erecting a dwelling there and sending daily shipments of the water to Santa Fe.

The New Mexican favors holding the territorial convention early in September. It thinks a two months campaign necessary to lay Mr. Joseph away at Ojo Caliente.

The Republican county committee of Colfax county, is called together to meet on July 10 at Springer. Henry Sturges is chairman of it and W. C. Wrigley is secretary.

Laughlin will be nominated for the council, whoever of the two is considered the strongest man; Abe Gold is looming up for the assessors on the Democratic ticket, and the bosses are trying to knock Tom Gable out of the race for the nomination for sheriff; if Laughlin gets the nomination for the council, Romulo Martinez will be nominated for sheriff and Frank Chavez for assessor.

The New Mexican is informed that the renomination of Delegate Joseph is a foregone conclusion. The latter will have to bear the brunt of the putting up of the money for the campaign, and the sum demanded of him is fixed at \$8,000. There are no federal officials to bleed this time; two years ago over \$4,000 was collected from federal officials, not even a fourth-class postmaster being overlooked. Chairman Gilder made old Julian come to time with \$250, although the old fellow kicked like a bay steed, and the postoffice in Santa Fe was worth to the Democratic central committee \$300. Postmaster Seligman alone putting up his check like a man for \$250. This source though will be found rather dry for the Democracy this season, although Chairman Gilder himself is good for \$1,000 for the campaign fund. It will take a good deal of the conduct of the Democratic campaign and it must be acknowledged that Chairman Gilder is the man to raise it.
