WASHINGTON MATTERS.

THE LAST HOUSE.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—Consideration of the tariff bill is practically closed. In the senate today speeches are to be limited to thirty minutes in length. Voting is to begin Tuesday and after the third reading of the bill is reached, three hours to be allowed to each side for general discussion.

THE SOUTHERN VIEW.
An inquiry made by Senator Teller at the office of the commissioner of Indian affairs develops the fact that the southern view is pressing the department hard for the fulfillment of its contract to remove them to southern Utah.

ARIZONA INDIANS.
Delegate Smith, of Arizona, today introduced in the house a bill to authorize removal of the Indians of Papago reservation in Maricopa county, Arizona, to the Papago reservation in Yuma county, or to the Gila river or Salt river reservation.

FINANCIAL.
The secretary of the treasury has issued a circular offering to repay interest due January 1, April 1 and July 1, 1891, on bonds of 4 per cent consols of 1897.

ARID LANDS RELEASED.

Western Settlers Can Now Go On and Locate—Order to Registers and Receivers.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—Land Comm. Gifford has issued to registers and receivers of the United States land offices the following circular, releasing from reservation the lands of the arid regions:

I am directed by the honorable secretary of the interior to call your attention to that portion of the act of congress approved August 23, 1890, which repeals so much of the act of October 2, 1888, as withdraws the lands in the arid region of the United States from entry, occupation and settlement with the exception of reservoir sites heretofore located or selected which shall remain segregated and reserved from entry or settlement until otherwise provided by the law, and reservoir sites heretofore located or selected on public lands shall in like manner be reserved from the date of the location or selection.

The circulars of this office of August 5, 1889, and August 9, 1890, are hereby rescinded.

It is further directed that all patents issued on entries made subsequent to this act and on entries so validated, west of the 100th meridian will contain a clause reserving the right of way for ditches and canals constructed by the authority of the United States.

Your particular attention is called to that portion of the law which restricts the acquisition of title under the land laws to 320 acres in the aggregate. You will require from all applicants to enter under any of the land laws of the United States an affidavit showing that since August 30, 1890, they had not filed upon or entered under said laws a quantity of land which would make with the tract applied for more than 320 acres, or, provided the party should claim by virtue of the exception as to settlers prior to the act of August 30, 1890, you will require an affidavit establishing the facts. As soon as possible a blank form of affidavit will be furnished you.

Vermont's Population.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—The population of the state of Vermont as announced by the census bureau is 322,350, a decrease in ten years of 81.

Fast Time.
INDEPENDENCE, Iowa, Sept. 6.—Roy Wilkes paced a half mile on Saturday in 10 1/2, the fastest half mile ever traveled over the course, and the feat was accomplished in the face of a heavy wind.

The Silver Bell Sold.
TUCSON, Sept. 6.—The sale of the Silver Bell mines to an English syndicate was consummated this afternoon by the payment of \$100,000. The mines are located thirty miles west of Tucson. The purchasers have commenced extensive developments.

A Novel Exhibit.

DENVER, Sept. 6.—The most unique idea ever presented for the purpose of showing the resources of any section has been adopted by Trinidad, Colo. That city will place in the Colorado Mineral Palace "King Coal" seated upon a throne of his subjects, the subjects being the natural resources of Las Animas county. The statue is fourteen feet high, and is constructed of coal, coke, silica, building stone, cement, etc. There will be considerable glass used, all blown to order from Trinidad silica. At a meeting

of Trinidad and Denver capitalists interested in Trinidad, held in this city Saturday, an order for "King Coal" was given to the designer, Mr. Hiram L. Johnson. It requires 112 electric lights to illuminate this work. After ruling at Pueblo his royal highness will go to Chicago and hold sway at the world's fair.

Campaign Closed.

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 5.—The campaign in Speaker Reed's district closed Saturday evening, when more than 3,000 attended the Young Men's Republican club. The speaker spoke briefly and Major McKinley made the address of the evening, devoting himself to the tariff. Speaker Reed said today he anticipated a majority of 1,000 in his district, although his friends feel confident it will reach 1,500.

ARMY ORDERS.

Capt. H. P. Kingsbury, of Stanton, has been ordered to report to the general commanding the division of the Atlantic for staff duty.

Troop 1, 6th cavalry, has been ordered disbanded and the greater number of the men have been ordered transferred to troop 17. This will reduce the Fort Stanton garrison to one company of infantry and one troop of cavalry.

With the approval of the major general commanding the army, 1st Lieut. A. P. Blockson and 2d Lieut. F. H. Beach, 6th cavalry, now at Fort Lewis, Colo., will remain on duty at that post until further orders.

Lieut. John A. Perry arrived today from San Francisco, and will take permanent station at Fort Marcy, having been assigned to company D, 10th infantry. Lieut. Perry has been on detached service for the past two years, serving as aide on General Grierson's staff.

Lieut. Van Vleet has returned home after a month's absence at Monterey, Cal., where he attended the division rifle competition.

Lieut. Col. Robert H. Hall, 6th infantry, acting inspector general, has been ordered to proceed on public business to Fort Apache.

Espanola Atoms.

Mr. Roscomb, manager of the Pittsburg Mining company, is down from the Chama placers, and reports himself more than satisfied with the working of the big lode in the riffles, and thousands of colors can be had to the painful of the sand lodged in the riffles. The Kendall Mining company are rapidly repairing their claim and negotiating for more territory.

Wright Hatch, assistant postmaster at Antonio, has been acting route agent between Antonio and Santa Fe for several days in place of A. W. Savies, who is in Denver attending the agent's convention. His running mate, Charlie Scherich, who was laid off sick for a while, has again resumed his run.

Conductor A. Springer has been transferred from the Red Pepper line to the long run on the main line from Chama to Durango.

Dr. R. W. Kire, of Aztec, San Juan county, has accepted the position of surgeon for the Chilli line of the D. & R. G., and will next week remove to Espanola, where he intends to build a house and start a small drug store.

The Bond Brothers have completed and moved into their new store, which is 160 feet long, and are now putting up a room 2500 feet.

Crops here are excellent and trade will be good during the fall and winter.
