Telegraphic Tidings

Washington Notes.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—After disposing of a number of bills of minor importance on the calendar, the senate resumed consideration of the conference report on the railroad land forfeiture bill, and, after some debate, the report was agreed to, yeas 30, nays 13. The Democrats voted in the negative; the Republicans in the affirmative.
The anti-lottery bill will be called in the senate to-day and probably passed without opposition. It is expected that only one speech will be made and that by Mr. Gibson, of Louisiana, in favor of the measure. The other bills likely to come up in the senate this week are the bills to repeal the timber culture act, to establish private land courts and for the relief of the supreme court and the labor bills.

CONDENSED NEWS.
A cold wave is prevailing over the north and west. Frost is reported in Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas, with snow in Montana.
Five days of continuous rain at Watertown, N. Y.
The president and family will return to Washington on Saturday.
Congressman Boutelle, of Maine, has 5,000 plurality in the 4th district.
A great celebration of the emancipation proclamation will be held at Richmond, Va.
Frank Allen, of Nashville, charged with embezzling \$41,000, has effected a compromise.

Forest fires have been raging along the line of the Northern Pacific railroad in Washington.
The murder of Mr. McGrath, of the National league, is reported from Ballingarry, Ireland.

There is strong opposition to the proposition for a dual site for the World's fair at Chicago.

The Maryland law school will admit no more colored students.

In the Mohawk valley the flats are submerged by recent heavy rains. Corn is gathered from boats.

Chicago anarchists are now in trouble over the demand of Mrs. Parsons and Mrs. Spies for monthly remittances.

President Harrison intends there shall be no party in the money market if the treasury department can avert it.

Representative Kennedy's speech attacking the senate and Mr. Quay appeared in the Congressional Record much toned down.

A long discussion is expected in the senate on the bill to transfer the revenue marine service from the treasury to the navy department. There is strong opposition to it.

W. Specht and Gustave Ranger, of New York, "the sugar kings," have bought 700,000 acres of land in New Mexico and 500,000 acres in northwestern Texas to rent to cattle men for grazing.

P. D. Armour and his partner announce that they have no intention of engaging in distillery projects, as has been reported.

C. L. Jungerman, city engineer at Cincinnati, Ohio, was shot and killed by Thomas Riley, a reporter on the Covington, Ky., Commercial.

Mr. McDonald of the World's fair commission has introduced to the full board a resolution recommending the establishment of a separate department in a separate building to be called the department of mines and mining.

A Chicago man has been charged with abducting his own wife.

Jay Gould says that the money market will be all right if congress will adjourn.

MORGAN ON THE RED MAN.

Cheaper to Build Schools than Forts—What it Has Cost to Do it All Wrong.

DENVER, Sept. 17.—Gen. Morgan, U. S. Indian commissioner, has been here for a day or two. He says:

"The government's idea of dealing with the Indians is radically wrong. Reservations, as they are now conducted, do not conduce to civilization. The federal authorities allow a white settler 160 acres of land. They put the Indian upon untold acres as if he were a buffalo or an wild animal which needed an extensive stamping ground. For specific instance, if the Utes of Colorado were given only 160 acres apiece there would be 800,000 acres of land left over for white settlers. The principle now in vogue of dealing with the Indians in masses is not a proper one. They should be treated as individuals. We should treat him as we do ordinary citizens, and put upon him the obligations of citizenship. Senator Moody, of Dakota, who has known the Indians in every way, has told me that he regards

them as desirable citizens, and in every way as to be treated as a man that he will be brought to understand his obligations as an American citizen. I have met all sorts of tribal Indians, and have been impressed with their manliness. In an official and social way, I have also been brought into contact with the best of American manhood, senators, congressmen, etc., and I think, for my own part, that in sheer manhood the Indian does not suffer by a comparison.
"The present educational system is only preparatory and must yield to the system of public schools. It will have done its best work when it has made itself unnecessary.
"The old method has proved itself a costly and melancholy failure. We have spent \$1,000,000,000—including the cost of wars—in caring for the Indians, and we have them still with us, a burden, a nuisance, a disgrace. The new method, begun in 1875, and now so well under way, deserves a fair trial, or rather, having already proved its efficiency, should be pushed forward until it has accomplished its benign work of redeeming and absorbing into our national life all the aboriginal inhabitants of this country. Experience has shown that it is cheaper to educate an Indian than to kill him, and it costs much less to build and maintain a school than a fort. Every Indian boy or girl in school is a hostage for the good behavior of the parents. The Indians educated in the government schools, under the flag, may be depended upon for service in the fields of industry, or, if need be, on the field of battle. Education is a cheap method of converting aliens, enemies or savages into citizens, friends and honorable, intelligent men and women."

Santa Fe Grievances.
CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—The general grievance committee of engineers and firemen employed on the Santa Fe system held a short meeting yesterday. But little business was transacted, as several members of the committee are away visiting adjacent cities.

The Colorado Way.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Sept. 17.—The First National bank of Colorado Springs purchased the \$50,000 of the city of Colorado Springs 5 per cent water works bonds at par, this being the first issue of 5 per cent bonds of the city. It is considered a good sale, and shows that the First National bank has confidence in the city's credit.

A SANTA FE RUMOR.

Could Again Said to Be in the Field—Improbable Report About Mr. Marvel.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 17.—A rumor is current in railway circles to the effect that the postponement of the annual meeting of the Atchafalaya, Topeka & Santa Fe from September to October, means more than is at first blush apparent, and that it means the deposition or retirement of Allen Marvel from the presidency. This, of course, means a change all along the line from the executive officers down to the section foremen.

No definite source can be found for the rumor, and the opinions of railroad men differ very materially, some holding to the opinion that the rumor is authenticated, while others, admitting the possibility of such an event, are inclined to regard it as mere speculation. The Santa Fe is said to be in a prosperous condition, though seriously near a receivership a few months ago.

To Allen Marvel, the president, the present satisfactory condition of the property is largely due, and just why a change should be contemplated at this stage is not so plain, unless, as rumored some time ago, Jay Gould has succeeded in relieving the Baring Bros. syndicate of a large portion of the holdings. No one in this city will give any definite information regarding the matter, though all have heard the rumor.

Seems to Be All Right.

Santa Fe is rather "getting there" just now, and she'll keep up the good work for an indefinite length of time. A great many people have said of late: "We don't want a boom; booms always bring a reactionary period that operates like a boomerang," or words to that effect. Now, the fact is, there isn't a particle of danger of a boom—that will react happening to Santa Fe. It takes resources to make a city, and, in the light of California's experience, there must be something upon which to base a boom before it can be brought about at the present day. Santa Fe has that something, and whatever of new life, of modern enterprise, crops out here now will come to stay. Santa Fe can't go backward; she must go forward. She has the resources for an advance, and since capitalists, by a careful survey of these resources, extending

over a long period of time, have convinced themselves of this fact to the extent that they have felt satisfied to expend in real property here over \$150,000, it would seem that the future is pretty bright.

The opponents of statehood are now telling lies and falsehoods to defeat the adoption of the constitution. After November 4 and October 7, they will tell a different tale of woe.

The other day four inches of snow fell in portions of South Dakota. If you want a winter resort, and a first-class, healthy and pleasant one at that, you must come to New Mexico, a country that possesses the finest and healthiest climate on the North American continent.

Our friends, the enemy, desire an aggressive campaign; well and good; they will be accommodated as far as the NEW MEXICAN, the WEEKLY NEW MEXICAN REVIEW and EL NUESTRO MEXICANO are concerned. The campaign in all probability will be more vigorous and lively than our friends, the enemy, will relish, at least as far as these journals go.

The Democratic county committee of San Miguel compelled Mr. Felix Martinez to resign as chairman thereof, claiming that he was not a Democrat and that he had sold out to the White Cap element. On the other hand Mr. Martinez is secretary of the Democratic executive committee of the territory. When Democratic doctors disagree, who shall decide?

DELEGATE ANTONIO JOSEPH has not very much to say concerning his ownership of these unconformed Mexican land grants, the Ojo Caliente and the Cieneguilla grants. The Democratic platform does not howl about fraudulent and stretched land grants to any appreciable extent. The leaders and the nominee of that party are about as deep in the mire, as anybody else in the territory is in the mud.

SENATOR EDMUNDS is of the opinion that the Republicans of Vermont at the recent election in that state stood at home and failed to vote, because they were dissatisfied with the course of the Republican senators in putting over the passage of the federal election bill. Senator Edmunds knows the temper of the people

of Vermont as well as any man living, and he is, in all likelihood, eminently correct in his views. There is no question but that all honest and law abiding citizens all over this country desire full, fair and open elections and an honest count. Senator Edmunds and the Republican senators in congress had best heed the voice of the people and redeem the pledges of the Republican party for an honest election and a fair count.

Eight armed, hulking ruffians with commissions as deputy United States marshals, were at each poll in New Mexico during the November, 1888, election, and intimidated, abused and maltreated people and thus helped the election of Antonio Joseph. This business is played out this trip. A few Democratic sheriffs may attempt a like game this season, but they had best beware; corrupt Democratic judges no longer disgrace the bench and the administration of justice in New Mexico and can protect them no longer from deserved indictment, conviction and punishment.

This record the Republican administration has made since April 1889, when it came into power, is a most excellent and respectable one. The record the Democratic administration has made from June 1889, to April 1889, is a most disgraceful, dishonest and corrupt one. In the year and a half of the present Republican administration \$200,000 have been saved the people and the tax payers of New Mexico. Bear this in mind, citizens and tax payers of New Mexico, and vote accordingly and show by your votes that you approve the honesty, efficiency and economy of the present administration.

This campaign was opened last Monday evening at Socorro, where a raising meeting was held, which was addressed upon the questions of the hour by the Republican candidate for congress, Hon. M. S. Otero and Hon. T. B. Catron, of Santa Fe. The attendance was large and much good was done. Let the good work go on from now steadily, energetically, prudently and openly. The dark tricks, the buying up of votes, slandering the people, abusing political adversaries, stuffing ballot boxes and the like shall and will be left to the gang, that now runs the Democratic machine, the Joseph campaign and the anti-statehood fight. They are adepts in that line, but their tricks will not succeed this time.

Ten thousand copies of the constitution printed in English are now being distributed and 30,000 copies of the same printed in the Spanish language will be distributed during the coming week. The people will be fully informed what is before them, what statehood means and what the provisions of the constitution are. There will be no dark lantern business about the matter. The constitution is one of the very best, most advanced and fairest documents of its kind. The fullest scrutiny and examination of it are invited. The objections to it, made by a few Democratic gangsters and corruptionists, are either based on false premises or deliberate lies, or attempts at falsification and deceit. The instrument speaks for itself; read it, citizens of New Mexico, and then vote intelligently and for the best interests of yourselves and the entire people, which means, vote to adopt it, and that by a large majority.

STATEHOOD SENTIMENTS.

An Object Lesson to Santa Fe.

New Mexico is just now receiving an object lesson in the practical advantages of statehood. Although the most unnatural and inconvenient place, Los Angeles, has long been the headquarters of the military department of Arizona, and the disbursements on that account have enriched her citizens to the extent of hundreds of thousands of dollars annually. A recent order of the war department commanded the transfer of the headquarters to Santa Fe, the most natural and convenient place. This meant the transfer to New Mexico people of the great gains heretofore accruing to Californians from this source. But California's congressmen and senators hustled around to the war department, procured a suspension of the order, and the headquarters will remain at Los Angeles for a time at least. Had there been two senators and a representative from the state of New Mexico at the national capital to work against the Californians the order of suspension would not have been granted. That is one point for statehood per se.—Aztec Index.

The Humor of It.

The strat into which the Democratic leaders of New Mexico are driven in the present campaign, is very forcibly illustrated by the inconsistency of their attitude as set forth in the Silver City resolutions—in one of which they declare that they are in favor of a state, while in another they affirm with equal positiveness that they are opposed to it—in other words they resolve that they are in favor of statehood but opposed to the constitution—which, reduced to every day English means, they are in favor of New Mexico becoming a state, but opposed to taking the steps necessary to make it a state.

The attempt to ride two horses, going in different directions at the same time, puts the Democratic party of New Mexico into an attitude which affords a degree of interest and some amusement to the general public, while it is, at the same time more than a little perplexing to the leaders and managers of that organization, who are conscious of the ridiculousness of their position in the eyes of the public.

They would be very happy to a chance to "ride two horses" and put both feet upon one horse—and it wouldn't make much difference which horse—but they can't let go of either and be consistent with their record, and hence in the vain endeavor to be consistent with themselves they try to ride both ways at the same time and thus become more than ever inconsistent. The Democratic party of New Mexico reminds one very forcibly, just now, of Artemus Ward's kangaroo, which he said was "an amusin' little cuss."

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

We, the Republican party of the territory of New Mexico, in convention assembled, at Albuquerque, the 13th day of September, A. D. 1890, reaffirm the principles of the Republican party as set forth in the Republican platform of 1888, and we endorse the actions of President Harrison, and of the 51st congress in giving effect to the same. And we especially thank the president for calling the attention of congress to his messengers to New Mexico and her wants and the necessity for a speedy settlement of our land claims; and we also thank the senate of the United States for making a special order, during the present congress, the consideration of a bill to create a land court to settle our land titles and urgently impress upon congress the necessity for speedy action in the enactment of some law to that end.

We commend the recent action of the Republican members of both houses of congress, in passing the silver bill, as a wise, sagacious and patriotic measure, to still larger increase of our circulating medium is imperatively demanded, and we urge the passage of a law removing all restrictions from the coinage of silver productions of the United States, and we earnestly endorse and hereby approve the action of a Republican congress and administration in imposing a duty on lead ores, in the bill which has lately passed congress, by means of which the miners and mining interests of our territory have been protected from foreign competition and mining property greatly enhanced in value, and we commend the Democratic party for opposing the same.

We endorse the tariff legislation carried through against the persistent and violent opposition of the Democratic party, whereby wool, the greatest product of New Mexico, has been permanently placed beyond the competition of the cheap products of Australia.

The Republican party remembers with gratitude the services of the former soldiers of the nation in defence of its integrity, and thanks congress for the passage of the dependent pension bill, as well as a vast number of private pension bills, many of which were voted by the Republican Cleveland.

We thank the present administration and congress for the repeal of the obnoxious law, enacted by a Democratic administration, whereby there were excluded from entry and purchase all the public lands west of the 10th meridian, and for removing the obstructions, placed by the Democratic party, in the way of the settlers in obtaining titles to their lands and homes. 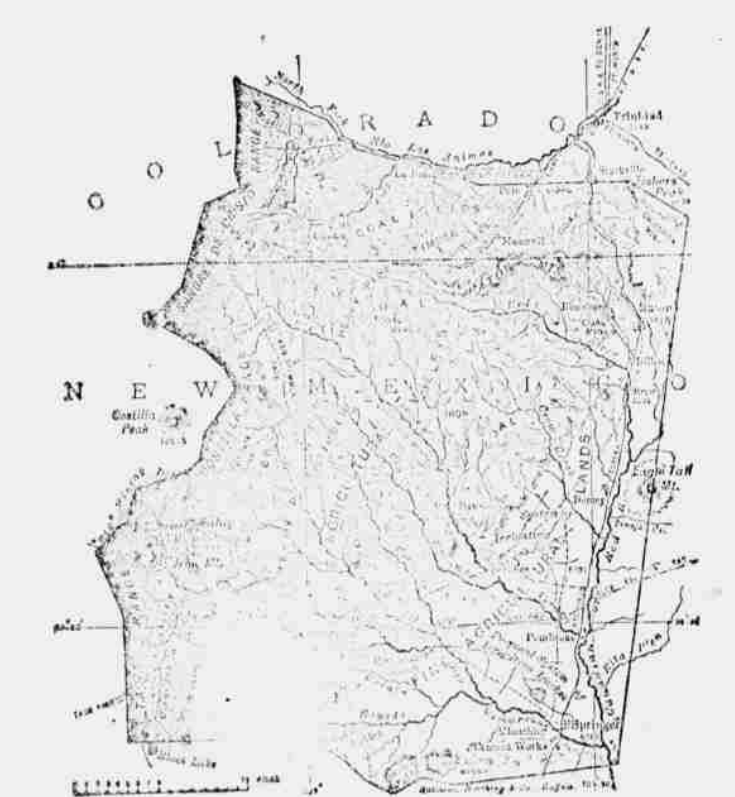

AFFAIRS POLITICAL.

Instructions of Cerrillos Delegates. Mr. Knaebel's Good Work in Rio Arriba. Councils of Comfort.

The Democratic primaries at Cerrillos resulted in the selection of these delegates to the county ticket nominating convention: Geo. L. Wyllie, Chas. Lyon, Richard Green, Randolph Kelley, W. E. Lane. These delegates were instructed to vote for Hon. C. F. Easley for the legislature and Geo. L. Wyllie for the office of county commissioner.

At Tierra Amarilla on Tuesday night of last week there was a very enthusiastic meeting in the interest of statehood. Some 700 people were present from all parts of the county of Rio Arriba, and speeches were made by Messrs. John H. Knaebel, Alexander and E. M. Read. On Saturday night there was a similar meeting at Chama, during which a joint discussion of the state constitution took place. Among John H. Knaebel, esq., who were present say that a list made a most senseless and bitter partisan speech, and that Mr. Knaebel, figuratively speaking, simply wiped the floor with him. It was a big victory for the progressive element and made friends for the constitution.

The Mora county Democrats, what few of them are left, have set Monday, September 23, as the day for holding their county convention.

Francisco Baca y Sandoval, deputy under Postmaster Knaebel, at Las Vegas, is a candidate for probate clerk on the so-called "Peoples' Ticket."

The recent election of the party is not being consulted just now in the make up of Democratic tickets in this county. Attempts at vindication seem to be the order of the day.

It seems right well established that Col. J. A. Lockhart will receive the Republican nomination for sheriff of Grant county, and if so, there seems to be no doubt of his election.

Frank W. Parker, of Hillsboro, will, in all probability, receive the Republican nomination for member of the house from Sierra county, and the chances are greatly in favor of his election.

The Democrats of San Juan county held their county convention at Aztec on the 4th of October. The county seat question will very likely cut the largest figure in the campaign in that county.

The present very efficient and well known sheriff of Sierra county, Hon. A. M. Story, announces himself as a candidate for re-nomination, subject to the decision of the Republican county convention.

The Democrats in Rio Arriba county are looking for men to place upon their county ticket. They are after Sam Eldred to take the nomination for the council. But Sam knows too much and gently declines. His head is level; very level; extremely level.

The New Mexican is informed that there will be no regular Republican county ticket put up in Eddy county, but that it will be a free for all, helter-skelter race, except on members of the legislature. This is not a good idea, but very likely, can not be helped. Eddy county is very close to the Lone Star state.

The present sheriff of Socorro county, C. A. Robinson, who is one of the best and most efficient officers in New Mexico, and who has collected over 90 per cent of the taxes of his county and has settled his accounts promptly, honestly and to a cent, will, according to the latest advices, be re-nominated by the Republicans of that county. They can not do any better.

A statehood meeting at Socorro was held on Monday night, and among the speakers were Hon. M. S. Otero and Hon. T. B. Catron, who spoke in both English and Spanish. Over 1,000 voters were present and the cause of progress was given a big lift to the fore. From all reports Socorro is all right and the discussion of the constitution is continuously making for it new supporters in that locality.

The state is pretty well fixed up in Santa Fe county Democratic boss circles, and will consist in all likelihood of Romulo Martinez for the council, Frank Chavez for sheriff, Abe Gold for assessor and Luciano Baca for probate judge. Mr. Abe Spiegelberg is a candidate for the assessorship, but the New Mexican's information is to the effect that he can not make it, although his friends are working hard for him.

The San Miguel county Democratic committee has finally organized by the election of Col. G. W. Stonerod as chairman; H. H. Pierce as secretary, and Antonio Cajal as assistant secretary. The full committee is composed of the following named gentlemen: Col. G. W. Stonerod, N. S. Belden, Catinario Romero, H. H. Pierce, Nicolas Delgado, Antonio Cajal, Dr. M. M. Milligan, Jose Dolores Gallegos, Chris Seimann, Nasario Romero. The committee resolved to call the county convention to meet in Las Vegas on Tuesday, September 30.

From Grant County.
H. H. Whitehill, sheriff of Grant county, his son, H. V. Whitehill, and Chas. L. Davenport, of the Silver City Sentinel, came in from the south to-day, bringing up half a dozen candidates for the penitentiary.

Richard Hayward, for "shooting up the town" of Central City, gets three years. Charles Wing, robbery, three years. R. Huber, alias Windy Dick, and Al. Mayfield, hold-ups, three and four years, respectively.

Jose Dominguez and Desiderio Ortega, robbery, four years each.
Sheriff Whitehill also brought up a 11 year old child, Anna Eigel, whom he turned over to Rev. A. G. Smith. The child has no mother and a father who is incapable of caring for her. Rev. Smith will have her cared for at the Presbyterian mission.
