## Telegraphic Tidings

### WASHINGTON MATTERS.

**THE TARIFF.**  
Washington, Sept. 22.—Although the meeting of the conference committee on the tariff bill was called for yesterday, when the hour of meeting arrived the Democratic members were notified that there would be no meeting. The reason for postponement was the desire on the part of the Republican conferees to consult further among themselves. It appears that no progress has been made since Saturday in the disposition of sugar, binding twine, the bonded period and metal amendments, but that these are in such shape that if an agreement can be reached upon one, it will probably also result in an agreement upon others.

**NOMINATIONS.**  
The president has sent the following nominations to the senate: Probate judges for Utah, Francis L. Daggett, Washington county; Henry Shields, Summit county; Charles H. Herman, Tooele county; Jacob Johnson, San Petre county; Stephen R. Frasier, Juab county; Hector W. Haight, Davis county; William Goodwin, Cache county; Thos. S. Watson, Wasatch.

**THE STYLE OF OUR MONEY.**  
New designs for the standard silver 5 cent nickel piece are to be adopted as soon as practically after the house bill passed by the senate yesterday shall take effect. It is known as a bill "to provide for new designs of authorized devices of United States coins," the purpose of which is not to interfere with emblems or devices, but only to empower the director of the mint with the approval of the secretary of the treasury to change the dies, models and designs of the emblems and devices already established by law. Changes in the design or die of any coin may not be made oftener than once in twenty-five years.

There is a popular desire that the coins of the United States should be not only mechanically but artistically perfect, or at least possess a high degree of merit, and the bill passed yesterday is intended to meet this commendable demand.

**CAPITAL NOTES.**  
Silver offered the treasury yesterday aggregated 1,035,000 ounces. The amount purchased was 250,000 ounces at \$1.15.  
Ex-Congressman Frank J. Morey, of Louisiana, died yesterday. Malaria troubles, combined with brain affections, was the cause of death.

The conclusion reached by the Republican representatives in caucus was to go on with the Langston-Venable election case at all hazards.

Morey, of New Hampshire, has introduced a rule in the house making it an offense punishable by a fine of \$500 for a member to absent himself for the purpose of breaking quorum.

**Boston Girls for a Job.**  
Boston, Sept. 23.—A general strike is threatened by the waiters in the hotels and restaurants. The cause of the trouble is the demand made by the waiters for shorter hours of labor and more wages. The employers think the demand unreasonable and are preparing to resist it. In the event of a strike taking place the managers have engaged girls to take the place of the waiters.

**L. O. G. F.**  
TOKYO, Kas., Sept. 22.—The sovereign grand lodge of Odd Fellows closed its session Saturday. The new officers were installed and the reports of the judiciary committee on Grand Masters Barnum, of Illinois, and Capt. Gen. Ellis was confirmed. Grand Sire Underwood, was made lieutenant general of the Patriarchs Militant. The next session of the grand lodge will be held in St. Louis.

**The Site Chosen.**  
Chicago, Sept. 23.—The park commissioners have acceded to the request of the national commissioners to allow the use of Washington park for the world's fair in addition to Jackson park and Midway plaine. This practically settles the vexed site question to the satisfaction of the national commission. At the opening of the session this morning the commission passed resolutions of regret at the death of Gov. Stevenson, of Nevada.

**Effects of Deep Water.**  
GALVESTON, Texas, Sept. 23.—Delegations from Houston, San Antonio, Dallas and Austin, to the number of 5,000, came in yesterday to help Galveston celebrate the river and harbor bill. There was a mammoth meeting at the cotton exchange, in which every business house in the city was represented, to discuss measures leading toward the immediate improvement of the city. It was very enthusiastic, and after its adjournment, instead of going back to their business houses, the men remained on the streets, shooting firecrackers, making speeches and yelling as loud as their

throats and lungs would permit them. The procession last night was the largest ever seen in the south. Gov. Lubbock and other distinguished Texans addressed a crowd numbering in the neighborhood of 20,000 people. Rents have advanced 25 per cent and there is but little property on the market. Laborers who came in yesterday can not find houses. Certainly the wildest crowd that Galveston has ever experienced are on the streets and have been there for two days.

**THAT BIG RAIL DEAL.**  
What the Denver Railroads Have to Say of It—After the D. & R. G.

Denver, Sept. 23.—"The Santa Fe has everything arranged so that it can lay its hands on the Rio Grande Western whenever it wants to," remarked a gentleman who is supposed to be on the inside of the former company's secrets.

Has the Santa Fe an option on the Western, or has it bought it? "I can't say anything more about it, but one thing is certain, they can get it whenever they want it."

But what one man asserts another of equal prominence disputes. A visit was immediately afterward paid to Colonel Dodge, general manager of the Rio Grande Western, who said in a very decided manner that "the Santa Fe has not ever had any option on the Rio Grande Western."

"Can the Santa Fe get the Western?" was asked.  
"Of course it can get it, if it has money enough."

"How much money would be required to buy it?"  
"I don't know."

"In your opinion, would the Santa Fe have any use for the Denver & Rio Grande?"  
"Why wouldn't they have use for it?"  
"I can't answer that, but you might say why they should want it."

"Well, everybody knows that the Denver & Rio Grande is a paying road, and one which would help the Santa Fe largely. The Denver & Rio Grande gives the bulk of its business to the Rock Island and Missouri Pacific, and now that the Santa Fe has the Midland, the Denver & Rio Grande will work against it in every possible way, so that the Santa Fe would have to suppress competition if for no other purpose. It would make a good feeder and there would not be any risk in buying it."

A man who is well acquainted with everything connected with the Denver & Rio Grande was next seen. He said, in reply to the question as to whether the Santa Fe could buy the Denver & Rio Grande: "The Santa Fe might like to own the Denver & Rio Grande, but it would be more reasonable for the Denver & Rio Grande to buy the Santa Fe, as in all probability it has the most money. Besides the bulk of the Rio Grande stock is held by two foreign syndicates who originally built the road, and they are not at all likely to sell it. If the Santa Fe went into the market and tried to buy the Denver & Rio Grande stock it would go up like a kite."

"How much would be necessary to buy the Denver & Rio Grande?"  
"About \$100,000,000, I suppose."

"If the Santa Fe gets hold of the Western, what will become of the through traffic arrangement with the Midland?"  
"If the Santa Fe gets the Western, the Denver & Rio Grande will build an independent line to Salt Lake City by a shorter and better route than the Western takes."

Nobody in Denver seems to know anything definite about the Santa Fe's movements, as they are being kept very secret.

**A New Paper for San Miguel.**  
To the Editor of the New Mexican.  
LAS VEGAS, N. M., Sept. 19, '90.—Arrangements are about perfected here for the issuing of a Republican campaign paper, under the auspices of the Republican central committee of the county. The paper will be printed chiefly in Spanish for the present, and will find its way to the door of probably every voter in the county. The reading matter will be furnished by capable writers. The purpose of its projectors is to make it something more than a campaign sheet. It is proposed to continue its publication under Republican management as a business venture, thus subserving two purposes. The Republicans of this county have long needed a paper of this character. They have had no Republican paper in this county since the demise of the Las Vegas Gazette. There are two Democratic papers published here, and one that has no politics. The latter published entirely in English, with but a very limited circulation among the Spanish speaking voters. What we need and must have, is a paper in the county that will reach the intelligence of every voter with reliable, truthful and consistent reading matter. There are several hundred issues of EL NUEVO MEXICANO

coming into the county now, and from the favorable manner in which it is spoken of, I have no doubt it is doing a great service. But there are so many questions here of a local nature and of such vital importance to the voter, requiring special consideration, that a local paper is indispensable. Local Republicans have been laboring under a vexatious disadvantage in having no party organ to take up, discuss and properly present the issues forced upon them by the White Cap party and its adherents and sympathizers.

Our outlook grows daily brighter. The White Cap party is divided. The Democracy is divided, and from all appearances the Republicans will have two or three tickets to beat instead of one. The more divisions our enemy affords itself, the less doubtful will be Republican success.

## REPUBLICAN TICKET.

FOR DELEGATES TO THE 22ND CONGRESS—

MARIANO S. OTERO, of Bernalillo County.

Read the constitution and then vote for its adoption.

This capital city of New Mexico will be greatly and permanently benefited by statehood.

The miner or mine owner who votes against the adoption of the constitution on the 7th of October next, votes against the incoming of capital wherewith to develop the great and rich mineral resources of New Mexico.

The friends of statehood and those favoring the best interests of New Mexico must pull off their coats and go to work and that promptly, energetically and incessantly. There is no time to be lost.

As his aspirations for the major generalship in case the bill reviving the rank of lieutenant general becomes law, Gen. David S. Stanley will find the woods of the west full of staunch friends, ready to give him all the aid possible.

The question of bettering their condition, obtaining a decent and honest county government and a reduction of the enormous and constantly growing debt of this county rests with the people. If they would have a different state of affairs they must defeat the gang ticket, nominated on Saturday last, every man of them. If they fail to do so, it can only become worse and capital, investors and people who desire to make homes, will be driven away and locate elsewhere. The business men and property owners of this community are more interested than any other class of citizens.

It will be a mighty sorry day, the coming 7th of October, should the constitution meet with defeat. Progress and advancement will receive a heavy blow and the influx of capital and immigration will be retarded indefinitely. Bear this in mind, tax payers and property owners of New Mexico.

This ranchman and farmer of New Mexico who votes against the constitution, votes against the speedy settlement of Spanish and Mexican land titles in New Mexico. With two senators and one representative in congress New Mexico's demands and needs in that direction will be speedily heeded and adjusted.

The citizen of New Mexico, the head of a family, who votes against the constitution, votes against a most liberal and advanced provision for the establishment and maintenance of free American public schools and against the donation of 5,000,000 acres of land for school purposes by the general government to the state of New Mexico.

As to whether it is best to "taper off" or simply stop short off when it comes time to sober up, the American prison congress has been gathering statistical information, and it finds that the men who "taper off" very seldom give up the liquor habit. It is hardly necessary to say that this conclusion was reached during the absence of some of the New Mexico delegates to the prison congress.

The wool raiser and sheep owner of New Mexico who votes against the constitution, votes against representation in congress and against the protection of his industry. The wool growing industry is being constantly assailed in congress by the free traders, and two senators and one representative in congress from the state of New Mexico will aid materially in the protection of this very important New Mexican industry.

The days of that gigantic swindle, the Louisiana State lottery, seem to have been numbered. The anti-lottery bill, which has just become law, gives authority to the postmaster general to make it exceedingly unpleasant for everybody handling lottery tickets through the mails, advertising the same or sending money for lottery tickets, authorizing the confiscation of the money and destruction of the tickets. An effort may be made to throw all such business in future to the express companies, but that will scarcely prove successful, for the reason should the parties be caught at it the U. S. district attorneys could prosecute them for the mere handling of such advertisements, tickets, etc.

## IT IS NOT A PARTY QUESTION.

Unfortunately for the advancement and progress of New Mexico the Democratic bosses have made the adoption or rejection of the constitution for the state of New Mexico a partisan matter. However, all indications point to the fact that there are a good many decent Democrats who will not be bound by the action of these self-constituted bosses and who will vote for the constitution. Indeed the matter is not a partisan one at all, but one that affects every citizen, every tax payer and every property owner. Any citizen of New Mexico voting against the adoption of the constitution votes against his own best interests, his own prosperity and his own advancement in a financial way. That is all. Of course there will be men, who are so much under the control of the few bosses, now running the Democratic machine, that they will vote against the adoption of the constitution, but it is to be hoped, there will be not many such.

## GOV. J. L. ROUTT.

John L. Routt, who has just received the Republican nomination for governor of Colorado, is one of the unique figures in western political history. He is a Kentuckian by birth, and an Illinoisian by adoption. In 1871 he was appointed second assistant postmaster general, and in 1875 President Grant sent him out as governor of Colorado. He looked over the resources of the Rockies and remarked something like this: "What's the matter with statehood for Colorado? We should be a state." Of course there were a lot of political soreheads immediately on deck, and they ridiculed the idea, but the masses were with Gov. Routt. They voted for admission and won, and honored their leader by electing him governor of the state. After fourteen years of phenomenal prosperity the masses of Colorado are evidently still with Gov. Routt. They ought to be.

## AS YOU SOW, SO SHALL YE REAP.

The New Mexican in this campaign, as at all other times, will be conducted with the greatest possible propriety and decency. It will stoop to no personalities and no personal abuse. It will handle the fitness of candidates for office in a fair and just manner and then let the people choose. If men, who have been tried and found wanting, like the candidates on the Democratic ticket, are elected, the tax payers will have to pay the piper and they will find it a mighty hard road to

travel; if other men on that ticket, who are notoriously unfit in every respect to hold public office, are to be elected, the people of this county as a whole will rue it in good time. This journal will do its duty by the people, and if such shall be found to be of no avail, well and good. Those who sow the wind, must reap the whirlwind.

The objections made by the opponents of the constitution are made for the most puerile and low partisan and personal reasons possible; they are based upon falsehood and wickedness; there is no honesty in them and they are founded upon nothing except partisanship, personal venom and political dishonesty and ambition. Let the people choose.

### A Very Good Reason, Why You Should Vote For Statehood.

Every man who is interested in this country ought to vote for statehood. Especially is this true with the mining element, for the reason that the alien law means general prosperity in every district. Ever since that law passed millions of English money has passed through New Mexico and gone into California or Old Mexico. Personally we know of many English deals which would have been made only for that infamous law, which closes our doors to foreign money.—Silver City Enterprise.

### The Course of the Gang Deserves the severest condemnation.

As was expected, the Democrats of New Mexico are, as a party, opposing the adoption of the proposed state constitution. The vote will be taken on the 7th of October, and, owing to a probable combination between the Democrats and a certain element in the Republican party, it is highly probable that the constitution will be rejected. This rejection will be a death blow to the effort to secure the admission of New Mexico into the union as a state during this congress. The proposed constitution contains strong provisions in favor of the establishment of public schools entirely free from sectarian or denominational control. If the people of the east see that New Mexico rejects a constitution of this kind, the belief will become fixed in the east that New Mexico is not qualified for statehood. The prevalence of this belief will prevent congress from passing an enabling act. The Democrats who are leading the opposition to the constitution deserve, therefore, the severest condemnation of all true lovers of New Mexico. Some of them should be careful lest, by this course, they dig their political graves for all time to come.—Denver Republican.

### During the Democratic administration from 1885 to 1889, the expenses of the territorial prison amounted to \$52,000 per annum.

During the first year under a Republican regime, from March 4, 1889, to March 4, 1890, the expenses, with the same number of prisoners, were \$29,000. It is plain to any person who can read and understand that the management under the Democratic administration was dishonest, and the management under a Republican administration is honest. That is all.

## REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

We, the Republican party of the territory of New Mexico, in convention assembled, at Albuquerque, the 13th day of September A. D. 1890, reaffirm the principles of the Republican party as set forth in the Republican platform of 1888, and we endorse the actions of President Harrison, and of the 51st congress in giving effect to the same. And we especially thank the president for calling the attention of congress in his messages to New Mexico and her wants and the necessity for a speedy settlement of our land claims; and we also thank the senate of the United States for making a special order, during the present congress, the consideration of a bill to create a land court to settle our land titles, and urgently implore congress the necessity for speedy action in the enactment of some law to that end.

We commend the recent action of the Republican members of both houses of congress, in passing the silver bill, as a wise, salutary and good beginning; but a still larger increase of our circulating medium is imperatively demanded, and we urge the passage of a law removing all restrictions from the coinage of silver productions of the United States, and we earnestly endorse and hereby approve the action of a Republican congress and administration in imposing a duty on lead ores, in the bill which has lately passed congress, by means of which the miners and mining interests of our territory have been protected from foreign competition and mining property greatly enhanced in value, and we condemn the Democratic party for opposing the same.

We endorse the tariff legislation carried through against the persistent and violent opposition of the Democratic party, whereby the wool, the greatest product of New Mexico, has been permanently placed beyond the competition of the cheap products of Australia.

The Republican party remembers with gratitude the services of the former soldiers of the nation in defence of its integrity, and thanks congress for the passage of the dependent pension bill, as well as a vast number of private pension bills, many of which were vetoed by Grover Cleveland.

We thank the present administration and congress for the repeal of the obnoxious law, enacted by a Democratic administration, whereby there were excluded from entry and purchase all the public lands west of the 100th meridian, and for removing the obstructions, placed by the Democratic party, in the way of the settlers in obtaining titles to their lands and homes. Also for the liberal aid extended to our agricultural college and agricultural interests, appropriating for us more than \$20,000 annually.

We charge upon the Democratic party, the responsibility for the enactment of the so called alien law, about three years since, by means of which foreign capital has been forbidden to come within our territory and foreign money has been turned away from us, thereby creating a scarcity in financial resources, absolutely stopping investments in our mines and real estate, and almost stopping all business.

To this act alone we attribute the depressed condition of business in this and all other territories.

We condemn our present delegate in congress for silently following his masters and quietly permitting, without a protest, the passage of the two laws before referred to and charge him with neglect of his duty and the abandonment of the best interests of our people and territory by making no effort to prevent the passage of said laws and for making no effort to secure their repeal.

Resolved, That we admire and praise the prudence, courage and common sense of Thomas B. Reed, speaker of the national house of representatives in throttling and destroying the revolutionary habit of filibustering, thereby enabling a majority to enact the laws which will into positive law, and we rejoice with the friends of freedom and progress everywhere at his triumphant re-election by an increased majority.

The Republican party of New Mexico declares itself as unequivocally in favor of the admission of New Mexico into the union of states, under any possible circumstances, as the one essential condition of our progress and advancement, without which our great natural resources will remain comparatively unknown and undeveloped.

We heartily approve of the action of the constitutional convention in fixing a date for the submission of the constitution to the people, apart from the time of the general election, so as to remove the question of statehood from the possible disturbance of partisan political feeling, thus affording an opportunity to all progressive citizens to express their views in favor of our admission to the union freed from the embarrassment of ordinary political elections; and we earnestly call on every friend of New Mexico, who has the public welfare at heart, and who is entitled to vote, to go to the polls on the 7th of October next, and cast his vote for the best interests of New Mexico, irrespective of party.

We earnestly insist that the question of statehood for New Mexico is not and ought not to be an issue of a partisan political character. And we deeply regret as unpatriotic and unstatesmanlike the effort, by the representatives of the Democratic party, recently assembled in convention at Silver City, to bring this question, which rises above all political factions, down to a fight between the two parties.

We endorse and approve the territorial administration of Gov. Prince as clean, wise and able, eminently satisfactory to the people of New Mexico at home and adding to the credit and estimation of the territory abroad, and we point with great satisfaction to the decrease in the expenses of the territory and the reduction of the public debt under Republican officials.

Resolved, That we refer with pride to the economical manner in which the courts of the territory are conducted by Republican judges, the cost per annum being about \$60,000, while under the administration of Democratic judges it cost the people \$100,000 for the same period, or nearly three times as much.

We favor universal education and a complete and adequate system of free public schools for the entire territory and

state of New Mexico, and insist that ample means shall be produced by taxation for their support for a period of not less than six months in the year, and we further favor the conferring upon the voters of each school district, the right to impose additional taxes for such district for such purposes, and we urge the election of members to the legislature who will favor such measures.

We denounce and condemn in the most unqualified terms the slanderous charge of the Democracy that the native people of this territory are mentally and morally disqualified for self government; on which ground that party bases its chief objection to the constitution.

We favor the protection of laborers and employees and the adoption of proper laws securing to them liens for their services and also establishing suitable courts of arbitration for the settlement of differences between employees and employers.

Resolved, That we recommend and adopt as a designating device, to be printed on the face and at the head of the ticket or ballot of the Republican party to be voted at the various polling places in this territory at the general election, to be held on the first Tuesday of November next, the American flag; and that we regard the action of the territorial Democratic convention, recently held at Silver City, in specially refusing to adopt the same emblem, as characteristic of the history of the Democratic party ever since 1860.

The people of New Mexico must not forget that under the Ross hoodie administration, from 1885 to 1889, when this territory was cursed with corrupt judges and dishonest federal and territorial court officials, the cost of running the courts was \$100,000 per year; the people must not forget that, owing to wise and benevolent legislation passed by a Republican legislature over the veto of that hoodie governor, put into office by Grover Cleveland, and owing to a just and honest administration of the courts, the entire expense of their administration for the first twelve months of the present Republican regime, amounted to only \$60,000, in which sum there is included an estimate of a deficiency in the pay of jurors, etc., of about \$10,000; this means that under the Democratic administration the people of New Mexico were systematically and constantly robbed by corrupt judges and dishonest court officials.
