CONGRESSIONAL NEWS.

SENATE.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—Hale introduced a joint resolution, referred to the committee on public buildings and grounds, for the erection in the District of Columbia of a memorial building which shall be suitable as a monument to the memory of U. S. Grant, and which is to contain the military and navy museum, etc., in the inner court of which may be placed to rest the mortal remains of the distinguished American. The title endorsed on the resolution reads: "In the vault of which shall be placed the mortal remains of Ulysses S. Grant."

HOUSE.
O'Farrell, of Virginia, was the only Democrat in the chamber during prayer. The clerk called the roll on the approval of the journal. The speaker hesitated before announcing the result, there being but two lacking of a quorum. To delay the announcement, Republican after Republican requested to know how they were recorded. After sharp interchanges between Taylor and O'Farrell as to the legality of the latter's seating as member of the house, the vote was announced—yeas 155, nays 1; no quorum. A call of the house was ordered. While roll was being called, Sweeney, of Iowa, and Mudd, of Maryland, appeared. During roll call a photographer again reproduced the array of empty Democratic seats. One hundred and sixty-four members responded to the call and the vote again recurred on approving the journal. It resulted, yeas 150, nays 6, the clerk noting a quorum. Saturday's and Monday's journals were then read and approved. The question then recurred upon the first of the majority resolutions to unseat Venable. Agreed to; yeas 161, nays 1, the clerk noting a quorum. Then came the question on seating Langston. It was carried on a division, O'Farrell and Cheadle alone voting in the negative. Langston was then brought to the bar of the house and amid applause took the oath. Then came the chorus from the Republican side: "Call up the other case!" The election committee called up the South Carolina case of Miller against Elliott, despite the efforts of O'Farrell to block the wheels. The previous question was ordered, and despite a protest from Kerr, of Iowa, that some reason for its adoption should be given, the resolution unseating Elliott and seating Miller was agreed to without a division. The house then went into a committee of the whole on the senate amendments to the deficiency bill.

CONDENSED NEWS.

Two Santa Fe freight trains collided near La Plata, Mo., and Brakenham, Mo., was killed.
Eastern railroads are reported to be doing better than at any time in the past five years.
Frank L. Colley, a railway mail clerk, has been arrested at St. Louis for tampering with the mails.
The total earnings of the Illinois Central railroad for the year was \$16,452,922, an increase of \$1,796,405.
Austria has taken the initiative in proposing concerted European action against the McKinley tariff bill.
There is a general feeling in financial centers that money will become cheap during the coming month.
Sugar men are satisfied with the outlook for a suitable amendment to the sugar schedule in the tariff bill.
Three hundred spectators enjoyed a revival of the whipping post and pillory at Wilmington, Del., Saturday.
Exports of specie from New York last week amounted to \$475,647. The imports of specie aggregated \$329,096.
Impressive ceremonies accompanied the unveiling of the bronze statue of Horace Greeley at New York.
The Lima Egg Case company has brought suit for \$25,000 against J. P. Batchelder, of the defunct Batchelder Egg Case company.
The committee of the whole in the Mississippi constitutional convention completed its work. The state governor is to be elected every four years.
The new cotton season at New Orleans shows a marked advance over last season. The amount now in sight is 125,000 bales more than last year. Exports have increased 52,777 bales.
Frank Evans, of Osgood, near Ottawa, Kan., went crazy through love for a girl he had seen but once and never spoken to. He was brought, before the magistrate, but broke away, took to the woods and is still at large.
The announcement at Chicago on Saturday that the bank of the Cape of Good

Hope at London had failed, for \$10,000,000 caused intense excitement among wheat speculators, and December fell from 107 1/2 to 107. After big dealers were pretty well cleared out it was learned there was no such bank in existence.

A Big Blaze.
NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—A private dispatch from Aspinwall to the Times says: The fire is under control. The damage is confined to Front street, the Panama railroad freight house and the market. All the Pacific Mail Steamship company's property is safe.

Catholic Congress.
PITTSBURGH, Sept. 24.—Before the German Catholic congress yesterday Rev. Dr. Baecheler, of New York, spoke on "Catholicism of the Church." He said Catholics had no use for public schools; Roman Catholic children ought to be brought up in their parents' faith.

Railway Conductors.
TOLEDO, Sept. 24.—The International Brotherhood of Railway Conductors rejected Grand Chief Conductor George W. Howard, Grand Secretary and Treasurer L. J. Carr, of Los Angeles; Grand Chaplain C. L. Houghwout, of Ashland, Wis.

Denver Base Ball Club Sold.
DENVER, Sept. 24.—Three-fifths of the Denver base ball club was yesterday sold to a wealthy Denver syndicate for \$5,000. Rowe and Van Horn retain the other two-fifths, but have given the syndicate an option on it which stands good until October 15.

A Wealthy Man Suicides.
SANFORD, Me., Sept. 24.—Silvester Cummings, a wealthy retired shoe manufacturer at Springdale, committed suicide yesterday. He was recently indicted by the grand jury for burning a barn owned by Charles Gray. He left a letter denying the burning of the barn.

Colorado Democrats.
DENVER, Sept. 24.—The convention to-night adopted the report of the committee on credentials and nominated delegates to the state convention and adjourned until Saturday when the legislative ticket will be nominated. The indications are that the Democratic nominee for governor will be either Myron Reed, of Denver, or Judge Yeaman, of Trinidad.

Cattlemen Will Not Pay.
WENNER'S FALLS, I. T., Sept. 24.—The Cherokee Strip Live Stock association refuses to make the last payment of \$100,000 now overdue the Cherokee for the lease of the strip for grazing purposes, giving as a reason President Harrison's proclamation ordering them therefrom. The cattle men say that they have no assurance that they will be permitted to stay on the strip as per contract with the Cherokee, and therefore a further payment can not be made on the grazing privilege.

Chief Mays has written a letter to the commissioner of Indian affairs in reference to the matter.

REPUBLICAN TICKET.

FOR DELEGATE TO THE 32ND CONGRESS.
MARIANO S. OTERO,

Let's have a decent and respectable county government for the coming two years. In order to obtain such a one, the gang ticket nominated last Saturday must be defeated.

If you want your children to go to school in this county during the coming two years, you had better defeat the gang ticket, nominated last Saturday, at the coming election.

What are public funds for anyhow in this county? What good does the tax money do anybody, except to keep a few officials in fat places and to pay interest on a fraudulent debt? Let's hear about this!

Get up and work for the adoption of the constitution, and that from this very minute on until after the votes are counted and declared. Time is short, very short; two weeks from to-day the vote will have been cast.

It is about time that a change came about in the personnel of the police officers of this county. In fact it is high time; disturbances and violations of the peace by officers seem to be the rule, rather than the exception.

The good and patriotic citizens of New Mexico must concentrate for the election on the adoption of the constitution, regardless of party or partisan spirit. It is too vital an issue, and for the good of the whole people, except a few bosses and gangsters at the head of the Democratic machine; the constitution must be adopted.

What are the stock men of New Mexico doing toward saving themselves from a water famine next summer? Tubular wells will do the business for them, but will they take time by the forelock and undertake the tubular wells?

Think people will decide on the day of election between the two parties; we think it will be found that the campaign of lies, slander and falsehood carried on by the gang running the Democratic machine will bear its proper fruit, and that the Republican party, which is conducting a decent and fair campaign, will be victorious at the polls.

How do the honest tax-payers and citizens like the gang ticket anyhow? It is the same old outfit, changing a spot here and there, but upon the whole the same old outfit that has lived off the tax-payers for the past few years and has fattened on illegal gains. Is it not high time that decent and honest men were placed in office and that the management of this county became clean, economical and honest?

Let a people as a whole do what is best for their interests in this matter and vote for the adoption of the constitution on the 7th of October next. Be not backward and be not laggards in this matter. Turn out and vote and show the people of the United States that you are progressive, intelligent, patriotic and worthy of being citizens in every sense of this great and glorious republic.

By all means let us have an improvement in the country's coin, both as regards its volume and appearance. For a quarter of a century the same old style coins have been in vogue here, and they are none too artistic; in fact, they are quite inferior when compared with the German empire's silver coinage since 1873. A bill has just passed congress permitting an improvement of this service, and it is hoped the treasury officials will lose no time in carrying it into effect.

Over the passage of the river and harbor bill Galveston has just had a celebration something akin to that which all New Mexicans will join in when the constitution carries on October 7. On the strength of securing from congress the appropriation to finish the deep water harbor there, rents in Galveston advanced 25 per cent. That's the way things move in a progressive country. October 7 will reveal the fact as to whether or not New Mexico may be termed a progressive country. Vote for the constitution and aid to New Mexico's progressive vote.

SHOW THE COUNTRY WHAT YOU ARE MADE OF.

It is admitted on all sides and by all good citizens that statehood for New Mexico would be of the greatest benefit to the people; it is not denied, except by a few gangsters and bootlickers, that have captured the Democratic party machinery and are running it, not for the benefit of the Democratic party or of the people but for their own aggrandizement, political ambition and personal profit, that the people of New Mexico are well fitted for statehood and that the commonwealth is well able to support a state government decently and well. That being the case, why should the good and patriotic citizen of New Mexico, not vote for statehood and the adoption of the constitution, which is one of the best, most liberal and most advanced instruments of the kind ever submitted to or voted for by any people of any state in this country. There is absolutely no answer to this, except the falsehoods and slanders of a few corrupt politicians, who just now are running the Democratic machinery much to the disgrace and the disgust and the injury of the rank and file of the Democratic party and all respectable citizens.

CONCERNING THE PAYMENT OF TAXES.

At any rate the law requires that taxes be paid by October 31 of each year; there fore there is plenty of time anyway; but as it is notorious and patent that the tax funds of this county are not being handled according to law; that they are not being disposed of according to law; that the tax funds in the past have been misappropriated and used only for the maintenance of a few Democratic bosses; therefore we advise the tax payers of this county to be slow, very slow in paying taxes; we advise them to form a tax payers' association and take steps toward the proper collection of and an honest accounting of tax moneys; we advise them in view of the past, to be very careful and to decline payment at present and until a change takes place in the county government; this may be called by some bad advice, by others unlawful, but the serious condition of this county demands some such action, and after all the people must help themselves. We have had enough rottenness and dishonesty in this county; let's put a stop to it. Stand up for your rights and show the gang that you are decent American citizens, knowing your rights and that you mean to have them. You have only yourselves to blame if you are misgoverned.

THE LATEST DODGE OF THE STATE OPPONENTS.

The Democratic bosses and gangsters, who are opposing the adoption of the constitution, assert that it was gotten up by men who own land grants, and that there is nothing in the instrument that protects the people against land grant encroachments. Of all the silly, lying bubbles the gang is using, that is about the funniest one. The gang knows absolutely and perfectly that this territory or the state of New Mexico will have nothing whatsoever to do with the land grant question. In any shape, way, manner or form it knows perfectly well that that question is simply, solely and entirely one for the United States of America to decide, and that all property rights must be adjudicated according to law, equity and justice in the courts of this territory and of the supreme court of the United States.

From the character and antecedents of the gang that is now running the Democratic campaign and opposing the adoption of the constitution, the people were prepared for anything in the line of political lying and falsehood and slander, ballot box stuffing and the buying of votes, with a little intimidation and bulldozing thrown in. But the silliness of the course the gang is taking, astonishes even those who knew them well.

In the mean time it is very pertinent to remark right here that the Democratic candidate, Antonio Joseph, claims only about 200,000 acres of land grants in Rio Arriba and Taos counties, namely the Ojo Caliente and Cieneguilla grants, alleged to have been granted by the Mexican government about sixty years ago; that the ex-chairman of the Democratic central committee, C. H. Gildersleeve, owes every dollar he possesses to the handling, buying, selling and ownership of Mexican land grants, and the present chairman of the Democratic committee, Mr. Childers, the claimant in several land grant cases; that there is not a prominent Democrat in New Mexico, who has any property at all, or who is a tax payer, who does not own or claim some land under Spanish and Mexican titles. Take these lights of the Democracy, Felix Martinez, Macario Gallegos, Rafael Romero, Felipe Chavez, Thomas J.
