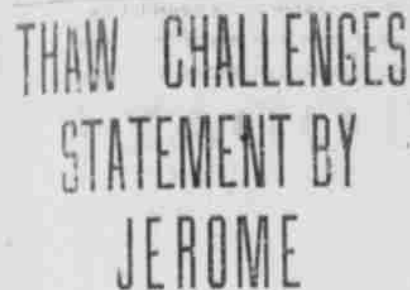

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## HOTELS ENTERED BY BURGLARS; OVER \$20 TAKEN

Intruders Quietly Purloin Trousers in Three Rooming Houses and Search Them at Their Leisure.

Burglars early yesterday morning entered three hotels and rifled guests' trunks for about \$20 and two watches. The hotels entered are the Grand Central, Second street and Central avenue, and the Overland, 509 1-2 West Central avenue.

They made the richest haul at the Palma hotel where they entered rooms getting two watches and from \$12 to \$14. W. C. Carr and G. Griffith had the watches. W. C. Carr, a passenger conductor, lost \$6.50 which he had in his trousers pocket. Carr had placed his vest under his shirt, containing about \$10, and this was not taken.

Not one of the men whose rooms were entered was awakened. The burglars simply went into the rooms took their trunks and departed. They searched the trunks in the hall and left each pair of trousers before the owner's door. They entered the room occupied by a student at the Albuquerque business college, who came here recently from Winslow, Ariz., and took to him from his pants.

## ARIZONA POSTMASTER KILLS SUITOR FOR HIS DAUGHTER'S HAND

Winning, Ariz., Sept. 28.—Alfred E. P. Conwell went to Holbrook last Wednesday, in answer to a message from Taylor, Ariz., to get there and defend a man named Bezan, who on Monday night had shot and killed John Martinez.

Bezan is the postmaster at Taylor, and it seems that Martinez was in love with Bezan's daughter and some time during the day asked her father for the young woman's hand in marriage. Bezan refused, and it is alleged, Martinez left very much disappointed with his lost love and proceeded to get intoxicated. Some time in the evening he returned to Bezan's house, armed with an axe, and requested his daughter to marry him. Bezan refused to comply with his demand, on being again turned down, he rushed at Bezan with the axe, and Bezan pulled a six-shooter and shot him through the body, the ball entering in the region of the stomach. The pistol did not stop the infuriated man and he kept coming toward Bezan, who picked up a shot gun and hit the forehead of one Bezan into Martinez's head, killing him instantly.

Taylor, where the tragedy occurred, is a small town about fifty miles south of Holbrook. Mr. Conwell returned from Taylor yesterday, and announced that Bezan had been held in the sum of \$1,000 to appear before the superior court at Holbrook in February. The bond was promptly furnished.
