Telegraphic Tidings

CONDENSED NEWS.

Gen. Ben Butler and P. T. Barnum are visiting Denver.
The President was entertained at St. Louis on Saturday.
The Jews in Sebastopol have been ordered to leave that city.
Heavy frosts have injured the tobacco crop in some parts of Washington.
An agitation for a divorce law in Italy similar to that of France has arisen.
The Stillwater, Minnesota, penitentiary will manufacture binding twine.
Congressional appropriations this season aggregate nearly a half a billion.
A newly elected school teacher at Berneville, Pa., is but 13 years of age.
A Dakota farmer this season raised by irrigation 400 bushels of potatoes per acre of the best quality.
Lucas county, Michigan, has an experimental farm conducted for immigration advertising purposes.
Russian calculation of the population of China place it at 382,000,000, and the annual increase at 4,000,000.
The letter carriers and postoffice clerks of New York and vicinity have started an eight hour movement.
A well-to-do farmer of Brooks county, Georgia, 62 years of age, took his first ride on a railroad last week.
Portland has taken the Oregon export salmon trade away from Astoria, with the result that Americans, instead of Canadians, get the carrying trade.
According to the recent census of Switzerland the republic contains 1,700,000 Protestants, 1,300,000 Catholics, 8,300 Jews and 10,000 non-religious persons.
The crown attorneys were directed to continue the prosecution of the remaining Irish leaders, notwithstanding the flight of Dillon and O'Brien.
Ex-President Cleveland has accepted an invitation to be present at the Thurman banquet to be given November 13 under the auspices of the Thurman club of Columbus. Judge Thurman will be 77 years old on that day.

Mexico News.

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 13.—Gen. Carlos Diaz Gutierrez, governor of the state of San Luis Potosi, expects to inaugurate a new market, theater, penitentiary, orphanage and children's hospital soon.
This state has taken gigantic steps forward, followed by such states as Mexico, Michoacan, Tamaulipas, Chihuahua and Queretaro.
Work on the harbor at Tampico is progressing favorably.
Silver here shows an upward tendency.
Gov. Martinez de Castro, of the state of Sinaloa, has ordered a report on mining to be prepared in all the districts of the state.
An epidemic of throat disease prevails here.

A Few Items of Railroad News.

New York, Oct. 13.—Geo. M. Pullman is quoted as saying that the decision in the vestibule patent case in favor of Pullman is worth \$25,000,000 to that company.
In relation to the August statement of the A. T. & S. F. it may be said that the company, in connection with all the western and southwestern roads, has taken advantage of the continued fine weather throughout the summer to renew its tracks, buildings and bridges, and to repair its equipment well worn by a heavy traffic. Floods on the Sonora and New Mexico and Arizona roads increased expenses \$21,000.
Chairman Fairbairn, of the western and northwestern divisions of the Western Freight association has accepted the position of chairman of the new Southwestern steamship and railway association.
Deep Water Advocates.
DES MOINES, Oct. 13.—The business of the Inter State Deep Harbor convention was completed Saturday. A resolution was adopted congratulating the great west upon the assured success of a deep water harbor at Galveston. Copies of the resolution were ordered sent to President Harrison and to the U. S. senate and to the house of representatives.

rado; Snyder Clarke, Oklahoma; F. L. Dans, Denver, and A. L. Tolbin, Missouri.

Boston Champions.

Boston, Oct. 13.—On Saturday at the Brotherhood park base ball grounds the champion pennant for 1890 was presented to the Boston club. Col. C. H. Taylor made the presentation speech, complimenting the team upon the high standard of their work. Mike Kelly received the pennant, making no set speech, and it was immediately hoisted in the field to the music, "Slide, Kelly slide" by the band. A five inning game was played by the champions and the New York club, the former introducing all three of their batteries, while O'Day and Brown represented the visitors throughout the game. Score—New York 7, Boston 2.

REPUBLICAN TICKET.

FOR DELEGATE TO THE 52ND CONGRESS.

Nor a public school open in this capital of New Mexico. Where are the school funds? Gone to the gambling table very probably.

A MAJORITY of dishonest men compose the Democratic county ticket of this county; the Republican ticket on the other hand consists of honest tax payers; take your choice on election day.

The earnest life of a great American goes out with the death of Justice Samuel Miller of the U. S. supreme court, who was stricken with paralysis on Friday. Ere this he is probably no more.

The Australian ballot continues to get in its good work. By the use of this system the Republicans of Covington, Ky., have just scored a big victory electing their mayor for the first time in twenty years.

The Republicans on Saturday wrote victory across the face of Santa Fe county by nominating a ticket that has already brought dismay to the corrupt gang that has been allowed to run this county all too long.

Chicago is not getting on so grandly with her World's fair arrangements as many of her friends would like to note, but that's no sign that Chicago won't really astonish the world when it comes to a final show-down.

At the present stage of the game it looks as though the tax payers will take a deeper interest in Santa Fe county elections henceforth. The past has piled up a record of criminal negligence and financial crookedness that vitally ought to have attention.

No money in the county treasury for the payment of the necessary expenses of the county of Santa Fe; and it is expected that investors can be lured to come here and invest in property in this city; both, no sane man would do here under the present circumstances.

Settle the Bernalillo county difficulty, fellow Republicans; no member of the party has the right to imperil party success over this territory; get together and settle it; the interests of the party as a whole are greater than the interests of a faction. Get together and settle it.

CALIFORNIA'S traveling fruit exhibit throughout the east has met with such splendid success that the state board of trade have decided to again take the field next year with a larger exhibit than ever. Some record has been kept of the immigration attracted to California from localities where this exhibit is shown the public and the Californians say, unquestionably this method of advertising is a success, giving ocular proof of the fruitfulness of the soil and attracting a most desirable class of residents.

With the exception of two men on the Democratic ticket of Santa Fe county, there is not a man on that ticket whose official or private character will bear investigation and who is not afraid to have the same investigated. Everybody around here knows this, and there is no giving names.

No pious, hired ruffians and criminals bossed the Republican county convention; there was no bossing there; but hired peons, paid ruffians and criminals dictated the ticket and the action in the Democratic county convention; the honest element in that convention was too small to wield any influence and the dishonest and law breaking element made the ticket.

The Democratic journalistic blackmail, the journalistic Democratic blackmail is abroad in the land; he seems to be a necessary adjunct of the Democratic press of this territory and should be shunned by all decent and respectable citizens; he is a disgrace and an injury to the community that he infests with his presence. But then parasites must live also, although they are a detriment to everything they come in contact with.

From all parts of New Mexico come the most cheering reports for the Republicans. Strong, honest and able men are being nominated in every county and the Republicans will carry at least two-thirds of the counties for county officers and will elect at least a two-thirds majority for the 29th legislative assembly. So note it, as it will prove of vast benefit to the people and insures honest and efficient county government and good and beneficial legislation for the territory.

COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE GROVE, in his annual report to the secretary of the interior, states that for the year ended June 30, 1890, nearly 10,000,000 acres of agricultural lands have been patented and transferred to settlers. The area of coal lands patented during the year largely exceeds that of 1889, Colorado standing first. She also leads in mineral and mill site patents, the number for the year being 571. The Indian lands disposed of aggregate 153,305 acres. Total cash receipts of the office from various sources amount to \$7,789,517. What a magnificent showing this is of western progress, and how it reaches way ahead of anything that was done under the Cleveland-Sparks-Julian plan of running the land department.

NEW MEXICO fruit growers are admonished that they should not neglect to take advantage of this soil and climate and their adaptability for producing raisins. California is in high feather over the protection afforded this western industry and is looking forward now to the time when foreign raisins will be wholly shut out of the American market. Ten years ago California's product numbered about 50,000 boxes per year per season, whereas, the present season, that state has turned out 1,300,000 boxes. There are certain portions of New Mexico that will, it is believed, by reason of their peculiar location and climatic surroundings, produce raisins even superior to those of California, and since we here are 1,000 miles nearer the market, there ought to be handsome returns to the cultivation of the raisin grape.

ALBERT J. FOUNTAIN.

Col. Albert J. Fountain has been renominated as a candidate for member of the house of representatives of the 29th legislative assembly. The counties of Dona Ana, Grant and Sierra are entitled to one member of the council and two members of the house, and Col. Fountain has been nominated for one of these places. He was a member of the last house and its speaker, and it goes without successful contradiction and is fully established to the satisfaction of all fair minded citizens, that he made a most excellent record in that body and in his capacity of speaker, and that he was true to the best interests of the people, true to the principles of the Republican party and true to himself as a man, as a citizen and as a member of the legislature over which he so ably and successfully presided. If the people of those counties would wield strong influence in the coming legislative assembly and would be represented by one of the ablest and most experienced men in the territory, they will vote for Albert J. Fountain and re-elect him by a large majority.

COMPARE THE TWO TICKETS.

The Republican county convention consisted of honest and good citizens and of tax payers, having the best interests of the people at heart. It was fully attended, every precinct in the county being represented.

The Democratic county convention, with the exception of six men in it, consisted of hired peons, at so much for the attendance and work of hoodlums, of thugs, and of men who were seeking indication from their own bad and immoral deeds.

Compare the two tickets. Examine them for man, and then judge for you. If you are an honest man, a

tax payer and a good citizen, you will down the gang of ringleaders, hoodlums, dishonest officials and immoral men, who compose the great majority of the Democratic ticket. There are candidates on that ticket who are guilty of malfeasance, dishonesty in public life, in business and official life, and are well known throughout this community as law breakers and as violators of the ten commandments. Their names are notorious throughout this country and need not be given; if deemed convenient in the future they will be given together with a list of their crimes and the accusations against them. No man unless he has a pecuniary interest in the election, of some of the candidates upon the Democratic ticket, can afford to vote for it; no father of a family who desires decency, morality and educational facilities in this community can cast his vote for it. No citizen who holds property here, desires to live here, wishes to see law and order obtain, hopes for prosperity and an increase of population can afford to cast his vote for the Democratic county ticket. There are but two respectable men on it and they are tainted by being on the ticket and will rue the day they allowed their names to go on it. For it will be said, and it will be believed, that birds of a feather will flock together. Upon the other hand, comparing the ticket man for man and candidate for candidate, it will be found by every citizen who is not crazy upon political affairs, who is not wickedly biased, who is not a member of the ring that has robbed and plundered this county for the past few years, or who is not vicious, that the Republican candidates, man for man, are tax payers, valuable citizens, prominent and public spirited members of the community, men who helped this community in every conceivable shape, some of them men of great influence throughout the territory, others eminent merchants, and all of good moral and unimpaired reputations. That will be found to be the case, unless a man is so blind that he will not see, and of course in that case, he will not find these facts as they exist.

With the exception of a blackmailing Democratic sheet here and another one or two elsewhere, not a single candidate upon this ticket has ever been attacked in his private, business, political or moral character, and the attacks made by these blackmailing and scoundrelly sheets are without the least foundation of any sort, and are made for no other purposes than blackmail, for a few dollars consideration, out of envy, spite and dirty jealousy, and to draw attention from the bad nominations of their own party.

The citizens of Santa Fe county, regardless of party, owe it to themselves, to common decency and in order to have honest and competent officials in office and to bring the scoundrels who have disgraced this county, to justice, to vote for the clean, able and good citizens nominated on Saturday by the Republican party of this county in convention assembled; in a convention that deliberated carefully and patiently and was composed of some of the best men in this county and of citizens and tax payers, who desired to better the condition of affairs here, and to put a stop to the disgraceful, notorious and outrageous plundering of the people and tax payers that has obtained here, openly and above board, during the past few years, and will continue to exist, should the Democratic ticket, through corruption, intimidation, fraud and the dishonest use of public funds, be successful.

THE people of New Mexico must not forget that under the Ross boodle administration, from 1885 to 1889, when this territory was cursed with corrupt judges and dishonest federal and territorial court officials, the cost of running the courts was \$160,000 per year; the people must not forget that, owing to wise and beneficial legislation passed by a Republican legislature over the veto of that boodle governor, put into office by Grover Cleveland, and owing to a just and honest administration of the courts, the entire expense of their administration for the first twelve months of the present Republican regime, amounted to only \$60,000, in which sum there is included an estimate of a deficiency in the pay of jurors, etc., of about \$10,000; this means that under the Democratic administration the people of New Mexico were systematically and constantly robbed by corrupt judges and dishonest court officials.

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

We, the Republican party of the territory of New Mexico, in convention assembled, at Albuquerque, the 13th day of September A. D. 1890, reaffirm the principles of the Republican party as set forth in the Republican platform of 1888, and we endorse the actions of President Harrison, and of the 51st congress in giving effect to the same. And we especially thank the president for calling the attention of congress in his messages to New Mexico and her wants and the necessity for a speedy settlement of our land claims; and we also thank the senate of the United States for making a special order, during the present congress, the consideration of a bill to create a land court to settle our land titles, and to urgently impress upon congress the necessity for speedy action in the enactment of some law to that end.

We commend the recent action of the Republican members of both houses of congress, in passing the silver bill, as a wise, salutary and good beginning; but a still larger increase of our circulating medium is imperatively demanded, and we urge the passage of a law removing all restrictions from the coinage of silver productions of the United States, and we earnestly endorse and hereby approve the action of a Republican congress and administration in imposing a duty on lead ores, in the bill which has lately passed congress, by means of which the miners and mining interests of our territory have been protected from foreign competition and mining property greatly enhanced in value, and we commend the Democratic party for opposing the same.

We endorse the tariff legislation carried through against the persistent and violent opposition of the Democratic party, whereby wool, the greatest product of New Mexico, has been permanently placed beyond the competition of the cheap products of Australia.

The Republican party remembers with gratitude the services of the former soldiers of the nation in defence of its integrity, and thanks congress for the passage of the dependent pension bill, as well as the vesting of private pension bills, many of which were vetoed by Grover Cleveland.

We thank the present administration and congress for the repeal of the obnoxious law, enacted by a Democratic administration, whereby they were excluded from entry and purchase all the public lands west of the 100th meridian, and for removing the obstructions, placed by the Democratic party, in the way of the settlers in obtaining titles to their lands and homes. Also for the liberal and extended to our agricultural and agricultural interests, appropriating \$25,000,000 annually.

We charge upon the Democratic party, the responsibility for the enactment of the so called alien law, about three years since, by means of which foreign capital has been forbidden to come within our territory and foreign money has been turned away from us, thereby creating a scarcity in financial resources, absolutely stopping investments in our mines and real estate, and almost stopping all business.

To this act alone we attribute the depressed condition of business in this and all other territories.

We condemn our present delegate in congress for silently folding his arms and quietly permitting, without a protest, the passage of the two laws before referred to and charge him with neglect of duty and the abandonment of the best interests of our people and territory by making no effort to prevent the passage of such laws and for making no effort to secure their repeal.

Resolved, That We admire and praise the prudence, courage and common sense of Thomas B. Keel, speaker of the national house of representatives in brooding the progress and advancement of the territory, and we earnestly commend the majority to enact the people's law into positive law, and we rejoice with the friends of freedom and progress everywhere at the triumphant re-election by an increased majority.

The Republican party of New Mexico declares itself as unequivocally in favor at all times of the admission of New Mexico into the union of states, under any possible circumstances, as the one essential condition of our progress and advancement, without which our great natural resources will remain comparatively unknown and undeveloped.

We heartily approve of the action of the constitutional convention in fixing a date for the submission of the constitution to the people, apart from the time of the general election, so as to remove the question of statehood from the possible disturbance of partisan political feeling, thus affording an opportunity to all progressive and patriotic citizens to vote in favor of our admission to the union freed from the embarrassment of ordinary political elections; and we earnestly commend the majority to bring this question, which rises above all political factions, down to a fight between the two parties.

We endorse and approve the territorial administration of Gov. Prince as clean, wise and able, eminently satisfactory to the people of New Mexico at home, adding to the credit and estimation of the territory abroad, and we point with great satisfaction to the decrease in the expenses of the territory and the reduction of the public debt under Republican officials.

Resolved, That we refer with pride to the economical manner in which the courts of the territory are conducted by Republican judges, the cost per annum being about \$60,000, while under the administration of Democratic judges it cost the people \$160,000 for the same period, or nearly three times as much.

We favor universal education and a complete and adequate system of free public schools for the entire territory and

state of New Mexico, and insist that ample means shall be produced by taxation for their support for a period of not less than six months in the year, and we further favor the conferring upon the voters of each school district the right to impose additional taxes for such district for such purposes, and we urge the election of members to the legislature who will favor such measures.

We denounce and condemn in the most unqualified terms the slanderous charge of the Democracy that the native people of this territory are mentally and morally disqualified for self government; on which ground that party bases its chief objection to the constitution.

We favor the protection of laborers and employees and the adoption of proper laws securing to them liens for their services and also establishing suitable courts of arbitration for the settlement of differences between employers and employees.

Resolved, That we recommend and adopt as a designating device, to be printed on the face and at the head of the ticket or ballot of the Republican party to be voted at the various polling places in this territory at the general election, to be held on the first Tuesday of November next, the American flag; and that we regard the action of the territorial Democratic convention, recently held at Silver City, in specially refusing to adopt the same emblem, as characteristic of the history of the Democratic party ever since 1860.

It must also be remembered that the law requires the sheriff to turn over all funds in his possession on the 10th of each month to the territorial and county treasurers, and that he has made no payments to either the territorial or county treasurers since February 12, 1890, except in school funds March 4 and April 4, 1890, to the amount of \$1,414.83.

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
