## Telegraphic Tidings

**Shot Himself.**  
CONCORDIA, Kas., Oct. 15.—State Senator E. E. Swearingin committed suicide yesterday by shooting himself through the heart. His mind is believed to have been deranged by financial difficulties. He had held various public offices and was a man of considerable prominence in the state.

**A Bank Failure.**  
ABERDEEN, S. D., Oct. 15.—The bank of E. H. Hagerly suspended yesterday which caused much excitement. An assignment was afterward made. The liabilities are about \$200,000 which is believed will be more than covered by assets.

**For Mrs. Fremont.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 14.—A committee has been formed to raise from the women of California a fund of \$6,000 for the purpose of purchasing a suitable home for Mrs. Jesse Benton Fremont and her daughter. About \$1,000 has already been subscribed.

**The Tariff and Wool-Growers.**  
COLUMBUS, Oct. 15.—Columbus Delano, president of the National Wool-Growers' association, has published an address to the wool-growers of the country complimenting them upon the present status of the tariff laws, and in conclusion stating that he has sent his resignation to the vice president of the association.

**The Old Ritual of the G. A. R.**  
CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—The date fixed for the return of the Grand Army of the Republic to the old ritual, in accordance with the decision of the national encampment recently held at Boston, is January 1 next. The change appears to give general satisfaction to the comrades of the order throughout the country.

**The Official Dead.**  
WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The acting secretary of war has issued a general order in regard to the death of Gen. Belknap. The war department is to be draped in mourning for thirty days. After the receipt of the order at each military post seventeen guns will be fired.  
The arrangements for the funeral of the late Justice Miller will not be completed until the arrival of his daughter, Mrs. Teutolin, this afternoon.

**Oklahoma's Capital.**  
GUTHRIE, Oct. 15.—Gov. Steele sent a message to the upper house of the territorial legislature vetoing the bill placing the permanence of the capital of the territory at Oklahoma City. The veto is based upon the grounds that sufficient reasons do not exist for a change of the capital from this city, its present location. That more territory will doubtless be soon added to the territory and the center of the territory will be changed thereby. The veto caused great excitement.

**A Unique Charge.**  
LEXINGTON, Mo., Oct. 15.—Judge Ryland, in his charge to the grand jury, created a sensation in business and social circles. He directed the jury to inquire into and indict, as the law directs, all persons responsible for permitting games of chance maintained at the county fair, and all persons who may have maintained or played games of chance, whether in a regular gambling hall or private house. He directed the attention of the jury especially to those who have participated in "high five" and "progressive euchre" parties.

**The Invasion of the Mormons.**  
ALAMOSA, Colo., Oct. 15.—More than 100 Mormons have recently gone to Salt Lake City to attend the large gathering of their people which is now in session. Some thirty of them passed through Alamosa from Sanford and Manassa. They will return just before election. The Mormons are all content here, and those who have gone to Salt Lake expect to bring back many of their brothers with them. If they succeed as well as they anticipate, the Mormon colonies in the San Luis valley will number at least 400 more by Thanksgiving time than at present.

**A Great Storm on.**  
DETROIT, Oct. 15.—The worst storm of the season is reported from up the lakes, this morning. As several many vessels have taken refuge in the harbor and are dragging their anchors. At Port Arthur the wind is blowing at the rate of forty miles an hour. A considerable portion of the new break-water is gone. The men working on the breakwater were rescued this morning with much difficulty. At Alpena a large vessel was blown ashore and went to pieces. A schooner went ashore in White Fish bay. An immense fleet has taken shelter in Pigeon bay, Lake Erie.

**Harmonious Churchmen.**  
PITTSBURG, Oct. 14.—The revision committee of the Presbyterian general assembly

bly closed its session to-day with the discussion of the committee upon chapters 3, 6, 9 and 10. Many of the questions were referred to committees to report at an adjourned meeting in Washington. The discussion of committees was thoroughly harmonious and the agreements reached thus far are practically unanimous. The committee conformed in the belief that the report will be finally accepted which will receive the approval of the general assembly and be adopted by the presbyteries.

**A Thankless Job.**  
DUBLIN, Oct. 15.—The Irish Times says William A. Graham and Timothy Harrington, who were appointed members of the committee to visit the United States to solicit aid for the Irish cause have refused to accept the appointments.

**GEN. BUTLER'S FIRST.**  
The Famous Lawyer Looking Over His Western Lands with Frank R. Sherwin.

DENVER, Oct. 15.—Gen. Benjamin F. Butler, of Massachusetts, arrived in Denver by way of the Rock Island railroad yesterday. He was met at the depot by Charles E. Taylor, president of the mining exchange, and Mr. John C. Montgomery. Gen. Butler was accompanied by a party composed as follows: Paul Butler and wife, of Lowell, Mass.; Mrs. Prentice Webster, wife of Gen. Butler's nephew, also of Lowell; Col. T. C. Major, of Malden, the general's private secretary, formerly on his staff when governor of Massachusetts; James Gillilan, ex-United States treasurer, and wife, of New York; Hon. Albion Little, of Portland, Me.; Robert Codrington, New York; Frank R. Sherwin and family, Boston; Thomas McD. Porter, of North Adams, Mass.; Thomas Kirwin, leading special writer of the Boston Herald; H. M. Pinkham, financial editor of the Boston Post, and Dr. Cilley, of Boston.

Gen. Butler's purpose in visiting the west is ostensibly for business and pleasure. He owns the Craig ranch below Pueblo, consisting of 100,000 acres, which was formerly the property of the Colorado Cattle company, but subsequently came into Gen. Butler's possession. He is also the owner of three-fourths of a great ranch in New Mexico, the Mora grant.

This is Gen. Butler's first visit to Colorado, in fact it is the first time he has been beyond the Missouri river in his life. The general will, and will afterward go to Sargent, accompanied by the party of gentlemen capitalists, from which point they will visit the May-Mazepa mine, and subsequently the San Miguel mining district. Gen. Butler is president of the San Miguel Gold Placers company. Gen. Butler was surrounded by a party of ladies and gentlemen all day and refused to be interviewed.

**The D. & R. G. Waking Up.**  
At last it appears probable that the D. & R. G. company intends to do something toward improving its passenger service in southern Colorado and northern New Mexico. The Durango Herald says:

"On or about the 20th inst. the Alamosa and Villa Grove branch will be completed and a new passenger train service will be put on between Durango and Denver via Alamosa and Salida, and the Veta Pass route will be abandoned as far as the passenger traffic is concerned. The Herald has been reliably informed by a high official of the D. & R. G., that the passenger service will be reconstructed and a Pullman car will probably be put on running as far as Alamosa and perhaps through to Durango and that the arrival of the train from the east will be considerably earlier."

Supt. Helm, of the Santa Fe Southern, is working very energetically to bring about equally as great improvement on this end of the line as that suggested in the above quotation.

**POINTS OF INTEREST.**

There are some forty various points of more or less historic interest in and about the ancient city.

The adobe stone stands on the spot where the old Spanish palace had been erected shortly after 1606. That ancient structure was destroyed in 1680 and the present one was constructed between 1697 and 1716.

The chapel of San Miguel was built between 1630 and 1680. In the latter years the Indians destroyed it. Fully restored in 1711, it had previously, and after 1693, been the only Spanish church in Santa Cruz. It still remains the oldest church in use in New Mexico.

The walls of the old cathedral date in 1622, but the adobe plaster is


Other points of interest to the tourist are: The Historical Society's rooms; the Garita, the military quarter; chapel and cemetery of Our Lady of the Rosary; the church museum at the new cathedral, the archbishop's gardens; church of Our Lady of Guadalupe with its rare old works of art; the Soldiers' Path-Finder, Kit Carson, erected by the G.
