## Telegraphic Tidings

**GOULD GOT IT AGAIN.**  
Another Sensational Dispatch Claiming the Purchase of Stock.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—An evening paper publishes the following sensational dispatch from Kansas City:  
It is learned here that Jay Gould has secured a controlling interest in the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad. Last week it was announced that one of the Gould boys was admitted to the directorate of the Atchison. It is known that last May Gould secured at least one-fourth of the Santa Fe stock, and since that time he has been gathering in all that was offered at low enough prices. Baring brothers, the bankers, who are now in such bad shape, have been largely interested in Santa Fe holdings, and it is believed by many persons that that stock has been one of the millstones that has dragged them down.

**England Feels It.**  
LONDON, Nov. 18.—The officers of the Bank relief committee are very much irritated by the flood of scolding correspondence which is being poured upon their management of the recent African expedition. There is genuine feeling of indignation among the British public because of the disgrace brought upon the nation by the acts of the men employed by the committee.

**Powderly Re-elected.**  
DENVER, Nov. 19.—At the evening session T. V. Powderly was unanimously re-elected grand master workman, Hugh Cavanaugh, of Cincinnati, general worthy foreman, and John W. Hays, secretary and treasurer. The assembly passed a resolution continuing Mr. Powderly's salary at \$5,000, but upon a motion of Mr. Powderly the resolution was reconsidered and the amount reduced to \$3,500.

**The Strip to be Opened.**  
WICHITA, Nov. 19.—The commission appointed by the president by virtue of an act of the last congress to negotiate for the purchase by the government of the Indian lands in the Indian territory have just completed negotiations with the Cheyenne and Arapaho tribes for the purchase of 3,500,000 acres of their lands. The commission left yesterday for Tallahassee to meet with the Cherokee council for the purpose of opening negotiations for the purchase of the Cherokee strip, the largest block of land now owned by the Indians in the territory. The negotiations will doubtless consume several weeks.

**Messiah-mad Indians.**  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—A telegram from Gen. Miles received by Major Gen. Schofield states that the Indians are in a state of trouble with the stock Indians at the Rosebud and other agencies. They remain restless, however, and are still looking for the coming of the Messiah who is to exterminate the white man. Every precaution has been taken by the military authorities to suppress an outbreak if it should occur. Troops in adequate numbers have been stationed at points of threatened trouble. Gen. Ruger's visit has had a good effect on the Indians.

**Oregon Will Have an Exhibit.**  
PORTLAND, Nov. 19.—Last night at a meeting of the World's fair committees of the Oregon Press association and the Oregon state board of commerce it was decided to ask the legislature to create a World's fair committee and appropriate \$250,000. The commerce committee went forward and planned to organize in every county in the state. Commissioner Williams, who was in the city on his way to Chicago, was furnished with resolutions demanding ten acres of land on the exposition grounds for Oregon, on which the state will put up buildings of its own and have an exhibition something on the scale of the Portland industrial fair.

**Settlers Starving.**  
LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 19.—It is useless to longer attempt to conceal the fact that in several western counties many of the settlers are in a starving condition. Some time since Gov. Thayer appointed several well known gentlemen to investigate the situation. They visited several counties and report much destitution. Their estimate is that there are in each of these counties 5,000 people who are nearly or quite destitute. The crop failure was nearly complete. They have little clothing and only shorts and corn meal for food. Fuel is very scarce and without money it is difficult to get enough to keep comfortable. They have no corn-cobs even. After mature deliberation the railroads have agreed to furnish coal at the cost of the mines. They will haul it the way free and the mines are from 200 to 500 miles distant.

**TERRITORIAL TIPS.**  
Several large sheep buyers are now in New Mexico figuring on the prospects for the coming year.

C. J. Booth, the representative of Swift & Co., the leading sheep handlers of Kansas City, has shipped out of New Mexico 341 cars of sheep, in all 71,800 sheep.  
Will it not be well for the sheep owners of the territory to call a meeting and discuss the feasibility of a scab law? This paper will lend its aid to secure any beneficial legislation.—Stock Grower.

The public school at Farmington commenced its term last week, Monday, under the charge of Prof. and Mrs. Bryce, with forty-five pupils.—Index.

The Index is informed that the medi-

cal fraternity of San Juan county have adopted the Colorado plan of making those who are slow pay "slam up" the cash in advance for medical attendance.

The Optic understands that the young gentlemen and ladies composing the Las Vegas Opera company are arranging to go to Albuquerque the last of the week, to present the Mikado in that city.

Severo Quintana, of Springer, commonly known as Humpback Kelley, was murdered in that town on Saturday night by some Mexicans. Particulars could not be learned.

Two indictments have been found against D. C. Cantwell by the Socorro county grand jury for the killing of W. H. Moore, his partner, in the Black Range Cattle company.

Arizona red sandstone is to be used in the building of the Webster block in Santa Fe. It is believed that the red sandstone found in the canon just north east of Doveva's mill, is quite as valuable for building purposes if any one would take the pains to open it up. At all events it is well known that the Las Vegas red stone is not excelled by the Arizona article or any other. New Mexico should prize home products.—Las Vegas Optic.

**Big Mining Deal.**

Reference has already been made in these columns to the sale of the Alhambra mine, recently negotiated by that excellent gentleman and leading mine attorney, Hon. H. L. Pickett, of Silver City. The Mining and Scientific Press, of San Francisco, has this to say on the subject of this transaction:

"Probably the most important mining transaction in southern New Mexico during the present year is the recent sale of the Alhambra mine, in the Black Hawk district, eighteen miles southwest of Silver City. This mine was the property of Miller & Dodd. H. L. Pickett, esq., attorney of Silver City, negotiated the sale to some Chicago parties for \$100,000, which was paid in cash. The purchasers have organized a stock company with sufficient capital to push the work with vigor, which they propose to do. There is no doubt but that this mine is well worth the price paid. The ore is high-grade silver with considerable amounts of native gold. In its present state it will pay a handsome dividend on the amount invested, and when more fully developed, the new owners will reap a rich harvest. At the same time, the sale is a fortunate one for the former owners, as well as for this district, for, with the ample capital of this new company, we may look for great developments than could have otherwise occurred."

**Advertising Santa Fe.**  
Mr. F. T. Webster, the Denver man, who in company with Mr. Papa, of Rawlins, Wyo., recently purchased the Probst tract, evidently has made up his mind that Santa Fe will do to tie to. He has just ordered 500 letter-heads printed, and on the back of each sheet are these "facts of interest relating to Santa Fe." Santa Fe has an elevation of 7,000 feet above sea level.

It is the capital city of the rapidly growing territory of New Mexico.

It possesses the finest climate on the globe.

It is the center of the richest fruit country on the continent.  
It is surrounded by the most valuable deposits of mineral and coal in America.  
It is the natural distributing point for the products of the Rio Grande valley and is destined to become the greatest health resort between the oceans.  
Mr. Webster's idea is to convey to his correspondents just enough information to inspire them to ask questions. It is an excellent plan for advertising Santa Fe and her wondrous undeveloped resources.

**"The Sunshine State."**  
Some months ago, a Boston publishing house, preparing a geographical work, after asking information of Gov. Prince on various points connected with New Mexico, inquired as to its "pet name," as, in treating of each state, they had placed in the pictorial headings these familiar names, as "Granite State," "Bay State," "Empire State," etc.  
In his recent annual report the governor refers to this fact and says:  
"I had to answer that New Mexico was not yet possessed of a 'pet name,' nor could one be adopted except by common consent; but I ventured to suggest that as it had been called 'the land of perpetual sunshine,' no more appropriate name could be found than 'The Sunshine State.' And so, for wider circulation, that may elicit comment and show how fully this meets the general thought. I repeat the suggestion here, for no part of the union, by its climate and cloudless sky, is so fully entitled to this name of 'The Sunshine State.'"

A Paper that Describes Col. Dwyer and the New Mexican.

The Las Vegas Optic prints this: "SPRINGER, N. M., Nov. 17.—J. W. Dwyer, who was appointed county commissioner by Gov. Prince, has just refused to allow a couple of printing bills against his county, although the statute provides that the county shall pay said bills, and he always gets the New Mexican's bills through very promptly. The bills were for stationery furnished by this Vegas firm for the district court and the superintendent of schools of Colfax county, and had the O. K. of the proper officials. Perhaps Dwyer wants to make the people believe he is looking after the interest of the county since they have been kicking against the bill of \$633.50 which, in June last, he allowed a doctor

friend of his for cutting off a tramp's leg who was injured by the train while attempting to steal a ride, and also a hotel bill of \$183 for boarding the tramp at the same time, both which were wholly unauthorized, as the county is not compelled to pay such bills. One of the parties has appealed his case to the district court and the chances are the county will have some court costs to pay. A few more commissioners like Dwyer, and Colfax county will be bankrupt. X V."

Col. Dwyer is a most honorable man and excellent official, the above notwithstanding.

### SANTA FE, the city of the Holy Faith of St. Francis, is the capital of New Mexico, trade center, sanitary, archiepiscopal see, and also the military headquarters.

An Indian pueblo had existed on the site previous to the 15th century. Its name was Uga-p'ho-ga, but it had been abandoned long before Coronado's time. The Spanish town of Santa Fe was founded in 1605, it is therefore the second oldest European settlement still extant in the United States. In 1804 came the first venturesome American trader—the forerunner of the great line of merchants who today made traffic over the Santa Fe world-wide in its celebrity.

**THE CLIMATE**  
 of New Mexico is considered the finest on the continent. The high altitude insures dryness and purity (especially adapted to the permanent cure of pulmonary complaints, as hundreds will be witness), and by traveling from point to point almost any desired temperature may be enjoyed. The altitude of some of the principal points in the territory is as follows: Santa Fe, 7,047; Coitella, 7,774; Taos, 7,455; Golieta, 7,887; Taos, 6,850; Las Vegas, 6,432; Cimarron, 6,480; Bernalillo, 5,704; Albuquerque, 4,918; Socorro, 4,656; Las Cruces, 3,844; Silver City, 5,946; Ft. Stanton, 5,800. The mean temperature at the government station at Santa Fe, for the years named was as follows: 1874, 48.9 degrees; 1875, 48.6 degrees; 1876, 48.1; 1877, 48.3; 1878, 47.6; 1879, 50.6; 1880, 46.6; which shows an extraordinary uniformity. For tubercular diseases the death rate in New Mexico is the lowest in the union, the ratio being as follows: New England, 25; Minnesota, 14; Southern States, 6; and New Mexico, 13.

**DISTANCES.**  
 Santa Fe is distant from Kansas City, Mo., 1,197 miles; from Denver, 338 miles; from Albuquerque, 216 miles; from Bernalillo, 216 miles; from El Paso, 340 miles; from Los Angeles, 1,032 miles; from San Francisco, 1,281 miles.

**ELEVATIONS.**  
 The base of the monument in the plaza is, according to latest correct measurements, 7,019.5 feet above the level of the sea; Bald mountain, toward the northeast and at the extreme northern end of the Santa Fe mountains, 12,601 feet above sea level; Lake Peak, to the right (where the Santa Fe creek has its source), is 12,045 feet high; the divide (Teague road) 7,171; Agua Fria, 6,480; Olneyville (west), 6,025; La Bajada, 5,514; mouth of Santa Fe creek (north of Pena Blanca), 5,225; Santa Fe mountains, 10,908; Old Pecos, 6,801; Los Cerrillos mountains (south), 5,584 feet in height.

**POINTS OF INTEREST.**  
 There are some forty various points of more or less historic interest in and about the ancient city.

The adobe palace stands on the spot where the old Spanish palace had been erected shortly after 1605. That ancient structure was destroyed in 1680 and the present one was constructed between 1697 and 1718.

The chapel of San Miguel was built between 1636 and 1680. In the latter years the Indians destroyed it. Fully restored in 1711, it had previously, and after 1683, been the only Spanish chapel in Santa Fe. It still remains the oldest church in use in New Mexico.

The walls of the old cathedral date in part from 1622; but the edifice proper is from the past century.

Old Fort Marcy was first recognized and used as a strategic military point by the Pueblo Indians when they revolted against Spanish rule in 1680 and drove out the enemy after besieging the city for nine days. The American army under Kearney constructed old Fort Marcy in 1846.

Fort Marcy of the present day is garrisoned by two companies of the 10th U. S. Infantry, under command of Col. Snyder, and here at 9 a. m. daily occurs guard mounting, a feature of military maneuvering of interest to the tourist.

Other points of interest to the tourist are: The Historical Society's rooms; the "Garita," the military quarter; chapel and cemetery of Our Lady of the Rosary; the church museum at the new cathedral, the archbishop's gardens; church of our Our Lady of Consolation with its rare old works of art; the soldiers' monument, monument to the Pioneer Path-Finder, Kit Carson, erected by the G. A. R. of New Mexico; St. Vincent hospital, conducted by Sisters of Charity, and the Orphan's industrial school; the Indian training school, Loreto Academy and the chapel of Our Lady of Light.

The sight-seeer here may also take a vehicle and enjoy a day's outing with both pleasure and profit. The various spots of interest to be visited are: Escondido pueblo, lying in the divide en route; Monument rock, up in picturesque Santa Fe canon; the Aztec mineral springs; Nambe pueblo; Agua Fria village; the turquoise mines; place of the assassination of Governor Perez; San Ildefonso pueblo; the ancient cliff dwellers, beyond the Rio Grande.

COMPLICATIONS UNTANGLED.

A Tie Vote for Sheriff in Eddy County and a New Election Necessary.

Under date of the 17th instant Solicitor General Bartlett has forwarded the following opinion to Eddy:

Sir: Your favor of the 11th instant, stating that in the late election in your county there was a tie vote for the candidates for sheriff, and asking the proper procedure in such a case is just received, and while the questions propounded are properly answerable by the district attorney of the 3d judicial district, yet, recognizing the importance of this case, and the necessity for a prompt answer, I will take the liberty of giving my opinion upon the various questions asked in the order of inquiry.

Section 6, chapter 87, at page 203, laws of 1889 provides for the election of your board, giving it the same powers as the boards of county commissioners over election matters, and providing the same penalties for the neglect of any duty as in the case of county commissioners, and I have no doubt that those powers and duties continue until the result of an election is completed, i. e., issuing the certificate of office to those who are elected; in this case from the canvass, it appears that no sheriff has been elected.

Section 1166, Compiled Laws, provides that in such case the county commissioners shall order a new election for that office. This is not affected by the law of '89, found at page 29, Session Laws of that year, providing for the county board to fill vacancies as that power is limited to vacancies caused by death, resignation, removal or otherwise, and there is no vacancy here to fill, it being an original office, to be filled by election, and even in the case of an organized county this section would not apply for the reason that there is no vacancy until the incumbent's term of office expires.

Your board should order the new election for that office, giving notice as required in section 1129, Compiled Laws, the reason therefor, and the places where such election is to be held. No new registration is required, but the registration list of the late election should be used. If section 1227, Compiled Laws is not broad enough to cover this case in express terms, I think upon principle it does so by implication at least.

The evident intent and meaning of the law creating your board was that you should have and exercise the same powers with reference to the conduct of this election from giving the notice down to the issuing certificates that are conferred upon the board of commissioners in organized counties, and all the powers incident or necessary to carry this object into effect are necessarily implied. No one can possibly be injured by this course or object to it, and the result desired in the law is accomplished, that is the will of the people is ascertained and certified by you. THE TAOS COUNTY CASE.

The mandamus proceeding against the Taos county board of election canvassers was heard before Judge Seeds in chambers yesterday afternoon. Gen. Bartlett appearing for the people. Mr. Laughlin represented the Taos county board of commissioners, but made no argument whatever, simply filing an answer to the pleadings of the relator, Hon. Juan Santistevan, and which was indeed a very unique and singularly worded document.

The court promptly ruled on the case and ordered that a peremptory writ issue commanding the board to count the returns from Taos county precincts, including precincts 4, 12, 14 and 18, which it was attempted to throw out on the pretext of technicalities, and also directing that the returns from all precincts cast for J. P. Rinker, Republican candidate for county commissioner from the 2d district, be also counted. The vote for Mr. Rinker had been thrown out in toto by the board of canvassers. The board is directed to appear in Santa Fe and make return as to whether or not this order has been complied with on Wednesday next, one week from to-day.

Grant Rivenburg is being congratulated over the arrival of a boy babe at his home.

Sheriff C. A. Robinson, of Socorro, is in the city and has turned over to the territorial treasurer the neat little sum of \$16,094, territorial taxes collected by him during the past thirty days; he is collecting the new taxes and as fast as collected and every thirty days turns the funds over to the proper officials, namely the county treasurer of Socorro county and the territorial treasurer. Sheriff Robinson has just been re-elected, the only Republican who was successful in his county. In this instance the people of Socorro did mightily well. On yesterday he paid the county treasurer of his county \$18,628.75; that's the kind of a sheriff and collector to have.

The Probst tract on the south side is being fenced by its new purchasers, Messrs. Webber and Papa, and they have purchased from the Santa Fe nurseries over 1,500 fruit trees which are to be set out thereon, also a vast quantity of small fruits—strawberries, raspberries, currants, etc. Their order calls for eleven varieties of apples, peaches, plums, cherries, German prunes, apricots and nectarines. It is to be made the banner orchard of New Mexico as a starter, and after a while, when the demand calls for it, it will be set up into small plots and placed on the market. Big money in such a scheme.

Prof. Hiram Hadley, of the New Mexico agricultural college, passed down the road yesterday for his home at Las Cruces, having been to Champaign, Ill., to attend the annual meeting of the association of American agricultural colleges and experiment stations.
