Telegraphic Tidings

Reapportionment to be Resisted.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The dispute between the New York authorities and the superintendent of the census has assumed a new phase. The Democrats in congress will resist to the utmost the passage of any reapportionment bill until a new census has been made.

After Intruders.
ARKANSAS CITY, Kas., Nov. 29.—Two companies of cavalry left Camp Merritt, south of this city, yesterday, under orders to clear the eastern part of the Cherokee strip of all hunters, boomers and campers. After December 1 no parties will be allowed to cross the strip without permission and an escort.

They Won't Fight.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The war department is in receipt of dispatches from the seat of the Indian trouble all indicating an improvement in the situation. Gen. Brooks says that every hour lessens the strength of the Indians. Little Wound has come into Pine Ridge agency and his brother braves are following him. Short Bull of the Rosebud agency, one of the most troublesome of the Sioux, and his followers to the number of about 500 lodges returned to Pine Ridge Tuesday.

Tucson, A. T., Nov. 29.—Authenticated rumors reached this city that the Indians of White Mountain reservation are growing very restless and the officers of the agency are apprehensive. Medicine men are endeavoring to work up an excitement by starting religious dances. Recently Lieut. Johnson arrested four of the most turbulent ones. The merchants believe that the emissary is from the Sioux and endeavoring to make trouble. Paymaster Tower has just returned from a partial tour of the territory and reports no special excitement so far as he noticed.

Pushing Work.
CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas, Nov. 29.—President Ropes and General Manager Armstrong have left for Philadelphia and New York, to arrange for the purchase of rolling stock for the Corpus Christi & South American railway. Work on this road is being pushed from Corpus Christi by Griffin Bros., of Minneapolis, contractors, who have their full force employed. The completion of the road will shorten the distance to the City of Mexico by 400 miles, and it will open to settlement rich farming and sugar producing lands now held as ranches between here and Brownsville, and it is also intended by its builders to be the first link to the Pan-American system of railroad on that portion being constructed in the United States to connect the three Americas.

The Koch Cure Again.
BERLIN, Nov. 29.—The Post publishes a statement by Dr. Daniels, a colleague of Dr. Koch, in which he admits that 500 marks was asked and paid for a single injection of Prof. Koch's lymph. The money was not paid to Dr. Koch, but to Dr. Cornhill and Dengel. It is reported that Prof. Koch has declined to further supply either Levy or Dengel with the lymph.

St. Louis.—Nearly a score of people, suspicion, left for New York to-day from whence they will sail for Berlin to place themselves under the care of Dr. Koch. The discovery of a cure for consumption has met with ready credence in this city among the medical profession. They regard him as even a greater benefactor of humanity than Sir Edward Jenner, who a hundred years ago, with his vaccine virus, took the sting from small pox.

Election Bets Contrary to Law.
GALVESTON, Texas, Nov. 28.—A special from Corsicana, Texas, says: The grand jury has been engaged most of the past week in trying a lot of citizens of this city indicted for betting on the recent elections. This is a new proceeding in our courts. Though the laws against betting on elections has been on the statutes a long time the sporting fraternity have in times past been wont freely and unmolested to put up their money on their favorite candidates to the full extent of their ability and desire. The last grand jury concluded to look into the matter, and as a consequence the names of Corsicana citizens of all degrees of prominence, wealth and social respectability to a large number born the trial docket of our county court. In some instances two and three, and in one instance as many as eight indictments appear against one man. Twenty-five dollars and costs is the usual fine. From the number of indictments, not less than \$1,000 will be gathered into the county's treasury from this source at this term of court.

Southwest Indians.
DURANGO, Colo., Nov. 29.—Several Navajo Indians are in from their reservation, and they are very talkative of the ghost dance situation and the Messiah craze, pretending to have received an important communication from the north. They say decidedly that they are not in it, and give an interesting story of the affair. They say that the great spirit is none other than a peddler named Isaac Cohen, who many years ago traded with them and learned their tongue. Cohen was known by the early settlers as "Noey" Cohen. The Navajos are positive that the would-be game rooster is Cohen, and the Utes are said to join them, notwithstanding there is undoubtedly some feeling in both tribes.

Chicago.—A special from Pine Ridge agency says: Unless the Indians are frightened or driven into a fight during the next week there is every probability that the Indian troubles about Pine Ridge agency will be settled without difficulty. No hostile In-

dians can be found among the 4,000 gathered here. The authorities look mysteriously but act much more pacifically than they have at any time before. Every Indian that can be found has united with Red Cloud in the declaration that they don't want to fight and never did. The authorities are reticent about their plans, but there can be little doubt that an effort will be made to disarm the Pine Ridge agency, if not the whole Sioux nation. This effort will include Pine Ridge, Rosebud, Cheyenne River and Standing Rock.

ADDITIONAL LOCAL.
Cerrillos Rustlings.
The Rustler comes up smiling as usual this week with the remark that Cerrillos has a smaller percentage of sickness than any other place in the United States with the same population.

Wm. Mailand has decided to open out in business in Cerrillos as a commission merchant, and has ordered a supply of stationery. He will handle general produce, hides and pelts.

The work of speeding and regulating the machinery in the Cash Entry's big concentrating plant is still going on, and every piece is being carefully adjusted to its work. The treatment of ore will likely begin in earnest some time next week.

Yes, observes the Rustler, speaking of the D. & R. extension, by going down the rocky river canon, the road would possibly get a half dozen goals to ship each year, while from the mines of southern Santa Fe county alone it could get annually thousands of carloads of freight.

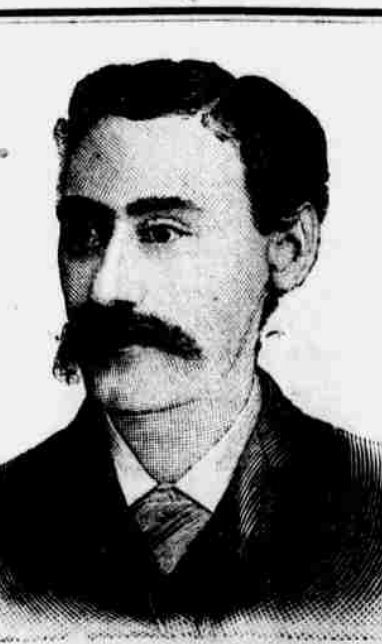
