Telegraphic Tidings

Massachusetts Kicks Hard
Boston, Jan. 22.—Faneuil Hall, floor and gallery, was packed with the substantial business men of Boston, gathered at the call of Mayor Matthews to formally protest against the free coinage of silver. The platform was occupied by some of the most distinguished statesmen, financiers and educators of Massachusetts.

Female Suffrage for Kansas.
Topeka, Jan. 22.—A bill was introduced in the house yesterday to confer the right of suffrage on women. The bill provides that women 21 years of age and possessing all other necessary qualifications of voters shall be entitled to vote at all general, special and municipal elections in the state, the same as men; women 21 years old and over shall be entitled to be voters for and hold office in, in the state. The Alliance members are practically unanimous on the question of woman suffrage.

Senatorial Election.
Hartford, Conn., Jan. 22.—Both houses met in joint convention, and re-elected senator O. B. Platt.
Concord, N. H.—The senate and house met in joint convention yesterday and declared Jacob H. Gallinger elected United States senator to the full term of six years from March, 1891.

Denver, Col.—The senate and house met in joint session at noon yesterday, to ballot for the United States senator. The vote was Hon. H. M. Teller, 47; Hon. Caldwell Yeaman, 27.

Albany, N. Y.—Every member of both houses of the legislature were present when the joint ballot for United States senator was taken at noon. The vote as announced gave D. B. Hill, 81 votes. William M. Everts 79 votes. D. R. Hill was declared elected.

Indianapolis, Ind.—In joint convention of the legislature the votes on the two houses for United States senator were compared and D. W. Voorhees declared elected. Voorhees received 110 votes and Governor Hovey received 40 votes.

Springfield, Ill.—The two houses of the state legislature met in joint session at noon yesterday to vote for a United States senator. The first ballot resulted as follows: Palmer, (democrat) 101; Oglesby, (republican) 100; Sarseter (farmers) 3. A strict party vote and no election.
The second and third ballots were the same as the first. Adjourned.

Atchison, Kas.—The friends of Senator Inalls profess to be confident of his re-election to the senate. They indicate that recently the representatives of the farmers in the house have become more friendly towards him and that they recognized the distinction which he has rendered the country. The opposition has combined on no candidate against him.

TALKING OF A CLUB.

A Suggestion that Santa Feans Get a Move on Themselves.

To the editor of the New Mexican.

SANTA FE, Jan. 21.—With the approach of spring and the very excellent prospects that Santa Feans will be called upon to be united for advancing the city's interests and for the entertainment of many visitors—investors—would it not be desirable to begin now moving in the matter of organizing a businessmen's club? All recognize the benefits the Board of Trade has wrought, but an association that reaches further and combines social as well as commercial interests is what the times demand. These organizations have proved powerful factors in building up western cities. The Denver Chamber of Commerce for instance, began with twenty-five members only, but to-day its members reach over 300. At Albuquerque a club has been started, 100 citizens paying an entrance fee of \$50, and a magnificent club house is in process of building. Every stranger of prominence who visits the town is given the freedom of the club rooms, and his entertainment is courteously looked after. Is it not possible to secure fifty business men in Santa Fe who will discuss the details of such an organization? Let's hear from the subject.

SHERIFF ROBINSON'S VIEWS.

He Comments Critically Upon the Present Law for Feeding County Prisoners.

To the Editor of the New Mexican.

Socorro, N. M., Jan. 21.—I find this editorial paragraph in your issue of the 20th:

"The system at present in vogue of feeding inmates of county jails by contract is more economical and a better system than the method, under which the sheriff receives a stated amount for feeding prisoners; leave well enough alone. The law as it now is to this respect ought not to be changed."

And I must say that I am more than surprised at the position you take on this question. I had always considered the New Mexican one of the most enterprising journals in the territory, but when you advocate the policy that you do in this article, you simply tie a man hand and foot, throw him in the water and tell him to swim or drown, (just as the superintendent of the penitentiary is now situated). You make the sheriff responsible for the jail and prisoners and then you turn the same over to a lot of irresponsible parties. So far as the money that is made in feeding prisoners at 75c per day is concerned, you can easily figure the profits, provided they are fed good and wholesome grub, and unless a sheriff has twenty or thirty prisoners all of the time he could not make enough out of it to board himself and a small family, and a sheriff must have a jailor to attend to the jail, he can not do it himself. I always give the jailor every dollar that he makes out of the jail, and hold him and his bondsmen personally responsible for the prisoners and the proper care of them, and I can assure you that my jailor has not made any more than a living out of the same in the past two years, and he has only one child in his family.

It is a well established fact that if prisoners are permitted to get tools to work with that they will cut out of the best jails made, and the only way to keep them, is to prevent their getting anything with which to cut out. Now then you allow a lot of irresponsible persons to be going in and out of your jail at will, and someone will soon bribe some person to carry in tools to his or their friend, and soon your prisoners are gone and Mr. Sheriff is censured for his negligence. I am free to say that under the law as it now stands, there will not be a jail where there are five prisoners continually in jail where there will not be a jail delivery in less than one year under the operation of that law. I hope that you will see the necessity of making the sheriff the sole custodian of the jails and hold him responsible for the management of the same. Yours truly,

The Insane Asylum.

There was a meeting of the board of managers of the territorial insane asylum board at Las Vegas on Tuesday. Gov. Prince was among those present. Hon. Russell Marcy presided. It had been advertised in the New York Tribune and St. Louis Globe-Democrat that \$500 would be paid for the best set of building plans, and as a result there were fourteen sets of plans laid before the board, they coming from all over the country from Delaware to Colorado. There were so many good plans offered that the board had to take time to consider them carefully before making a selection. Under the present act this institution gets about \$5,500 a year, which is considered insufficient. A committee of Messrs. Benigno Romero, J. B. Watrous and Russell Marcy were named to visit Santa Fe and solicit from the legislators an increased allowance of funds.



FOR JUSTICE AND PRINCIPLE.

The Council Stands up for Economy and Business Methods in Handling Public Funds.

No Dribbling Special Appropriations will Be Allowed—The Lower House at Last Shows Its Hand.

The tax payers of New Mexico will find more than a passing interest in the New Mexican's legislative report to-day: THE COUNCIL.

YESTERDAY AFTERNOON'S SESSION.

H. B. No. 46, An act creating a commission to codify the laws, and C. B. No. 55, providing for the issue of current expense bonds by counties, were laid before the council and consigned to the president's desk to come up in regular order.

A recess of fifteen minutes was taken to permit the conference committee, Messrs. Perea, Catron, Achetia and Jaramillo to confer with the house committee, Messrs. Burns, Paulin, Easley and Montoya, on the subject of H. B. No. 64, the house substitute for the council bill providing for the pay of employees other than those prescribed by the U. S. law.

When the council was again called to order, Mr. Perea announced that the conference committee had agreed to disagree and he intimated in rather strong terms that they would probably occupy that position until the coming of the rainy season, the unprecedented demands of the house conferees.

The council is perfectly willing to appropriate funds for the payment of employees, providing such funds come through the medium of the regular appropriation bill for the joint benefit of both branches of the legislature, but the house, contrary to all precedent, will not consent to this simple and apparently just solution of the question, and, on the other hand, demands that the council agree to give the house a special contingent fund, to be placed to the credit of the house exclusively, to be used by that body as it sees fit.

Mr. Catron defended the stand taken by the council committee. The council had agreed that the house could designate the number and pay of the employees, but the plan of providing for all expense in a general appropriation bill had worked so admirably during the past two years saving over a quarter of a million dollars to the taxpayers of New Mexico, and putting a stop to the loose way of handling public funds under the special appropriation system contended for by the house that the council felt in duty bound to stand up for the principle of providing a general appropriation bill to cover all necessary expenses.

Several other members spoke of the business-like, just, fair and equitable plan of appropriating all funds in a general bill; of the advantage it had been to the people, and referred to the success of this plan as demonstrated in national legislation, even the special appropriations, if there are any, always going into the general appropriation bill, and it was said that the contention taken by the house seemed inexplicable, no possible good from it coming to the tax payers of the territory. The fact that legislation had already been seriously interfered with and retarded by the unreasonable conduct of the house was referred to, and it was proclaimed that should this contention be maintained and adhered to, to the detriment of the best interests of the people, the house and the party it represents would have to suffer the consequences which the people would unquestionably lay at its door and hold it responsible for.

The matter was then dropped for the time being. Mr. Jaramillo introduced a council bill amending the mode and method of electing county commissioners. Read the first and second time, ordered translated and printed and referred to the committee on counties and county lines.

Mr. Stover thought that there should be some further report and action in regard to the committees of the two houses on the bill in reference to the pay of employees of the two houses. Mr. Catron, of the conference committee, made further report that the committee of the house wanted to know what the council committee wanted, and asked if they were willing to put the pay of the clerks and employees of the house in a special act or to establish a regular contingent fund for each house to draw from to pay clerks, employees and for incidental expenses as required. The council committee was willing to concede the extra number of clerks and employees and to concede the increased expense demanded for those in both houses but would not agree to a special appropriation, but the council committee insisted on making a general appropriation to cover all. The house committee insisted on a special appropriation. All the statements made by the council committee were declared to be false and some other remarks made were not proper or necessary to report to the council. The council committee gave way to their demand for five extra officers and even conceded that the pages and some of the officers of the council might have more pay, but the house would not consent that it should be made in a general appropriation bill and the council committee would consent to nothing else. Mr. Perea soto voice intimated that the words "falsehood" and "lies" were used in the committee by the house conferees.

Mr. Stover hoped that the members of the conference did not so far forget their position as gentlemen and members of the council as to bandy such words when transacting public business. Mr. Mills asked what had become of the resolution to send a committee to Washington to aid in the passage of the land grant and other important bills concerning New Mexico. Mr. Stover asked for information from the judiciary committee to which it was referred, and Mr. Catron made satisfactory explanation, saying the resolution would be forthcoming as soon as the much worked judiciary committee could get around to it.

A message announced that the house had passed a substitute to C. B. No. 5, the high license bill. The house substitute was read in full. Mr. Perea said that small towns under 100 inhabitants paid no license at all, according to this house measure, and he moved the bill be recommended to the judiciary committee, translated and printed. Mr. Stover hoped it would not again be printed as there were but few changes. On motion of Mr. Mills the bill was referred without printing. Adjourned to 10 a. m.

TO-DAY'S SESSION.

After the opening ceremonies Mr. Stover presented a letter from Judge Oakes, of Albuquerque, a gentleman who is interested in the passage of a game law, stating that a great deal of game was being slaughtered at this time near Albuquerque, and as the animals were at

this season of the year carrying their young, he suggested that a law be passed to better protect the game. The letter was referred to the committee on territorial affairs.

A letter was also received from N. C. Donnette of Albuquerque, referring to the protection of settlers who had, under authority of the U. S., located upon lands formerly alleged to be grant land. Referred to the committee on mines and public lands.

The committee on railroads reported favorably, through Mr. Stover, C. B. 47 to amend chapter 23 of the session laws of 1887.

C. B. 28, regulating the business of abstracting, was favorably reported by Mr. Santistevan from the committee on counties and county lines.

A substitute for C. B. 48, enabling authorities of any town or city to fund the indebtedness of same at a lower rate of interest, was reported by Mr. Catron from the committee on municipal affairs and ordered to take its regular course.

H. B. No. 32, relating to sewers in cities and in incorporated towns, was by the same committee favorably reported.

Mr. Richardson introduced C. B. No. 79, an act for fixing the time for holding the supreme and district courts. Referred and referred to the committee on judiciary.

Mr. Richardson also offered C. B. No. 80, relative to supervision of roads in towns and cities. Referred and referred to the committee on public works.

C. B. No. 28, regulating the business of abstracting, was passed.

H. B. No. 32, an act in relation to sewers in incorporated towns, was passed.

C. B. No. 47, to slightly modify the law making it a death penalty to place obstructions on railway tracks, was taken up and passed.

C. B. No. 77, to repeal the act relating to fences in special cases, was passed.

H. B. No. 46, creating a commission to codify and revise the laws, was referred to the committee on judiciary.

C. B. No. 55, to provide for the issue of current expense bonds, was debated at length and on motion of Mr. Catron recommitted to the committee on judiciary.

Adjourned to 10 a. m. to-morrow.

HOUSE.

TO-DAY'S SESSION.

Mr. Montoya presented a petition from the residents of San Miguel protesting against the working of convicts at the penitentiary. Referred to the penitentiary committee.

Mr. Walker, from the finance committee, reported back H. B. No. 66, to tax commercial travelers selling spirituous liquors and cigars in the territory, and recommended that it do pass; also H. B. No. 62, requiring the appointment of a committee of the legislative assembly to settle with the auditor and treasurer, and recommend that it do pass.

Mr. McDonald, from the committee on roads and irrigation, reported back a substitute to H. B. No. 29 and H. B. No. 30, and recommended that it do pass.

Mr. Gable, from the committee on municipal corporations, reported back H. B. No. 24, in relation to special assessments by municipal corporations, and recommended the passage of a substitute.

The committee appointed by the house to confer with the legislative assembly, the council in reference to the number and pay of the employees of the two houses reported as follows:

Your committee heretofore appointed to confer with a like committee of the council upon the matter of pay of the employees of this legislative assembly, beg to report that pursuant to instructions conferred with said committee and failed to agree. The honorable council delivered their ultimatum to the effect that no contingent expense bill, nor any appropriation bill for pay of employees, should pass that honorable body except as contained in a general appropriation bill which, we were informed, would likely be presented within a short time. Our reasons for not agreeing to this were that, as expressed by an honorable member of the council committee to a member of this committee recently and as implied in their ultimatum, "they proposed to hold the employees' appropriation matter as a club over the house;" and your committee not having had the pleasure of instructing themselves by an examination of the mysterious but doubtless perfect appropriation bill mentioned by the honorable member of the conference committee, and, not being empowered, could make no pledge that this house would pass the aforesaid general appropriation bill, especially in view of past financial legislation enacted by the territorial assembly of which three of the honorable committee were illustrious and leading members. Further, we could not give our consent, as representatives of the people who sent us here, to pledge ourselves as a committee, as representatives or as men, to the support of the aforesaid general appropriation bill without being informed as to the contents of the same.

The report was accepted and the committee discharged.

Mr. Otero (by request) introduced H. B. No. 83, to amend section 1, chapter 27, of the session laws of 1887. Read the first and second time, and referred to the committee on public property.

Mr. McDonald offered the following: Resolved, That the special committee appointed by this house to investigate the affairs of the auditor and treasurer, be and the same is hereby instructed to inquire without delay into the affairs of the treasurer's office and report to this house: The sums of money received by the treasurer for each fund, and from whom, since Sept. 1, '90. The sums paid out, to whom and for what purpose, during the same time. The amounts paid in the treasury belonging to separate funds; what said funds are now deposited and in what manner. And whether the funds in this territory are being used directly or indirectly for the benefit of any person or persons now sitting as a member or members of the 29th legislative of the territory of New Mexico.

Read and on motion of Mr. Pedro Sanchez it was adopted.

The chair presented to the house H. B. No. 86, to tax commercial travelers selling spirituous liquors and cigars, and on motion of Mr. Walker it was postponed indefinitely.

The chair laid before the house H. B. No. 52, relating to settlements with the auditor and treasurer. Mr. Read moved that the house be resolved into the committee of the whole to consider the same. Mr. Walker in a long and able speech moved to amend in section 1 line 18, by the words "not more than two members of one political party." Adopted.

After some other amendments the chairman reported the bill to the house and it passed, yeas 23, nays none. Adjourned to 2 p. m.

The council bill introduced to-day, at the solicitation of the Bar association and with the consent of the judicial officers of the territory, provides for the regular terms of the courts as follows:
