WASHINGTON MATTERS.

THE APPROPRIATION BILLS.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The army and the fortification bills have been agreed upon in conference and will doubtless receive the president's approval in a day or two. Four appropriation bills (the District of Columbia, the military academy, the pension and the naval) have passed both houses and will go to the final conference stage as soon as the necessary order can be made by the house of representatives.

In the house it is confidently expected by the party leaders that by the end of this week the deficiency bill will be the only one of the regular annual bills not acted on.

It is intended to finish consideration of the Indian bill early and it has been arranged that the postoffice and agricultural bills shall follow the Indian bill in the order named.

THE LAND COURT.
The Republican caucus list of measures selected for consideration in the committee, after the discussion of the appropriation bills, is as follows: The Indian depredations bill, the Nicaragua canal bill, the pure food and the Conger land bills, the army reorganizing bill, the interstate commerce bill, the land court bill, the bankruptcy bill, the revenue marine bill and the Pacific railroad funding bill.

How far this program may be followed will depend upon the amount of time occupied by the appropriation bills, but it is the caucus' determination that none of the measures named on the list shall be permitted to remain under consideration for an unreasonable length of time.

THE SILVER QUESTION.
The silver question still remains the most absorbing topic of discussion among the members of the house. There is a general fear on the part of the conservative members that it may at some unexpected time be sprung on the house in an unlooked for shape. The belief has, however, now become quite general and strong that no silver bill can be brought in in advance of a report from the coinage committee. This committee has lately shown a disposition to cease further hearing and vote on the bill before it. The silver men are confident that the bill will be reported to the house before the end of the week.

CONDENSED NEWS.

At Bozeman, Mont., twenty-seven inches of snow covers the ground.

Dakota parties are in Utah buying up 30,000 sheep for removal to Dakota.

The rush to Guthrie, Okla., of people desiring to take homes in the Iowa and Sac and Fox lands that have been ceded to the government has already commenced.

Texas Democratic legislators have deserted Cleveland and now clamor for "Hill or any other western man."

It is thought that Gibson, the alleged dynamiting secretary of the whisky trust, is enroute to Europe.

The saddler arrested Saturday in London and announced as "Jack the Ripper," has been released, his record shows that he is not the Whitechapel fiend.

Mrs. McCabe, the murderess of Judge Max Stein, in Reynosa, Mexico, several months ago, and who escaped from the Matamoros, Mexico, jail last Sunday, was captured at Alice, Texas, yesterday.

Cleveland's anti free coinage letter has caused a sensation in Indiana, but, although Indiana favors the free coinage of silver, the Democrats of that state had decided to support Cleveland through thick and thin.

The failure of the coroner's jury at Clarks, Neb., to implicate the murderer of Mrs. C. E. Cowles, wife of the Pacific bank president, who was choked to death last week, has created much adverse comment.

ADDITIONAL LOCAL.

Manzano Valley.
The school election passed off quietly at Manzano. D. Gonzales, August Kayser and Amador Otero being the successful candidates.

While a dance was in progress at the residence of E. A. Dow, a drunken crowd assaulted the house, but Mr. Dow soon dispersed them. Manuel Sanchez y Sanchez, Jesus Sanchez y Gallegos, Dionicio Sedillo and some four or five others were placed under arrest for the assault.

Much snow yet covers the ground in the Manzano valley, and the weather keeps up cooler than usual.

The farming and grazing season promises a fine outlook.

An Unusual Storm.
It is scarcely necessary to remark that the past forty-eight hours is most extraordinary. The whole west, however, is "in it," heavy fogs in Colorado, rain and sleet in California and snow and wind in Nebraska, Montana and Kansas, while electrical disturbances are reported from many points between Chicago and the Pacific coast. In Colorado the prevailing fog was so dense on Monday that all trains had to be run with the utmost caution, and even then the fog resulted in a collision on the Union Pacific road that killed three men.

THE MILITARY MOVE.

Fort Marcy Not to Be Abandoned—A Hint Concerning Department Headquarters.

The following good news came to hand this morning, and is self explanatory: L. A. Hughes, Esq., Santa Fe, N. M.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14, 1891.—Dear Sir: This morning, in company with our delegate, Hon. Antonio Joseph, I called on Gen. Schofield, at his rooms in the war department, to learn exactly the condition of the order relating to the military at Santa Fe.

Gen. Schofield seemed very friendly indeed to Santa Fe. He said, "at one time I expected to have been stationed at Santa Fe, and looked forward to it with much pleasure. We are about to remove the troops for the present on account of the complications in the north among the Sioux Indians, but we do not abandon the post, but shall keep it ready for occupation in the future. It was our expectation to establish the headquarters of the department at Santa Fe, but the California politicians prevented it for the present; but this removal of troops has no relation whatever to that question and the headquarters of the department may be established there at any time when the political pressure is removed."

I do not claim that I give Gen. Schofield's exact words, but substantially, and as nearly as I can remember them.

He impressed me as a friend of Santa Fe. He is the general of the army by the death of Gen. Sherman, the highest military officer in the United States, and I do not believe that he will allow this cruel blow to crush us.

We lose our military friends and band for the present, but we will either get them back soon, or get the headquarters of the department. Yours truly, SAMUEL B. ANTELL.

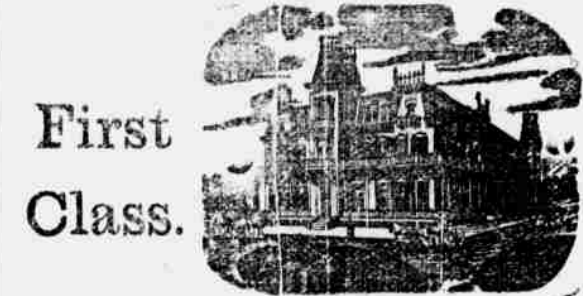

Pass the bill for the suppression of gambling; the present statute licensing gambling is a public disgrace and a reproach.

Gentlemen of the 29th legislative assembly, the appropriations are creeping up and so are the tax levies; there will be a day of reckoning.

Reduce railroad fares to 4 cents per mile; the Santa Fe road reduced its passenger fares to that rate four years ago, and why can not the other roads in New Mexico follow suit?

If partisan considerations and boodle are to defeat the general appropriation bills for the 42d and 43d fiscal years in the house of representatives, the people will know whom to hold responsible, never fear.

Exact a just and fair law compelling the express companies to pay taxes and regulating their rates. Give the people a chance and hit these grasping and rich monopolies because they deserve it and that fully, and because the interests of the people so demand.

The council has passed a good, liberal and well considered appropriation bill for the 42d and 43d fiscal years; if the Democratic house of representatives can afford to defeat that bill for purely partisan and selfish considerations and in obedience to the command of the bosses, well and good; the people will judge in due course of time.

Las Vegas is to have the sum of \$25,000 for the erection of buildings for its insane asylum; this is well and good, and the New Mexican did its share of the work toward securing the money needed for the Las Vegas institution; the insane of this territory should be well taken care of, and the New Mexican believes this will be the case hereafter.

Score another one for the New Mexican; the council and house have passed the bill providing for the taxation of bank shares and shares of stock of insurance companies. The New Mexican called attention to this very important matter and carried it through successfully. The territorial and county treasuries will receive taxes on about two millions worth of such bank shares hereafter.

It may be that the Wells-Fargo monopoly may be stronger than the interests of the business community and of the people; but it is only a question of time, and if that grasping and seemingly powerful monopoly is not curbed this time it will be at the next session; two years are not very long, and the help that the company is getting now, it will not get two years hence, mark the prediction. It will be all the harder when it comes.

The Republican party is not worrying about the appropriation bills for the 42d and 43d fiscal years; if the Democratic house can afford to beat them, the government will go on "allies same"; put a pin right here, read and ponder.

Some of our esteemed contemporaries seem to have the spleen concerning Santa Fe; it is not helping them any, it is not helping the Republican party any, but simply the enemy; but as it can not be helped, let it go.

The good and honest citizens and taxpayers of this city and county and becoming very much disgusted with the tardiness that is shown by the territorial officials in the matter of straightening out the muddle that exists in this county; why can not the collector and the county treasurer be enjoined from recognizing any but the legally elected and qualified county commissioners, namely, Messrs. Staab and Garcia. Governor Prince ought take notice and appoint a commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late W. H. Nesbitt, and that the sooner Solicitor General Bartlett and District Attorney Twitchell move in the case the better for the public good and the public welfare. As we say, decent and law-abiding citizens are becoming greatly disgusted with this state of affairs and something must be done and that speedily.

THE REPORT ON THE CONDITION OF THE BOOKS OF THE AUDITOR AND TREASURER.

Bluster and wind characterize the report of the house committee on the condition of the books of the auditor and treasurer; the committee acknowledges that it would take longer than the time they gave to it to make the proper examination and in fact made a most superficial and one-sided investigation; the report is merely rot and gotten up for partisan purposes; in this connection it must be stated that the record of Treasurer Ortiz compares very favorably indeed with that of the Democratic treasurers of Arkansas, Alabama, Kentucky, Maryland, Tennessee, Mississippi, Missouri, Florida and Louisiana, who have embezzled and stolen some four to five million dollars from the various state treasuries. Mr. Ortiz has handled millions of dollars for the past few years under a bond of only \$20,000, and has been honest; had a Democratic treasurer been in his stead very likely and more than likely the territory would not have at this time nearly \$300,000 in its treasury; it would not have any money for the coming year's expenses and would have no money to pay off about \$75,000 of outstanding warrants on the 4th of March, 1891, or within about two weeks from this date; it would not have reduced its debt during the past two years by \$100,000; but the Democratic treasurer would very likely be now in Canada, enjoying the people's money and living under the protection of the British lion. The less the Democratic party or territories or municipalities the better; even the present extremely partisan and one sided report can not and dare not charge Treasurer Ortiz or Auditor Alarid with being dishonest. It is political rot and booh and no more and no less, and will go exactly for what it is worth.

THE PEREA FINANCE BILL.

Had it not been for the Perea finance bill and an honest auditor and treasurer, the territory would not to-day have nearly \$300,000 in its treasury, of which amount about \$225,000 will be used for expenses of the government for the 42d fiscal year (1891) and about \$75,000 for the reduction of the debt of the territory on March 4 next or in about two weeks; had it not been for the provisions of that act and the honesty and efficiency of Treasurer Ortiz and Auditor Alarid, the territory would not have paid of \$30,000 worth of penitentiary bonds and \$70,000 worth of its floating warrants in the past two years. The large accumulation of funds at this time has been brought about by the fact that the outstanding warrants can only be taken up at the end of the fiscal year from the surplus in the funds existing on the 4th of March and because the new taxes for use in the year 1891 have come in during the past two months; neither the banks nor any individual can be benefited by balances on short time in a bank. The howl about this is either made by the banks in Albuquerque and Las Vegas for selfish purposes or by Democratic politicians for partisan purposes.

The fact remains that the Perea finance bill has saved the territory \$225,000 in the past two years in current expenses; has enabled the executive officers to reduce the debt about \$100,000 during the past two years; will enable them to reduce it still more by about \$70,000 in a couple of weeks, and has put the sum of about \$200,000 into the treasury for expenses for the year 1891. No report of any committee, that investigated nothing, can change these facts, no matter by whom made or by whom signed. The Republicans of New Mexico, Senator Perea and the territorial administration can well afford to stand by this record despite any and all reports by any person or persons, and despite any and all partisan blow, bomb, bluster and rot.

OPEN DAY OR NIGHT

THE LEGISLATIVE LOG.

Several New Candidates in the Field for the Capital—The Normal School Bill Passes the Council.

Taxing Bank Stocks—The Jury Bill—More New Counties—Both Branches Earnestly Pushing the Work.

COUNCIL.

YESTERDAY AFTERNOON'S SESSION.
Mr. Richardson introduced council joint memorial No. 16, to congress in relation to the first New Mexico Reservoir & Irrigation company. On motion of Mr. Richardson, the memorial was read the first, second and third time and passed.

A message announced that the house had passed H. B. No. 43, to amend an act of the legislative assembly of the territory of New Mexico, approved February 14 1889; entitled an act to provide for the protection and propagation of fish. Also had passed house substitute to H. B. No. 90, an act to regulate the drawing of jurors; also H. B. No. 104, to pay a salary to the clerk of the agricultural college and experiment station at Las Cruces; also that the house had passed H. B. No. 131, an act to amend section 16, of chapter 32, of the session laws of 1889, which was revised from the governor by the house and some amendments were adopted and the bill passed. The council went into the committee of the whole upon C. B. No. 60 and C. B. No. 112, relating to the normal schools, with the educational committee's substitute therefor. A number of amendments were offered, but one only adopted (locating a normal school at Los Lunas also).

The following amendment offered by Mr. Stover was voted down:

Provided that there is hereby established at the county seat of each county in the territory in all counties of 5,000 population and over a normal school for the instruction of those desiring to become teachers; and there is hereby appropriated for the support of such normal schools the following amounts to wit: In all counties of 9,000 population and over, \$2,500 each annually; and in all counties of less than 9,000 population and over 5,000 population, \$1,500 each annually. Provided, that each county or town where such normal school is located shall furnish, free of cost to the territory, for the use of such school, suitable building or rooms, furnished for such normal schools, such rooms and the location thereof to be subject to the approval of the territorial superintendent of public instruction.

Provided, further, That this provision shall not apply to counties where normal schools are established by this act, and provided further, that in all counties where the population is less than 5,000, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$500 each for the support of normal institutes to be held under the direction of the superintendent of public instruction of each county, and the territorial superintendent of public instruction.

The normal school bill was then reported favorably and passed.

Mr. Catron presented the following: Whereas this council has received an invitation from the mayor of Las Vegas inviting the members to be present at the laying of the corner stone of a new public school building. Therefore; be it

Resolved, That the council accept said invitation and wish the movers of said enterprise God speed in their undertaking, and congratulate them on being the first to adopt and act under the new school law.

Adjourning to 10 a. m.

TO-DAY'S SESSION.
C. B. No. 114, to amend chapter 49, session laws of the 28th assembly, relating to subscriptions for newspapers to be kept on file by the county clerk, was passed. It provides that two copies instead of one copy of each county newspaper shall be subscribed for and kept on file, one copy to be kept in the office of the county clerk and one copy by the territorial librarian.

H. B. No. 91, providing for the publication of legal notices in English and Spanish, was reported with some amendments by Mr. Catron of the judiciary committee.

Mr. Stover introduced a resolution providing that hereafter all bills and resolutions introduced or come to the house shall at once after second reading be referred to committee of the whole and the several committees of the council shall report without delay all measures in their hands. Adopted.

The following new bills were introduced, ordered translated and printed and referred to committee of the whole: By Mr. Mills, C. B. No. 139, to amend section 2033, Compiled Laws; also C. B. No. 104, to amend section 11, of chapter 56, relative to the solicitor general's duties. Also C. B. No. 141, providing a method for the assessment and taxation of railroads.

Mr. Stover again offered his resolution providing for a council calendar, and the same was laid over under the rule.

C. B. No. 64, relating to the office of county treasurers and fixing the salary thereof, was taken up in committee of the whole and its consideration resumed at section 16. After a time the council took a recess till 2 p. m.

HOUSE.

YESTERDAY AFTERNOON'S SESSION.

House substitute to H. B. No. 96, in reference to the drawing of jurors, was taken up in committee of the whole; Mr. George in the chair. In compliance with the instructions of the committee the chairman reported the bill favorably to the house and the bill was passed. H. B. No. 92, to amend section 2834, of the Compiled Laws, and for other purposes, which had been reported from the judiciary committee adversely, was taken up, and on motion laid on the table indefinitely. The chair presented to the house H. B. No. 57, to repeal subdivisions 6, 9, and 10, section 2801, Compiled Laws, repealing retail merchants' license act, over which there was such a spirited fight to get it to a third reading at the previous day's session and it was laid on the table indefinitely. H. B. No. 51, to suppress abuses committed by persons in killing wild and domestic animals for food; was taken up and on motion it was laid on the table indefinitely. H. B. No. 111, to regulate the carriage and transfer of freight which had been reported from the judiciary committee adversely; was on motion laid on the table indefinitely. The chair presented to the house for its consideration H. B. No. 123, to establish

the boundary lines of Taos county, which was reported adversely from the committee on counties. After some discussion this bill was laid on the table indefinitely. The chair presented to the house for its consideration, H. B. No. 108, to amend the revenue laws and to provide for the taxation of stock in incorporated companies. This bill was taken up and after careful consideration was passed.

On motion of Mr. Montoya, H. B. No. 48, for the incorporation of colony and town grants of lands, was taken up for consideration, Mr. Walker in the chair. This bill occupied the remainder of the afternoon. Quite a number of amendments were offered; some were adopted and others rejected, and finally the bill was reported favorably to the house and passed.

TO-DAY'S SESSION.

Mr. Hubbell presented a petition from the commercial club of Albuquerque praying for an appropriation for a suitable exhibit for New Mexico at the World's Fair.

The following bills were introduced, read the first and second time and referred to appropriate committees.

By Mr. Burns, H. B. No. 160, an act to fix the salary of the probate judge of Sierra county at \$500.

By Mr. Garcia, H. B. No. 161, relating to incorporated towns and cities.

By Mr. Montoya, H. B. No. 162, in reference to insurance companies.

By Mr. Hubbell, H. B. No. 163, an act to provide for an exhibit at the World's Fair Chicago.

By Mr. Montoya, H. B. No. 164, to amend section 2033 of the Compiled Laws of New Mexico.

By Mr. Fall, H. B. No. 165, to promote and protect the horticultural interests of New Mexico.

By Mr. Montoya, H. B. No. 166, an act to amend section 11 of chapter 56, of an act of the 28th assembly entitled an act with reference to the office of solicitor general and district attorney and other purposes.

By Mr. Montoya, H. B. No. 167, an act to provide for ascertaining and paying off the indebtedness of all cities incorporated by an act of the 28th assembly approved February 11, 1889.

By Mr. Herrera, H. B. No. 168, an act to repeal the 5th subdivision Sec.—of the compiled laws of 1889.

By Mr. Herrera, H. B. No. 169, an act to repeal sections 989, 990, 991, of the compiled laws.

H. B. No. 160, fixing salary of probate judge of Sierra county at \$500, was passed.

Mr. Fall, from the judiciary committee, reported back C. B. No. 71, for the appointment of a district attorney, to the counties of Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy; also C. B. No. 85, to amend section 6, chapter 56, of the session laws of 1889, relative to district attorneys, adversely, and submitted a substitute therefor. On motion of Mr. Easley the house went into committee of the whole. Mr. McDonald in the chair. The bill provides that the annual pay of the district attorneys shall be for Dona Ana county, \$400; for Socorro county, \$400; for Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy counties, \$500. In addition to this pay, the county of Dona Ana pays \$300; the county of Socorro, \$300; the county of Lincoln, \$200; the county of Chaves, \$150, and the county of Eddy \$150. The bill was reported favorably to the house and passed.

The chair presented to the house, house substitute to H. B. No. 112, relating to the killing of animals. The house went into committee of the whole. Mr. George in the chair. An amendment was adopted that hides of bovine animals shall be kept for twenty days and of sheep for ten days for public inspection. The bill was reported favorably to the house and passed.

A message announced that the council had passed a council substitute to C. B. No. 60, establishing and providing for the maintenance of normal schools; also C. B. No. 120, to provide for the maintenance of normal schools; also that the council had passed C. B. No. 114, to amend chapter 49, of the session laws of the 28th assembly, relating to the preservation of newspapers. The chair announced having signed C. B. No. 115, making an appropriation for the construction of a suitable building for the territorial insane asylum of New Mexico; also council joint resolution No. 10, relating to the early promotion of Gen. E. A. Carr; also council joint resolution No. 10, relating to the death of Gen. Wm. T. Sherman.

Mr. Herrera, by unanimous consent, introduced H. B. No. 170, for the removal of the capital or seat of government from Santa Fe to Las Vegas. Read the first time. On motion of Mr. Montoya, read the second time, and on the further motion of Mr. Montoya the bill was referred to the special committee. Adjourned to 2:30 p. m.

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT.

The New Mexican copies the following from the Albuquerque Citizen and does it with pleasure: "The New Mexican is authority for the statement that Hon. W. G. Meyler, of this city, has been favorably mentioned for territorial school superintendent, and the Citizen takes pleasure in assuring Gov. Prince that he could not select a better or more competent man for the place, or one who could more successfully put our new educational machinery into operation.
